comes a good brown. See that the boards are perfectly clean and dry, then with a large painter's brush apply the stain. When this is dry give a second coating is necessary. Wash the brush in soft soap and soda, using plenty of warm water, dry it and then give the boards a coating of linseed oil mixed with a good drying medium. When the oil has dried in begin polishing with the usual beeswax and turpentine. The two or three rubbings with this will be necessary before a good surface is obtained.

Although the wheat crop of Manitoba was this year below the average, the farmers of that province were never in a more prosperous condition.

Dr. Talmage, in a recent address on the country newspaper, spoke thus: "A newspaper whose columns overflow with advertisements of business men has more influence in attracting attention to and building up a city or a town than any other agency that can be employed."

The two party papers in this county are getting into a warm discussion over the merits and demerits of the Minister of Agriculture, as manifested during his recent visit to this county.

There appears to be a general awakening all over the Province in the line of the enforcement of law against the liquor traffic. In Yarmouth and Windsor the Scott Act is being vigorously enforced.

The Apple Shipping Company.

By submitting to the farmers and fruit growers of the Cornwallis and Annapolis Valleys the following outlines of a scheme for the profitable marketing of their apple crop, the promoters ask their consideration and support of the same and invite their criticism.

The scheme proposed is as follows: 1. The formation of a Joint Stock Company with the object of encouraging the producer to ship and market his own apples; and having for its shareholders, principally, the farmers and fruit growers of the Cornwallis and Annapolis Valleys.

2. By combination and co-operation to secure the control of as large a portion of the apple crop for shipment as possible. 3. The erection of warehouses at large shipping stations for the receiving, storing, assorting and shipping of apples.

4. The judicious regulation by one central authority of shipments, in accordance with the state of the markets, and the providing suitable and well ventilated steamers for the carrying of apples. 5. The securing the full advantage of competition as regards freight rates, with the further advantage of shipping from and to any suitable port.

6. The practical extinction of middlemen's tolls, as the shareholders will, through their own officers, market their own apples and transact their own business. 7. The reduction of commission and other charges in England to a minimum, consequent upon the controlling of all shipments to their own accredited agents.

To carry out this scheme it is proposed to start with a capital of \$50,000, in 500 shares of \$10 each. This is a small amount for the 5000 fruit growers of these districts to raise, when the benefits they will immediately derive are taken into consideration. The money will be required gradually, and as the directors—who will be appointed by the shareholders themselves—see fit; principally for the building of warehouses such as those at Cambridge and Port Williams, where apples can be handled independently of the state of the weather, and be ready for shipment whenever steamers arrive.

Fruit growers know that no greater boon could be conferred on them than the erection of such warehouses, connected by sidings with the railway. It will now be for themselves to decide, by the amount of their subscriptions, whether their district can get a warehouse or not.

The providing of cold storage is no part of the scheme. When gotten up at Halifax and on the steamers, of course any shareholder at his request can have his apples shipped in cold storage, but the great bulk of our apples do not require cold storage, but well ventilated steamers, and it is only wanted for the softer kinds, such as greensteins, etc.

It is manifest the scheme is practicable, and can be made to fully meet the circumstances of the case. It only requires, those for whom it is intended to become shareholders to make it profitable. Joint stock companies of farmers have revolutionized the dairy industries of Canada, and a joint stock company of fruit growers can revolutionize the apple industry of Nova Scotia, but this can only be done, and it is the basis of the whole scheme, by the fruit growers themselves becoming the shareholders and having direct personal interest in the success of the Company. No outside interest or capital can be substituted. The scheme is for the farmers and fruit growers, and for them alone.

So many schemes are brought forward for the benefit of farmers and fruit growers, that they naturally look with a certain amount of suspicion on every fresh proposal.

move that is to take money out of their pockets, and rightly question the motives of the promoters.

We submit our scheme for their closest examination and leave it for them to decide whether it will be for their benefit or not.

Personally, and I think I am expressing the sentiments of those associated with me, I have no axe to grind, and no desire for any position in connection with the proposed company. Induced by friends to look into the present system of marketing our apples, the helpless position of the producer soon became apparent, and that the effectual remedy is combination and co-operation, and the conducting of the business through the agency of a joint stock company of which the fruit growers themselves are the shareholders.

Stock lists will be circulated forthwith, and further action will depend upon the readiness shown by fruit growers to adopt the scheme which will be evidenced by the amount of their subscriptions thereto.
