Miscellaneous.

A COMBAT OF CUIRASSIERS—The consequences might have been disastrous in the level and open plains which ensued when the retiring columns approached the Danube, had not the Archduke placed twelve squadrons of the Emperor's cuirassiers and a large body of hussars in front of Egloshaim, which was garrisoned by six battalions of grenadiers, and supported by several powerful batteries. As the passing columns approached this imposing mass of cavalry, they paused till the French horse came up in sufficient strength to harass them and engage; a variety of charges with various success; but at length the magnificent Austrian cuirassiers bore down with apparently irresistible force upon their pursuers. The French light horse could not withstand the shock, and were quickly dispersed; but their cuirassiers came up, and then two rival bodies, equally heavily armed, equally brave, equally disciplined, engaged in mortal combat. So vehement was the onset, so nearly matched the strength of the combatants, so tremendous the conflict, that both parties, as if by mutual consent, suspended their fire to await its issue: the roar of the musketry subsided, even the heavy booming of the artillery ceased, and from the mêlée was heard only, as from the battles of the knights of old, the loud clang of the swords ringing on the helmets and cuirasses of the dauntless antagonists. The sun shone while the combat was yet undecided; the moon rose on the deadly strife; and amidst her silvery rays fire was struck on all sides by the steel upon the armour, and dazzling sparks flew around the combatants, as if a thousand anvils were at once ringing under the blows of the forgers. Nothing could overcome the heroic courage of the Imperialists, but their equipment was not equal to that of their opponents; and in close fight, the Austrian horsemen, whose front only was covered, were not an adequate match for the cuirassiers of Napoleon, whose armour went entirely round their body. After a desperate struggle, their numbers were so reduced, that they were unable any longer to make head against the enemy; and, leaving two-thirds of their number on the field, they were driven in disorder along the chaussee towards Ratisban.

A JUVENILE ORATOR.

'Universal Morality, and may we become truly intellectual beings,' was responded to by a very short gentleman who had worn his coat during the whole evening. He made a brilliant oration, mentioned Greek, and quoted Latin: spoke of Dido in her cave; called upon the company to support the cause of morals and to endeavour to make all men intellectual; dashed a beer-glass to pieces, and overset a tumbler of brandy-and-water (*plus aqua*), stamped upon the toes of Davy, and, 'in a fine phrenzy,' spread out his arms, and gave an individual seated near him a very excellent prospect of a black eye; in conclusion he made a splendid peroration, played with the cords of his clock, and exclaiming with great volubility, 'that—that—that—such will be the case?' seated himself with a self-complacent air, and amidst universal approbation.

The Sheep Guarding the Shepherd.—A Paris paper relates an amusing incident, which occurred recently in the Department of Nièvre. The worthy old rector of the parish, over which he had been pastor nearly twenty years, received preferment from his Bishop, and was ordered to a higher station in another place. He was greatly beloved by his flock, and was no less attached to them himself; he expected to have a parting scene which would be painful to his feelings, when he came to take leave of them, and he determined to take himself off quietly without letting any one into the secret. One morning, therefore, he left the village about the break of day, and journeyed towards his new benefice; but he had not walked above a league or two, before his departure became known, the inhabitants of the village assembled en masse, and determined to fetch him back.—Away they went after him, and in due time overtaking the stray shepherd, brought him back in triumph to his rectory, where they have since kept a guard of six men posted round his house to hinder any new attempt at flight. The old rector, overcome by the rather boisterous testimonials of affection from his parishioners, had subsequently written to the Bishop, begging to decline the preferment offered to him.

PERSIAN SUPERSTITION.—The Persians are of opinion that a lion will never hurt a person of their religion, which is somewhat different from that of the Turks. They firmly believe that their lions would devour a Turk; but that for themselves they are perfectly safe, if they take care to let the lion know, by some exclamation, what religion they are of. This opinion shows, as I have already told you, that men are not often attacked by lions in Persia.

