

If your father and my father had adopted this method of providing funds for our education, it is very probable that our careers today would be somewhat different from what they are and it is very true as I am sure we all think, that whatever our position in life may be there are always greater opportunities for the educated man than for the man of limited educational achievements. If I were an Insurance man I should develop this thought.

Finally regarding Life Insurance and Citizenship. Where is the connecting link here? I do not think it is difficult to find it, for is not a good life insurance policy a "stake" in one's country -the very kind of "stake" that I referred to a few moments ago as making for good citizenship. It is an abuse of language to apply the term "sleeping" to one of the pro-minent symptoms of both of these diseases. Sleeping is an eminently natural, healthy, and recuperative process. Unnatural prolongation of unconsciousness, such as occurs in these diseases, is of the nature of coma, a condition of complete insensibility due to disease or other external causes.






