Mr. Reames also swore that Mr. Ivens was responsible for printing the programme of the Russian Soviet in the Labor News. On Jan. 7 he said he attended a mass meeting where Messrs. Russell, John Armstrong and Ivens spoke. The hall, he said, was packed. Each of the speakers, Mr. Reames declared, expressed the hope that the coming revolution would be a peaceful one but expressed a willingness to shed blood if the capitalists wished to use force in keeping the working classes from obtaining their rights. He swore also that on Feb. 16, at the Labor church, Mr. Ivens said that "the capitalists of today have been rooted out, and they are frantically offering co-operation with the laboring man to save what they can and we will not have it. It is entirely in the hands of the workers themselves. All you have to do is to walk into the factory or other place of business.

To co-operate with capital at the present time is like putting a patch over the hole which has appeared in the old objects.







MURDERED

CITY OF MONTREAL

(Montreal Herald.)
An array of 119 women, including nineteen keepers, who pleaded guilty last week to being found in disorderly houses, crowded the court this morning to get their sentences from Recorder Semple. Nine keepers were given three months' hard labor without the option of a fine. The others were fined sums ranging from \$100 to \$250 and costs, and were also required to secure a bond of \$1,000 and \$2,000 real estate to keep the peace for one year or less serve six months' imprisonment.

All the inmates except one were fined \$25 and costs or one month in jail, one was fined \$150 and costs or three months for selling liquor.

The total fines for the amounted to over \$6,000.

City Asks Heavy Penalties. All the prisoners were well represented by counsel. Nathan Gordon, prosecuting attorney in each case, pleaded for heavy sentences in the case of each housekeeper, pointing out that they were responsible for the downfall of countless maidens of the city. Records of the court were produced showing the number of times each house had been raided in the past year.

Some resorts had as many as twelve offences in one year to their credits. Leniency was asked for the girl victims who had fallen into the clutches of the keepers.

WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1918

Notice to Employers of Labor

WHEREAS on the 17th day of April A.D., 1919, His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor and Council did by Order-in-Council bring within the scope of Part 1 of the "WORK-MEN'S COMPENSATION ACT, 1918," from and after August 1st, 1919, the following industries, viz.:

"Persons employed in the woods in logging, cutting of timber, pulp-wood, fire-wood, railfoad ties or sleepers, river driving, rafting, booming, or the transportation of logs, timber, pulp-wood, fire-wood or railfoad ties or sleepers."

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that all persons engaged in any of the above mentioned industries are required to file

in any of the above mentioned industries are required to file a statement of their estimated payroll from August 1st, 1919, to December 31st, 1919, inclusive, with the said board, on or before the 1st day of August, 1919.

AND FURTHER NOTICE that any employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to

and further notice that any employer neglecting or refusing to furnish such estimate or information is liable to a penalty not exceeding \$20.00 per day for each day of such default, and is further liable for damages, as provided by Part two of said Act, in respect of any injury to any workman in his employ during the period of such default.

NOTE—Forms for furnishing such information will be successful.

Recollections of One of The Visiting Players of Those Days

WRITES OF SOME OF THE MEN