THE WALNUT TREE.—Walnuts yield half their own weight in oil, whose flavor is considered equal to that of the finest Lucina oil. This very fruitful tree, which we see flourishing along the high road, and in the orchards of the peasants, is one of great utility to the German; his furniture is made from it, the leaves dye a good black, and he feeds his cattle with the shells of the nuts that have supplied his oil.

The court of Java is persuaded, that women are better calculated than men, for negotiation, that they are more accustomed to dissimulation and constraint, that they have more address and docility, and that they possess greater resources of a creative fancy, as well as the fertility of expediency.

THE QUEBEC TRANSCRIPT.

Many of our readers will join us in the expression of sincere commiseration and regret at the truly melancholy account below. Under the veil of exaggeration and inaccuracy, they will be able to recognize the description of an individual who in brighter and happier days had many warm friends, and who, by his talents and education, was well qualified to adorn his profession, or any society in which he moved. No one can read the account without exclaiming—*Quantum mutatus ab illo?* or breathing the wish that the mournful example may not be lost.

Melancholy consequence of Intemperance.—At a late hour on Friday night, a watchman met a man in the street, whose conduct betokened him a perfect maniac, and the watchman had him conveyed to the watch house, where he said his name was T——. On Saturday morning he was brought before the magistrate but was still so dreadfully afflicted with *delirium tremens*, or insanity in some other form, that it was found useless to ask any questions, and he was sent back to prison.

In the course of the day a gentleman happened to see T——'s name on the watch returns, and became curious to ascertain if he could be a person whom he knew under happier auspices. He accordingly went down to the cell and at once satisfied himself that the unhappy lunatic was his former acquaintance. And now for a brief outline of his unfortunate career.

T—— is by birth an Irishman, and connected with some of the first families in England and Ireland. At an early period in life, he entered Trinity College, Dublin, where he graduated, and after a most brilliant collegiate career, left it. He then became an *attache* to the Bishop of Clogher, with the view of taking holy orders in the Established Church of England, in which, from his high connections, he had good reason to expect a speedy promotion. The unnatural propensities of the Bishop of Clogher having, however, been discovered, and himself obliged to fly his country to avoid probably an ignominious death, T—— changed his mind as to his future career, and obtained a commission in the English army. The regiment to which he was attached was sent to the Peninsula, and during a considerable part of the war H——'s regiment was in active service, and he conducted himself so as to obtain the character of an excellent officer. When the war terminated his regiment was disbanded, and he again turned himself to the church, and was ordained, and became Chaplain to a regiment. His regiment afterwards went to Canada, where he accompanied it, and there he imbibed those habits which have been his destruction. As is always the case, he did not become an habitual drunkard at once, but having on one or two occasions appeared publicly in a state of intoxication, he was obliged to relinquish his situation in the church. He then for a short time conducted himself as a tutor, but his unfortunate habits soon deprived him of this resource. He next edited, and we believe first established a paper in Montreal, which has now a considerable circulation.

From this situation he was also soon driven by intemperance. He then came to New-York, where he was employed as assistant editor to one of the morning papers, and proved himself a man of very superior talent. But his unrelenting enemy, alcohol, very soon left him again without employment, and after enduring extreme poverty for some time, he became clerk to one of the theatres. His habits now became worse than ever, and he was so seldom sober that he was turned away from the theatre, and found himself without any means of earning bread. In order to prevent himself from starving, he was next obliged to become a mere menial drudge, and run on errands, or do any thing by which he could earn a shilling. He now seemed to have lost all recollection of what he had once been, or still might be if he could get rid of his miserable habit of intemperance, and he became a low drunken loafer, who would associate with any one, or go any where to get a glass of grog. Alcohol was all he now cared for, and he was seldom or ever sober. Such a career could not but soon close in death or insanity, and the latter has been the consequence in this case, and he is to be sent to the Lunatic Asylum. Thus, an accomplished scholar, possessing talents and of most respectable connections, and who began the world with a brilliant prospect, and all the means to make a glorious career, has cut it short while yet in the prime of life, by indulging in that most irrational of all sensual pleasures—alcohol. And as if nothing

should be wanting to render his fate melancholy and deplorable, he has left a young and interesting family, depending for their daily bread, on their own feeble and inefficient industry, or the world's cold charity.—*New York Journal of Commerce.*

