Report of G. W. P.

The G. W. P. read his Report.

To the Grand Division of Canada West :

Officers and Brothers of the G. D. of the Sons of Temperance of Canada West,

With feelings of devout gratitude to Almighty God for His mercies, and for the continued prosperity of our Order during another half year, I present this my first semi-annual Report.

During the Recess much of my time has been spent in endeavouring to promote the best interests of the Order ; my first official acts after the close of the G. D. was the appointment of D. G. W. P's. In the discharge of this duty, I have laboured with a design to the general good, and in all cases, where I could, I have availed myself of the counsel and advice of brethren acquainted with the different localities, and who were capable of judging correctly in the matter ; but notwithstanding all my anxiety to promote the harmony and advance the interests of the Order, some dissatisfaction has arisen from a few of the appointments, in different parts of the jurisdiction of this G. D. ; but in all cases, where there was a possibility of remedying it, I have done so at once.

In concluding this subject, I would add, that notwithstanding some slight dissatisfaction has arisen out of the present system of appointing D. G. W. P's., yet, I am of opinion, if judiciously carried out, there will be as little difficulty from this mode of procedure, as from any other that I am capable of recommending for your consideration.

Since the last Session of the G. D. Returns have been received from sixty-five new Divisions, which have been organized under most favourable auspices, and many of them have already rendered efficient service in the ranks of our Order.

I find within the jurisdiction of your G. D. there is, at the present time, three hundred and seventy-one Subordinate Divisions divided into something over two hundred Districts, which are under the supervision of more than two hundred D. G. W. Ps., and, from the great majority of their Reports, I am most happy to be able to inform you, that the Order throughout the length and breadth of the work is in a most vigorous and healthy state, and while new Divisions have been springing into existence, several old ones have ceased to exist ; twenty-six Divisions have surrendered their Charters or discontinued their meetings, so that their final dissolution may be looked for daily ; and here I would remark, that a number of these Divisions, although, often reported among the others, yet it cannot, in reality, be said that they ever had an existence or possessed vitality ; others have come to a premature end from a lack of that principle that is characteristic of every true Son of Tem-

perance, and prompts him to labour for the good of the cause, the cause of all mankind.

I have ordered the G. Scribe to procure one thousand copies of the Maine Liquor Law, published in pamphlet form, with an introduction and an appendix, on its practical working, by a citizen of Maine. Copies of which will be submitted for your consideration, whether they shall be distributed gratuitously, or sold to cover expenses.

I would also recommend to your honorable body the importance of employing a part of the funds of this G. D. [which is already large] for the purpose of paying a competent person, as a temperance Lecturer, to travel the length and breadth of our work, or in purchasing temperance tracts to be distributed gratuitously through our country, believing that the result will be, in the end the augmentation of our capital.

I would likewise transmit for your consideration, a Circular from the Grand Scribe of the G. D. of Canada East, and would request your serious consideration upon this subject, as a number of the Subordinate Divisions now in connection with this G. D., are within the limits or boundaries of that G. D., and several of them have already signified their desire to become connected with the G. D. of Canada East; and further, you will find that there are several of the Divisions located in our own jurisdiction which are much nearer to the office of the G. D. of Canada East than our own.—Should they wish to dissolve their connection with this G. D. and become connected with the other, it would be well to adopt some rule, in order that they might know how to proceed.

I would also urge the necessity of some definite action being taken by this Grand Division, to bring before the Subordinate Divisions under your jurisdiction the necessity of a united and simultaneous effort in favor of a law prohibiting the manufacture and sale of alcohol as a beverage. Your country calls for it; and as men that love her welfare, we should tread no vacillating course in this glorious reform. As you regard the prosperity of your country, the happiness of your families, the purity of the churches, the feelings of a father, mother, or sister, I conjure you to take this stand,—and never sheath the sword until this foe to mankind is exterminated and driven from the world.

