DUTCH GRAIN FLEET COMING. The Hague, via London, May 23.—The minister of agriculture has regulated under the shipping law twenty-two Dutch vessels, which will proceed to the United States by way of Halifax, in ballast, to bring back 100,000 tons of grain.

AUSTRIA'S NEW PEACE MOVE. Amsterdam, May 23, via London.—The Roman Catholic newspaper Tyd says it understands on good authority that in accordance with the wishes of Pope Benedict the Austrian court is initiating a new peace effort.

FRANCHISE REFORM IN BRITAIN. London, May 23.—After ten days of debate, which was devoted mostly to the question of woman suffrage, the house of commons tonight passed the second reading of the franchise reform, or, as it is officially known, "The Representation of the People Bill."

RUSSIA IS NOT HOSTILE TO BRITISH WAR AIMS. Lord Cecil Says Russian Criticisms Were Based on Misconception. London, May 23.—Replying in the house of commons today to criticisms from Russia, of his speech on the war aims of Great Britain, delivered May 16, Lord Robert Cecil, minister of blockade, said that he was based on an entire misconception of what he said.

RUSSIA TO RESUME ACTIVITY AT ONCE. Message to Premier of France Allays Anxieties of Allies. GERMANS FALL DOWN Party Under Kaiser's Influence Fails to Gain Upper Hand.

Paris, May 23.—Julius Cambon, general secretary of the ministry of foreign affairs, referring to the Russian situation in the light of the assurances given by the Russian foreign minister, M. Tereshchenko, which were read in the chamber of deputies Tuesday, by Premier Ribot, said today:

"The dispatch is notable for the enthusiasm with which it sees Russia's immediate resumption of military activities in the war. There were tears that the revolutionary element, under German influence, might get the upper hand and seek to make Russia arrange a separate peace and disown the alliance.

"Fortunately, however, this has come to naught, as M. Tereshchenko has indicated that Russia, while repudiating the traditional policy of Peter the Great, and of the Empress Catherine, for unlimited conquest, conceives that a victory of the liberals in Russia is possible only by a complete victory over Germany. All our anxieties on this subject, therefore, are greatly diminished, if not wholly removed.

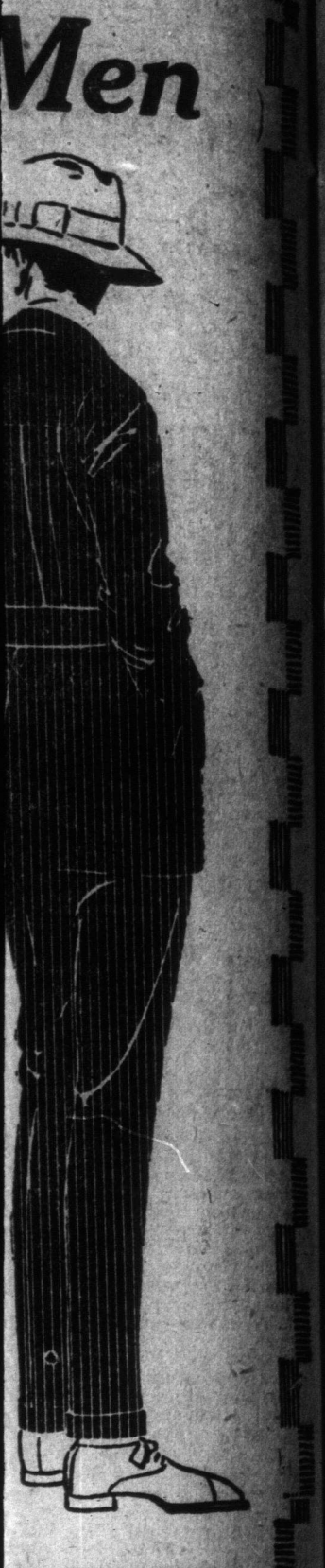
"The French people are intensely interested in the coming of the American division to France," M. Cambon added. "Their reception will be equal to if it does not exceed that given to M. Joffre and M. Viviani by the American people."

POINCARÉ SENDS KING EMPIRE DAY MESSAGE. Warm Wishes Conveyed for Prosperity of the British Empire. London, May 23.—(via Reuter's Ottawa agency.)—President Poincaré has telegraphed the king, on the occasion of Empire Day, renewing the warm wishes which the French people give with him for the "prosperity of the United Kingdom, the British dominions, colonies and India, whose sons are united with the children of France, her colonies and protectorates, valiantly fighting for the noblest cause."

