Col. Peters Says Boys Thus Adorned
Cannot Be Soldiers—Urges

St. Thomas, June 21.—Col. Peters, D.C. of No. 1 Military District, paid his first official visit to St. Thomas on Thursday, and inspected the collegiate institute at St. Thomas, a corps of 40 students under the command of Capt. H. Isaacs. The D.C. commended the boys upon their efficiency in drill and military appearance, and then told them that some of them were not fit to be soldiers, and "have football hair."

He urged them to learn the drill, and to be prepared to go to fighting. KEEPING DOWN OF DUST

Is Just Now An Important Topic With
the Residents Along the

CITY COUNCIL ASKED FOR HELP

Conference Reached in Nothing—
Social to Rev. W. F. Wilson—

Hamilton, June 21.—(Special.)—The main topic of discussion at the meeting of the Beach Road and Beach Committee this evening was the watering of the Beach roads.

Councillors Dewar and Carscallen of the St. Lawrence Council waited on the aldermen, and asked for assistance in laying the dust at the beach road. They said that the only plan that was practical was to have about six cisterns, costing \$100 each, and the regular wagon, etc., to cost \$600 more.

The Township Council asked the city to give an annual grant towards the expense. After some talk Ald. Reid moved that a grant of \$250 be made, but this was voted down as being too extravagant. The chairman, Ald. Waddell, said he was willing to give \$100, but the township representatives said that would be of no use. Nothing was done in the matter. The outcome of a meeting of Beach residents next Tuesday to consider this and other matters will be awaited with interest.

THE YACHTS WILL RACE TO-DAY

R.C.Y.C.'s Saturday Program—Commodore Gooderham Measures the Invader.

Commodore Gooderham will not start the Invader at Hamilton for the Queen's Cup on Dominion Day. As already stated in The World, the Hamilton Yacht Club looked to be playing cannon, but not this time.

President Landers-Green and Commodore Gooderham will be in Toronto on July 3. There will be a meeting of the two clubs on that day to settle on the conditions of the race. As Mr. Landers-Green has already stated, he will not turn up, nothing was made known, but it is a settled thing that the rules will be the same as in 1899, viz., three miles over a course of 21 miles and one to windward and return, nine miles out.

Commodore Gooderham took some measurements of the Invader, and found it is a sure thing that she will come within the measurements, but it did not mean that the Invader was sailed about the bay all day, and had a couple of brushes with the Royal Canadian Yacht Club will sail the race for the Mail and Empire Trophy this afternoon for first-class yachts.