It gives me pleasure to be able to speak, in the most favorable terms, of the manner in which your Grand Scribe, has performed the duties of his office; and in order to do this, he has been under the necessity of employing an able assistant, for which his salary is by no means adequate; you are therefore requested to take this subject into your consideration, and grant such additional sum as will enable that officer to continue to discharge the arduous duties of his office.

I would recommend to your Honorable Body, the necessity of referring as much of the business of this G. D. as will admit of it, to the proper committees,

appointed for that purpose, in order that they may consider and report thereon to this body, for the more speedy completion of business.

In bringing this report to a close, allow me to tender my most sincere thanks to the officers and brothers of this G. D., for the distinguished kindness and respect which have at all times been extended to me ; and I still hope that the same fraternal feeling may continue to characterize our acts, until the completion of the work assigned for us to accomplish, viz,—the hurling of King Alcohol from his already tottering throne, and the restoring of mankind to happiness and peace.

The Grand Scribe then read his report as follows:

Report of the Grand Scribe.

HAMILTON, MAY 22, 1852.

GRAND WORTHY PATRIARCH:

The Grand Scribe herewith presents his first Report and Statistics of the Order for the past six months ; and he is proud to assert that our glorious cause was never as flourishing in Canada, or even in the entire world as at present. Interest, appetite, and prejudice, are gradually yielding to common sense ; and many people who before considered themselves temperate, have been converted from their dangerous practices, and enlisted under the health inspiring banner of total abstinence.

I deem it my incumbent duty in the first place to mention, that upon my assuming the onerous and important duties of my office last October, that the P. G. Scribe did not furnish me with any of the correspondence which had

transpired during the previous two years and a half. The Cash Book and Ledger, containing the accounts of the D. G. W. P's. have also been retained by that brother; but during the months of March and April he transmitted me twenty-three manuscript accounts against D. G. W. P's., copies of which have been duly sent to the parties.

As soon as time admitted, I sent full copies of accounts to the Divisions having balances either for or against them, in order that their correctness might be acknowledged; and although it caused a great deal of extraneous work and correspondence, the result was most beneficial in arranging many differences of long standing.

In accordance with your directions, the Committee on Publication had the proceedings of the Session given out by tender, and the lowest was taken.—Some delay occurred, which will be obviated in future, by making the time the work is to be executed, a part of the contract.

I have had printed, agreeable to your resolution, eight reams of blank Returns and Bonds. The latter have been drawn up by a legal brother, expressly for the use of Incorporated Divisions, the previous forms being useless under the Act of Incorporation. These forms are printed on good paper, and at so low a price as to allow of their being disposed of at the rate of 1s. 3d. per quire.

Under these instructions I have also had 3,000 Odes printed, and charge the low rate of one dollar per hundred for the same.

Great complaints having been made by many Divisions, at the charge for Withdrawal or Travelling Cards, viz: seven pence half-penny each, because they observed in the book of Constitutions, that the price stated by the National Division was only four dollars per hundred.

In consequence of the constantly expressed dissatisfaction concerning the price of these cards, I wrote to Philadelphia to ascertain what the Grand Division of the State of Pennsylvania, whose head quarters is in the very vicinity of the N. D., charged for cards, and the reply was ten cents. We being over 400 miles distant, have to pay freight and other expenses, besides the charge for impressions of the Seal of G. D.

A few days previous to the commencement of the present Session, I found that the stock or B. B's, Music Books, and Officers' Cards, as well as the latest revised Constitutions, and revised Rules, was very low, in consequence of the numerous new Divisions having been formed during the past six months. I therefore ordered a fresh supply, and have now 68 B. B's, 111 sets of officers cards, 136 Music Books, 138 Constitutions, and 104 Revised Rules—I beg leave here to mention, that there will probably be no new ritual at least for another twelvemonths.

The demand by new and old Divisions for the Book of Constitutions, as published by this G. D., has nearly exhausted the supply ; and I would respectfully recommend that a new and amended edition be issued, as soon as practicable. Several important alterations have been made in the Constitution ; and from the notices last Session respecting proposed amendments to the By-laws of this G. D., after the present Session would be a most appropriate time to publish a new edition.

