EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
St. George Snow Shoe Club.

MONTREAL, Nov. 15th, 1881.

The Eighth Annual Meeting of the St. George Snow Shoe Club was held this evening in the ladies' ordinary of the Windsor Hotel, the President, Mr. F. C. HENSHAW, in the chair, 62 members being present.

The meeting being called to order, the Minutes of the last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Secretary, Mr. W. L. MATHEWS, was directed to read the following Annual Report :—

TO THE PRESIDENT AND MEMBERS OF THE
ST. GEORGE SNOW SHOE CLUB.

Your Secretary has much pleasure in submitting the following Report of the Club's doings and progress for the season of 1880-81.

In no year since our formation in 1874 have we been so prosperous or full of life as at present.

Everything undertaken by us during the past winter was carried successfully to completion, and to-day we can congratulate ourselves on being second to no Snow Shoe Club in the Dominion.

The winter opened with a heavy downfall of snow on the 15th of November, and though some of the city Clubs had reason to complain of their tramps being interrupted by rain, yet St. George, our patron saint, contrived to have every Tuesday night bright and clear, with lots of the beautiful, so that not a single tramp was cancelled during the season.

Our roll shows a membership of 293, comprising 2 life and 291 ordinary members, being an increase on previous year of 119.

From one reason or another, 39 gentlemen left the Club, but their places have been more than filled by 157 new-comers:

A Branch of the Club has been formed in Winnipeg, and bids fair to outstrip the parent organization. Its President is Mr. S. S. CUMMINS, our old 1st Vice, and he has imparted so much of his enthusiasm and fire to its members, that it now numbers 170, and in a letter which I shall read you this evening, Mr. CUMMINS mentions that he expects to run over 200 during present winter.

We have to regret the loss of several of our most active members by death:—poor JIM WALLACE, who was cut away by typhoid a month after winning a prize in our steeplechase; W. W. REDPATH, by whose untimely death Montreal lost one of her best gymnasts; and J. BRADY, an old Committee man, who, while in health, rarely missed a tramp.

Business has also removed from our ranks D. MCINTYRE and HARRY PRINCE; both have left for Winnipeg, where, no doubt, this evening they are sitting in the Council Chamber and expounding words of wisdom to the members of our branch, whose Annual Meeting is at present in progress.

Our finances are in a satisfactory condition, the coifers of the Treasurer running over with wealth, his report showing a balance to our credit of eighty dollars.

The first tramp to Prendergast's took place on November 16th, being earliest date for opening of winter campaign since our formation; 28 members turned out. Midweekly walks were kept up with great spirit until March 8th, upon which date we took the last. 16 runs were taken across the Mountain, being an increase of 2 on previous year, the average muster being 40; largest 60; smallest 10; this does not include the race night, when over 200 assembled at the Club-room.

The first cross-country tramp was taken on Dec. 18, to St. Laurent. Blue Bonnets was visited once; Back River twice and Lachine twice, during the winter, the last named being the

favorite tramps of the season. On the first occasion, 27 went out, and like the faithful spies, gave such a good report that next trip found 45 good men and true following their President, each one eager to taste of the milk and honey reported to be flowing in such abundance in Hanna's Hotel.

The average for the five cross-country trips was 25; largest muster 45, smallest 10.

On January 1st, in response to an invitation from the Montreal Club, 40 of the members assembled at the Club rendezvous, to participate in a Union tramp to the Back River.

Upon January 25th, we had our fifth Annual Steeple Chase across the Mountain—the prizes given for this race being the most handsome ever competed for over the Mount Royal Course; twelve members competed, C. Lamothe taking first place and gold medal, in 22.44; Geo. Ray second, gold medal, in 23.55; third, A. Kavanagh, silver medal, in 24 minutes; fourth, J. Wallace, in 24.45; fifth, J. C. Bowden, in 26.20, and sixth place by G. Ferrier in 27.10.

The night was very dark and the track heavy, being drifted over in some places to a depth of a couple of feet, so that, taking all things into consideration, the time, though apparently slow, was fully equal to that made by the other city clubs during the season. I think, in future, this race should be run when the moon is full, and not on the last Tuesday of January, as the By-laws direct.

