

Explains Scheme

terested.

At a meeting held in the Ladies' Reading Room, on Friday afternoon, last, a scheme was laid before those present advocating the opening of a depot where people in poor circumstances might at a low cost procure stances might at a low cost procure prepared food, such as soup, custard, beef tea, junket, etc., for use in their homes. It is felt that especially in homes where there is illness, it will facilitate matters, particularly in the case of those of too self-respecting and independent a spirit to desire charity. Then, too, it is thought that in many cases where the women are away at work all day, getting home too tired if not too late. to bother In many cases where the women are away at work all day, getting home too tired, if not too late, to bother about preparing a meal, it would be a great boon to be able to get some good nourishing food without the trouble of preparing it. As no one will be helped without proper investigation, it is hoped that this will reach a class of people really deserving of support. In other words, it is not a mere charity, it is an endeavour to help those who are willing to help themselves, a class generally overlook in most charitable organizations, as they are not usually those who are in the habit of applying for help.

It is further hoped that all interested in work amongst the poor in St. John's will co-operate in what is by far the most important phase of this undertaking, viz., the working out of a complete list of the cases helped. It is felt that this will prove most valuable in checking the lamentable overlapping of unorganized and promiscious charity known to exist by those who do most visiting amongst the poor in this city. The plan is no new one, being one of the most successful points in that recognized beneficial institution, the Charity Organization Society, which has branches all over Great Britain, Canada, and the United States. It is therefore clear.

that properly conducted, such an or-ganization will not be a new charity at all, but a bond of union, through which one charity may avoid overlap-ping the work done by another, and thus more people may be helped and more good accomplished with an ex-penditure of less time and money. This scheme has been found in other countries to be the only satisfactory way of regulating the distribution of charity, so as to foster the self-respect of those receiving assistance and way of regulating the distribution of charity, so as to foster the self-respect of those receiving assistance and help them to keep, or regain, their independence. The invariable experience of those who have systematically studied the subject proves that indescriminate charity in almost all cases undermines the self-respect and independence of the recipient, and in this way often does more harm than good. The more deeply this subject is studied the more emphatic does it become that the wise dstribution of charity is a most difficult problem, and that indiscriminate giving breeds a class of professional beggars. In many cases these are able to live much better on the proceeds of their begging, than is the self-respecting independent working man, who would be ashamed to ask anyone for a cent. It is hoped to hold another meeting at a later date, of which notice will be given in the newspapers, and which all interested are invited to attend.



The next speaker, was the President of the F. P. U., Mr. W. F. Coaker, When he arose to his feet there was remarkable outbursts of applause from every corner of the spacious building, which was crowded to overflowing. overflowing.

COMPOSITION OF COUNCILS.

After the applause had subsided, Mr. Coaker, the President of the Fishermen's Union, proceeded to explain the features of the organization which has created such a stir throughout our northern bays. He explained to the meeting, which was composed of Union and non-Union sealers, the constitution, the working, the aims and objects of the Union. As to its constitution, he said it was composed of three kinds of Councils; local, district and supreme. The local council was composed of Union members of a settlement or settlements who paid an entrance fee of 50c, and 5c. a month dues to keep them in good standing. They elected as officers a chairman, a vice-chairman, a secretary and a treasurer. The duties of the local council are to interest themselves in public, social, terest themselves in public, social, commercial and political affairs of the settlement, but in no way to meddle with any matter affecting religion.

Above the Local Council is the District Council which is composed of the four officers of every Local Council in the particular Electoral

District. The District Council is supported by an assessment of 5c, a man per annum in each of the Local Councils. Its duty is to take up district affairs, political and commercial. These councils have already nominated a number of Union candidates as representatives for the House of Assembly.

The Supreme Council is the general council for the whole of Newfoundland. Its membership includes the Chairmen of the Local Councils, and the Officers of the District Council its officials are: President W. F. Coaker: Vice-President, Thos. Dower, of Conche; Secretary-Treasurer, Wallace

nche; Secretary-Treasurer, Wallac bott, of Bonavista.

BENEFITS OBTAINED. After explaining the Constitut After explaining the Constitution, President Coaker proceeded to set forth the benefits which its members had derived from the Union during the past year. He referred first of all to the rise in the price of fish and oil. He showed that by united action and by the power and the prestige of the Fishermen's Union, he had been able to raise the price of fish to what able to raise the price of fish to what the market would bear, viz., from \$5 to \$7 a quintal. He had met with a similar success in raising the price of cod-oil from \$90 to \$128 a tun. The second benefit on which Mr. Coaker dwelt, had been the opening during the past five or six months of five cash stores at which the members were able to purchase goods at St. John's at wholesale prices. The turn-

over during that period had been about \$70,000. The third benefit which Mr. Coaker mentioned had been the purchase of \$150,000 worth of provisions whole-sale in St. John's during the fall, and their distribution at prices advan-

tageous to the members of the Local Councils. Another advantage had been the in-corporation of the Union Publishing Company, Ltd., for the publication of The Fishermen's Advocate, so that fishermen would have an organ of

their own to advocate their own cause and publish news and views which were especially in the interest of the Fishermen's Union and of the fishermen generally of Newfoundland.

A fifth advantage was the incorporation of the Union Trading Company, which was promoted for purpose of importing goods for the supply of the stores which were at present in existence, and for the twenty additional stores which were about to be enterprised. Mr. Templeton was at present in England buying goods for this Company, and his purchases were due to arrive here at the beginning of next month. As the sixth benefit, Mr. Coaker

As the sixth benefit, Mr. Coaker emphasized the Sealing Agreement which he had been able to arrange with the owners of the sealing steamers. This agreement was a matter of congratulation, as it would affect their comfort during the present voyage. It especially illustrated the advantage to be derived from unity of purpose, and showed the strength of union among sealers. 