The present work has not been so generally diffused among the members of the various Divisions as it should have been, preventing thereby a proper and thorough knowledge of the working of our order.

I would humbly suggest that many of the Decisions of the Committees of Appeals of the N. D. be added to the work, and other amendments, and improvements, such as a better classification and an index.

The M. W. S. has kindly furnished this office with six complete setts of the proceedings of the N. D. from the commencement of the Order to the present time. These and six entire setts of this G. D's proceedings, I have had bound as books of reference for the representatives. The setts of proceedings of the G. D. in this office, with the exception of the six bound volumes, are incomplete, not having any of the October session of 1850,—the G. W. P. having furnished me with the six numbers to complete the volumes referred to.

I now beg to read the list of the numbers and names of the 64 new Divisions reported to this office during the past six months, which displays the great activity and energy in the cause, evinced by numbers of our D. G. W. P's in instituting them.

It will be observed that I have followed the plan adopted by the G. D. of Western New York, and other G. D's in taking up the number of defunct Divisions, consequently, they are not classed according to the date of formation.

Having now given the favorable aspects of our institutions, I must turn to a less pleasing picture, and render a detail of those Divisions which have dissolved connexion by forfeiting their charter, as well as those which appear to be nearly approaching that crisis.

- 44 Sparta, - - - Sparta, Co. York: No Returns for June, September, December, and March.
- 52 Pakenham, - - Pakenham, Co. Renfrew: The D. G. W. P. writes that this Division is broken up, but that there is a probability of its being re-organized.
- 64 North Star, - - (now Phœnix) Sparta, Middlesex: Charter surrendered. The members have re-organized, and formed a new Division called Phœnix.
- 80 Millville, - - - (now Queensville) near Bowmanville, Durham: After a Commission had arranged all difficulties, members sold property and divided proceeds.

The frequent errors in making out the returns, as well as, the irregularity in sending them in, are insurmountable impediments to the proper carrying on the business of the Order, or, at ever arriving at correct statistics.

As a proof of this,

On the 31st Dec'r. 1850, There were 197 Divisions 7934 contributing members, and 28 Divisions of the number, had either neglected to send in returns, or omitted the number of contributing members,

The National Division has not only planned a form of annual returns for the G. D's., but has drawn up one with similar headings, for the adoption of Subordinate Divisions, and in the M. W. Scribe's Circular of June, 1851, item 11, he states, "That the Grand Divisions be and are hereby required to make the items of the Quarterly reports, correspond to the items of the Annual returns of G. D's. to the N. D.," and to impress the matter more forcibly upon the G. D's., adds, "The M. W. S., in the name of the National Division, invites the particular attention of Grand Divisions to the items referring to returns. The beauty, uniformity and efficiency of the statistics of the Order, depend upon their right and prompt observance of the new regulations."

Now this wish of the N. D. can never be practically carried out, unless there is a general determination on the part of all the S. D's to make their returns correctly and regularly.

In the Constitution, it is obligatory upon every W. P. on the night that he vacates the Chair, not only to see that the Quarterly Returns are prepared for the G. D., and the per centage appropriated, but to certify to the correctness of said returns, and to forward them, with the seal of the Division, to the office of the G. D. It is frequently difficult, however, for the W. P. to accomplish this on the night he vacates the Chair, as the members are not required to pay up their dues until the last night of the Quarter, but many Divisions have remedied the present delay, by a By-Law making it imperative on their members to pay up dues at or previous to the last meeting but one, in each and every quarter; and no brother who does not comply with this requirement is allowed to speak or vote on any question before the Division, nor is the Q. P. W. given to him. By this plan the F. S. is enabled to balance his Books, previous to the last regular meeting, the usual procrastination is avoided, the W. P. is enabled to examine carefully what he certifies to, and to forward the returns and per centage to the office of the G. D. at a much earlier period.

In consequence of the non-transmission of several returns and per cent-
age, the December and March Quarters Synopsis have not yet been closed.

