Obviously the Bulgar army would not be able to do more than attend to this department of the total task of the Central Powers in the Balkans.

#### Bulgaria the Pivot.

Once more, as a year ago at this time, Bulgaria holds the centre of the stage. It is safe to assume that she will not desert her allies as long as she feels that they have an even chance of victory, because she will conquests. If Roumania were defeated she might count on taking all the Roumanian seacoast, and she owe Roumania a lesson for the incidents of 1913. Finally, the Bulgar dream of hegemony in the Balkans, realizable in a measure if the Central Powers retain their hold in the peninsula, will disappear if the Allies win and Bulgaria will be smaller than Roumanis or Serbia. She may even be smaller than Greece, if Greece gets on the winning side in time.

But if Bulgaria deserts or is con quered, then the collapse of the Austro-German influence in the Balkan and in the Near East will be instan and the fall of Constantinople wil not be long delayed. #### Confessions of a Censor

Delightful Bits from the Many S diers' Letters Which Pass Under

(From a Member of the British Censoring Staff.)


