



The Prevention of Pneumonia

A MATTER WORTHY OF CONSID-ERATION IN "THE MORE DEADLY HALF OF THE YEAR."

"Pneumonia is the most deadly of all acute diseases: it is the type of those diseases of the respiratory organs which are the great curse of this country now that improved primary sanitation has brought the waterborne disease under control. It kills, in England and Wales, between thirty and forty thousand persons every year-much the same number as that for which pulmonary tuberculosis is responsible," writes "Lens" in the

New Statesman. "That takes years to kill: pneumonia ten days or so. It kills at all ages, but is the enemy of the very young and the old: unless, indeed, we take the view of Sir William Osler that it is the old man's friend. When a man is really tired of life, he may indeed do worse than make an end, swiftly and with little pain, by means of this disease.

"As the colder, darker, dirtier and more deadly half of the year returns, we may properly consider this 'acute lobar pneumonia,' about which we know so much and so little, and which lies in wait, with its high case mortality, for so many of us.

"Forty years ago the bacteriology of the disease was worked out in the main respects. To-day it is the easiest matter to find, in the 'rusty sputum' of pneumonia, the pneumoccus of Fraenkel, described by him and others during the years 1882-6. So much serves for diagnosis.

"But forty years have brought us absolutely nothing, towards the cure or the prevention of pneumonia, from these bacteriological discoveries. When the crisis occurs, and, in favorable cases, the temperature drops, perhaps eight degrees or more in a few hours, we must believe that some process of immunity has succeeded: and we must hope that a chemical product should be obtainable, like the antitoxin which works such natural miracles in diptheria. But we have none

"Of course, we have our orthodox armamentarium-antipyretics to bring down the high temperature by means evidently as different as can be from those which Nature employs at the crisis; expectorants to aid the cough: hypnotics for sleep: cardiac stimulants to whip the sore-pressed heart: and also hot poultices and ice-bags to relieve the pain in the side, due to

the associated pleurisy. "And we have a fine system of examination, with percussion and auscultation, whereby we can ascertain how, far the dullness extends, and which lobe of which lung is still unaffected. The verdict on all this may he taken from the greatest doctor of the age, a lifelong student of pneumonia, who knew more about it than anyone else. Osler wrote from the death-bed, where his old enemy, this very disease, was beating him at last, that 'all our bronchial therapy is fu-

"In these days we are at least learning not to raise the death-rate by closing the windows, and doing all we can to reduce the supply of oxygen to the respiratory surfaces, already dangerously reduced by the solidification of so much of the lung. The antipyretis and sedatives, antifebrin and alcohol and so forth, are used with far less freedom. Windows are opened. Nature is given a chance. Fewer patients are killed by treatment: and that is all we can say.

"Such being the meagre record. surely a hearing should be gained for any suggestion towards the prevention of pneumonia-a phrase which except from my own pen, I have nowhere seen. Do I, then, suggest that pneumonia is a preventable disease, as many of us have long asserted tuberculosis to be? Yes, indeed I do. I have no doubt that, if we chose, we could reduce the death rate from this disease almost out of recognition.

"Urhan smoke is unquestionably casual factor of pneuronia and of bronchitis. The relation has been known for many years. The Medical Officer of Health for Salford, in his latest - report, published diagrams showing how the deathrate rises after fogs in that borough. The same has been repeatedly shown in London. Citizens who regard me as a fanatic may reflect, when next we have two or three days of fog, that many of themselves, just a fortnight later, will consequently breathe their last.

"In Pitisburg, four years ago, I was fold that the pneumonia death-rate had been the highest in the world, the wost figures being recorded not in the coldest sections on the hillsides, but in the smoklest. In our country Middlesborough claims pre-eminence in respect of pneumonia, as all who live or visit there may well believe.

"When we cease to burn our coal, we shall do more to lower the pneu monia death-rate than forty doctors put together. The elderly and affluent, of course, have long ago practised the prevention of pneumonia by repairing to the Riviera every winter Give them a villa in Garavan from November to April and they are an unconscionable time a-dying, as many forts. an expectant heir can attest.



How to Appoint Governor-Generals

"As is usual when the Governor-General's term is expiring there are a series of paragraphs in the papers about a possible successor. One hears first a semi-royalty mentioned, then a peer, then possibly another. One learns with some astonishment that the name of such and such a distinguished personage has been well received in Canadian circles," says the Queen's Quarterly, of Canada.

"Whether these rumours are published on the authority of the newsapers it is hard to say. They have appearance of kites flown in the air. But surely it would be more beoming and more dignified if the reonsibility for the selection lay urely with the Crown, in whatever sense it be regarded, and the Can-adian Government or Parliament of the day. No plebiscite is taken after the newspaper paragraphs referred to; there is not even correspondence on the subject in the Press.