I would, whilst upon the subject of returns, suggest the propriety of
inserting on the pages of the pamphlet of the published proceedings of this
Session, and not upon an unconnected sheet, either a Synopsis of the March re-
turns only, or a combined Synopsis of the March and December returns, as I
find practiced in the Grand Divisions of the U. S.

One hundred and fifty of the Subordinate Divisions have availed them-
selves of the Act of Incorporation.

The Committee on By-Laws have examined and approved of the By-
Laws of thirty Divisions, in which I, as Chairman, have been most ably
aided by Brother J. W. Bickle, who was appointed to act in lieu of two of
the Committee, unavoidably absent.

Having already extended my Report beyond the usual limits of similar
documents, I shall close my remarks and read the Accounts.

The G. D. met on Thursday morning, the 27th May, at 8 o'clock, pursuant to adjournment.

Officers absent: G. W. P., G. Con., G. Sen., and G. T.

The G. W. P. appointed the following Representatives, *pro. tem.*, to fill the vacancies:

Rep. Beatty, G. W. A., Rep. R. Walker, G. T., Rep. Gregory, G. Con. Rep. Jones, G. Sen.

The committee on Elections and Returns, reported the Credentials of Representative Marks, correct.

On motion, it was resolved, that Representative Marks, Claremont Division No. 185, be obligated.—Carried.

The G. Con. introduced Representative Marks, Claremont Division, No. 185, who was duly obligated.

Moved by Rep. Dick, seconded by Representative Gregory, that the order of business be suspended a few minutes for the purpose of considering a message from the G. W. P.—Carried.

Moved by Rep. Aishton, seconded by Rep. Dick, that a Committee of Appeals be appointed in each County, composed of all the D. G. W. P's and acting W. P's of each Division, except the Division from which the appeal arises, and their decision to be in force until the next meeting of the G. D., when said committee shall then report.

Moved in amendment by Rep. Perry, seconded by Rep. Wilkinson, That the Committee on Appeals shall consist of members, of whom the G. Scribe shall be one, and shall meet once every three months, to confirm or disannul all decisions that may come up from local Sub-Committees—it shall be the duty of this Committee to prepare a report as often as the G. D. shall meet, of all cases of Appeals that have come to them from Sub-Committees, giving a Synopsis of the charge, evidence and action taken thereon, together with all the papers that may have been received from the Sub-Committees, which shall be laid before the G. D. by them at each Session.

All Cities, Towns and Townships that shall have three or more Sub-ordinate Divisions within its boundary, shall be a locality, and Cities, Towns and Townships that shall not have that number, shall be united with others at the discretion of the G. W. P., to form a locality.

The Subordinate Divisions of each locality shall on the first meeting of October, in each and every year, elect, from the P. W. P's. belonging to their Divisions, two Sub-Committees; and said Sub-Committee men having their election certified by the R. S. of their Division, under seal, shall form a local Board to adjudicate on all matters of grievance that may arise within their locality; they shall meet and organize, with a Chairman and Secretary, receive all complaints, and summons the parties and understand that a fair notice has been given to the appellants of the time and place, when and where the subject matter in dispute will be brought before the said Committee for investigation, and if either party shall deem it expedient to appeal from their decision, said Sub-Committee shall send up all the proceedings thereon by them, with all papers and documents evidence, &c. connected therewith, to the Committee of Appeals. Five to form a quorum.

It shall be the duty of the said Sub-Committee to use diligence in the investigation and adjustment of all matters submitted to them, having due regard to the welfare of our Order, and officially notify the parties of their decisions on matters in which they are interested.

Moved, in amendment to the amendment, by Rep. Ring, seconded by Rep. Arkland, That such appeal be made to the P. W. P's. and W. P's. of the three Divisions nearest the Division in which such complaints originate. Such referees always to report all such appeals in detail to the G. Brown, were illegally exacted, and recommend that they may be refunded by this G. D., amounting to £1 17s. 6d. They would further say, that they believe the whole difficulty to have originated in the culpable neglect of D. G. W. P., Foley, in not making his return to the office of the G. Scribe. They recommend that the Charter take date from the 28th April, 1851, not only on the face of the Charter, but also on the G. S's books.

