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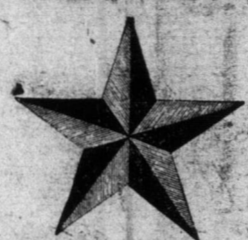

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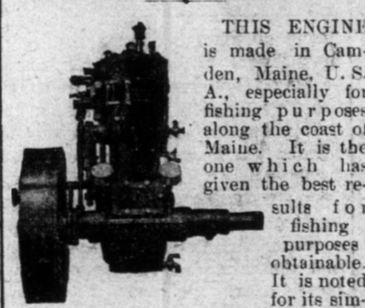

Great Temperance Rally

AT METHODIST COLLEGE HALL.

The great meeting of the representatives of the Methodist Communions in Newfoundland on the question of Temperance which was held in the Methodist College Hall, last night, was attended by a concourse of people who were most earnest and enthusiastic.

On the platform were a large gathering of Ministers and Laymen and representatives of sister churches. Included amongst those on the platform were—Mrs. Peters, Revs. J. Tasker, James Bell, W. T. D. Dunn, M. Fenwick, W. H. Webber, Hon. Donald Morrison, K. C. Messers, J. R. Goodson, M. H. A. R. A. Squires, J. A. J. E. P. Peters, Hon. H. B. Woods, Capt. A. Kean, A. W. Martin, Sydney Woods, I. C. Morris.

The President of the Conference being undoubtedly about the chair was taken by Rev. Dr. Curtis. The singing of several members of the city choir who were present was very pleasant feature of the meeting, and the singing which was congregational was led by them.

Proceedings began with a hymn, Rev. M. Fenwick read the Lesson, and prayer was offered by Rev. J. Tasker. The address of the Chairman, Rev. Dr. Curtis, though brief, was filled with the zeal which he has always displayed in this good work, and at its conclusion the following Resolutions were read by Rev. J. W. Bartlett:

Whereas in recent years, and especially during the sessions of the Legislature for 1910 and 1911, the License Laws have been so amended as to materially lessen the consumption of intoxicating liquors and temptation regarding the same.

And whereas the police have shown their activity in enforcing the law in St. John's by bringing the law breakers amongst the liquor dealers to justice.

And whereas the Liquor Traffic is still a menace to society and a curse in many lives and homes.

And whereas the Anti-Cigarette Law is now imperatively owing to a lack of public sentiment regarding the effect upon minors.

And whereas the better housing of the people would largely contribute to the bettering of their lives.

Resolved that the Legislature be urged to amend the License Laws so as to materially lessen the consumption of intoxicating liquors and temptation regarding the same.

Bell and Father O'Callaghan. Reference to those gentlemen were received with much applause. Rev. Jas. Bell who was called on by the chairman, reviewed the work done in the temperance movement to date, and was cheered to the echo. Many were disappointed because of the absence of the President and Rev. C. Hackett, due to the railway blockade. After a collection had been taken up and the benediction imparted this memorable meeting came to a close.

ion ways of the hatches in order to shield the occupants from drafts, men for the most part, and the accommodation by steam pipes.

BETTER FOOD.
Then as to provisions, the owners had agreed to provide soft bread, three times a week, whenever practicable. Beef, pork, potatoes and pudding would be provided for dinner three times a week. Stewed beans would be provided daily for breakfast. Onions, potatoes and turnips were to be ingredients in the pea soup supplied on Saturday's. The allowance of butter was to be continued, and the fat taken from the boilers by the cook was to be used in the puddings. Better accommodation had also been agreed upon for those who became sick or were disabled during the sealing voyage.

It had been agreed also that the owners should endeavour, where possible, to insure the men for the share of the crew on the voyage, taking the premium out of the men's share of the voyage.

As was a meeting of seafarers, the President of the Fishermen's Union paid considerable attention to this benefit, which was naturally the topic of the hour.

