Russians Completely Defeat Germans

Petrograd, Sept. 9.—On the Riga-Dvinsk front, the general situation remains unchanged. German attempts to advance on Tuesday in the region of the railway station at Ross Ekan, south Riga and Neu but were repulsed. In the direction of Dyask there were only unimportant advances past actions.

The fight for the River Lantze container. In order to occupy more covered positions our troops removed a little to the right of the Lantze. There have been no important changes on the routes toward Vilga.

In Galicia, near Tarnopolis, we achieved great success against the Germans. The German Third Guards Division and 48th Reserve Division, reinforced by an Austrian brigade, with great quantities of heavy and light artillery, according to statements made by prisoners, had been preparing for several days for a decisive attack. This was fixed for Tuesday night or Wednesday. Forestalling the enemy, our troops took the offensive, and after a stubborn fight on the River Doljanka, the Germans were completely defeated Tuesday evening. The enemy left prisoners in our hands to the number of more than 200 officers and 8,000 men. We captured thirty guns, fourteen of which were heavy calibre many machine guns and gun limbers, and other booty.

NEWFOUNDLAND POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word.

A Government cable to Canso, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraph Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 85 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50.

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to apparatus, which are due to pass with in the radio of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Offices on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Over \$1000 but not exceeding \$5000 - 35 cts
Over \$5000 but not exceeding \$10000 - 40 cts
Over \$10000 but not exceeding \$50000 - 45 cts
Over \$50000 but not exceeding \$100000 - 50 cts

War News

London, Sept. 7.—East and southeast of Grodno the Russians have taken up new positions across the river Stohera and its numerous tributaries, and are protecting a network of railways which run eastward and northward to the interior of the country.
To the southeast among forests and swamps at the northeastern edge of the Pripiat marshes, a great battle is in progress between the army of Prince Leopold of Bavaria, and troops of the Russian centre, the latter, having at last elected to make a stand amid the Pripiat marshes. German Field Marshal Mackensen is working hard for a decisive result. He reports he has taken two Russian positions. Still another battle is being fought for the triangle of fortifications further south, of which Rovno and Dubno remain in the hands of the Russians. The Austrians and Russians are facing each other across the Sereth river in Galicia, where fighting continues. The stand which the Russians are making suggest that their supply of munitions is ample.
A Petrograd correspondent says the munition shortage of the Russians has been corrected, and while the production is slow it is incessant.



WAR NEWS

London, Sept. 7.—News that Emperor Nicholas had placed himself at the head of his army, which he announced in a telegram to Raymond Poincare, President of France on the visit paid by the French Commander in Chief, General Joffre to the Italian army, foreshadows, it is believed in military circles here, that stirring events both on the eastern and western fronts in which the armies of all the allies will cooperate. It is declared the Russians already are nearly, if not quite holding their own against the Austrians and Germans, whose advance at most points has been brought to a stop, and in places the Russians are carrying on an active offensive.

Riga remains the danger point, but the fact that the Russians continue to occupy the town after the German advance to Drina, southeast of Riga, leads military writers to the conclusion that the Russians feel pretty sure of their ability to defend the river and have time to push sufficiently far westward to relieve the pressure on their forces on the shores of the Gulf of Riga.

Westward of Doinek and Vilna the Russian offensive has held up the Germans for more than a week, and to military observers those two towns seem fairly safe unless the invaders are able to bring up strong reinforcements.

GEORGE the FIFTH, by the Grace of GOD, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, King, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

Whereas We deem it expedient and necessary to appoint Terms or Sessions for the holding of Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern and Northern Districts, respectively, of Our Island of Newfoundland; at the several times and places hereinafter mentioned;

We do, therefore, declare to all Our loving subjects in Our said Island that it is Our will and pleasure to direct and appoint that Our Supreme Court on Circuit for the Southern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:—

At Placentia, on Wednesday, the Eighth, and Thursday, the Ninth days of September next;
At Channel, on Monday, the Thirteenth, and Tuesday, the Fourteenth days of September next;
At St. George's, on Thursday, the Sixteenth, and Friday, the Seventeenth days of September next;
At Bay Islands, on Saturday, the Eighteenth, and Monday, the Twentieth days of September next.
And that Our said Supreme Court on Circuit for the Northern District of Our said Island shall be open and holden:—

At Botwood, on Wednesday, the Twenty-second, and Thursday, the Twenty-third days of September next;
At Bonaville, on Saturday, the Twenty-fifth, and Monday, the Twenty-seventh days of September next;
At Trinity, on Tuesday, the Twenty-eighth day of September next;
At Briggs, on Friday, the Nineteenth, and Saturday, the Twentieth days of November next;
At Harbour Grace, on Monday, the Twenty-second, Tuesday, the Twenty-third, Wednesday, the Twenty-fourth, and Thursday, the Twenty-fifth days of November next;

At Carboneau, on Friday, the Twenty-sixth, and Saturday, the Twenty-seventh days of November next.
And the said Court shall be kept open for the periods herebefore prescribed, at each of the respective places, as aforesaid, provided the Judge shall have business to do therein; and, if necessary, such Judge may extend the term at any of the said places for a period not exceeding two days, and until the determination of the trial of any case then proceeding.
And We do, by these Presents, further order and direct that, in the event of the Judge who may preside in the said Court in the Southern or Northern District of Our said Island being prevented, by unforeseen circumstances, from opening Our said Court on any of the days herebefore appointed, or if the said Judge should arrive at any of the places herebefore named for holding Our said Court before the time stated for the opening thereof, and should deem it proper to open the same without delay, the said Judge may, and he is hereby authorized to open and hold Our said Court on any other day or days than those herebefore specified, and to keep the same open for the respective periods herebefore stated as aforesaid, if he should find it necessary for the despatch of business to do so.

And of these Presents all Magistrates, the Sheriff, Officers of the Constabulary Force, and all Bailiffs, Constables, Keepers of Gaols and all other officers in the execution of their offices about the premises, and all and singular other persons whom these Presents do, shall or may concern, are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Lecture by Mr. John Weir

On Tuesday night, Sept. 7th, a very interesting lecture was given in the Public Building by Mr. John Weir, of the Halifax School for the Blind. Canon Field presided and introduced the speaker as a Newfoundland, and before the meeting closed those who had the pleasure of listening to his remarks must have felt he was a credit to his native land. His remarks were based on the question as to how we, as a people, are to help the blind of this country.

He first told of the origin of the Halifax institution in 1869, by Mr. Wm. Murdock, who gave \$20,000 towards it. With the help of some others he opened it in 1871. It was then one small building; now it has increased to five large ones with a large number of students from Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and Newfoundland, irrespective of class, creed or colour, with up-to-date equipment for educating them, so that when they graduate from the school they go forth to face the battle of life feeling they can compete favorably with any man who has the sense of sight.

They have two courses of training, the first, children from 6 to 21 years, where they are taught the same lessons as children who can see, except by a different method called the Braille Method. Then the adults are taught trades, such as making baskets, brooms, mop brushes, mattresses, rugs, carpet tufting pianos and organs, resatting cane bottom chairs and many other things which really seemed marvellous for those who could not see.

hours those who sit in their homes must spend with no education or occupation. It is to lessen that loneliness and make life worth living for the many who are deprived of their sight that the Institution was started. But the workers and the work cannot go on without funds, so the appeal was made to all who can see in Newfoundland to give a thank-offering for the blessing of sight. We have to help the 140 of our brothers and sisters on our Island who are deprived of that blessing. The lantern slides were also very interesting, showing School for the Blind, Braille Alphabet, Kindergarten Class, Geography Class, Men at their Trades, Boating on the Pond, Knitting for Soldiers, Nfld. No. 1 Aeroplane, Nfld. No. 1 Machine Gun and a splendid picture of Superintendent, Mr. Fraser.

In speaking of him, Mr. Weir said he was a man of sterling worth; a man he felt it an honor to work with; a man whose work King George recognized, and on his last birthday conferred on him the honor of Knighthood. At the close of the address Capt. Eli Dawa moved a vote of thanks, and Rev. Mr. Jackson, of Clarke's Beach, seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously. The National Anthem brought a very interesting and instructive meeting to a close.