Report of Committee on Appeals.

The Committee on Appeals made the following Report:

To the G. W. P. and members of the G. D. of Canada West.

Your Committee on Appeals report that they have carefully examined the several papers and documents referred to it, and would recommend that the several cases to which they refer, be disposed of, by your Division, as follows:—

1st. That the Appeal of brother D. B. Stickney, from the decision of Newburgh Division No. 77 be dismissed, the sole ground of Appeal being that said Division dismissed a charge preferred by the said brother against brother Caton, for having as a Druggist sold wine and brandy by the quart, unmixed with drugs or medicines, but sold by him as a medicine. However, it is not to be understood that the Committee have affirmed the principle, that any brother has a right to sell intoxicating liquors in the course of his business or otherwise than is provided by the Constitution.

In regard to the Appeal of brother Freel against the decision of Stouffville Division, No. 47, your Committee are of opinion, that the case, as it at present stands, is one which does not properly come within the jurisdiction of your G. D., as no decided action as yet appears to have been taken by that Division in regard to the subject in dispute.

That the Appeal of brother Ebenezer Perry and others of Cobourg Division No. 9, from the decision of that Division, be sustained, the facts of the case being as follows:—

A charge was preferred against brother Mitchel, for slandering said Division, the charge was referred to a Committee, which met, tried the charge, reported it proved, and recommended the suspension of the brother for six weeks. When the case came before the Division the Report was

received, but the recommendation was not acted upon, but a motion that the brother be expelled was carried. The brother was declared expelled and his name entered upon the Black Book, and neighbouring Divisions notified within one week of the expulsion; at the second meeting of the Division, after such expulsion, a motion [one week's notice of which being given] to rescind the vote of expulsion was introduced and carried; and the R. S. notified the neighboring Divisions of such vote; it is in regard to this vote brother Perry appeals, contending that it was unconstitutional.

Your Committee are of opinion that the brother being constitutionally expelled, such vote could not be rescinded at a subsequent meeting; if the brother expelled felt himself aggrieved, his proper course was to have appealed to this body.

In regard to the appeal of Andrew McClure against Fingal Division, No. 239, your Committee are not in a position to report the facts of the case, not having been properly brought before your Committee, and would therefore recommend that the papers in the case be returned by G. S. to appellant, and informing him at the same time of the nature of this Report.

In the appeal of brother Lock from the decision of the Star of Bethlehem Division, No. 114, your Committee are of opinion, that the distribution of the funds of Subordinate Divisions is a matter over which this Division has no control.

The Appeal of brother Elliot, W. P., Pine Division, No. 134, against the expulsion of brother Ledson and others, from that Division, the Committee feels itself bound to sustain the appeal, as it considers these brothers improperly expelled, they not having had a trial. At the same time, the Committee are of opinion that when the vote of expulsion was first proposed, the W. P. should not have refused to put the question of appeal from his decision to the meeting.

Your Committee would further say that it is satisfied the whole of the difficulty in this matter may be attributed to our Committee on By-Laws, having approved of Art. 9, Sec. 9, of the By-Laws of such Subordinate Division, which appears to be at variance with Art. 2, Sec. 1 and 2 of the Revised Rules.

The Committee in the case of Samuel Coakes against the Thornhill Division, would Report, That they consider the agreement to refer the matter in difference and the award thereon, closed the matter, and therefore deserves no further notice from this Division.

TO THE G. D. OF CANADA WEST, IN G. D. ASSEMBLED:

The Committee on Petitions respectfully Report—

1st. That they have examined the Petition of Barrie Division, No. 147, S. of T., and cannot recommend any alteration in the Constitution, as prayed for; namely, to enforce it upon Subordinate Divisions to receive members of other Subordinate Divisions without the required fee, or to render Divisions liable for the benefits payable to brothers who shall have withdrawn from such Divisions.

2nd. They cannot recommend such alterations in the Constitution as are desired by the Galt Division, No. 158; who have prayed for an alteration in the scale of representation to this G. D., and for a different manner of raising the necessary funds for defraying the expenses of the G. D.

