Grand Encampment of Ontario, I.O.O.F.

GALT, ONT., 28th July, 1891.

The Grand Encampment assembled in annual session in the Ancient Order of Foresters' Hall, Galt, at 9 o'clock, a. m.

Representative Blackaby, of Galt, welcomed the Grand Officers and Representatives, and, on behalf of Galt Encampment, No. 62, presented the Grand Patriarch, for the use of the Grand Encampment, a beautiful lignum vitæ gavel, with a silver plate bearing the following inscription: "Presented to the Grand Encampment of Ontario by Galt Encampment, 1891."

The Grand Patriarch accepted the beautiful and appropriate gift, and warmly thanked the Patriarchs for their consideration and thoughtfulness. It was an emblem of authority that was always needed at our deliberations.

His Worship, Mayor Lutz, of Galt, welcomed the Grand Encampment on behalf of the town of Galt, in the following address, which was beautifully engrossed and framed, with elaborate views of several of the prominent commercial houses:

To John A. Macdonald, Esq., Grand Patriarch, Officers and Representatives of the Grand Encampment of Ontario:

The occasion of this, your first visit to the town of Galt, has been looked forward to and anticipated with much pleasure for some time by our citizens, and now that the long looked for day has arrived the citizens of Galt extend you a hearty welcome, and I, as Mayor, accord you a warm greeting in their behalf.

We are exceedingly pleased to have you with us, and trust that you will be able to mix a sufficient amount of pleasure with your business, so that you will not soon forget your first visit to the Manchester of Canada.

REPORTS.

The Grand Patriarch, Grand Scribe, Grand Treasurer and Grand Representatives to the Soverign Grand Lodge of Oddfellows, then submitted their reports in printed form, which were by resolution referred to the Committee on Distribution.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O. F. :-

PATRIARCHS,-Through the blessing of Divine Providence we are again privileged to meet in Annual Session, on this occasion for the first time in the beautiful town of Galt, fittingly termed "The Manchester of Canada." I welcome you most heartily to this our twenty-second Annual Convention, and sincerely trust that all our deliberations will be marked with that spirit of harmony and unity which should ever characterize the members of our patriarchal family. past year has been one of general prosperity for our beloved Order, and to Him who ordaineth all things we should give the glory, with our most fervent thanks for the blessings He has bestowed upon each and everyone of us. The past year has wrought many changes. Some of those who in former years were present at our Sessions, and whose voices were heard in our deliberations, have passed away, while others have removed to distant portions of our wide domain. Let us keep green in our memories the remembrance of our departed brothers, and strive to weave the silken cord of friendship and brotherly love about the living, so that

within our tents may ever be peace, harmony, joy and unity.

In accordance with the requirements of the Constitution, I now submit for your consideration the following report which I trust will meet with your

approval : .

(1) NEW ENCAMPMENT.

On May 11th, 18891, assisted by Patriarchs W. N. Drenan, R. Elliott, Thos. Donelly, and K. McIvor, of Kingston, and Geo. R. Brown, D. D. G. P., John Brazier and several other Patriarchs of Belleville, I instituted Picton Encampment, No. 72, at Picton, Ont. They started with a good list of members, comprising some of the most influential man in the town, and I have again again. prising some of the most influential men in the town, and I have every reason to believe that this Encampment will prove one of the most successful in the jurisdiction. I am under deep obligations to the Patriarchs of Kingston and Belleville who so kindly came to Picton to assist me in the work of institution.

(2) OFFICIAL VISITS.

Owing to the pressing requirements of my private business and sickness in my family, which combined to keep me at home, I was unable to make a tour of the Encampments, which I had intended doing when I accepted the office so kindly conferred upon me at last session. I regret very much that I was unable to carry out my programme in making official visitations, as I am confident they prove a great benefit to the Encampments visited.

On the evening of May 12th I visited Belleville, and in the rooms of Moira Encampment, met a large number of Patriarchs of both Quiffite and Moira Encampments, a joint meeting having been called by D. D. G. P. Geo. R. Brown for the purpose. The members in both Camps take a deep interest in their work, and seem prosperous. I wish to return my warmest thanks to the Patriarchs of Belleville for the kind Rospitality extended to me while there.