An actor, who two years ago performed in secondary characters at the Havre theatre, recently transferred his talents to a Belgian theatre. Learning that a formidable cabal opposed his reception, he made his debut with the following singular address to the ungracious public:—“Ladies and gentlemen, I am aware that you won't have me; be pleased, therefore, to hiss me at once. It will save me the mortification of appearing three times before you, and save yourselves the tedium of enduring my presence as often.” The request was forthwith complied with; for five minutes together the hissing was unanimous; after which the artists courteously bowed and withdrew.

ENGLISH EXTRACTS.

London, June 5th.—Just previously to the Queen's departure yesterday from Windsor Castle, Mr. Brown, surgeon, of Fleet street, was sent for to attend Her Majesty. Upon leaving the Castle, a bank-note in an envelope was put into Mr. Brown's hands, which, without opening, he safely, as he imagined, deposited in his waistcoat pocket. On his arrival at his residence he discovered that the “Royal Fee” had vanished.

Mr. William Tynemouth was released from Durham prison lately, after having suffered incarceration in that place nearly nineteen years, for non-payment of a penalty to the Excise.

A most extraordinary increase of water has arisen in the Serpentine River, by the sudden irruption of fresh springs, so much so that at now overflows, and runs down the rocks which were intended for a waterfall, but which, from a deficiency of water, have not been overflowed for twelve years past. Within three months the waters have increased upwards of six feet.

At one of the enormous fetes given by the Emperor of Russia, at the commencement of the new year, to which no less than 25,000 invitations are said to be issued, there were found to be 35 degrees of heat in the apartments, and above 20 degrees of frost in open air. This contrast was fatal in many cases, death being occasioned by the sudden transition from heat to cold in only getting to the carriages.

The demoralized state of the Australian colonies has frequently been adverted to, and it appears by late accounts that the military stationed there have deeply partaken of the taint. The Sydney Herald of Nov. 14, says, “It is a melancholy fact, that there is at this moment a lieutenant of the 80th Regiment and 21 private soldiers of the different regiments in the colony (but principally the 80th and 28th) now in Sydney jail on different criminal charges.”

There are now three peers living, who have filled the office of Speaker of the House of Commons—namely, Lord Sidmouth, Lord Castlereagh, and Lord Danvers.

By way of inducing the Cockneys to take a trip by the Great Western Railway, they are obligingly told that they may have “an agreeable view of the Lunatic Asylum.”

What they drink in England.—The London Morning Herald has the following paragraph:—“No country ever before possessed such noble colonies as England does; and never before did colonists exhibit proofs of devotion to the mother country so striking as those which she at this moment displayed on every side by the inhabitants of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. England can never lose those invaluable provinces, except through the grossest abandonment, on the part of her rulers, of her highest interests—and if ever those provinces be lost to England, England herself must prepare to descend to the level of a province!”

In 1706, the stage coaches went from London to York in four days, and now they perform the distance in twenty-four hours. In 1712, it took thirteen days to travel by coach from London to Edinburgh, and now it requires but forty hours! In 1760, travellers were two whole days in going from London to Brighton, now they are only about five hours.

United States.

During a late trial in St. Louis, for passing a counterfeit note, the note itself was stolen from court, and the accused was accordingly released.

A man was recently fined, at Lowell, 15 dollars, only, for taking a letter written by a lady from the post office, opening it, and reading its contents. The person, a gentleman, to whom the letter was addressed, was the prosecutor.