"The king, replying, reciprocates these cordial wishes and expresses his own and his people's deep appreciation of them. His majesty's message concludes: "My empire, in union with France, her colonies and protectorates, will continue the struggle for liberty and right until they and their gallant allies have gained the final victory."

LABOR TROUBLES ARE BECOMING NUMEROUS. Sorel Dispute Settled, But Other Cases Are Still Pending. By a Staff Reporter. The labor trouble at Sorel where seven hundred government employees engaged in the shipyards had gone on strike for higher wages, has been settled. The men were receiving \$2 per day and demanded 25 cents increase. The case was referred by the marine department to the minister of labor who advised that the demand be granted which was done at once.

The fourth day was cloudy, cold and raw at Woodbine Park, but the racing was loyal and turned out above the week-day proportions, and Wednesday must have ranked second to the first Saturday in point of attendance. The public were rewarded by backing five favorites and two strongly-supported second choices. Stucco was topheavy favorite in the steeplechase, and had to be content with second money behind Bally Bay, Minnetonka, favorite in the Canada-bred six-furlongs event for maiden jockeys, and in the rack. The feature race, the Hotel Cup, furnished a thrilling finish as Stucco won by a nose over All Smiles.

Luke was the winning rider, cleaning up the last two races. Each of the seven winners paid less than 4 to 1. Kilday, second in the last race, yielded the best pool, almost 5 to 1, with old Budweiser paying 5 1/2 to 1, second in the sixth.

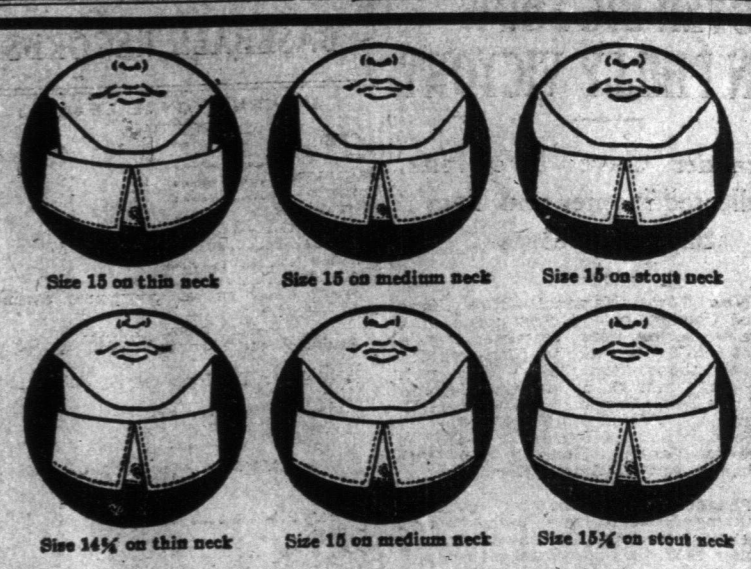

Brilliant and younger men are Mr. Murphy and Cox, who manage to finish one-two in the contention for big money, may be the strongest in the viewpoint of performance, but when Geers hurries thru the stretch and wins by a narrow margin, the applause greeting him shows where he stands.

Mr. Geers has been a favorite in Detroit since that now regarded as the early days of the sport. He grew into prominence when he beat him, and she repeated at North Randall, where she won one heat.

He was one of those horses that could trot all four quarters inside of 32 seconds, but did he have the end of a mile? That is the one that causes the secretary to write the desired check.

Campaign Was a Hard One. No horse raced harder in 1916 than did St. Frisco. He was in prime shape at the North Randall opening, but Mr. Geers had been hurt, so Mr. Jones drove him.

ONTARIO NOTED FOR VARIETY AND WEALTH OF MINERALS

New Ontario Supplies Metal, While the Southern Sections Abound in Non-Metallic Products.

Old Ontario may be described as that part of the province south of the main line of the Canadian Pacific Railway, from Sault Ste. Marie on the west to the Quebec boundary on the east.

The feldspar deposits north of Kingston are large and of excellent quality. This mineral also occurs near Parry Sound and in several other parts of the province.

Phosphate of lime, otherwise known as apatite, also occurs near Perth, Ontario, and is being extensively mined when the cheaper supplies now available in the Southern States are exhausted.