On May 13th I visited Kingston Encampment, No. 15, and passed a very pleasant evening with the Patriarchs of that Camp. A candidate was exalted to the R. P. degree in a very creditable manner by the team of the Camp, who are very proficient in the floor work. (3) PROSPECTIVE NEW ENCAMPMENTS.

On July 1st I received a letter from several Patriapchs who are now located at Chapleau, Ont., asking what steps were necessary for the formation of an Encampment there. I supplied them with the necessary information, and in all likelihood my successor will soon be the recipient of an application for a charter.

On July 10th I received, through the Grand Scribe, a letter from Patriarch J. W. Gibson, of Blenheim, Ont., stating that the Patriarchs in that town have now everything in readiness to start an Encampment there. As it will be impossible to get this Encampment enrolled under my regime, owing to the short notice given, my successor will probably have the pleasure of instituting it at ap

Q., under the jurisdiction of the Grand Encampment of Ontario, duly received, and in reply would say that as Grand Patriarch of this jurisdiction I accept the trust, and give Union Eccampment a hearty welcome. Our Grand Scribe will forward the necessary documents for making reports, etc. to this Grand Encampment. At their request I have appointed Pataiarch N. N. Walley D. D. G. P. for Union Encampment.

(5) REPORTS OF DISTRICT DEPUTIES.

The Commissions to the D. D. G. P.'s were promptly issued, together with the blank forms for making semi-annual reports to the Grand Patriarch of the state of the Encampments in their several localities. While some of the D. D. G. P's have been exceedingly attentive to their duties, others, I regret to say, have not fulfilled the wishes of the Grand Enampment in respect to furnishing the reports required I trust that in the future the importance of this duty may be more fully impressed upon the District Deputies. I return my sincere thanks to the following Patrickshe for several furnished. archs for reports furnished :

John Howard, D. D. G. P., Phoenix Encampment, No. 57, Wallaceburg: "I am sorry to say that we have had a very quiet year in this Encampment, dull times being the cause; but we are in hopes that we will be able to make a better

showing this term.

A. E. Fuke, D. D. G. P., Exeter Encampment, No. 33, Exeter: "I regret to state that we are at a standstill in regard to growth, but the members we have now are all in good standing and are faithful and true. I believe we are on the verge of an era of prosperity, as we have been adding a considerable number of young and ambitious members to our Subordinate Lodge, and expect to increase our membership in the Encampment half a dozen anyway during this term."

David Cram, D. D. G. P., Eureka, No. 65, Carleton Place, reports: "We have had a fairly prosperous time, although not the increase in membership I would like to have seen. However, we are marching forward steadily, and are on a good footing financially. We have admitted three Patriarchs by initiation during the term." during the term.

W. Izzard, D. D. G. P., Maple Leaf, No. 55, Woodstock: "Our prospects are most encouraging. We have initiated ten and admitted one member by deposit of card during the past term, making a total of eleven. Our financial standing is also good. We have two more applications for membership for this term, and future prospects are excellent."

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Samuel Law, D. D. G. P., Wellington Encampment, No. 31, Guelph; Samaritan, No. 49, Berlin and Galt, No. 62, Galt: "I am sorry to say that the Encampment branch of our order has not progressed as faverably as I would have liked to have seen in this district. Although we have not increased we have not lost any. The only one of the Encampments having done any business was Galt, for the ensuing term, especially from Berlin and Galt, both having good prospects. Wellington, No. 31, has experienced severe drawbacks during the past year, owing causes, but we have hopes that ere long we will be in a position to report considerable improvement."

Geo. R. Brown, D. D. G. P., Quinte, No. 19, and Moira, No. 59, Belleville, in sending reports of his Encampments, gives an account of a union installation held in January last, which was a great success, and was a very pleasing occasion to the members of both Encampments. A banquet followed, at which the greatest of harmony and fraternal feeling prevailed, and the D. D. G. P., expresses the hope that the unity which prevalled on that evening will never be broken. Both Camps report an increase in membership.

A. W. Cameron, D. D. G. P., Ontaouais Encampment, No. 53, Ottawa: am sorry to report a loss for the term just ended. We are now on the upward grade, with the appearance of an active term ahead. We have a good set of officers, and I am sure we will have a prosperous term. We are going to work with renewed energy. The best of good feeling and harmony exists within our Camp. Grand Junior Warden, F. I. Daniels, kindly installed our officers, assisted by R. Ronan, P. C. P., and myself."