Our First Annual Races were held on the Montreal Lacrosse Grounds, on February the 19th. The weather was glorious, the attendance one of the largest ever seen on the ground, the events well contested, and the success of the Club's representatives most gratifying. The event of the day was the race for the Hogan Cup, presented to the Club by Mr. Hogan, of the St. Lawrence Hall, to be won twice before becoming the property of the winner: distance, two miles, and open to members of any Snow Shoe Club in Canada. Mr. Lamothe, our champion, maintained the honor of St. George, and in him the hitherto invincible Stark found more than his match. Lamothe, after a good contest, won

the cup in 13 min. 35 sec., beating his plucky opponent by over 100 yards.

The one-mile Club was won by G. Roy easily, A. Kavanagh and J. C. Bowden, after a series of "exciting brushes," taking 2nd and 3rd places, respectively.

The half-mile Open was won by Corcoran, of the Montreal Club, in 2.55½; Laing 2nd.

The quarter-mile Green Open, was taken by J. Patterson, of the Montreal Club, in 1.17; J. Bolton of St. George, a good second.

In two-mile Club, Lamothe won Club Cup in 13.34, beating his time for the Hogan Cup by a second; Geo. McLaine took second prize.

The one-mile Green Open brought out a string of competitors, thirteen starting; first prize was won by McTaggart, of the Montreal Club, in 6.26½; C. J. Patton of the same Club, taking second.

In the half-mile (Club) Green, J. Bolton was first, in 3.4; K. Mathews, second, in 3.6.

The Club was highly complimented by the City Press for manner in which races were conducted; an extract from *Gazette* reads as follows: "The programme was well arranged, and admirably carried out, the first race being started almost to the minute announced, no delay being allowed between the subsequent ones; a fact for which the officials deserve the thanks of all present."

It will be pleasing to you to hear that, in a monetary point of view, the races were a success, as we had a surplus of over twenty dollars, after paying all expenses. For this state of things, we must thank those gentlemen who came forward and presented us with the very handsome prizes which we were enabled to offer for competition.

Mr. Hogan, of the St. Lawrence Hall, and our worthy President Mr. Henshaw, each gave a very fine cup.

Messrs Stanley Bagg, R. Kane, H. A. Howe, J. W. Mills, and J. G. Monk, were donors of medals, and J. R. Harper & Co. and Tooke Bros., also gave prizes, which only left the Club Cup and one Medal to be purchased out of the Club funds.

In connection with the next races, I may state that we have already been promised four prizes; a magnificent cup, of value of nearly \$200.00, by the sturdy limb of St. George at Winnipeg, a cup by the Hon. P. Mitchell, and medals from Mr. R. Kane and Alderman Gilman.

Upon February 26th, the Montreal S. S. Club held their Annual Races. The first two open events on their programme, the open mile and 100 yards in heats, were taken by two of our men, viz., C. Lamothe and J. Bolton; in the quarter-mile, T. Davidson, of St. George, ran a splendid race, only being beaten by a couple of feet.

On March 5th, the supplementary Races of the Montreal S. S. Club took place. The Worthington Cup, given for one mile championship, open to Canada, was competed for; this was third race of series, C. Lamothe, of St. George, winning it first year; Starke, of the Montreal, taking it following season—and now the question was to be decided as to who was to be its lucky owner.

Our members had every confidence in their representative, and turned out to a man to encourage him. The race proved to be one of the most exciting ever run in Montreal, and resulted in the champion of St. George winning by thirty yards.

On March 12th, the races of the Waverly S. S. Club were held on the esplanade at Quebec. Your committee had sent J. Bolton and G. McLaine down to compete. Bolton took gold medal for 100 yards and 440 yards races, and McLaine carried off the Minister of Militia's Cup for the one mile race. Our men were well treated by the Quebecers, and the visit may probably lead to some of the Quebec Clubs sending representatives to our next sports.

On the 31st of January an event took place which will be remembered for many a day by the St. George Club—viz., the concert in aid of the Montreal General Hospital. The Club had been preparing for it for some six weeks, and those forty or fifty gentlemen who devoted so much time and trouble in learning their respective parts, deserve the hearty thanks of the remaining 240; for there is no doubt that the popularity and favor with which the public look upon us is mainly the result of that

concert. The Theatre was filled to the doors, with one of the largest and most fashionable audiences it ever contained. Result—a cheque to the Treasurer of the Montreal General Hospital for \$609.00

Where all did so well, I think the omission in this report of the names of those who performed their part on the stage so artistically will be excused; for if they received full justice, it would take about twenty sheets of foolscap to record their merit.

