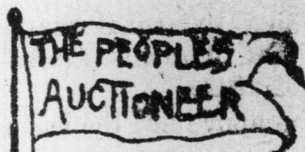

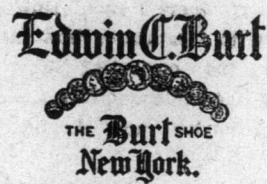

To please Mrs. Winter, she swallowed a few mouthfuls of food when the supper was brought, and she let the housekeeper help her to take off her gown and to slip on an old

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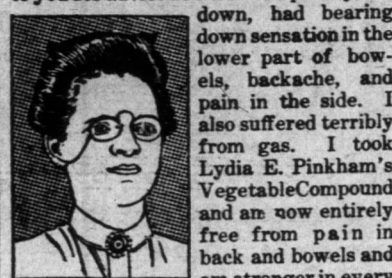

Household Notes.

Don't scour white enameled tubs and sinks with soap or power. Dip a cloth in gasoline instead.

In packing a trunk, it is a good idea to line it with a steamer rug or something thick, so that if the trunk should break, nothing will spill out.

Pearls and pearl trimmings are best cared for laid in a box with powdered magnesia, just thick enough to cover the pearls.

To find out if a gas pipe leaks, mix soap and water and apply with a brush to the pipe. If there is a leak, it will bubble.

Clean gold braid with powdered fluting and bread crumbs mixed; rub with fannel and brush well. Polish with red velvet.

Fried apples make a delicious luncheon dish. Pare and cut in thin slices, then drop into hot fat. Serve lightly sprinkled with sugar.

Add one-half teaspoonful of baking powder to the milk put into potatoes, if you would have them fluffy.

A good rule for the size of thread in making buttonholes is to have it 20 coarser than that used for making the garments.

Some people like a coffee flavor to their meat gravy. Add two teaspoonfuls of coffee, clear, just before removing from the fire.

When washing Irish crochet lace, lay it in shape and pin it flat to dry, as you would a lace curtain, and it will keep its new look.

To cook onions satisfactorily, boil them in two or three waters. When done, drain, put in double boiler and add a cupful of cream and seasoning.

To freshen the air of a sick room, if windows cannot be opened, carry a burning roll of newspapers through it, or throw a little vinegar on blazing coals in a shovel.

"Rainbow jelly" may be made as you do marble cake, by pouring several different kinds of jelly into the same mold. Of course, each should harden before the next is put in.

Put white blotting paper under the dollies or covers of tables intended to hold vases or pitchers. If either upsets, the blotter will save the table being marked.

A mitten made of two layers of black sateen with cotton batting between will be useful when you wish to place a few lumps of coal accurately with your fingers, as in a sick room.

Flaxseed tea is useful when the children have a cold. Wash two tablespoonfuls of seed, add four cupsful of water, cook slowly for an hour, add lemon juice and sugar and strain.

To wash canvas skin, put it through warm soap suds, rinse in several warm waters, draw it through the hand to squeeze the water out and hang up to dry. Pull while drying, if you would have it smooth.

A charming serving tray is made of the printed blue and white toweling from Japan, covered with glass and framed in soft gray. Richer trays are made with precious Chinese embroideries used in the same way.

When you wash lace curtains, don't rub them. Put into cold water overnight. Then put into clean cold water with borax; bring to a boil and boil 15 or 20 minutes. Rinse through and stiffen in a final water, which has 5 cents' worth of gum arabic in it.

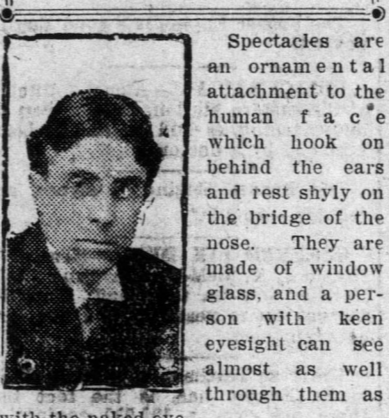

Spectacles.

Spectacles are an ornamental attachment to the human face which hook on behind the ears and rest shyly on the bridge of the nose. They are made of window glass and a person with keen eyesight can be almost as well through them as with the naked eye.