John Andrews, D. D. G. P., Unity, No. 21, Ingersoll, reports: "I duly installed the officers of Unity Eucampment, No. 21, and I can assure you that the past term's work has been very graifying and the prospects are very bright for the present term. Several new applications are now on the way. We have initiated twelve and reinstated two Patriarchs during the last term."

P. McCandlish, D. D. G. P., Hamilton, writes: "Matters in the Encampment branch in this city have been very dull for some time past, but Burlington, No. 7, has struck a small boom and at their meeting last night seven brothers were admitted to the Patriarchal Degree. These are all young men and active workers in their Subordinate Lodges. Royal, No. 36, is still in difficulties, and appears to have lost energy,"

S. Jones, D. D. G. P., Dufferin Encampment, No. 41, Point Edward, writes: "It is with pleasure that I am able to let you know that Dufferin Encampment, No. 41, is in a prosperous condition. We have admitted nine new members this term, and some more are waiting for initiation. I installed the officers, and from my personal knowledge of them I am confident that they will be a very efficient staff."

(6) REVISED CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

During recess the Constitution and By-Laws of the Grand Eucampment have been thoroughly revised and harmonized by the committee appointed by the Grand Patriarch at our last session, via.: Dr. Cl. T. Campbell, Deputy Grand Sire; M. D. Dawson, Grand Scribe; and John Donogh, P. G. P. These brothers have given a great deal of careful attention to the work, and the result of their labors will be submitted at this session for your consideration.

(7) DECISIONS.

I have had very few requests for decisions during my term of office, which is an evidence that the Digest and Constitution have been well studied by the D. G. P.'s and Patriarchs generally.

(8) NEW CANTONS.

The commandant of the Canton is Capt. Somerville. Canton Victoria, No. 5, of St. Thomas, and Canton Stratford, No. 13, of Stratford assisted in the ceremonies. A pleasant reunion of the Militants followed at a banquet provided by the Chevaliers of Canton Woodstock.

(A) STATE OF THE ORDER.

I am glad to be able to report that from latest returns received, the patriarchal branch of our Order in this jurisdiction is progressing steadily, and general prosperity is reported. The freport for year ending Dec. 31st, 1890, shows an increase of memberahip of about 100, with a gain of one new Encampment, and for the term ending June 30th, 1891, a large increase is also shown, with two more Encampments (Sherbrooke and Picton) added. ANNUAL REPORT OF THE GRAND SCRIBE.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Encampment of Ontario:

(1)

PATRIARCHS :- We meet to-day in the town of Galt, a business centre of large commercial importance, if not a city, and as fully alive to the moral and beneficial benefits of societies of this kind as any town in Canada. It is the first time in our history that we have been enabled to meet outside of the great centres of trade, as it was not thought an act of wisdom to separate our place of meeting from that of the Grand Lodge, and the selection of place was always made by the larger body. Our object has not been so much a feeling of independence, as an encouragement to the Canton Branch of the Order, which, so far, has been a valuable auxiliary, and deserving of recognition. Independent of that it tends to awaken a spirit of enthusiasm in smaller places, and shows them whasort of material Oddfellowship is composed of. It must do the Patriarchal Branch good to have a grand annual assembly of the Cantons in full uniform, which could not be successfully accomplished at the session of Grand Lodge. Last year was the first attempt of the kind, and the enthusiasm exhibited was certainly worthy of encouragement. And if a success could be made in the eastern limit of Ont tario, a much greater success may be expected in the west, even if we have not an ancient city with all the historic associations of Kingston and surroundings. It is a complete change, and if the lively town of Galt, with its busy hum of machinery, its horny-handed sons of toil and enterprising citizens, cannot equal if not excel the east in a hospitality and welcome, then we must admit that our conjectures of last year were a delusion.

STATE OF THE ORDER.

Notwithstanding the reports in some localities of want of interest, and the trouble in some of the cities, to awaken the enthusiasm in the members that they appeared to once possess, Oddfellowship is increasing. New members are coming into the order, and are taking the place of those passing away. The net increase in the Patriarchal Branch is fully equal to that of the previous year, and the present term shows a commendable increase. In the cities, for some years past, there has been a lack of interest that, perhaps, has been attributed to the multiplication of societies, all demanding a certain amount of time and attention, and where there has been two Encampments in one place, the healthy rivalry does not exist that we would like to see. Yet there is an increase both in membership and the amount of relief dispensed.

