This is a variation of the existing Prohibition Act designed to deal with the case of breweries which are allowed to manufacture beer, but only for sale to the Board. In the same way nobody can sell alcoholic liquors, just as under the Prohibition Act, except to the Board or those operating under permits from it. With respect to Beer, it is provided that taining three per cent. of alcolol or Americans call "near beer" may be sold as is done at present by small shops without reference to the Act. It has been argued that the tendency of the sale of these weak beers has been to wean people from strong drink, and to enforce the Act against the sellers of this would be harmful
