



The chairman, Mr. E. B. Osler, in opening the meeting, urged upon the members to look at the question from a broader standpoint than mere localism. As the views of the board had been asked at a meeting of Chambers of Commerce of the Empire, the board had, therefore, to look at it aside of all questions of free trade and protection, to sée how to further the interest of the Empire, as a whole. Canada, as far as territory goes, is an important and large part of the Empire. As far as population goes, it is small, but it counted by energy, it was a growing factor, pertaining to the interest of the Empire as a whole, It was in Canada's power to add a chapter to the history of the Empire, which would not be the least interesting chapter. Concluding, Mr. Osler suggested that, in any resolutions passed by the Board of Trade of Toronto to be submitted to the Congress in London, the board had to recognize that England was committed to a policy of free trade, and should avoid suggesting that England become a protectionist country. We can ask her to help us and can tell her that in return we will help her to maintain her as the chief nation of the world. Concluding, Mr. Osler asked that the question be discussed in a broad, liberal spirit, showing that we can look above our own little views and interests for the general benefit of the Empire.







THE BILL IN COMM'TEE MR. WALLACE'S AMENDMEN VOTED DOWN.

ortawa, March 21. (Special.)—The whole of the afternoon session and a greater part of the evening sitting was taken up in a discussion of a cattle exclusion bill, now before the Imperi-

Mr. Foster gave a resume of the action of the Government in proving the mone-existence of pleuro-pneumonia among Canadian herds, and concluded by moving a resolution setting forth "that the Pariliament of Canada, whilst not wishing to interfere in any way with legislation considered necessary in the United Kingdom, desires respectfully to protest against the permanent exclusion of Canadian cattle, on the ground of the existence of pleuro-pneumonia in Canada, and to express in the strongest possible manner its belief that pleuro-pneumonia has not in the past, and does not at the present time, exist in Canada."

Mr. Mulock made a lengthy speech, in which he attempted to prove the Dominion Government was responsible for the scheduling of Canadian cattle. He concluded by moving the following amendment: "That, in view of the repeated official declarations of the British Government of the existence of pleuro-pneumonia amongst Canadian cattle, and the serious consequences to Canadian interests from the passage of the bill now before the British Parliament, which would permanently exclude cattle from Great Britain, this House regrets that the action of the Government of Canada has not been such as to protect the cattle industry of Canada from the serious injury calculated to accrue to it from the passage of such a measure.

What the Liberals are Doing

Sir Charles Tupper, Bart., said he regretted the attitude taken by the Liberals, and that if their purpose was to secure the passage of the Exclusion bill now before the Imperial Parliament, they could not have done anything more calculated to effect that purpose. It was too bad that they should endanger a great industry of the country simply in order to score the Dominion Government. Mr. Mulock's motion misrepresented matters, for the bill before the Imperial authorities in 1892 to protest against the schedule, he advanced what he considered incontrovertible evidence. Three veterinary experts of the Board of Agriculture had then reported finding traces of pleuro-pneumon

accept it; but, on the question being referred to the law officers, they were told they could not do so. The report of their veterinary advisers was before them and they must act on it. Thus the embargo was imposed with great reluctance on the part of the Imperial authorities.

In the Evening.

Sir Charles Tupper, after recess, continued his reply to Mulock's strictures re cattle embargo. Who were the experts on whose flat Canadian cattle were scheduled? Prof. Brown was a paid officer of the Board of Agriculture, one of the chief purposes of which is to exclude all foreign cattle as well as Canadian cattle from Britain. Prof. Guid, another of the experts, had declared a cargo of Canadian cattle infected with Texan fever, but on reexamination within 24 hours admitted he was wrong and had to report to his Government that his first report was wrong. The suggestions of the Imperial authorities were such that it was impossible to comply with them, but the Government had done everything possible and had collected and presented an overwhelming mass of evidence which proved that there was no pleuro-pneumonia in Canada. The entire Colonial Office had been satisfied of the health of Canadian herds and Lord Ripon on this question took a stand at variance with his Government associates. The foremost veterinary surgeons of England who examined the alleged diseased lungs said there was no proof of pleuro-pneumonia. The peculiararities of some lungs were unquestionably due to transit pneumonia caused by excesses of cold and heat en route. This was never found in Canada and moreover was not contagious.

The Imperial Government were violating the statute under which they were acting, for it only gave them the scheduling power in case of reasonable evidence of the existence of contagious diseases. If the cattle trade was to be at the mercy of three veterinary experts of the Board of Agriculture perhaps the present condition of affairs was a good thing, for it showed where Canada stood. Finally, it might not prove an excessive evil, for it would lead to the building up of a fatted cattle trade, thus retaining to Canada the profits of the fattening of cattle.

Sir Richard Cartwright held that Sir Charles Tupper, in dealing with the question, had been excessively controversial with the Imperial authorities instead of diplomatic. The motion before the House would do no good, but it would be well for the Government to make an offer as to the inspection of Canadian herds, an examination of the cattle at the port of export and even as to the prohibition of cattle in transit trade if necessary in order to secure the removal of the embargo.

The debate was continued by Messrs. McMillan, McMullen, O'Brien, Featherston and Sutherland. It was closed at 12.30 a.m., when Mr. Mulock's amendment was lost on a division, and Mr. Foster's resolution was then carried on a division.

The adjourned debate on Sir Chas. Tupper's motion to go into committee on the Remedial Bill was resumed by Mr. Wellace, who moved an amendment, seconded by Mr. McNeill, that it was unwise and inexpedient to pass the bill. He trusted the Government would approve of his amendment, although he had some doubts about it. (Laughter.) He proceeded to explain how, in his judgment, there had been urdue haste in this matter. This was legislation which affected the future of the country. Parliament, without due consideration, was proposing to enact legislation which was absolute and irrevocable. Moreover, this Parliament was not specially charged to deal with this question. He himself