The French Tricolor

(London "Chronicle.") The origin of the French tricolor is usually explained as it is by Carlyle. "Woman, too, are sewing cockades—not now of green, which being D'Artois color, the Hotel de Ville has had to interfere in it, but of red and blue, our old Paris colors; these, once based on a ground of constitutional white, are the famed Tricolor—which (if prophecy err not) will go round the world." Another explanation, however, is that the tricolor combines the blue hood of St. Martin, which was borne on the standard of the ancient kings, the oriflamme (originally the banner of the Abbey of St. Denis), and the white flag of the Bourbons. Others make it the shield of the Orleans family.

French Steamer Sunk

Paris, Sept. 8.—The French steamship Guatemala has been torpedoed and sunk 50 miles off Belle Isle. The crew escaped in boats. She was 5,913 tons burthen.

Official Report

London, Sept. 8.—Three Zeppelins visited the Eastern Counties last night, and dropped bombs, seriously damaging fifteen small dwellings and starting several fires. Ten people were killed, and forty-six are reported wounded or missing.

The French Government report continued bombardment along the Western front. The British fleet bombarded the coast as far as Ostend, and enemy aviation sheds at The Russians report indicates a check of enemy attacks at some points. There is no material change elsewhere. The Italian Government report small local successes.—BONAR LAW.

Gains in Gallipoli

London, Sept. 1.—Further gains for the Allied forces on Gallipoli Peninsula are chronicled in an official report received from General Sir Ian Hamilton, Commander-in-Chief of the British forces operating against the Turks. The report says: "Further fighting on the 27th and 28th in the northern section of the line, resulted in the capture of an important tactical point commanding the Buvuk Ana fawn valley east, and appreciable gain of ground occupied by the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps. Fighting was almost entirely hand to hand and of a severe character. Very heavy losses were inflicted on the Turks, and three of their machine guns, three trench mortars, three hundred rifles, five hundred bombs and a large quantity of small arms and ammunition was captured by us."

Offering \$3.80 Qtl.

The Mail and Advocate learns that the Labrador fish exporters are offering \$3.80 for Labrador soft fish. Four dollars is being offered at Battle Hc. Those who bought at \$2.60 last year scooped in from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per qtl. profit. The fish exporters, so the Advocate says, will have to pay \$4.70 or the fish won't be shipped, for the F. P. U. has offered to send vessels to the Labrador to buy fish at \$4.70. Jobs are buying all the soft fish procurable in Conception Bay and paying \$4.80. The price for soft Labrador fish in St. John's now is \$5 per qtl. The Advocate advises fishermen on the Labrador not to sell at less than \$4.50 and a bonus of 20 cents. Fishermen in the outports should be paid \$6.00 for salmou and \$4.80 for soft fish.

Mr. S. S. Erick leaves St. John's at 2 p.m. on Saturday, Sept. 11th, for Labrador with freight and passengers. She sails at Hr. Grace and other northern ports.

Passports

Residents of this Colony, intending to travel out of Newfoundland, are hereby notified that they may be required to produce Passports at various points on their journey.

Passports are issued at the Department of the Colonial Secretary, in accordance with Rules and Regulations approved by the Governor in Council, to persons domiciled in Newfoundland, who are—

1. Natural-born British subjects;
2. The wives and widows of such persons, or
3. Persons naturalized in the United Kingdom, in the British Colonies, or in India.

A Passport cannot be issued on behalf of a person already abroad; such person should apply for one to the nearest British Mission or Consulate. Passports must not be sent out of Newfoundland by post.

Applicants are requested to have their Forms of Application (which can be obtained at this Department), properly filled in, according to marginal instructions thereon, and forwarded to the Department in sufficient time to permit of any necessary alterations being made in the same before the date upon which the Passport would be required.

The charge for a Passport is \$2.50, which covers a period of two years, after which it may be renewed for four further periods of two years each, at a charge of \$1.00 for each renewal.

Copies of Rules and Regulations, Forms of Application, or any desired information may be obtained upon request.
