MINES AND MINING STOCKS

Good Buying of War Eagle Yesterday Advanced the Price—Cariboo Declined Some.

REPORTS OF MINING TROUBLE.

News From the Boundary District of B. C.—Mining Stock Investors Company—Notes.

War Eagle advanced five points on good buying today, and Cariboo-McKinney declined only slightly on report of reduction of dividends to enable directors to double stamp mill capacity.

Bear and Bull Reports.

Every now and again some report is made public, either thru the press or otherwise, for the purpose of affecting some particular stock, and upon inquiries being made and the report investigated, it is found to be untrue and to have been circulated merely for purposes of lowering the price of the issue aimed at, so that interested parties might be able to buy it in at a bargain price.

The World has come across a number of instances lately, where persistent misstatements have been made.

It is a pity that such a condition of affairs should exist, and that the public will well if it will in such cases carefully investigate all reports before acting on them. It is of course also wise for the public to discount some of the boom reports which are sometimes spread abroad for manipulative purposes.

Boundary Country Activity. Grand Forks, B.C. March 14.—The shipments of ore from the B. C. mine in Summit Camp to the trail amount to some 250 tons far to 1500 tons. The new plant now being installed comprises 30 30-horse-power boilers and half of a 20-drill compressor.

Reports from Franklin, the new camp on the east fork of the north fork of Kettle River, 60 miles from Grand Forks, are to the effect that a great deal of development work has been done on properties during the winter months. On the Banner claim, a gold-copper proposition bounded last fall by Henry White, the leader of the Knox Hill and Old Ironides, a tunnel has been driven 1200 feet to catch the water which is still in process. The assay values obtained from Franklin Camp are the highest ever obtained in the district. A big influx is expected there in the spring.

One hundred miles to the north of the development of the water power in the Kettle River at Cascade, the tunnel will be conveyed from the mouth of the tunnel to the feet long and 20 feet high. The tunnel will be 16 feet high, 17 feet deep and 100 feet long. The water will be conveyed from the mouth of the tunnel to the feet in diameter and 200 feet high, with a perpendicular fall of 100 feet. Ten thousand horse power will be available, and the route of the pole line to Phoenix has already been cleared.

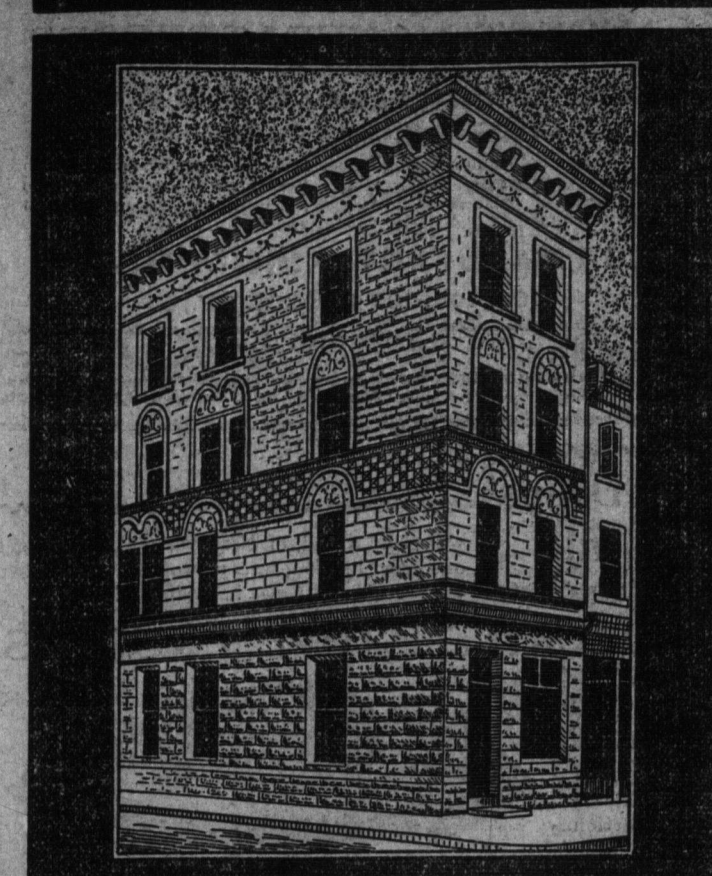