3rd. Nor can your Committee recommend the adoption of the prayer of the Petition of the Grand River Division, No. 184, desiring that all badges and regalia be dispensed with.

4th. Your Committee cannot recommend the alteration in the Constitution sought for by the Cobourg Division, No. 9, who have prayed, "That such measures by appeal to the N. D. as will lead to such an alteration of the Constitution as will relieve the Order from the injuries arising from the benefit system," believing, as your Committee do, that the benefit system is one well calculated to further the objects of our organization.

5th. The G. W. P. having brought under the consideration of this G. D., the subject of petitioning for a Law similar to that which prevails in the State of Maine, and his Report having been referred to a special Committee, it is unnecessary for your Committee to report on the Petition of Claremont Division, No. 185, and the Resolutions of Colborn Division, No. 29.

6th. Your Committee recommend that a D. G. W. P. be commissioned to proceed to Caledonia, on the Grand River, to arrange the differences between the Caledonia Division No. 124, and Seneca Division, No. 360.

The Committee on the Grand Scribe's Report, beg to submit—

That they find the document full and complete, and in relation to its contents recommend

1st. That the G. W. P. and G. W. A. be a Committee to obtain from our P. G. S. all the correspondence of his late office, as G. S., embracing, as he states, some thousands of letters; also, the Cash Book, though it contains his vouchers, viz.: the certificates of the several Auditing Committees; such book being as unquestionably the property of the office of the G. S. as the book of the F. S. of a S. D. is the property of his office, so that although it contains all his vouchers, he must deliver it up to his successor in office; the same rule should certainly hold in the office of this G. D. as it obtains in all public offices, political and ecclesiastical.

Your Committee have great pleasure in stating that the P. G. S. consents freely and cheerfully to deliver up to your order whatever you may claim as connected with his late office, requesting only a little time to classify and arrange the accumulated mass; and hence we further recommend that the above Committee require the delivery, as above, on or about the 15th July next, and not before. The Committee to immediately forward all they receive to the office of the G. S. Also, that they examine the Memorandum Book, kept instead of a Ledger, and forward the same, if they deem it necessary.

2nd. That the Committee on Publications be instructed to issue the third edition of our G. D. Book, as soon as they can embody in it the By-Laws, as amended by this Session, and the Constitutions as they shall stand at the close of the approaching Session of the National Division, together with such extracts from the proceedings of that body as they shall deem necessary; taking care to render the whole as complete and practical as possible.

3rd. That the Publication Committee be instructed to print the Synopsis of Returns hereafter, on the pages of our published Minutes, and not on a separate sheet, as heretofore.

Your Committee have to congratulate the Grand Division on the highly satisfactory and business-like management of the office of G. S., as apparent in the reduction of 75 per cent. in the cost of Blank Returns and Bonds to Subordinate Divisions—in the prompt manner in which the Accounts of Divisions have been rendered—in the care taken to secure regular and correct Returns, and in his monthly remittances to the Grand Treasurer: all entitling him to the continued confidence of this body.

To THE G. W. P.

Your Committee appointed to adapt Section 7th of Article 4th of our By-Laws to a Resolution passed by the G. D., affecting the same, beg leave to recommend the following to be substituted for that Section:—

Any Appeal originating in a Subordinate Division shall be made to a Committee, consisting of P. W. P's and acting W. P's, of the three Divisions nearest the one in which such Appeal originates. Five of such officers to constitute a quorum. On the occurrence of an Appeal in any Division, the W. P. of such Division shall convene the above named Committee as soon as convenient. At the first meeting of any such Committee, the members shall elect from their number a Chairman and Secretary, who shall act as such until the matter under consideration shall be disposed of.

It shall be the duty of the Secretary of any Committee on Appeals, constituted as above provided, to acquaint the appellant or appellants immediately with the decision of the Committee, and also, if such decision be appealed from, to report in detail to the G. D. at its next regular meeting. The Committee shall have power to require from a Subordinate Division, parties to an Appeal, the production of all books and papers of the Division, or certified copies thereof, which are necessary to be used on the Appeal, and shall acquaint officially all parties to such Appeal with the time and place of the investigation of the case, when and where such parties shall attend personally, or by Counsel, produce their evidence and argue or submit their cause.