It during the term just closed, and although "Royal," the sister Encampment of that city, is in a dormart condition, hope is held out that they may yet resuscitate. The D.D.G.P., P. McCandlish, makes an excellent report, which is worthy of consideration. I extract the following:

"Royal No 36 is in about the same condition as reported December, 1890. They do not appear to try to lift themselves. Their indebtedness is stated about \$\$500, but they have not made any financial statement that I can get. Their assets consist of regalia and degree costumes. The owners of the hall in which they meet have not received any rent for 18 months, and have now remitted the amount \$75 to help them. One of the city lodges gave them \$30, and I think they anticipate further help. The feeling among the members is divided, some desire to surrender the Charter, while a sufficient number wish to retain it. The latter are good Oddfellows, who will (if relieved of some of the indebtedness) do their best to advance the interest in this branch of the Order. They have not had an election for a year, and their C. P. is not with them. They are talking of subscribing enough to pay the cap. tax, and electing a representative, but I cannot say if that will be done. If they are unrepresented this term I would suggest that they ask the Grand Encampment to remit the amount charged against them for tax, and think that by the Grand Encampment doing this it would stimulate them to greater energy."

"Alpha;" No. 26, Sarnia, has initiated 12 the past term, and "Dufferin," No. 41, nine. These Encampments are practically in one place, and both are doing well. "Central," No. 60, Essex Centre, has initiated 13, and "Unity," No. 21, Ingersoll, 10. That is all that report double figures.

One new Encampment has been instituted during the year—Picton, No. 72, Picton, by the Grand Patriarch. Union, No. 3, Sherbrooke, Quebec, has also been added to our roll, and the Patriarchs at Blenheim have built a new hall, and use now awaiting institution.

As instructed, by resolution, I purchased a supply of the new Installation Ceremony, but very few of the Encampments have availed themselves of it.

The Standing Committee on By-laws, Cl. T. Campbell, M. J. Beam, of St. May's, and the Grand Scribe, of London, examined all By-laws and Amendments to law submitted for approval during the year.

The Special Committee on Constitution and By-laws of the Grand Encampment, appointed at last session, P.G.P., John Donogh, Cl. T. Campbell and the Grand Scribe, prepared a new Constitution and Code of By-laws, which are substited to this Grand Encampment for its approval. The Constitution was printed to the Grand Encampment for its approval. The Constitution was printed to the three months ago, and circulated among the different subordinate Encampments and Grand Officers. I have also sent copies of both to the Representatives a toon as I knew of their appointment, so that they might be fully prepared for their consideration.

To M. D. Dawson, Grand Scribe, I. O. O. F .:

DEAR SIR AND EROTHER:—In compliance with the law respecting benevolent societies, passed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge session of 1890 (Journal 12,251 and 12,299). I submit the following information respecting the Oddfellows'

- (1) The Association, whose head office is in Kingston, Ont., was organized on May 12, 1874, and incorporated on April 16, 1875. It is named as per the
- (2) Its revenues are derived by assessments, collected in part by the Secretary, and in part by Agents, trustworthy Oddfellows who are appointed by the Association, and who, when handling sums aggregating over \$25, are now required to give a bond, endorsed by two responsible persons, guaranteeing the safe and accurate transmission of the money to head office. All expenditure is made with the authority of the local directors through the written order of the President (or Vice-President in his absence) upon the Treasurer, and the Auditors, making a critical examination of the books and papers and accounts, see that there is a woucher for every item of expenditure, and that the By-Laws of the Association are strictly enforced. A copy of the Constitution and By-Laws is attached.

(8) A member becoming bodily disabled by loss of hand, arm or leg, total blindness, or by spinal injury, receives a disability benefit of \$250 if insured for \$500, and \$500 if insured for \$1,000 or over. The disability benefit is limited

(9) Between January 1st and June 30th, 1891, the Oddfellows applying for admission to the Association numbered 708, of whom 19 were rejected. Of certificates 53 were allowed to lapse through the non-payment of assessments, and 16 by the withdrawal of members from the Association; eight were cancelled and new ones issued for a larger amount of insurance. The total net increase for the past six months has been 600 members, which, added to the 4,012 (including 29 members of Classes B and C who were not in Class A on January 1st, 1891), make a total on June 30th of 4,612.