Spectacles are always recommended by some high-priced optician who makes his own glasses and sells them at an altitude of 9,000 feet above sea level. The patient's eyes are first tested by leading him into a dark room, throwing a blanket over his head and ordering him to read fine print at a distance of 80 rods from the target. If he is unable to do this, the optician discovers at once that he has nearsighted astigmatism, with symptoms of nostalgia, locomotor ataxia and hay fever. The more symptoms an optician discovers, the more expensive it is to secure a good fit.

Spectacles do not add to the beauty of the male, and are worn mostly by husbands who have no rheumatic tendency to keep their trousers creased. An industrious pair of spectacles will drive away the headache, and in some cases will impart a look of real intelligence to the features. As an investment for this purpose, however, they are frequently a melancholy failure.

The society brand of spectacles is called nose glasses. These are graceful but uneasy, variety which have to be replaced about twice a week, as they slide from their perch every little while and have to be caught in a frantic leap with the bare hand. A pair of nose glasses never falls to the ground without breaking both legs.

Some people circumvent the hurdling nose glass by attaching it to a chain and spring, which interrupt it in the middle of a high dive and thus thwart the local optician, who prescribes a new \$10 lens every time a fracture occurs. Other people wear a chain lopped over the right ear, which allows the glasses to dangle to and fro and produces a coy effect.

Spectacles should be worn by everybody whose eyes do not track. They are also a fairly good substitute for intellect, and will provide everything but the conversation.

A Discredited Government.

The public at large are hugely disgusted with the Government. They have had enough of contract seekers, fee hunters, land grabbers, and political picnicers, who constitute mainly the ranks of the People's Party.

The events of the past four years have thrown a lurid light on the actual doings of the party, which made such a brave show some four and a half years ago.

"Under the banner of the People's Party the whole of the industrial classes of the Colony—the Fishermen, the Farmers, the Mechanics, the Laborers, the Clerks, and all who work for a living—will find a rallying point, where all who wish to see their country advanced and their interests protected will work for the common good."

Under such a promise did the party organized by Sir Edward Morris offer itself to the country. To-day the party is a discredited and hopeless organization, whose day is done, and whose hopes for the future are shattered.

The Fishermen have looked in vain for a furtherance of their interest. They find that their sheet anchor, the Bait Policy, made the play of doubtful deals with Americans. They asked for bait storage, standard culls, new markets, and a general uplift of their interests, and they are given futile deals with American Fish Companies, with apparently more attention to Americans than their interests.

The Farmers have found the Morris Agricultural Policy a delusion and a snare. The attempt to put Agriculture on a safe and scientific basis made by a practical farmer and a sound statesman, Sir Robert Bond, has been frustrated by the present Government, and the policy of the latter has been proved to be as infertile as dead-eye potatoes.

Mechanics, Laborers, Clerks, and all who work for a living, have waited in vain to see where they come in. They find extravagance rampant, railway building financed wildly, grabs confronting them, picnics galore, fat livings provided for politicians, while they are crabbed and cribbed daily in their own living.

Coal, which Morris promised should be cheaper, is dearer than ever. Houses are as hard to get as ever. Taxes which were declared implicitly to be inequitable on the working class-

es have not been reduced as Morris promised, but to-day they are in fact higher than ever, rising with the rising prices, and while people are outraged at the extravagance of the Government, they find it harder to live than ever they did before.

The Government party is therefore a discredited body. People are determined on a change. They are insistent that Morris and his men must be turned out as they are summing up the situation as one intolerable to them. From the north, the south, and the west the clarion cry is rising and the universal shout is "The Grabbers Must Go," and go they will when the Electors have a chance of turning them out.

MONTREAL, Nov. 20.
The appointment of H. F. Bradley to succeed Geo. W. Hannah as General Passenger Agent of the Allan Line, is announced. Bradley has been connected with the line for 20 years.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.
Sentence of death on the four gunmen, convicted yesterday of the Rosenthal murder, will be pronounced by Justice Goff, next Tuesday. Of the seven indicted, this leaves but one defendant to be tried.—Jack Sullivan, King of the Newsboys.