The meetings of all Committees on Appeals shall be open to members of the Order, during the hearing of Appeals.

After hearing the testimony and argument on an Appeal, the Committee shall sit with closed doors, deliberate upon and decide the case.

Report of Committee on G. W. P's Report.

The Committee on the G. W. P's Report, brought up their Report, which was read as follows:—

The Committee to whom was referred the Report of the Grand Worthy Patriarch, have had the same under consideration, and given it such attention as their time would allow, but not equal to that which the importance of the matters contained in it would appear to require.

1st. Your Committee concur with the opinion of the G. W. P., in the present mode of appointing D. G. W. Patriarch's, believing it to be one of the safest and best that can be adopted for the benefit and general interests of the Order.

2nd. That part of the G. W. P's Report, referring to the Tracts containing the Maine Liquor Law, your Committee consider no action necessary on their part, the same having been at the present Session reported upon by the Finance Committee, and disposed of by the G. D. With regard to the expending a part of the funds of this G. D. in the employment of a Temperance Lecturer, your Committee unanimously concur with the opinion of the G. W. P. They would therefore recommend that an appropriation be made from the funds of this G. D., for the purpose of employing Lecturers to advance the cause of Temperance; but particularly to agitate the propriety of having a Law passed for this Province, similar to the Maine Liquor Law, and that the Committee appointed at the last Session to take into consideration the *Liquor Traffic*, be called upon to Report forthwith, and that this subject be referred to them for their serious consideration.

Your Committee respectfully beg leave to differ in opinion with the G. W. P. in allowing any Subordinate Division located in Canada West and under the jurisdiction of this G. D. to withdraw for the purpose of joining or becoming attached to any other G. D. and would therefore recommend that no further action be taken by this Body on that part of the Report.

We recommend that all Subordinate Divisions located in Canada East and under the jurisdiction of this Grand Division, that may wish to withdraw from this G. D. for the purpose of becoming united with the Grand Division of Canada East, be allowed to do so, at any time within four months from the date hereof, upon the following terms and conditions.

First, upon their paying to this G. D. all legal demands that this Body may have against them at the time the Resolution hereinafter named may be passed by a two third Vote at a regular meeting of the Division, after one weeks notice has been given in writing by some member thereof, that he intends at the next regular meeting to introduce the said Resoulution.

That when, and so soon as any of the said Divisions shall pay all demands as aforesaid and pass the above Resolution, that they or any of the said Division shall have full power and authority to withdraw from this G. D. for the purpose of connecting themselves with the G. D. of C. E., and that the said Grand Division of C. E. have full consent and permission of this G. D. to receive them under their jurisdiction provided always, that the said Division withdrawing from this G. D. as aforesaid, shall file in the office of the Grand Division a copy of the above resolution and certificate from the Grand Scribe of the G. D. of C. E., under the seal of G. D. last aforesaid, to the effect that the said Division so withdrawing as before mentioned has become a subordinate Division under the jurisdiction of the G. D. of C. E.

That then their connection with this G. D. shall cease and determine and not before.

We further recommend that the G. S. of this G. D. send immediately a copy of that part of this Report relating to the withdrawing of Divisions from this G. D. to all Subordinate Divisions in C. E., under this jurisdiction and to the G. S. of the G. D. of C. E.

In reference to that part of the G. W. P's. Report referring to the necessity of a united and simultaneous effort being made in favor of a law prohibiting the manufacture and sale of Alcohol as a beverage, your Committee unanimously concur with his opinion, and recommend that part of the Report be also referred to the Committee on the Liquor Traffic.

We recommend an additional sum of twenty-five pounds be added to the G. S's. salary for this current year.

In alluding to the opinion expressed by the G. W. P. in his Report of the necessity of referring as much of the business of this G. D. as will admit of it, to the proper Committees appointed for that purpose. We fully concur and unanimously recommend the adoption thereof.

