PARISH NOTES.

Perseverance seems to be the distinguishing feature of the past month, as it is just a record of steady work, and in consequence, gradual growth. The numbers who attend the various meetings and societies have much increased since November, and the amount of work done is truly inspiring. Amongst the members of the evening Guild of St. Agatha a new movement is starting, to train and prepare some of the younger members of the church in a little musical play to be given after Easter. Already much eagerness is shown on the part of the children,

and Miss Dye, to whom is due the original idea, will have no difficulty in filling the various parts. Much more difficult it is to find helpers who are musical enough to play and start the singing.

St. George's Choral Clui held its initial meeting on Tuesday evening, February 17th, and the tollowing officers were elected: President, the Rector; Vice-Presidents, the Rev. M. Hare and Mr. Street; Librarian, Mr. Murdoch; Treasurer, Mr. H. Boulton; Secretary, Mr. Worsley; Musical Conductor, Mr. Phillips. This Club consists mainly of members of the choir, and will meet once a week to practise glees, part songs, etc. The meetings will be held in the schoolhouse on Tuesday evenings.

What we do not provide for is crowded out, and it is in recognition of this fact that the season of Lent is set apart from the rest of the year. This time is provided for us to direct our interest towards the religious life and to find time for religious thinking. Lent is to the year what Sunday is to the rest of the week, and though all days are holy, we know for a fact that if we do not mark special days for special prayers and devotional reading we are not likely to do either on the other days.
