Turks Retreating Allied Jordan. Drawn Around Huns Fear An Attack.

WAR REVIEW.

Both on the Macedonia and Pales e fronts the Entente Allied forces ulgarians and Turks no rest, while maining elements of the Hindenirg line in this immediate region. n Macedonia the situation of the ulgarians and Geramns is daily rowing more critical as the Allied rces steadily maintain their pressure against them. In Turkey the latest operations of the British and Arab tribesmen friendly to the Allied anse seemingly forecast the comin, through the latest advices of the ped, and to the north the strong enemy line protecting Cambrai has been further encroached upon by Field Marshal Haig's men. All along the ront in Macedonia from the region orth of Monastir the important trategic positions at Prilep has been cupied, thus giving control of the nerous roads, radiating from it to erbians have passed their wedge furher in between the enemy's west and east armies while on the extreme stern flank the British and Greeks ave advanced along both sides of the Vardar to a depth averaging about 10 niles over a front of 20 miles. Nowhere are the Entente commanders ancing troops who are harrassing

rmitting the Bulgarians and Gernans to lose contact with the advigorously. So badly has the harried ine been penetrated or battered, that nmediate dire calamity seemingly faces the enemy, unless the retreat is greatly hastened. Unless the enemy fleet enough of foot to outdistance the Allies on the wings of the drive and reconstitute his front to the north with its centre resting possibly on Uskub or thereabouts. Even if such a manoeuvre is possible doubtless it will be necessary for the enemy to Albania to the Adriatic Sea. That the Allied armies are moving swiftly to prevent the separated armies from osing up is indicated in the capture of Prilep, and the advance of the Britsh to the north of Lake Doiran. These manoeuvres point to an attempt at a rolling up movement of great proportions by the Allies. In Palesne the British on the coast have taken the important towns of Haifa and Acre, while east of the Jordan the Turks are everywhere in retreat, hard pressed by the British and the esmen of the King of the Hedjas. Inside the big sack, the neck of which was sewn up by the British in their initial drive, many more prisoners have been taken, and the aggregate now greatly exceeds the 25,000 offi-cially reported. To the west of St. Quentin over a front of four miles unning south from the Omigner liver, the British have materially vanced their front, notwithstanding he desperate resistance of the enemy, ind taken about 800 prisoners. Hard ighting is in progress at Selency, a cant two miles from the western outkirts of St. Quentin. Around Epehy nd further north in the Cambrai tor, the German positions in front the Hindenburg line have been bated. Murder Mystery. EXPERT FELL DOWN ON HIS OWN

CASE. New York, Sept. 17.-Charles E. Chapin, city editor of the New York Evening World, famous for the skill with which he directed his reporters in the solution of murder mysteries, to-day in a police station told the story of how he killed his own wife. Chapin yesterday shot and killed her in their apartment in the Hotel Cumberland and to-day surrendered himself to the police after failing to carry out plans to end his own life. Smoking a cigar and continually pressing his hands on his head, he said that he had been driven to the deed through desperation caused by the demands of his creditors.

Approach of a policeman, the editor declared, prevented his suicide in Prospect Park, Brooklyn, where he went after shooting his wife.

Chapin asserted that he committed the murder immediately upon arising yesterday morning. While his wife slept, he said he tried first to shoot her with a magazine revolver, but it failed to discharge. He then brought out a police pistol that had been presented him by Former Police Commissioner Waldo, and fired the fatal

After breakfast and a shave, the editor continued, he went to the park, where he had planned to carry out the second chapter of the tragedy. He wandered about throughout the day and night, he declared, and, this morning, reading newspaper accounts of his wife's death and his disappearance, gave himself up.

Chapin, who is 59 years of age, asserted that he intended to com uicide four years ago, but put it off with the hope that he would be able to meet his obligations. Having lost in speculation, he said, he had borrowed money from friends who were constantly pressing him for payment.

District Attorney Swann, who later alked with Chapin, said , he believed the editor was mentally deranged.

As there has, as yet, been no formal report of the Newfoundland delegates, or guests, (it not being quite certain whether they were the former or the latter) the text of the resolution which interests this dominic chiefly is given herewith:

#### RESOLUTION NO. 4.

Passed at the Annual Convention of Canadian Fisheries Association, Halifax, Nova Scotia, August, 1918.

INTERNATIONAL SCIENTIFIC COMMISSION.

Whereas there are large areas of Deep Sea Fishing grounds off the Atlantic and Pacific Coasts of the Continent of North America, where much scientific work might be done of value to the commercial fisheries, particularly in the way of mapping grounds and determining the habits and seasons of the

fishes which frequent them. And Whereas this work is of mutual interest and value to the Fishing Industries of the United States, the Dominion of Canada, and the Dominion of Newfoundland, and for other material considerations should be undertaken

by these three countries. Be it therefore resolved that the Canadian Fisheries Association in Annual Convention assembled, respectfully recommends to the Governments of these three countries, the formation of a permanent international scientific commission to collect scientific data, statistics of resources and production and direct surveying of the Fish grounds common to two or more of these countries.
