Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

8 Any person who is the sole head of a tamily, or any male over 18 8 Any person who is the sole head of a tamily, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, bother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties: Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his hemestea on a farm of at least 80 acres selly wned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, orother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter

good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead.

good standing may pre-empt a quarter section alongside his homestead. Price \$3 per acre.

Duties: Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six nonthin each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the timerequired to earn homestead patent), and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purch is ed homestead in certain districts. Price \$3 per acre. Duties: Must reside six months in each of the system cultivate fifty acres and erect a fine is worth \$300.

It is therefore incorrect to speak as it the problem before us were one which trade could scive. It must be remembered, especially in Canada where there is a tandency to complain of the conservative methods of the British trader could scive. 





SELLS MOSTLY AT HOME.

How the Canadian Farmer Disposes of his Year's Crop.

Canada as everybody knows is a canada as everybody knows is a very great food exporting country. We sent out in the year 1910 \$21,-607,692 worth of cheese, practically the whole of which was sent to the United Kingdom. We exported to the same destination \$6,836,392 worth of bacon and ham. The wheat export of the Dominion of Canada which at exposuration reached only 2,284,702 confederation reached only 2,284,702 bushels, amounted in 1910 to no less than 49,741,350 bushels of which over 46,509,000 bushels was sent to Great

Britain.
Our Canadian farmer is greatly in-Our Canadian farmer is greatly interested in this export business and particularly in his connection with the British market, but it is not generally realized that this foreign or export market represents only a small part, not more than one fifth of the hierest of the Canadian farmer as a producer. The statement has been very frequently made that 80 per cent of every thing that is grown upon our farms is consumed within our own borders. Some people have been inclined to challenge this. They have the general idea that the Canadian farmer is a grain grower and have the general idea that the Canadian farmer is a grain grower and that Canada is a grain exporting country and have failed to appreciate the enormous growth of our own home consumption, and the vast quantity of farm produce that is necessarily consumed in a community of eight million people or by cities like Montreal and Toronto with about half a million of inhabitants each. On examination there seems ample warrant for the statement that Canada consumes 80 per cent of this agricultural output. We may reach this result from the following calculations:

The Crop Bulletin for 1909 places the value of all the wheat, oats and beriey grown in Canada that year at \$289,144,000.00. To arrive at the hame consumption of the crops we must deduct the net exports, i. e., the exports of such produce proper, less any imports entered for consumption. For the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1910, the exports (Canadian produce only) were:
