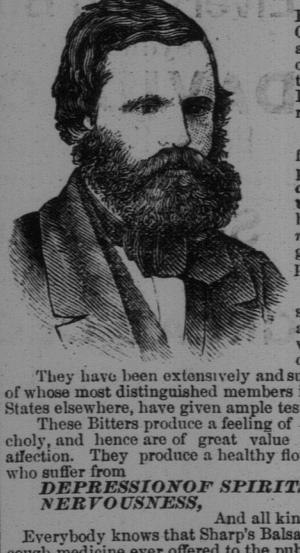

The articles from the Boston Herald, which we publish today, show that New England is profoundly stirred by the prospect that she will lose her industrial supremacy as a manufacturing centre.

The city assessment for this year has been made up and the percentage is \$1.25 on the \$100. This is two cents more for the East side, than it was last year, and 25 cents more for the West side.

Provincial Points. The Nova Scotia Telephone company has completed Halifax with Lunenburg and Bridgewater.

Grading on the Tobique Valley railway is nearly completed, and will commence in a few weeks.

The Canadian Press association were entertained by the local press men Halifax yesterday, given an excursion on the harbor, shown through the war ships, driven through the city and suburbs and banquets at the Hotel.

To obviate grievances that have hitherto been complained of the Minister of Fisheries has decided to divide New Brunswick and Nova Scotia into three districts each, the inspectors to report to Ottawa direct. In New Brunswick the districts will be as follows: No. 1, the county of Charlotte, including Campbellton and Grand Manan; No. 2, the counties of Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent and Westmorland; No. 3, the remaining counties. Nova Scotia, No. 1, the Island of Cape Breton; No. 2, the counties of Halifax, Hants and counties to the westward; No. 3, counties of Lunenburg, Kings, and counties westward.

Mr. W. Eaton on Monday last showed up a cheque for \$200 which he had just received from the Department of Customs at Ottawa. This is a refund to Mr. Eaton of the fine exacted from him last spring on account of seizure of goods by customs officers. He is a man of means and the fine was a heavy one. An investigation has shown that the seizure was a perfect case of the production of the goods having led him to make seizure without any legal investigation. —Kentville Chronicle.
