Home Rule Campaign.

Yesterday we pointed out that the passing of the Parliament Bill cleared the way for the passing of a Home Rule Bill within the next two or three years. A message from London to-day conveys the intelligence that the two great parties at home are preparing for a struggle on the Home Rule issue, and that both parties are preparing for a big campaign on that issue. That the enactment of some such statute as is embodied in the Parliament Bill would be a necessary preliminary to the successful passage of a Home Rule Bill has been evident to everybody. Sir Gladstone saw it eighteen years ago and was desirous of forcing on the issue in spite of his advanced age and increasing infirmities. The Nationalists' support of the Liberal party in their fight against the House of Lords has been based on that assumption. The Tory campaign of denunciation of Premier Asquith as the helot of John Redmond, and of denunciation of the latter as the American Dollar Dictator, is based on the same assumption. Lord Dunsany, the Irish Unionist and advocate of Devolution, says in a work just published:—"Constitutional reform is desirable both for its material and moral effect. It is necessary to ensure better government. It is necessary as an

expression of nationality, and a true sense of nationality finding a legitimate mode of expression is necessary for the creation and development of those civic virtues without which Ireland cannot progress. Ireland cannot be content without some political recognition of her nationality; nor, save under the stimulus of control over her own affairs, can the people of Ireland regain the self-confidence and energy necessary for industrial development in agricultural and other trades."

He also added that—"The people of Ireland are not likely, under any circumstances, to abandon their political claims. If they did, I should deeply regret it, for I do not believe that under the legislative Union as it stands, real prosperity and progress is possible."

Geneva, August 5. — An exciting chase after a murderer, across a spur of the Mont Blanc range, took place recently, and the fugitive was finally arrested and handcuffed at a height of 7,700 ft. by gendarmes and Alpinists.
Three young Italian workmen were repairing the Alpine hut at Rosalire, near the summit of the Tournette, a mountain near Geneva, when two of them, named Dielemino and Guelpa, quarrelled. The former drew a knife and stabbed his companion, who died almost immediately.
Dielemino then fled across the mountain in the direction of the Swiss frontier, with the object of reaching Geneva. Two Alpinists, who had witnessed the murder, abandoned their excursion and hastened down to Thones to inform the police. Two gendarmes thereupon started in pursuit of the murderer, accompanied by the Alpinists.
Meanwhile, Dielemino had descended the Tournette, and, after crossing the valley, began the ascent of the more difficult Col de Montremont. Owing to the great heat, the pursuers were at a disadvantage, for the fugitive proved an expert climber. Moreover, he left the ordinary paths and risked his life among precipices in order to gain on his pursuers.
Finally, the murderer showed signs of exhaustion, and he sat down on a rock to rest. The gendarmes drew their revolvers when they came within range and threatened to shoot him unless he surrendered. Thereupon Dielemino allowed himself to be handcuffed and led to Thones.



Washington, Aug. 7.—A congress of nations to adopt a "World Alphabet" is called for in a bill introduced by Representative Jackson of Kansas. Mr. Jackson wants the President to invite all nations to send delegates to Washington 2, 1912, to consider the possibilities and feasibility of promulgating all elementary sounds of the human voice which may be used in forming an speech or expression of ideas and of formulating a graphic sound notation of alphabet for all such sounds, which alphabet shall be adapted to the use of every language, dialect and form of human vocal expression and shall be suitable for writing, printing, engraving, and other forms of presentation. In presenting this "unprecedented scientific alphabet," Representative Jackson particularly asks that the views of all "linguists, phoneticians, philologists, lexicographers, orthographers, orthographers, translators, teachers of languages, artists, oculists, physicians, anatomists, stenographers, artists, typographers, linotypists, tenoraphers, phonographers and type foundries" be taken into consideration.