(10) The amount of a single assessment, as the membership stood on June 30th, was \$7,768.17; the amount of insurance carried by the members is 30th, was \$97,70c.17; the amount of insurance carried by the memoers is \$6,506,500; the average age is 38 years, which is lower than it was on January, 1891, notwithstanding the general increase duly accounted for. There is a steady influx of new blood, and the great majority of the new members are young men.

(11) The average cost of insurance to beneficiaries, of those dying in 1891, has been \$53.30 for \$1,000; the average age of deceased members in 1891 has has been 44 years; the time insured of members, whose claims have been paid this year, was 5 years and 3 months; the average death rate since the organization of the Association has been 6.4, and since January 1, 1891, 5.2.

(12) The members dying between June 30th, 1890, and June 30th, 1891, numbered 22. The claims of two have not been paid, because the papers in the cases have not been completed.

(13) The surplus funds of the Association are (a) placed in a reserve fund, (b) on special deposit, and (c) invested in bonds, and they cannot be transferred or drawn without the joint signatures of the three trustees having the custody of

SPECIAL NOTICE TO SCRIBES.

The certificates of Past Chief Patriarch and Representatives to Grand Encampment should be forwarded to the Grand Scribe immediately after the installation of officers.

Past Chief Patriarchs and Representatives shall be furnished with a duplicate Certificate by the Scribe in order to avoid any possible inconveniences arising out of the miscarriage of the original. Especially should this be the case when Past Chief Patriarchs present themselves for admission to the Grand Encampment some time after they have passed the chairs.

The Per Capita Tax is twenty-five cents for each member upon the roll at the last stated meeting in the term.

Charge books cannot be delivered except upon the special order of an Encampment, signed by the Chief Patriarch and Scribe, and attested by the Seal, and the old Charge Books must in all cases be returned to the Grand

Adopted in Annual Session at Galt 28th July, 1891.

CONSTITUTION.

PREAMBLE.

The representatives of the Subordinate Encampments of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in Ontario in Grand Encampment assembled, by and with the consent and approval of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., do ordain decree and establish the following articles as the Constitution enacted for their sovernment:

TITLE.

I. This Grand Encampment shall be known and hailed by the name and style of "The Grand Encampment of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in Ontario."

POWERS.

II. The "Grand Encampment of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows in Ontario" is the supreme tribunal of all Encampments of Patriarchs in the Province of Ontario, by virtue of a charter from the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

It possesses the sole power in this jurisdiction to grant Charters for Subordinate Encampments and such other bodies as may be authorized by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., and to suspend or reclaim the same for proper causes; to enact laws for the government of its Subordinate Encampments; to receive, investigate, and decide all appeals from Subordinate Encampments or their members; to adopt by laws and rules of order for its own government; to regulate the means of its own support, and to do all such other acts as in its judgment shall tend to promote the interests of the Patriarchial Branch of the Order; provided that such acts shall not be inconsistent with the laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., of the Province of Ontario, or of the Dominion of Canada.

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III. This Grand Encampment shall be composed of all Past Chief Patriarchs who have received the Grand Encampment Degree, and are members in good standing of some Subordinate Encampment in the Province of Ontario, and are entitled to all the privileges pertaining to their rank as prescribed by the usages and laws of the Soverign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows.

IV. During the sessions of this Grand Encampment its legislative and judicial functions shall be vested in and exercised solely by its elective officers and such representatives as shall be elected in the manner prescribed by the Constitution and By Laws of the Grand Encampment, but Past Grand Patriarchs shall have the right to make motions and debate.

V. Every Subordinate Encampment in this jurisdiction shall, at its last meeting in the month of June in each year, elect by nomination and ballot from among its Pa-t Chief Patriarchs in good standing, a representative or representatives as follows, that is to say, one representative where the number of members in the semi-annual report for the current term, shall be one hundred or less; two representatives where the number of members shall be over one hundred and not more than two hundred; three representatives where the number of members shall be over two hundred.

