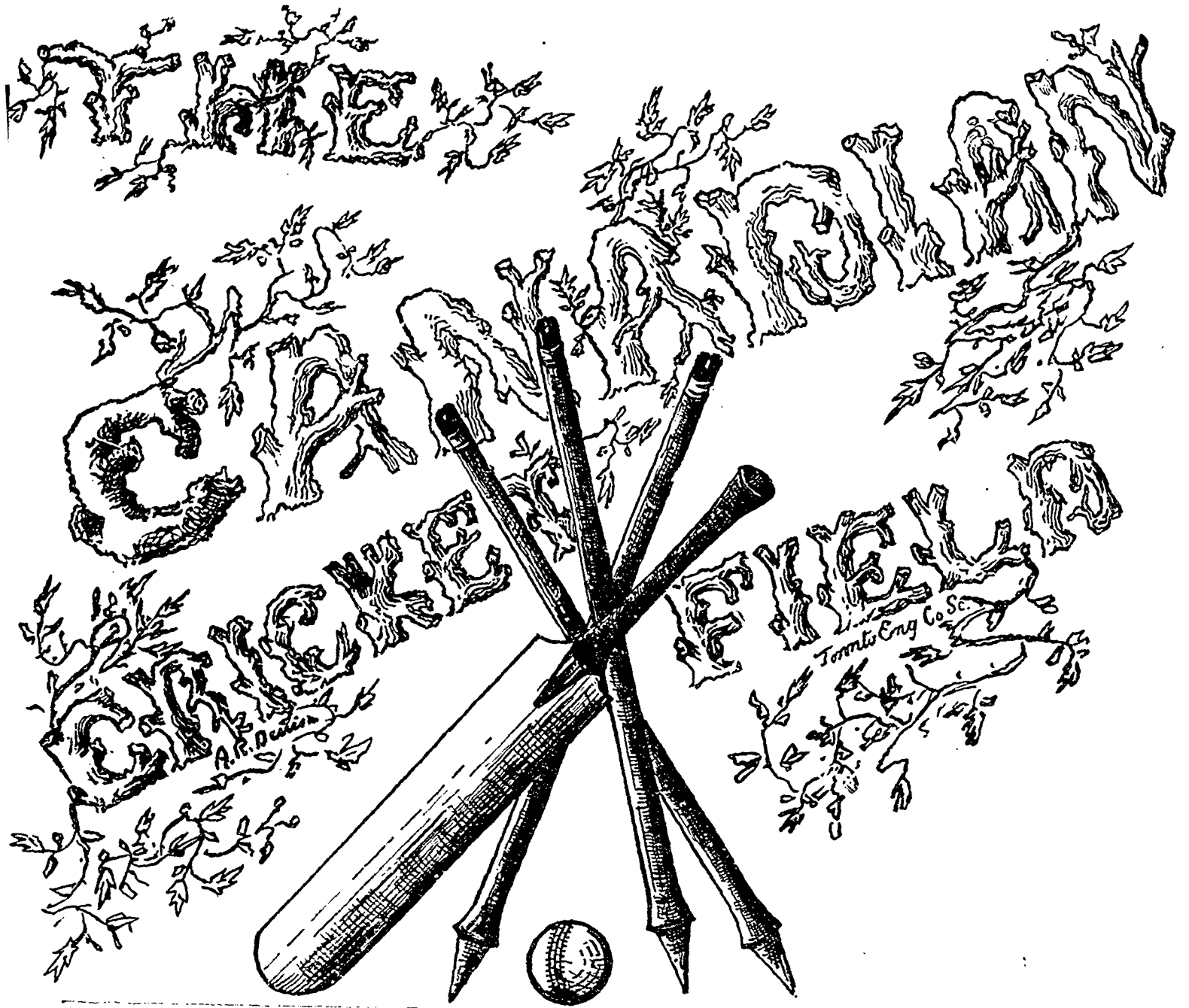

OH! HOLLOW! HOLLOW! HOLLOW!

Many, ingenious and always hollow, are the excuses we hear day after day and year after year for failing to score at the bat. It would seem that nearly every batsman deems it a duty which he owes his reputation to give the reason why every time he gets out without scoring. How often are we compelled to listen to these dismal tales, and how little are our sympathies awakened thereby. A man who always has an excuse at his finger ends is seldom a good cricketer. If you must have excuses, let not the blame of your failure be laid on pads, bat, or the ground but honestly acknowledge that you could not stop the ball, and you will be thought much better of. By all means imitate the simplicity of Morley's reply as to the character of the ball which bowled him in the match with the Australians on the Trent Bridge ground at Nottingham. This is Morley's account of the ball: "It beat me in the pitch, it beat me in the pace, and it beat me in the flight."

THE INTERNATIONAL MATCH.

The Committee of the Ontario Cricket Association have selected September 18, 19 and 20 for this match. The date is as late as we dare choose, and by that time most Philadelphians will have returned from the seaside and country. A strong team can be sent from Canada this year, and we sincerely trust that at last victory will be on our side, and that our American cousins will not find us so hopelessly feeble against slow bowling as last year. The Ontario Cricket Association has done a good work in making this match an annual event, and in systematizing the selection of the Canadian eleven.

Every club belonging to the Association has the right of having the names of those they send in as eligible for

selection receive consideration at the hands of the Executive Committee. The selection has, up to the present, given satisfaction, and the only thing now necessary to make the International Match a thorough success is strength on our part. The Ontario Association has made such a very favourable arrangement with the Association of the United States that the continuance of this game, as far as meeting the expenses in connection with the match is concerned, is put beyond the shadow of a doubt; and it could only be in the event of our proving ourselves so inferior in cricketing talent to our neighbours that the match could die a natural death through lack of interest. This is not likely to come to pass. The committee should select the eleven as early as possible, and then it becomes the bounden duty of every man chosen to practise conscientiously until the match.

