It is said that the decrease is over 5000 a year. In Canada the last census gave us 123,553, -thus making the total for the two countries 370,338. The civilized Indians are included in this count. There are 53,806 Indians citizens of the United States; and 114,165 are classed as civilized. There are now very few Indians without a recognized location. There are over 19,000 dwelling houses occupied by Indians. The U.S. Government now follows a policy of kindness and good faith. Indian massacres have ceased. The long wharf at Richmond with the freight shed and immense coaling pier were totally destroyed by fire last Sunday morning. An alarm was struck at 2 30 a. m.