LONDON, Nov. 20.
Professor Isaacsohn, of Berlin, has been summoned to Tsarskoeloe, where Dr. Federoff has been in attendance since the Russian Imperial family returned there. Circumstances point to the continued gravity of the illness of the youthful Czarvitch. The Court doctors admit that a serious surgical case is at issue.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 20.
Acting under directions of P. M. G. Hitchcock, the P. O. Inspectors and States Marshals in 72 leading cities commenced to-day action for using the mails to promote criminal medical practices, and sale of drugs and instruments for illegal purposes. Many prominent persons will be arrested, including leading physicians and wealthy business men; also many who live by their wits, and are little known outside their own circles. One is a Chinaman who has preyed on women of his own race and those in the lower strata of society.

LONDON, Nov. 20.
The new financial resolution of the Home Rule Bill was discussed in Committee to-day. Austin Chamberlain remarked that if Ireland demanded separation she must bear the burden of her own financial responsibilities. Lloyd George declared that it would pay Britain as well to have a prosperous Ireland, as a prosperous West Indies or South Africa. Bonar Law pointed out that Britain did not pay Old Age Pensions in the Colonies, and there was no sound reason why she should pay them indefinitely to a Home Rule Ireland. Sir Frederick Banbury moved to amend the resolution, providing that payments for Irish services should not involve any charge on the British taxpayer. This was defeated by a majority of 115. The resolution was passed by a majority of 111.

LONDON, Nov. 20.
Ten thousand sovereigns have been stolen from a consignment of 200,000, shipped to Alexandria on Nov. 12th. On arrival, two boxes were found to be filled with lead.

CHICAGO, Nov. 20.
Irving Farrell, aged 23, was shot and killed by a policeman, while resisting arrest. He was the third of three brothers shot at by the police within five months, and the second to be slain.

BUDAPEST, Nov. 20.
Serbia has yielded to the Austrian demand that an official from the Foreign Office should be allowed to proceed to Priserend to investigate the complaint made by the Austrian Consul that he had been hindered by the Servians in the performance of his duties. This news relieves the immediate tension between the two countries, as an opportunity is now furnished for an unbiased examination of the grounds of the dispute.

LONDON, Nov. 20.
The Daily Mail correspondent with the Bulgarian Army, says: I passed through three or four villages which the Turks, in their retreat, had given to the flames. There is no doubt they added to the horrors of the situation by foul massacres of Christians. The evidences of these atrocities are buried, but I heard from eye-witnesses, whose words cannot be disputed, that women were murdered in cold blood, then with their slaughtered infants cast into the mud.

SOFIA, Nov. 20.
Turkish reports of victories at Tchatalja are officially declared to be untrue. This is the only information given out as to the three days' operations before Constantinople, except yesterday's announcement that a battle had been engaged in at an advanced point.

LONDON, Nov. 20.
A Belgrade despatch to the Daily Express says that the capture of Monastir has proved a difficult problem for the Servian government, which is extremely puzzled as to the housing and feeding of its army and 40,000 new prisoners. Fethi Pasha, who was among those who surrendered was Turkey's popular minister at sword to the Servian Commander. Luxurious apartments await him which he is brought back to Belgrade.

Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram.
LONDON, Nov. 20.
The Saloniki correspondent of the Times says that relations between the Greeks and Bulgarians are far from amicable. That more serious developments have not occurred is due to the Bulgarian minister to France, Dr. Stancieff, who is now attached to the staff of Crown Prince Boris. When the Greeks entered the city, three columns of Bulgarians had approached within striking distance. On Nov. 8th the Bulgarians began the battle with the Turks at Aivali, and pursued the enemy within two miles of Saloniki. An envoy, sent to demand surrender, found the Greeks in possession, and they refused to allow the Bulgarians to enter the town, with the result that the Crown Prince and his brother, Prince Cyril, were compelled to sleep under the Bridge of Aivali. The Bulgarians then sent an ultimatum to the Greeks threatening to enter the town forcibly. Twenty-four hours later the Greeks abandoned their opposition, and King George permitted the Bulgarians and Servians to enter within the walls. The allies have also quarrelled over the occupancy of the Mosque of St. Sofie by the Bulgarians. On two occasions the Greeks attempted to seize the Mosque on the grounds that the Bulgarians wish to dedicate it to their Church. The latter, however, declared they only wished to use it as a barracks. Annoyance has also been caused by the appointment of Prince Nicholas as military Commandant. The Bulgarians desired only to recognize the authority of their own general. The two occupying armies are about equal in strength.