VI. Any Encampment not having in membership a duly qualified Past Chief Patriarch may caoose one so qualified from any other Encampment in the jurisdiction to serve as its representative; but no member shall act as representative for more than one Encampment at the same time.

OFFICERS.

VII. The elective officers of this Grand Encampment are the Grand Patriarch, Grand High Priest, Grand Senior Warden, Grand Scribe, Grand Treasurer, and Grand Junior Warden, who shall be elected in the manner prescribed by the by-laws of this Grand Encampment, and a Grand Representative or Representatives who shall be elected in accordance with the constitution and laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, I. O. O F., and at the same time and in like manner as in the election of other grand officers.

VIII. The appointed officers of this Grand Encampment are the Grand Marshal, Grand Sentinel and Grand Outside Sentinel, who shall be appointed at the annual session by the Grand Patriarch immediately after his installation, subject to the approval of this Grand Encampment.

IX. There shall be two auditors, who shall be appointed at the annual session by the Grand Patriarch, immediately after his installation, subject to the approval of this Grand Encampment.

X. The Grand Patriarch shall, as soon after his installation as may be, appoint, subject to the approval of this Grand Encampment, a District Deputy Grand Patriarch for each district under the jurisdiction of this Grand Encampment and within which one or more Subordinate Encampments may be in operation.

XI. All officers shall hold office until the annual session next succeeding their election or appointment, and until the installation of their successors, except Grand Representatives who shall hold office for such terms as may be prescribed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F.

XII. Should a vacancy occur from any cause in any elective office, except that of Grand Patriarch, during the recess of the Grand Encampment, such vacancy shall be filled by a duly qualified Past Chief Patriarch, to be chosen by a

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majority of the remaining elective officers, provided always that the officer so chosen shall serve only until the next annual session of the Grand Encampment, when, in the event of the term in the vacant office being still unexpired, the members of the Grand Encampment present shall elect by ballot a member to serve for the remainder of such unexpired term.

XIII. A vacancy occuring in any appointive office during the recess of the Grand Encampment shall be filled by the Grand Patriarch by appointment.

COMMITTEES.

The elective officers, including the Grand Representatives, shall con-Alv. The elective omcers, including the Grand Representatives, snail constitute an Advisory Board to meet during the recess of the Grand Encampment on the summons of the Grand Patriarch, and to advise with him on all matters which in his discretion he may submit for their consideration. The decisions of the Advisory Board shall be final until reversed by the Grand Encampment.

XV. The Grand Patriarch shall, at or before the opening of each annual session, appoint the following standing committees to consist of not less than three members each, and whose duty it shall be to consider and report on such matters as may be referred to them under the by-laws or by resolution of the

SESSIONS.

XVI. This Grand Encampment shall meet annually on the Tuesday precedin the second Wednesday in August, at such place as may be designated for the meeting of the Grand Lodge, I. O. O. The hour of meeting shall be nine o'clock in the forenoon.

XVII. The Grand Patriarch, whenever he considers it necessary, may convene special sessions of the Grand Encampment for the transaction of extraordidary business, which business must be stated in the call for such meeting; pro-didary business, which business must be stated in the call for such meeting; pro-vided that two weeks notice shall be given to each Subordinate Encampment and presentative of the time and object of such session; and at such session no busi-tes shall be transacted other than that stated in the call.

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XVIII. To constitute a regular or special session of this Grand Encampment there must be in attendance a majority of the representatives of all the Subordinate Encampments in the jurisdiction; and all business shall be transacted in the Grand Encampment Degree. Nine representatives shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

REVENUE.

XIX. This Grand Encampment shall be entitled to receive from each Subordinate Encampment such sum per capita as may be fixed by the by-laws of this Grand Encampment, which shall be payable half-yearly for each unsuspended member on its books as shown by its latest semi-annual return. Its revenues shall be further drawn from charter fees of new Encampments instituted, which shall be \$30; from the sale of supplies to Encampments; and from such fees for dispensation as may be fixed by the by-laws of this Grand Encampment.

XX. In case of failure or deficiency in the funds of this Grand Encampment, the amount required may be supplied by an assessment upon the Encampments under its jurisdiction, apportioned according to the number of unsuspended members in each Encampment, as reported in its latest semi-annual return. But this Grand Encampment shall not create any debt or incur any liability requiring a larger amount than can be paid out of its funds on hand, without the sanction previously obtained of at least two-thirds of the Subordinate Encampments in this jurisdiction.