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

Mr. Jackson wants the President to invite all nations to send delegates to Washington in 1912, to consider the possibilities and feasibility of recording all elementary sounds of the human voice which may be used in human speech or expression of ideas and of formulating a graphic sound notation of alphabet for all such sounds, which alphabet shall be adapted to the use of every language, dialect and form of human vocal expression and shall be suitable for writing, printing, engraving and other form of presentation. In preparing this "universal scientific alphabet," Representative Jackson particularly asks that the views of all "linguists, phoneticians, philologists, lexicographers, orthoepists, orthographers, translators, transliterators, teachers of languages, artists, oculists, physicians, neurologists, stenographers, printers, typists, linotypists, tenographers, phonographers and type foundries," be taken into consideration.

Sydney, Aug. 7.—Signor Marconi, the distinguished inventor of wireless telegraphy is expected to arrive here in a few days, and will conduct experiments at the Glace Bay Station for some time. The experiments now under way are of an entirely new character. Among the latest schemes of the wireless wizard is a system which will glide the globe by way of the British Colonies, giving the Empire an exclusive service around the world. Mr. Marconi will arrive about the first of next week, and will at once begin his experiments at Glace Bay.

FUNERAL TO-MORROW.—The funeral of the late Mr. Brooks will take place from No. 7 Maxse Street at 2.30 p.m. to-morrow.

City Council.

Mayor Ellis and full Board were present at last evening's meeting. Councillor Mullaly wanted to know why Pittman and Shaw appeared to be getting all the odd jobs of plumbing from the Council. He was told that the amounts were small and not worth discussion. Messrs. Pittman & Shaw were near the Water Store and wanted to get in emergencies. Councillor Mullaly suggested that the telephone could be used in order that other plumbers may not be complaining to him that Pittman and Shaw had a monopoly of the work.

The Premier wrote saying that he and his colleagues would attend to the putting of lights in the Western suburbs. Harvey & Co. sent in a letter saying that the tourists who had gone back to New York from Newfoundland on their steamers had complained to the Red Cross Agents about the high charges of the city cabmen. A discussion followed on the need of a proper cabstand. Mayor Ellis said that it would be only justice that the cabmen should have a place to stand their horses. He thought that by widening Adelaide Street a suitable place would be provided for the West End men. For the East End men some of the drivers had suggested a stand on Duckworth Street near the old C. E. Cemetery and opposite the Court House.

Residents of Gear Street asked for sewer connection. Engineer will see to it.

P. Summers who asked leave to cut hay on a field taken over from him by the Council near Windsor Lake. He will be asked to make an offer for the hay.

W. Mufford asked that a drain near his shop on Barron Street be removed as it was an inconvenience to approaching his shop. Engineer will see about it.

M. Mackey asked to be appointed to the Cash vacancy on Sanitary staff. Councillor Mullaly said that he had promised to support the application of Mr. Martin for the job. The committee will arrange about it.

J. Adrain denied that damage to concrete on Water Street was caused by his men. After some explanation from the Engineer the Mayor ordered that repairs be made.

C. E. Goad wrote about plans. He wants to get information for nothing. The Council believed that he should pay for it.

Mrs. Hynes who kept the Council Rooms for twenty-three years felt that the City Fathers want to shake her off. They said they had no intention but did not recognize that an agreement had ever been made with her. The Council will be removing to new quarters next week, and owing to the "lay out" of the building no quarters are provided for the janitress. The Council will still allow Mrs. Hynes \$100 for house rent etc., and they hope she will be able to get a suitable house near the new City Hall.

ended that the work could be done cheaper. F. Bradshaw may change the roof of house, Military Road. N. Worsley can repair roof of shop. Mrs. Duffy will repair house; and T. Templeton may put concrete wall under building at James Street. Nfld. Produce Co.'s plan of iron shed on their wharf was passed; also J. Bishop's plan for house, Pennywell Road.

The Engineer will see about Mrs. Collins' kitchen, Holloway Street; and Smith's residence, Pennywell Rd. Of the three possible routes suggested to bring the new water pipe into the city that suggested by Engineer Ryan was adopted. Government Engineer Hall was called in by the Council to give an opinion. He endorsed Mr. Ryan's selection. The Engineer reported that 40 man hydrants were needed on the High levels.