Hayey Theatre.—This house was crowded to excess last evening, on which occasion the President of the United States was present. The performances were the comedy of the Honey Moon, which was admirably acted throughout, and the moral spectacle of the Lion King, which still continues to increase in attraction and popularity.

At Cincinnati flour is selling at four dollars eighty seven cents per barrel.

A Baker at Pittsburgh proposes to sell ten pounds of baked bread for 25 cents.

The oldest town in the United States, it is said, is St. Augustine, Florida, by more than forty years. It was founded forty years before Virginia was colonized. Some of the houses are yet standing which are said to have been built more than three centuries ago.

THE TRANSCRIPT.

QUEBEC, WEDNESDAY, JULY 17, 1839.

This day's mail brought no papers from any quarter, of a later date than those which were received yesterday, per steamer, from Montreal.

London and Liverpool papers from the 27th to 31st May, inclusive, were received by mail yesterday, having been brought to New York by the packet-ship *Virginia*, which sailed from Liverpool on the 14th June. Their contents cannot, of course, be news; but we have culled a few items from them, which will be found in another column.

The following extract from the London *Morning Herald* of the 27th May has not, we believe, been previously published by any paper in Lower Canada:—

The Earl of Aberdeen's second son, Lieut. the Hon. Alexander Gordon, of the Grenadier Guards, has been appointed to the staff in Canada, as aide de camp to Major General Sir James Mc Donnell, K. C. B., the second in command in the Province.

A fire broke out, at Eastport, Maine, on the morning of the 6th instant, which destroyed property worth two hundred and forty thousand dollars, of which about eighty thousand was insured.

Four hundred acres of land, in the township of Blenheim, Upper Canada, being lot 89 in the 12th concession, were sold by auction, in London, on the 23rd May, for £105.

The redoubtable Dr. O'Callaghan, it would appear from a paragraph in the Albany Daily Sun, has pitched his tent in that city, with what view does not appear. The individual alluded to in a paragraph with the remarkable inappropriate ending of *Srunx!* The editor is talking of the judgment obtained by O'Callaghan against Mr. Doyle of Montreal, but evidently does not mean that his vulgar monosyllabic head shall refer to the latter gentleman.

In the Court of Quarter Sessions, yesterday, an altercation arose between a gentleman of the long robe and one of the Clerks of the Peace, who acts for the Crown, which led the Bench to anticipate a “hostile meeting.” This unfortunate affair occurred during the trial of a man for stealing a five-dollar note, in the course of which, Mr. Aylwin, the counsel for the prisoner, left the Court, with permission from the Bench, to procure authorities on the law of evidence, a statement having been made by one of the witnesses touching an admission of guilt by the prisoner which Mr. Aylwin contended could not be received as evidence. When Mr. Aylwin had left the Court

a conversation commenced between Dr. Manden, the witness alluded to, and Mr. Scott, the Clerk of the Peace, respecting the trial, when Mr. Dunbar Ross rose, as *amicus curiæ*, and said that, during the absence of the prisoner's counsel, such conversation was improper. This was characterised by Mr. Scott as “impertinent,” and some angry words arose between that gentleman and Mr. Ross. The latter eventually appealed to the Court, saying that either he was in the wrong or Mr. Scott was right, or vice versa. On this Mr. Mr. Symes, one of the Magistrates sitting on the Bench, decided, (the others concurring,) that the conduct of Mr. Ross was not “impertinent,” but at the same time observed that he did not conceive that there was any necessity to give any formal decision as to the propriety or otherwise of the conduct of either party, the gentlemen having no doubt acted from proper motives. Here the matter apparently stopped. Shortly after the return of Mr. Aylwin, however, the Court became apprehensive of an “affair of honour,” and Mr. Symes called upon Messrs. Ross and Scott to put in securities to keep the peace towards each other in particular, and Her Majesty's laws in general; thus taking additional security that the Clerk of the Peace should take good care of it.