SUBORDINATE ENCAMPMENTS.

XXI. Upon the written application of five or more Royal Purple Degree members in good standing in the Order praying for a charter for a 'Subordinate Encampment, this Grand Encampment may grant the same, subject to the terms and conditions imposed by the Constitution and By-laws of this Grand Encampment. XXII. Every application for a charter must be sent to the Grand Scribe, accompanied by the charter fee, together with a certificate of membership in a Subordinate Lodge, and a withdrawal card from some Subordinate Encampment, for each applicant.

XXIII. The Grand Patriarch, or his deputy authorized by him, may confer the Encampment Degrees on a sufficient number of members of the Degree of Truth in good standing to make them eligible as petitioners for a Charter for a new Encampment, provided that there is no other Encampment within thirty miles of the location of the proposed new Encampment.

XXIV. The funds and properties of Subordinate Encampments are, by the provisions of their Charters and the laws of the Order, held in trust for charitable provisions of their Charters and the laws of the Order, held in trust for charitable purposes; donating them for other than such purposes, or in any manner dividing them among the members individually, is a violation of such trust, the penalty for which is expulsion; and any member participating in such illegal diversion of Encampment property from its legitimate objects will be held personally responsible for the money or effects so diverted, and will be liable to prosecution by the Grand Encampment in the civil courts. If an Encampment shall from any cause fail to work, all moneys and properties, together with its Charter, shall be surrendered to the Grand Encampment, to be held in trust and applied as may be provided by the by-laws provided by the by-laws

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XXV. Any Subordinate Encampment failing to make the returns and pay the dues required by the Grand Encampment for twelve months, shall between the forfeiture of its Charter, which may thereupon be reclaimed by the Grand Pariasch or by a resolution of the Grand Encampment at a forsix consecutive months, it shall thereby become extinct, and it shall be the duty of the officers and members of such Encampment to transmit to the Grand Encampment the Charter, books, funds and other property of said Encampment.

XXVI. This Grand Encampment, or in its recess, the Grand Patriarch may issue dispensations to any subordinate Encampment in this jurisdiction to exempt it in any particular case from the operation of any of the various regulason other than financial by which it is governed, or to enable it to proceed in any matter with other than the usual or prescribed formalities, subject always to the laws and decisions of the S. G. L.

XXVII. A Subordinate Encampment may surrender its Charter and be merged into another Encampment, or two or more Encampments may be amalgamated, under the terms and conditions prescribed by the by-laws of this Grand Encampment.

XXVIII. This Grand Encampment may group the Subordinate Encampments in this jurisdiction into districts, making such arra gements thereof from time to time as circumstances may require and as may be judged to be expedient.

APPEALS.

XXIX. Upon the investigation of any appeal the Grand Encampment shall after full power and jurisdiction to dismiss the appeal, approve the proceeding, after the decision appealed from, reverse, modify or change the decision or sentence, remove any suspension or expulsion, restore any brother to his full rights and privileges, inflict a penality where the Encampment has failed to do so; set aside the proceedings for informality or irregularity, remand the case for further proceedings, order a new trial; or give such directions as may seem proper.

AMENDMENTS.

XXX. This Constitution, or any part thereof, shall not be altered, amended, supended or annulled, unless by the votes of two-thirds of the representatives present, at an annual session of this Grand Emeampment, and upon notice of such alteration or amendment; in the exact terms of the amendment proposed, being given at the annual session next preceding, and a copy thereof being sent to each subordinate Encampment by the Grand Scribe at least three months previous to the session at which the vote is taken; provided that all changes which may be required to make this Constitution and the By laws of this Grand Encampment conform to such laws, rules and regulations as may be made by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, shall be ordered at any annual session.

MEMBERSHIP IN THE ENCAMPMENT.