LONDON, Nov. 20.
The Daily Chronicle's correspondent, telegraphing on Monday, from Hademkrevi, says:—The battle has been one of the bloodiest in the present war, both sides sustaining fearful losses. Magnificent courage was displayed by Turkish officers of the highest rank, who exposed themselves to the Bulgarian fire with unequalled devotion, in order to set an example to the men. The battle is still raging with unabated fury. The Bulgarians are directing their fire against three forts west of Hademkrevi, attempting to break through the Turkish line. The Turks are holding their ground, disputing every inch, and desperately making the most heroic resistance.

SOFIA, Nov. 20.
The Bulgarian troops before the Tchatalja fortifications have received orders to cease fighting, and merely to hold the positions won, as negotiations for an armistice have begun, at Turkey's request.

London, Nov. 11.—According to rumor the historic post of Maid of Honor is to be abolished. Queen Mary has three Maids of Honor, but the duties they perform can be equally well done by ordinary ladies in waiting, and as the disposition of the present court is to dispense with much that is purely ornamental, these maids may be the last of their kind, at any rate as far as Queen Mary is concerned.

From the Maid of Honor's standpoint, of course, the emolument of \$2,000 a year is immaterial compared with the social advantage to be reaped from constant contiguity to the throne. The salary indeed is easily swallowed up in clothes; in fact in Queen Victoria's time the young ladies spent fully quarter of their pay on gloves, as they were never permitted to enter "the presence" with bare hands.

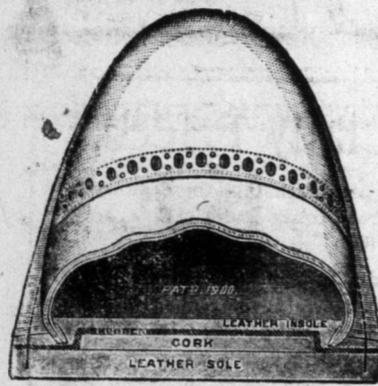

LONDON, To-day. War shifted for a time from field arms to that of diplomacy. May be the war is at an end. Plenipotentiaries for belligerent powers met at the village of Hademkul, a few miles outside the Capital for preliminary discussion of terms of armistice; meantime Turkish, Bulgarian and Serbian commanders ordered cessation of hostilities. Although cannonading, which Nazim Pasha reports unimportant, occurs, Szwedling terms which the allies are said to have demanded, as basis for armistice, appear not to have been advanced but plenipotentiaries may not have known level and platform until they meet for discussion. It is almost certain it will be on the basis of the Balkan States holding all the conquered country under a permanent treaty of peace is signed. What vestiges of his former power they are prepared to concede to the Turks depends largely upon two factors—strength of supplies. Allied armies threatening the gates of Constantinople. The extent to which the cholera spectre has embarrassed plans is not certain but great transport difficulties hamper the Bulgarian army on account of the distance from its base and rough roads. Cholera is counted on by the Turks to weaken the Bulgarian ambition for triumphal march into the Capital and celebration of Mass in St. Sophia.

NEW YORK, To-day.

In widely separated parts of Brooklyn two tragedies resulting in each case in the suicide of the mother, death of her child, occurred almost simultaneously yesterday. Mrs. Fred Kaufman, 25 years old, took her 5-year-old daughter to bed with her after turning on the gas, the pair were found exsanguinated by the woman's husband. She left a note saying she deplored the outcome of an operation which she was about to undergo. In like manner Mrs. Catherine Herring, widow, who had been ill for several months, and her six-year-old son met the same fate and were found asphyxiated by neighbours.

MANCHESTER, To-day.

OTTAWA, To-day.