During the course of the affair, Mr. A. Stuart, Jr., advocated the right of a lawyer to act as *amicus curiæ* on behalf of a prisoner.

In another part of it is sheet will be found an affecting account of an individual who was well known in Quebec and Montreal.

From Montreal papers of Monday.

(From the Montreal Herald.)

The Rev. Mr. Perkin, of the American Presbyterian Church in this city, having been under the necessity of travelling for the benefit of his health, a clergyman from Boston, of the same persuasion, was lately invited to officiate during his temporary absence. He commenced his labours on the morning of the day week, when he delivered a sermon, as might be considered proper for a fourth of July oration addressed to “sympathizing” Americans, but was considered so disorganised in his views by the hearers that they left the church in great numbers. His tirades about British tyranny and the galling yoke, as he called it, of British connection, were of the most insulting description to his audience, while his descriptions of the vices of republicanism and the “horrid independence and institutions” of the land of slaves, were of the most glowing nature. The consequence was that there was no divine service in the church in the afternoon.

The Congregation showed good sense in leaving him to preach to empty benches, and in afterwards closing the doors of their church against this pestilent fellow; we hope the lesson he has been taught, for preaching against the laws and institutions of a country protecting him, will prove salutary.

We understand that the Rev. Wm. Tappan, Pastor of the Secession Congregation in this city, has acceded to the request of the Committee of the French Canadian Missionary Society, and in consequence, will shortly proceed to Europe as their agent.

A few evenings ago, at an evening auction sale of books, a lot was offered, consisting of twelve copies of Lord Durham's famous report on the state of the British American provinces. After considerable delay, the sum of one farthing was offered for the lot, but as there was no advance, the auctioneer withdrew it. The gentleman who offered this magnificent sum intended to use the report for wiping his razor. The popularity of the egotistical “People's Peer” is on the wane in the Canadas.

Commercial.

THE QUEBEC TRANSCRIPT.

REVIEW OF THE NEW YORK MARKETS FOR THREE DAYS PRECEDING

Wednesday, 10th July 1839.

Ades—Holders of Pots generally require \$5 and the transactions have in consequence been quite limited since our last, at \$4.87 1/2 a \$5, though the latter rate was obtained only for superior parcels. For Pearls also, a further considerable advance on that notice in our last is now demanded, and the sales therefore have been only to a very trifling extent, unworthy special notice.

Flour—There has been no variation in the market requiring special notice for any description of either Western or Southern; the transactions, which are yet with only a few occasional exceptions confined to parcels as necessary for immediate domestic use, comprise common brands of Western canal at \$6, 25, with some also at \$6, 12 1/2; good fancy do. \$6, 50; Ohio via canal \$6 1/2 to \$6, 12 1/2; and Georgetown \$6, 12 1/2 to \$6, 17 1/2; the common descriptions of Southern may be quoted at \$6.

Provisions—With respect to the demand generally, there has been no change of importance. Beef also continues as before unnoticed in price. Pork we quote \$18.25 for Mess, as referring, however, to Western alone, and Prime \$14 to \$15.50, including all descriptions. Lard also is yet comprised within 11 1/2 to 13 cents for both western and northern. Hams range from 12 to 13 cents, the same as previously quoted. In the remaining articles there is nothing which requires notice at present.

Exchange—On the date of our last, the rate on England rose to \$4.87 a \$4.88 (9 1/2 to 10 per cent. prem.) the pound sterling; this was, however, owing to the circumstance of the withdrawal of the United States Bank, as their supply of bills had become exhausted, by which the business was thrown into private hands. On France the closing rates were, 1/5, 1/2, to 1/5, 1/3. For the London packet, which leaves to-day, there was nothing worthy of notice done. The United States Bank intends, we understand, furnishing bills on England for the packet of the 13th inst.