The sewers at Rocky Lane and near Street are finished. J. Rooney reported that many of the houses on Pennywell Road were to have sewerage connection and asked that the people be given 10 months to prepare.

Councillor Mullaly told of one poor woman there who said she could not be able to pay the interest on a loan. The Mayor said that they would have to carry out the law.

The new fish markets at Cliff's Cove and Beck's Cove will be opened next Monday.

Mayor Ellis said that a few sample inventors to abate the nuisance of smoke from factory chimneys would arrive here in a few days. Messrs. J. Vey and A. Tooton sent a sample of photo taken of the opening of the City Hall. Three of each will be ordered.

Mrs. Walsh, Portugal Cove Road will be informed that the Council will give her \$18 a ton for hay. Councillor Mullaly took occasion to make strong objection to the action of the Council in increasing the salaries of two officials at a former meeting. They were deserving of more money, he says as a principle but he objected to. All whose names had been brought up at a former meeting should get the increase unless no one should get it. He reminded the Mayor that a former meeting it was agreed to drop all the applications for increase and that no one should get an addition to his salary for a year. In spite of this resolution these two increases have been made while he was absent.

Mayor Ellis and other Councillors could not remember any resolution having been made, not to increase salaries for a year.

Councillor Mullaly said that it was so and that now that the resolution had been ignored all should get the increase or none.

The question of arranging a regular scale of fees for cabmen was introduced by Councillor Mullaly. The Council had been given power to do this by the Legislature and it was right that they should put it into practice. The majority of the cabmen are good, honest men; there was no intention to do them an injury. There were a few men amongst them who were accused of charging exorbitant rates especially to strangers. They should get control of such individuals and prevent them from pulling the wool over the eyes of the public. At the conclusion of the debate a committee consisting of the Mayor, Councillors Martin, Mullaly and Chaning was appointed to draw up a scale of fees and submit them to the full Board.

The street sprinkling cars will be ordered to visit the extreme west and east ends of Water Street. After passing pay rolls the meeting adjourned.

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Those Harbor Main Jobs.

Editor Evening Telegram: Dear Sir.—Kindly permit me space in your esteemed journal to add a few words in connection with the way the Government are still handling the Post Office and Customs jobs.

As has been explained by other writers, both these jobs were resigned about six weeks ago, and I understand application was made by other residents for the positions at the same rate of salary; and it was simply a matter for the departments to make their appointments. This has not been done, as it seems that the parties who held these jobs, although resigning in the usual way, have still some unknown but apparently exclusive right to both positions; a matter which we suppose Mr. Woodford will explain satisfactorily to us before 1912.

We have two men here from St. John's under full pay, with practically nothing to do but enjoy the sea breeze and keep these positions open until the Executive Council can be influenced to make a grant of \$400.00 for the former official, so that his valuable official services may not be cut to the country. We exclaim, may God help the Civil Service!

This, if ever done, will represent the sum of \$200 deliberately thrown out for political expediency, which would give four poor worn-out and infirm old fishermen \$50 per year, which would be a blessing to those people and a credit to the Government.

As these appointments are something in which the people are interested, why not let the people be the ruling power, and let the matter be decided by a petition, and then the most popular and best qualified person will be supported and will have the satisfaction of securing the position as Mr. Woodford secured his by the voice and vote of the people. Surely the members of this district are not so blind but they see the mistake of offending the majority of a settlement for the sake of giving up to one or two when it can be of material advantage to themselves or the public.

Surely it is not public economy; it is not a matter of public policy, it is not a common sense. Such unwarranted favors merely create discontent and destroy the honest support which a member may otherwise be entitled to.

Trusting that the Government may see the wisdom of ending this meddling, and that we may not be compelled to return to this subject again. We are, yours truly,




