

OUR WORKERS.



NE of the most pleasing and profitable gatherings of the season was held last Monday evening, when our Workers assem-

bled for prayer and conference. Our Bible Parlor was filled with earnest, bright faced and willing workers in the vineyard. After tea, about two hours were spent in talking over the work. There was an utter absence of that stiff formality which so often marks such gatherings. Every brother felt that he was at home, talking over family matters; that his Father's business needed wise planning and vigorous prosecution, and that for this purpose they had gathered together. Not a word was spoken to cause any feeling other than love, and we feel assured that the results flowing from that gathering will be far-reaching. The one absorbing theme was God's glory in the salvation of young men. The questions asked, and answers given, were all to the point of "How shall

we reach, hold, and benefit,-eternally benefit, the young men of Toronto?" A vigorous campaign was resolved upon, and boarding houses were marked as the chief points of attack. A thoroughly earnest, practical committee on boarding houses was chosen, and it is their determination, as far as possible, to reach the young men and invite them to our rooms and meetings. It is, however, well known that the majority of young men in every city of our land have a wrong idea as to our work and our rooms. They look upon our building as they would upon a club room, -a place where only the members are welcome; and even when an invitation is given in the Bulletin or the papers, it seems to miss many of them, in fact it is too general. To meet this, to some extent at least, we are preparing cards as follows:

Members of the committee will be supplied with these, and when they meet a young man who seems to hesitate accepting a general invitation, this card of introduction, signed by the member, is given. In

this way we hope to induce some to visit us. It is also intended to secure, whenever practicable, the names of young men boarding at the houses, and then to send cards of invitation addressed to them personally, or at times tickets to our even-

ing social gatherings.

But another important point is the reception they meet with at the rooms. christian brother, (Robinson, of Sarnia), in addressing a Provincial Convention, said. "As a rule, men never come to your house unless invited, and never return unless welcomed on their first visit." Recognizing this, our Reception committee has been carefully re-organized with an efficient staff for each evening; and added to this, the Directors at the last Board meeting agreed to be in attendance, one each evening, during the month.

Still another step must be taken. Thus far we have planned to reach, and to welcome, but the all-important work is yet before us, to SAVE. How are they to be won for Jesus. Our devotional committee took up this part of the meeting, and the gospel services and Bible classes, were thoroughly discussed, with a view to their greater efficiency. But after all, the "best concerted schemes are vain, except the Lord conduct the plan," therefore, much of the time of the meeting was spent in prayer, and we believe that He whose "ears are ever open" has heard these petitions, and that we shall have those things we then desired of Him. Amen. Let all our praying members and friends say, Amen. Let our fellow workers in other Associations say, Amen.
