CHEAPER MONEY.

Premier Scott of Saskatchewan has announced that the big question at the next session of the legislature of that province will be that of providing cheaper money for the farmers of the province.

But New Zealand and Australia have had greater success in this kind of financing than any other country. Between 1894 and 1912 the Dominion of New Zealand loaned \$60,000,000 to assist farming developments, and out of 32,000 lands had only 33 foreclosures.

It would be some time before the provinces of Western Canada could hope for such success, but with some effort they could do much to furnish cheaper money for the farmer, as soon as the money stringency is over.

NATIONALISM VS. IMPERIALISM.

As Mr. Bourassa advocates a policy which, if not now openly one of independence for Canada, will ultimately lead to that, The Albertan does not approve of the message which he gave to the Canadian club on Saturday.

The only imperial policy that will prevail is one of alliance rather than centralized coercion. In half a century the British empire will include a family of self-governing empires, two or three of which will be greater or nearly as great, in population at least, as the mother country itself.

AN ATTEMPT AT SCANDAL.

It is unfortunate for readers of Canadian newspapers that a great deal of the news from the Old Country, particularly that on political matters, is colored to a large extent, and written from the bias of the Tory party, so that one has to await the arrival of papers by mail to ascertain the real nature of the truth.