The services of Mr. Harry Prince on that occasion were recognized by his fellow members of the Club, by the presentation of a gold watch and chain.

On Dec. 14th a special General Meeting was held; the By-laws, as revised and amended by the Committee, were approved, and the Secretary was directed to have them printed and distributed, which was done.

Notice of motion having been given to limit the membership of the Club to 300, the matter came up for discussion on Jan'y 11th, Messrs. W. L. Mathews and Stewart Howard, the mover and seconder, though apparently full of their subject, seemed to be bemuddled, either through the coffee provided by host Prendergast or some other stronger ingredient, and were wholly unable to say a word in support of their motion; the little they did manage to utter was in favor of unlimited membership. The motion was defeated. I am happy to say, however, that one month later they came to the attack again, and succeeded in having an addition made to By-Law No. 11, that is infinitely better than that they wished to carry at first, viz., that in clause which reads "no person shall be eligible under the age of eighteen years," last two words now read "twenty-one years." This change serves all the purposes of a limit, and at same time bars the admission into our ranks of boys.

Early in the season a communication was received from Mr. Barnjum, offering us the use of his Gymnasium as a headquarters for the Club. The subject was fully considered by the Committee, and it was decided to take no action during the meantime in the matter.

On this occasion the prizes won at our Annual Races were presented to the lucky winners, and Mr. Henshaw, on behalf of the Club, presented Mr. Cummins with a cup to be competed for at first Annual Races of the St. George Snow Shoe Club of Winnipeg.

Arrangements have been made with Mr. Lumpkins for the better ventilation of the Club Room at Cote des Neiges.

WINNIPEG, NOV. 30th, 1881.

The Second Annual Meeting of the St. George Snow Shoe Club of Winnipeg was held this evening, a large number of members being present.

The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock, the President Mr. S. S. Cummins, in the chair. Mr. W. A. Henderson, the Secretary, read the following Report:—

MR. PRESIDENT AND GENTLEMEN :

In making the first annual Report of the Winnipeg Branch of the St. George Snow Shoe Club, I think I cannot do better than begin by congratulating the Branch on the size it has attained the first year of its growth. You will remember that on the 3rd of Jan. last, a meeting was held at the Russell House, to consider the advisability of forming a Snow Shoe Club in this city, at which only twelve were present; but they made up for the smallness of their numbers by the hearty way in which they received the proposition, and it was then decided to make the Club a branch of "St. George," of Montreal. The movement seemed to take from the first, and the applications for membership poured in, till we had at the close of the season, eighty-seven members on our roll, and I not see any reason why this year we should not raise it to two hundred. In consequence of the lateness of the season when the organization of the Club was completed, the Committee were unable to take up the question of Races till about the end of Feb., and then owing to the early and unexpected break up of the winter, were after several postponements, finally obliged,

much to their regret, to abandon them. The Club in Montreal had given a handsome Cup, and several other fine prizes had been promised, so that there is no doubt, had we been able to carry out our plans, a most successful meeting would have taken place. The Club had some 15 meetings; of these 10 were on shoes, and the rest at the rooms, owing to the stormy weather. As to the attendance at the tramps, I am sorry to say it was not so good as it might have been, only an average of 18 turning out, but that at the rooms was always good. However, this year we hope to have a much better attendance, as from the quantity of snow that has already fallen, we may expect to have excellent shoeing before the season closes. Great difficulty was experienced in securing a suitable club room, and the Committee were compelled to engage the one used, and this year, having been unable to do better, have again rented the same room, the one we meet in to-night.

From Montreal we hear there is a good chance of a branch being formed in Ottawa, and our President has been making an effort to start another in St. Paul, and with good prospects of success, and should both succeed as well as the "Winnipeg Infant," the "Purple Tuque" will be worn in the three most important cities of our Dominion, and one of our American cousins, and the St. George Snow Shoe Club be the largest organization of its kind in existence. But of one thing I feel sure, that come what may, the Winnipeg Branch will always lead the van.

From the Treasurer's Report, which is attached, it will be seen that in spite of the heavy expense the Club had to incur, it has been able to pay its way, and carry forward a small balance to next year, but from the increased membership we look for, it ought to do still better, and have plenty of funds to help to make the Races the success they ought to be, and I have no doubt will be.
