

Misreported Evidence.

Attempts have been made by the Mail and several other Ministerial papers to make political capital out of the following telegram:—

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—George W. McMullen, in a card published this morning, denies the correctness of the press report of his brother's testimony before the Royal Commission, now in session at Ottawa. The testimony, as reported, is to the effect that McMullen sold the Allan correspondence to the Opposition; and this he asserts is not true; that he never has received from any one anything in consideration of the evidence he has furnished, or intends to furnish, against the Canadian Government in the Pacific Railway matter.

Some absurd misrepresentation has been founded upon this telegram; but the explanation is simply that an erroneous report was published in the Chicago papers. The press report telegraphed to Chicago was that D. Y. McMullen stated that his brother had received \$20,000 from the Grits for furnishing them with the Allan correspondence; whereas the evidence was that the \$20,000 was received for depositing the letters with Mr. Starnes, and of course was paid by Sir Hugh Allan, on whose account they were deposited.

ARRANGEMENTS have been made for holding a public meeting in Berlin, on Thursday, the 9th of October, to discuss the Pacific Scandal and kindred questions. Several distinguished public men are expected to be present, and there is little doubt there will be a large attendance.

Robbery this Morning.

HEAVY LOSS OF JEWELLERY. We regret to hear that Mr. D. Savage, jeweller, Wyndham-st., was robbed this morning of a case of rings which he values at over \$200. It appears that two or three customers came into the shop one after another, and some little time after the last one had left, Mr. Savage discovered that the case of rings was missing from the window, the glass door of which had been left partly open. Mr. Savage had left the shop once or twice to go into the workshop at the back, and the thief no doubt availed himself of this opportunity to abstract and secrete the rings. The case has been put in the hands of the police.

POLICE COURT.

(Before the Police Magistrate.) Sept. 18. David Leishman was charged by Constable Dopley with being drunk on Wyndham street, yesterday. Fined \$1 and costs. Samuel Boulding, colored, was charged by Constable McCann with disorderly conduct on Macdonnell street, yesterday. Fined \$1 and costs. Committed for ten days in default. Thomas Wardbrough was charged by the Chief Constable with breach of the Lottery Act. His Worship took a merciful view of the case on account of his being a stranger, and also his supposed first offence, and dismissed the case with costs and a caution.

Guelph Township Council.

This Council met on Monday the 8th. James Laillaw, Esq., Reeve, in the chair. President Messrs. Bonham, Darby, Hawes, and Sweetnam. The Clerk presented papers relating to drainage from the Agricultural Department, and a circular from the manager of the Deaf and Dumb Institution; also applications from the Boards of Trustees of the several School Sections requesting the Council to assess and levy rates on their respective Sections for the following sums for Common School purposes:—Section No. 1, \$800; Section No. 2, \$250; Section No. 3, \$400; Section No. 4, \$300; Section No. 5, \$300; Section No. 6, \$320. Mr. Sweetnam introduced the necessary By-law which was duly passed. The following accounts were presented and ordered to be paid:—from Mr. J. Anderson for copies of Acts and stationery, &c., \$13.43; Wm. Gray for gravel, \$1.50; Wm. Paterson for gravel, \$2.80; Wm. Creighton for gravel, \$1.72; Chadwick & Co. for printing, \$5.50; Clerk of the Peace for Ontario Statutes, \$4.50. The Clerk presented certificates that the Juror and Voters' list for this Township have been duly filed by the Clerk of the Peace, also for half yearly return of marriages, births and deaths. It was agreed that \$13 be allowed jurors' solicitors for preparing Jurors' Lists, and that the Clerk be allowed \$10 for making out Voters' Lists for the Township subdivisions, also \$6 for the half yearly return of Registration of marriages, births and deaths. The Reeve and Mr. Sweetnam stated that numerous enquiries had been made about improving home roads; and it was resolved that \$50 be placed to the credit of the Committee on boundary roads for the improvement of the road from the top of Carthew's Hill to the gate, on condition that the Guelph Town Council grant an equal amount; also that \$50 be granted for the road between the Town and Township from the 5th Con., Div. C., to the York Road on similar conditions. Complaints having been made that the allowance of road leading from the Elora to the West End road by the Cemetery was in several places contracted from the original width. The Reeve was instructed to have all the fences removed off the line of road from the north corner of Division C. to the gravel road. In conformity with an Act passed last Session of the Legislative Assembly of Ontario, a By-law was passed appointing an Inspector of Taverns. The appointments made are Wm. Paterson, West End, and Wm. Paterson Division G. The Solicitor was instructed to notify the Grand Trunk and Great Western Railway Companies to have the crossings on the roads in this Township put into a safe and proper state of repair. The Council then adjourned until Monday, 13th October. A. McCORNDALE, Clerk.

The afternoon session commenced at half-past two. Mr. Peter Rennie, President of the Fergus Y. M. C. A., in the chair. After the opening services were over, the Associations represented were called on to render an account of affairs.

Mr. Morse gave a vivid sketch of his experience, and that of different Associations in literary work, giving an account of the only manner by which literary work can be successfully carried on.

Mr. Williams, of Hespeler, followed with an "Essay on Harmony," paid high tribute to music in general, entitled its elevating influence more especially upon the young, and strongly recommended its assiduous cultivation.

A few remarks by Mr. McPherson, teacher of the school, explained the object of the meeting to be the getting of funds for the Sabbath School Library. The last song—"The Resenee," was given by the Professor, and the doxology then closed a happy meeting.—Com.