Parliament opens to-day. The speech contains the announcement that the Prairie Provinces are each to be given additional Senators; also has a reference to conference which Borden and other Ministers had with the British Government on the question of Naval defence.

MIDDLETOWN, N.Y., To-day.

A spark from a pipe which John E. Gison, farmer, eighty years old, was smoking in his yard near his house at Greenville, near here, ignited his long whiskers, the flames spread to his clothing and he was burnt to death.

What is Ireland's Flag

What is the Irish national flag? The question is being much discussed in Ireland just now, and there is really no answer. Most English people would say offhand the golden harp on a green ground, but students know that this sign only belongs to the Province of Leinster. Even the green of the Nationalists and the orange of the Ulster Unionists are comparatively recent adoptions. Mr F. E. Smith would perhaps be surprised to know, for example, that the color of his new collar did not prevail at the Battle of the Boyne. King William's army fought under a green flag, while the forces of King James fought under the white cockade of the Stuarts. The harp on a blue ground was the standard of Grattan's Parliament, but the Presbyterian leaders of the insurrection of 1798 decided to change the national color to green, not because the banner of the great Queen Scots of the Milesians was green, nor in deference to Moore, who in "Let Erin Remember" recalls the days

"When her King with standard of green unfurled
Let the Red Branch knights to Battle."
They fixed on green for a curiously scientific reason. The blend of blue and orange which produced green was

accepted as signifying the union of North and South. So green is strictly the color of united Ireland.

This decision of the United Irishmen, crystallized in the immortal verse of "The Wearin' of the Green," has held good ever since, outliving both the scholarly demand for a return to blue and the outspoken dislike of Mr. Parnell, who abhorred green as a most unlucky color. The result of the interesting contention going on in Ireland is that a prize is being offered for the most appropriate design for a flag, and there is a touch of irony in the fact that the solution of the difficulty comes from Ulster. Mr. Francis Biggar, the well-known archaeologist of Belfast, has contributed a design which covers most of the ground. According to him, the national emblem should be of rich dark green linen with a Celtic harp on its folds; "such a device on a square, not an oblong flag is impressive and artistic, has no obscurity about it, and is admittedly national in the fullest sense of the term."

Chicago, Nov. 13.—"I have celebrated my twenty-fourth birthday," writes Packey McFarland in the Chicago Tribune. "In two months I shall stick the padded mitts away, for I have determined to leave the ring forever. I am not retiring as champion, but that is through no fault of my own, for the man who holds the title in my class refuses to meet me for the championship."

"I realize that few fighters ever have retired when they were only twenty-four years old. I have been fighting eight years, and in those eight years I have gained success and the financial reward that goes with it. I was a pugilist because I discovered early in the game that boxing was the field for me. I could do better in it than in any other occupation that I knew."

In those eight years of ring work I have earned a fortune amounting close to \$200,000. I have bought a home for my folks, so that they will be comfortable for the rest of their days. The money that I have made out of pugilism is enough to insure my brothers and sisters comfort as well. When I quit the ring I intend to enter some business. It probably will be the commission business in the stockyards district.

"There are many who believe that the average fighter has brutal instincts but I do not believe it. In all the time I have been fighting there never has been a time when I saw I had my opponent beaten or outpointed that I had any desire to punish him further or cut him to ribbons, as they say. There have been many fights in which I had beaten my man and knew he did not have a chance for victory and asked the referee to stop the fight. I always felt that I was clever enough to protect myself, but I also could see that the other fellow could not protect himself and that meant certain defeat for him."

"There are two reasons why I am to leave the ring. One of them is the fact that I have made all the money I need, and the other, which also is an important one, is that I am tired of the training grind incidental to fighting. It means road work every day, work with the gymnasium apparatus, punching the bag and boxing half a dozen rounds with a sparring partner. That isn't the worst of it. The boxer who must make a required notch on the scales must diet and at times even is not allowed to drink water, which is about the hardest thing of all to leave alone."

"In the time that I have served in the ring I have heard many things about this fighter and the other one. I have heard them say that Packey Farland never carried a knockout punch I only want to answer that by saying:

"What's the difference?" I have been clever enough to win my battles and the record books will show that there have been a good many knockouts to my credit."