INCREASED WAGES.
A seventh advantage had been a rise of wages in outports. Mr. Coaker stated that at Catalina, Bonavista and Twillingate, pay had gone up from 70c. a day taken up in travel to 80c. a day in cash. In the last place 12c. an hour was paid for over-time.

They were also desirous of obtaining free and compulsory education. They were insistent that their children should have a better chance than they had. They wanted to fit them better to fight the hard life of the sea, and in no way attempt to interfere with denominational education.

A third subject in which the Union would insist was a Reduction in Taxation on the necessities to make the conditions of life more tolerable.

Having set forth the advantages derived from the establishment of the Union, Mr. Coaker passed on to the formation of a Royal Commission, and its object, and dwelt particularly on the Platform of the Union Party.

In connection with the Platform of the Union Party, he emphasized that they took a firm stand for the standardising of fish, so that a man might get out the value of the cure he put into the fish.

He explained also that it was the intention of the Union to raise a fund to be loaned eventually to the fishermen for the purchase of supplies. The fund would be derived from the discount the Union received from the wholesale purchase of butter, tobacco, oil, clothes and tea. They had hopes that these discounts would amount to \$30,000 a year. These discounts would be put in a Trust Fund until they amounted to \$250,000. When this sum was reached, the loan system would be inaugurated and would gradually eventually destroy the present objectionable credit system.

Mr. Coaker explained how he came to publish the statement which gave rise to what is known as the Coaker Libel Suits. The information had been given to him by a person interested in the matter, and he had accepted it and published it in good faith. He had eventually found that the statement was in many particulars untrue, and he had withdrawn it, and apologized for making it. He gave out that he had been no assured with the correct facts of the incident.

TIMES ARE CHANGING.
Mr. Coaker showed that times were changing and the workers had every hope now of coming to their own. These were not the times when fishermen had to go can in hand, fingers in their mouths, and the nunney bag on their back and beg for supplies to keep them alive. They had railways here elsewhere, and he said in honor-bound had withdrawn it, and apologized for making it. He gave out that he had been no assured with the correct facts of the incident.

They were not satisfied to go to the Labrador and come back to get \$2.40 a quintal for their fish. If they could get the same price for their fish here, they would not go to the Labrador. They would get to their anchors and the traps to rot in the store. They would look for a \$4.00 quintal for their Labrador fish or they would not go and catch fish the next season. Mr. Coaker impressed upon several fishermen that the changes could not be brought about rapidly or by violence or revolution. They could only be brought about by determined steps, by quiet, fixed and stern determination. They must all pull together. They must all aim at the same object, and they would make good and win out by Union.

TOBACCO HERE.—The Furness liner Tobasco, Capt. Veomans, arrived at 4.30 p.m. yesterday after a rough experience of three days from Halifax. When leaving the Nova Scotia port on Saturday last the full force of a N. W. gale was severely felt. She brought 700 tons of freight.

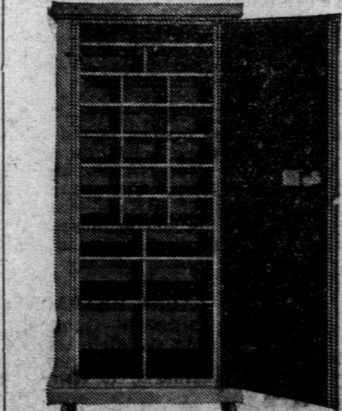

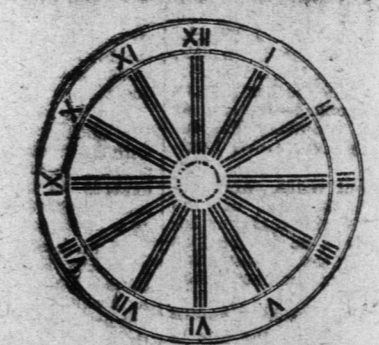

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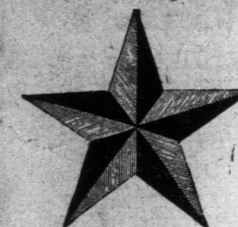
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