When on the subject of fertilizers it may be mentioned that gypsum or sulphate of lime, from which we obtain plaster of paris and land plaster, is mined at Caledonia on the Grand River.

Talc and fluor spar are mined at Madoc. Talc is an ingredient in talcum powder, and is also ground and used as a filler in the manufacture of paper and for other purposes.

Barite, or heavy spar, also occurs in Eastern Ontario. It is used in the manufacture of paint.

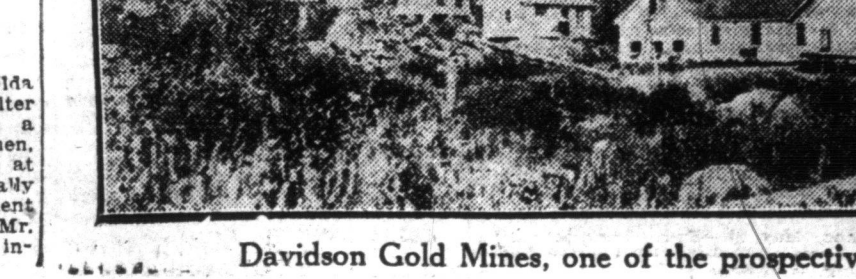
Sodalite, an ornamental stone, has been found near Madoc and a few years ago actinolite was extensively mined near Kaladar.

A considerable quantity of mica is found in Eastern Ontario, and there has been a steady production for several years.

Corundum, an oxide of aluminum, is the hardest mineral outside of the diamond. It occurs over a considerable area, and is used as an abrasive.

Graphite is also quite common in the older crystalline rocks. This is used in making crucibles for smelting purposes, pencils, stove polish and paints.

Apart from the precious metals, molybdenite is probably the most valuable mineral found in old Ontario. It occurs in granite, gneiss, limestone and other crystalline rocks.

NEWRAY NOW ON PRODUCING BASIS

Mill Now Treating High Average Grade of Ore.

The Newray management is pushing its cross-cutting work at top speed, and is drifting on the Anchor and the blind vein which have been cut within 500 feet from the shaft.

Pyrite, pyrrhotite and mica often occur with the ore, and the removal of these adds to the expense.

The drilling to the west, where five holes have been put down, is proving the formation in a very comprehensive and satisfactory way.

EFFORTS MADE TO KEEP UP PRODUCTION

Shortage of Labor Responsible for Any Curtailment.

Mine managers of Cobalt and Porcupine are anxious to keep in their power to keep plants operating to the last possible ton, according to the F. C. Sutherland and Company's weekly market letter.

Ontario has no coal, but there is a large amount of peat, and in the Silurian rocks in the vicinity of James Bay there are lignites of good quality.

FORMER ESTIMATE CONSIDERED LOW

Greatest enthusiasm is felt by the management of the Rand Consolidated regarding the No. 1 sulphide property at Doudreau.

This company, among other of its valuable holdings, has acquired the Montrose property in South Lorrain, which lies between the Wettlaufer and Lorrain Consolidated.

FLOUR DROPS AT CHICAGO.

Chicago, May 23.—Flour today had dropped \$2.10 a barrel from its record high price of \$18.80.

BETTER FEELING IN MINE MARKET

McIntyre Made Nice Rally—Renewed Demand for Stocks Perceptible.

It appeared yesterday as if the public was beginning to get a glimmer of advantage of the unprecedented bargains which are offering at the present time in the local mining market.

The timidity of public investment speculators in their failure to take advantage of the present level brought about by the recent depression is in sharp contrast to their anxiety to buy last fall.

The fact that McIntyre, although maintaining its production and having paid already one dividend of 5 per cent, with another one payable in a week, has dropped in price from \$2 per share in January to \$1.35 this week is a fair indication of how drastic has been the discounting of all the various adverse factors.

McIntyre displayed more strength doing a "come back" to \$1.45 against \$1.35, the low point established this week.

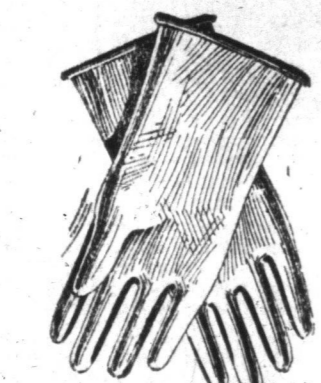