"We may at times over-do our democratic spirit, but this surely is not the way of democracy. As to the kind of personage Canada desires for a Governor-General, certain qualifications are fairly obvious.

"We like to see a man who has made good on his own merits, whatever his sphere may be. It ould be a gross ineptitude to name anybody, but an invisible college one might say, from whose ranks alone our Governor-Generals were drawn. It might even include 'Elder Statesmen' and other Dominious programs."

"As a result of long experience I assert my conviction that in the discharge of their respective duties and occupations, the merchants of England, and those to whom the task of government is entrusted in our tropical dependencies, from the least to the highest need fear no comparison with the merchants or officials of any other nation or of any other epoch in

the world's history." Sir Frederick Lugard.

"The control of the tropics is not a mere question of profit to the working classes or any other class in this country. It is a question of national honour, and national destiny and national responsibility," said Sir Frederick Lugard, G.C.M.G., in a speech re-

corded in the Guardian. "Trusteeship is not a mere sentimental expression of what is called the 'Humanitarian Conscience.' It does populations of Europe to share in the bounties of nature in the tropics, or the first and proper claim of those who have spent capital and effort in

development to reap their reward. "It holds that that development should be undertaken in such a way as to benefit the people of the country equally with others. It recognizes the prior claim of the people of the soil to the land and its products, so far they are required to meet their needs

and their future expansion. "It maintains the right of the producer to sell his produce in the best market and to benefit from the competition, which will assure to him the world's price for his commodities, and the right of the labourer to sell his labour to the best employer, if he de-

sires to do so. "The Power which accepts the obligations of a trustee is, moreover. charged with the duty of assisting the evolution of each native community, according to the stage to which it has already attained, by a system of education adapted to its needs; by improved methods of sanitation, and measures for the prevention or eradiction of disease, and the decrease of infant mortality; by introducing such systems of government as will foster a sense of responsibility and public service in the leaders and eradicate the servile habit of mind among the people.

"On the economic side the preservation of forest resources, instruction in better methods of agriculture, improved varieties of crops, improved means of transport, better implements, and better preparation of produce for the market, must go hand in hand with research for the destruction of insects, pests and fungoid diseases

"Prospects of railway and harbour construction and of irrigation, and the demand for wage labour for European plantations must be limited to what can be reasonably met without harmful results to the native population The prosecution of these aims should be outside the sphere of polemics in order to maintain a consistent continuity of national policy."

Submarine Dead

BRITAIN SAYS FUNERAL FARE-WELL TO 69 M-I VICTIMS.

LONDON, Nov. 19 .- Britain to-day said funeral farewells to the 69 dead of the lost submarine monitor M-1 and bade them sleep the mariners' sleep in the sea graveyard beyond old Plymouth. Their funeral cortege was a line of gray craft, steaming out at dawn to the channel cemetery where slumber other seafaring men.

For the 69 peace time sacrifices of the undersea weapon, a chaplain spoke words in praise of their devotion to duty and in sorrow for their loss. Sailormen, many of them "buddies" of the dead, stood at salute as volleyng guns boomed out the au revoir of

And then they cast to the waves as marker for the tomb of the 69, great vreaths sent from every corner of the British Isles

Twelve ships put out of Plymouth Portsmouth and Devonport while night still wrapped the channel. They converged to a spot 30 miles out of lymouth where the M-1 was last seen to plunge last week. In the cortege were eight submarine craft which had served as sister ships of the ugly monitor.

Ship As Pulpit.

The mother ship, Maidstone, served as a pulpit for the funeral services said by Rev. Dr. F. S. Burkett, chaplain of the submarine depot ship Polphin, while his audience was the line of 12 strung out in a circle round the death scene. Ship lights winkled out of the rendezvous in the dawn, while streamers of black smoke om the larger craft streaked across the sky line like pennons of crepe.

Dr. Burkett's words finished, congning the 69 forever to their watery rolleys sounded out over the waves ashed by a northeaster as lads of the hmarine stood at salute choking ack their sorrow at the fate of luckss companions.

Then from the stern of the Maidtone, which bore the rear admiral of he submarine service, A. B. S. Haggard, the wreaths were floated out to sea. One of them was a mammoth piece from the Navy. Then there were also little wreaths and mere wisps of flowers from humble donors to tell of maritime nation's grief.

This done, the funeral line filed eack to Plymouth, to Portland and to Devonport, passing over the spot where the M-1 was supposed to lie. As they reached this place-at the same hour at which she disappearedthey halted and their engines stopped

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


