It is quite possible, nevertheless, that his gratitude is premature, that his self-conceit is deceiving him somewhat; and that, as an undoubt ed matter of fact, he has been more han once guilty of actual stealing He has not, perhaps, committed theft in its technical sense—the sec ret purloining of another man's goods contrary to the rational will of their owner; but technical theft is not the only way in which the Seventh Commandment may be broken. What concerns the penitent is the theological definition of stealing, and that is: The enjust taking or keeping of the goods of another against his will, when he rightly wishes not to be deprived of them.