Your Committee would not be doing justice to the G. W. P. or its own feelings, did it not briefly advert to the uniformly affable and courteous course pursued by that Officer in the discharging the manifold labours connected with the duties of his Office, and at the same time, bear warm testimony to

the undeviating spirit of kindness and conciliation which has marked his intercourse with the Order during the time he has been in office.

The Committee on the Liquor Traffic brought up their report, which was read, as follows :

Report of the Committee on the Liquor Traffic,

To the Grand Division of the Sons of Temperance of Canada West in Grand Division assembled :

The Committee on the Liquor Traffic, respectfully report:

1. That your Committee are of the opinion, that it will be much to the interests of the Order, and assist greatly in extending the principles and designs of this institution, to employ competent Temperance Lecturers, for the purpose of agitating the question of a law prohibiting the use and sale of Intoxicating Liquors.

2. Your Committee recommend, that the sum of three hundred pounds be appropriated by this Grand Division, and placed at the disposal of your Committee.

3. That in order efficiently to carry out the design of employing such lecturers, and agitating the question referred to, it is necessary to divide the Province into four Districts, as follows:

The first District to comprise the Counties of Middlesex, Kent, Elgin, Lambton, Essex, Huron, Perth, Bruce and Norfolk.

The second District, of Brant, Wentworth, Halton, Haldimand, Welland, Waterloo, Wellington Grey and Peel.

The third, of York, Ontario, Durham, Northumberland, Peterboro', Simcoe, Hastings and Prince Edward.

The fourth, of Lennox, Addington, Frontenac, Leeds, Grenville, Prescott, Russell, Stormont, Dundas, Glengarry, Lanark and Renfrew.

4. That Brothers Wilson, Wilkinson and Boyd be a sub-committee for the first district

O'Reiley, Ryerson and Currie, for the second district.

Arkland, Dick and Farewell for the third, and

Pardee, Ellerbeck and Perry, for the fourth district.

5. That the sum of £75, portions of the appropriation, be placed at the disposal of each of the said sub-committees.

That such sub-committees shall employ competent persons to lecture in their districts, determine the number of Lectures to be delivered in each County, so that at least one lecture shall be delivered in each and every County; and that such sub-committees shall make arrangements with the Subordinate Divisions, for holding meetings, and generally to carry out the objects of the appropriation.

6. Your Committee recommend for the adoption of the Grand Division, the following Petition, to be presented to the several branches of the Provincial Legislature, viz :—

To the Honorable the Members of the Legislative Assembly in Parliament Assembled.

*The Petition of the Undersigned, Inhabitants of the Town———of———
Humbly Sheweth.*

That your Petitioners regard intemperance as a great moral, and social, evil, destructive of health, virtue and happiness, and producing only disease, lunacy and crime, entailing heavy burdens on society, and erecting a fatal barrier in the path of individual and national progress.

That your Petitioners regard Total Abstinence from the use of intoxicating liquors as the only effectual means of prevention or cure of this great evil; but while rejoicing that many thousands of their fellow countrymen in this Province are persuaded of the truth of these statements and act on such persuasion, your petitioners regret that many from interested motives, consequent on their peculiar avocations, or from the blinded influence of vitiated appetites, are, in this matter, still unmoved, and apparently unmovable by the remonstrances of moral suasion.

That your Petitioners deem it the duty of a wise and patriotic government in such circumstances to protect the community from the immense pecuniary sacrifices, the mental and physical maladies, the outrages on life and property, and the moral contamination consequent on the use of Alcoholic Beverages.

Your Petitioners, therefore pray your Honorable House to pass a Legislative Enactment, prohibiting the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, except for medicinal and mechanical purposes.

And your Petitioners, as in duty bound, will ever pray.

Your Committee recommend that your Grand Scribe be directed to send

three copies of the foregoing Petition, and a copy of this report to each Subordinate Division with directions that each Subordinate Division return the Petitions when signed to the Grand Scribe.