"What is the difference whether a man wins on points or whether he wins with a knockout? It is the aim of every fighter to win by fair means, for that means not only the glory of victory but the financial returns and that in the end is all that any contestant seeks."

"It is generally believed that I was nicknamed "Packey" because I once worked in a packing house at the Union stockyards. That is not true. I never worked in a packing house. When I was a boy my little sister gave me that name. She was so little that she could not pronounce Patrick, so she did the best she could and called me "Packey." That name has stuck to me ever since, and I guess it always will."

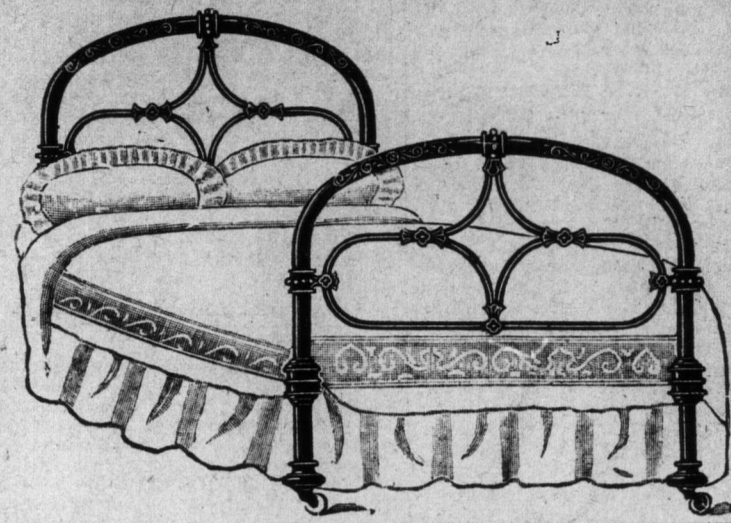

Knighthood Errors.

Some Fanny Mistakes Have Occurred Over Honor-Giving.

The apportioning of honors to celebrate such occasions as the King's birthday is not an easy one for the Prime Minister and others concerned. Somebody is sure to be overlooked. And many amusing stories are related about the poorly-made knights on these auspicious occasions. For the new knight, in his flurry and agitation, is so likely to do strange or unsuitable things in the presence of royalty that the amusing tales about him have become legion to the general public.

Of the really true ones, however, the following are some of the best. Who can forget the contumpts which occurred when Queen Victoria was about to knight a certain prominent citizen of Leamington, a man whose name remains enshrined to-day in the town as one of its most benefactors? But, just as the Queen was about to knight him, so agitated did he become that he forgot what ought to be done. He rose too soon, and left the room, turning his back on her all the way and not actually knowing but that the ceremony was over! Needless to say, he was never really knighted at all, and right to the day of his death Leamington to felt much aggrieved at the mishap.

Then was there not that occasion when Mr. John Thomas, of Buckingham, was included in the birthday honors? Mr. Thomas, who is a well-known paper manufacturer, was made a knight. But the singularity of his name (together with no mention of his town) to that of the famous musician who was for so long the royal harpist, led many people to a very probably error, and Mr. John Thomas the fine Welsh harper, received more than 1,000 congratulatory messages from friends far and near who took him to be the lucky and worthy recipient of the King's favor.

It falls to the lot of few men to be twice knighted! In fact only one within our own generation has such a thing happened. Some score years or so ago the then Lord Herschell went to Windsor to be invested by Queen Victoria with the Grand Cross of the Bath. On those occasions the Queen was very rapid in her movements, and his lordship, having seen anyone present had grasped the sword and could interfere. Her Majesty touched him with the sword and gave him the honor of knighthood! She herself overlooked the fact that she had actually knighted him only two years previously.

The celebrated war correspondent of the London Times, Mr. W. H. Russell, had a physical form nearly as small as his mind was large. Hence his familiar friends used commonly to call him "Little Billie"; and one of the best and most valued of such friends was his late Majesty, King Edward.