The Ontario Cricket Association has up to the present been entirely successful in the main object of its formation, namely, in its operations in connection with the International Match, the series of matches to determine the champion club of Ontario have given rise to more cricket and greater interest in the game than heretofore. Nevertheless, objections to the idea of championship matches in connection with cricket are heard of. What raises the cricket enthusiasm to the wholesome pitch at which it exists at the English public schools but the struggle for cock house, or cock dormitory, or cock form, or in the country at large, cock county?

Still there is no doubt that objections do exist on the part of sundry clubs who maintain that these matches lessen the amount of their cricket in spite of the general increase throughout Canada. The Association, however, would be wise to do away with these matches for a season and test the effect. A great impetus has been given by them, but it would be well to satisfy the discontents for one or more seasons by doing away with this competition and let the Association quietly work out some other branch of reform.

EDITORIAL NOTES.

Familiarity on the cricket field is not a factor in the sociability of the game. The constant reference to his men as Tom, Hamilton and Harry by the captain falls strangely on the ear of an old country man, and helps to undo the authority of this official, as well as detract from the dignity of the situation. "It would be much better if during play none but the surnames of the players were made use of, and as little familiarity as possible indulged in.

Galt, for so small a town, puts a very good eleven in the field. Simpson is bowling fast and straight, and has a very good batting average; McConkey bowls a wide and then gets a wicket, and for this reason is said to be destructive; he also makes runs. McCulloch is a very promising colt. We were nearly forgetting the Rev. Mr. Hill, who has not played for nine years, and consequently acts very much like the scriptural war-horse when his turn comes to bat. He is active on the field and bowls very well left hand round. We shall doubtless hear before long of some great feats to be credited to the worthy divine.

Regarding the remark of a correspondent in another column concerning Guelph, Toronto and Hamilton, we consider Guelph the strongest batting team in Ontario as her eleven stands at present; but the extreme weakness of her bowling will always heavily handicap her chances of success against an average batting and good bowling team such as Hamilton. In Lockwood they have a useful, steady bat: in young Hanson a sure un-getter and wicket-keeper, in Hall an exceptionally good bat and field; in ~unders they have the most painstaking batsman in Canada, and last, but not least, Lemmon, whose good qualities are too well known to repeat.

SHORT SLIPS.

Mr. J. Gillean is now associated with the Windsor Club, and will in future play in its matches.

The management of the Canadian I Zingari have been compelled to leave out Chicago, Detroit and Guelph from their tour. The rest of their engagements will be kept, however, and in addition a match played at Ottawa on the 12th proximo.

The Parkdale Cricket Club took a trip to Galt on Wednesday 5th, and brought back with them the scalps of the Local Team, winning easily a 12 side match, with ten wickets to spare. For Galt: Parkin. McCulloch and Simpson were the principal contributors to the score (while Simpson's bowling was of the greatest value); for Parkdale, in batting, Morrison 43

On Saturday last Parkdale gained a one-innings victory over Seaton village, with a score of 59 against 23 and 26. The ground of the Northern Railway Club was kindly lent for the occasion. Of the batsmen, Joe Featherstonhaugh and Campbell obtained 11 and 9 respectively in good form, and the former made two splendid catches at cover. Irving headed the account of the losers with 8 and 6. Shaw and John Featherstonhaugh bowled most destructively for Parkdale, the former having 8 wickets for 35 runs, the latter 11 for 12. The fielding on both sides was good, the winners having but 6 "extras" in their score, while the losers got nothing but a wide in each innings. Curiously enough, half the runs made from the bat in the first innings of Seaton village were from Shaw's first over—the ground being too small for the arrangement of his field. W. Shipman's 6 wickets for the losers cost 37 runs.

COMMUNICATION.

THE ONTARIO ASSOCIATION.

To the Editor of the Canadian Cricket Field.

SIR,—What is the reason that we hear of so few association matches? By this time there ought to have been at least thrice the number played of which any mention has appeared. Considering the importance of the institution, and the energy which it has aroused among the smaller clubs, the present apathy is much to be deplored. Of course there are some clubs and some individuals who grumble at the management,

and some who altogether deny the usefulness of the association. Now, as to the latter point, there ought to be no doubt that one of the main objects has been gained—the good players in clubs too small to contend for the championship centring about larger clubs in their neighbourhood, and thus bringing stronger elevens into the field, the best substitute we can get for county matches. Regarding the other main object of the association, the international match, success has not been attained, nor will it be more than problematical until we have more men of wealth and leisure. The eleven cannot be got together for sufficient practice before the match, and consequently cannot work well together, nor can the captain have sufficient knowledge of the capabilities of each of his followers. Here I would remark (though I have no hope that my humble opinion will carry weight with those who have grown gray in error) that men are selected for their *individual* strength rather than for their likelihood to play well together. I would rather than not see half the team taken out of one club, unless they can have at least a week's play in company before the match. Also, what earthly necessity is there for putting on more than one bowler who cannot bat? But my purpose is not to criticise, though I have drifted in that direction, but rather to urge upon cricketers the desirability of giving the association a full, hearty and energetic support.

When you disapprove any action of the executive write and tell them so, and recommend the course you prefer, but don't go about growling when you do nothing to better the situation. By the way, why do Hamilton and Toronto look down upon the association games with such lordly indifference. Are they so *very* much superior to other clubs? Hamilton on Saturday scored 29 against 83 of the T. C. S. Rovers, and Toronto came out with exactly the same figures against Parkdale. Of course, we shall be told the city clubs did not play their full strength, but then neither did their opponents on either occasion.