Very touching and delightful was the scene when Sir William Howard Russell came forward to be knighted by the sovereign when he had known so long and served so faithfully, and whose steps as a young man he had guided over the battlefields of the Crimean War when the then Prince of Wales visited that interesting spot.

The famous journalist's small frame and physical infirmities would have made it a trial for him to kneel down before the King. The kind heart of Edward VII. grasped this at once, and he knighted in embryo came forward.

"Don't trouble to kneel, Billie! Stoop!" whispered the monarch with a sweet smile.

Russell's eyes filled at this kindly thought of his King and friend. He stooped, the sovereign touched his shoulder very lightly, and then said just a word in congratulation, as the new knight, will full heart, affectionately kissed the royal hand.

Few Premiers have ever been more cynical than was Disraeli, afterwards Lord Beaconsfield. The Right Hon. George Wyndham, who knew him well, relates how on one occasion Disraeli was much pestered by a well-known politician to bestow a knighthood on a friend who much desired it.

"Tell your friend that the source of honor in this country is a fountain, not a pump!" was Beaconsfield's laconic answer.

A. Palzer the Legitimate Champ.

Jack Johnson has eliminated himself from the prize ring. He has severed connection with boxing in America, Australia, England and France.

No self-respecting boxer, white or black, will meet Johnson for his now empty title. Indeed, no boxer need meet Johnson to become world's champion, because as a prize ring attractor of the public's money, Jack Johnson no longer exists.

The promoter staging Johnson would sign a voluntary bankruptcy petition. He would be shunned by men who support boxing. No decent man would put up a cent to see him fight anybody.

Six weeks ago this negro scornfully refused to box for less than \$30,000. Before his exposure, Johnson had signed a contract for \$50,000 to fight Langford and McVey in Australia. Hugh McIntosh cancelled this when Johnson's disgraceful deeds became public.

The ring has been guilty of many a shady, even criminal, transaction, but it is refreshing to note the unanimity with which it bars Johnson.

Palzer Logical Champion.

So, with Johnson out, there are plenty of decent heavyweights in the world. Bombardier Wells, champion of England, is one. Al Palzer, conqueror of Wells, is another. Little Sam Langford, the giant killer, is another. If Wells weighed, twenty pounds more he would be the peer of any boxer. He has everything a champion needs save weight properly distributed.

To-day the heavyweight title seems to rest, by right of physical superiority, upon the shoulders of the corn-fed giant, Al Palzer.

Palzer is the logical champion. He is a youngster, game and willing. He will never be a Jim Corbett, Bob Fitzsimmons or Kid McCoy, but there is no reason why he should not be the reincarnation of Terry McGovern and Battling Nelson.

He is a giant in the bright flush of youth. A clean-living virile man-mountain weighing 200 pounds with six feet three inches of dynamic activity and force.

He possesses the undaunted courage of Nelson with the irresistible awe-inspiring rush of Terrible Teddy. He loves to get close to an opponent and exchange pile-driving blows until one drops for the fatal ten.

A Physical Marvel.

Imagine this clean-limbed boy his great barrel-like chest housing enormous heart and lung power; tremendous shoulders with trail-like arms muscled like a Vulcan; a thick column-like neck supporting a head not able for his bulldog jaw and mop of blonde hair throwing his great bulk across the ring with the speed of a light-weight—and you visualize Al Palzer in action.

Palzer has everything to make a champion. He has the size. He has 'd a clean country-boy life. He has marvelous physical powers. He recuperates in the way that made Fitzsimmons a terror. He assimilates punishment like a sponge soaking up water and is most dangerous when severely punished. He has proved that he is entitled to red badge of courage by winning the fight despite a broken arm and by knocking out Wells when almost out himself. He has never faltered before the fiercest fire.

He lacks experience and has been gaining it at the expense of some good fighters.

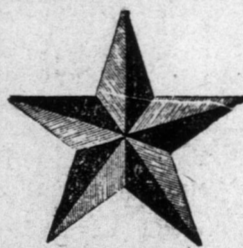

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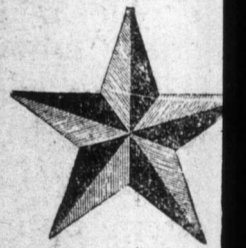