- I. Any Past Chief Patriarch, in good standing in some Subordinate Encampment in this jurisdiction, on presenting a proper certificate, shall be entitled to receive the Grand Encampment Degree; to attend the sessions of the Grand Encampment, and to vote on the election of Grand Officers.
- 2. No Past Chief Patriarch shall be admitted as a Representative in this Grand Encampment unless duly certified as having been elected thereto; nutil be has been instructed in the Grand Encampment Degree and has s'g'ed a promise faithfully to support, maintain and abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of this Grand Encampment; nor if his Encampment is in arrears to this Grand Encampment.
- In balloting for Representatives to the Grand Encampment only one name should be written upon the ballot; and no one shall be declared elected unless he has received a majority of all the votes cast.
- 4. The resignation of any member of his office as Representative must be addressed in writing to the Chief Patriarch of his Encampment, which shall proceed at its first opportunity to consider the same, and either accept or refuse the resignation, as may seem expedient; and if such resignation be accepted, the Encampment may at once proceed to elect another qualified member to fill the vacancy.
- 5. Whenever charges affecting the character or standing of any Representative or Grand Officer shall be submitted to the Grand Encampment in writing, by one or more members thereof, the same shall be immediately referred to a committee of five members, to be elected by ballot, who shall, with as little delay as possible, examine carefully into the charges, and report the result of such examination to the Grand Encampment.
- 6. The Grand Encampment, after having heard the member thus charged, in his defence, shall proceed to determine the case, by the acquittal, reprimand, suspension from his seat in the Grand Encampment, or expulsion therefrom of the implicated member, as the Grand Encampment may deem fit and proper.
- 7. Whenever any member shall be suspended or expelled intimation of the same shall be forthwith given to the Chief Patriarch of his Encampment, and the Grand Encampment may require that he be tried by the Subordinate Encampment to which he belongs.
- 8. The Grand Scribe shall keep a register of the Past Chief Patriarchs of this jurisdiction. Whenever any member of a Subordinate Encampment attains to the rank of Past Chief Patriarch a certificate to that effect shall be immediately forwarded under the seal of the Encampment to the Grand Scribe, and each semi-annual return of a Subordinate Encampment shall contain a full list of all Past Chief Patriarchs in good standing belonging to the Encampment.

SESSIONS OF GRAND ENCAMPMENT.

 The Grand Encampment shall be opened at the time specified in the Constitution for its meeting, and if a majority of the Representatives be present, shall proceed to business. If there be not a majority present within one-half hour, the C

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- 10. In the absence of the Grand Patriarch the Grand High Priest shall preside; in the absence of the Grand High Priest the Grand Senior Warden shall preside; in the absence of the above named Officers the Junior Past Grand Patriarch present shall take the chair; and if no Past Grand Patriarch be present, a Representative shall be chosen by open vote to preside during the meeting, or until the arrival of the proper Officer.
- 11. Should there be present less than a majority of qualified members, the Grand Patriarch shall direct the G. E. Degree to be conferred upon such Representatives as are in attendance and not in possession of said Degree, but present-
- 12. Immediately upon the opening of the Grand Encampment in the prescribed form, the Grand Patriarch shall appoint a Committee on Credentials, who shall consider and report upon the Credentials of new Representatives and Past Shall consider and report upon the Chief Patriarchs, with as little delay as possible; and no other business shall be transacted by the Grand Encampment until the report of said Committee has been
- Immediately on the adoption of the report of the Committee on Cre-dentials the new members and Representatives shall be admitted and instructed, the minutes of last annual session read, and the roll of Officers and Representatives The Grand Patriarch will then appoint the Standing Committees for the se-sion (except where otherwise provided) and the reports of Grand Officers and Committees appointed during recess will be read; after which the Grand and committees appointed during recess will be read; after which the Grand Scribe will submit all petitions, communications, appeals and accounts, and the Scribe will submit all petitions, communications, appears and accounts, and the roll of Encampments will be called for the presentation of questions of business and such reports, communications, petitions, accounts, appeals, questions and other business shall be referred by the Grand Patriarch as soon as received to appear to the property of the present the presen propriate committess unless in any case the Grand Encampment shall otherwise
- The business of the Grand Encampment shall be transacted in the Grand Encampment Degree, and shall be conducted in the manner prescribed in the Rules or Order following. In any case where there is no rule applicable, the Grand Encampment shall be governed by Canadian Parliamentary practice.

RULES OF ORDER.

- I. After each adjournment the Grand Encampment shall be opened in the manner prescribed in the Order of Business, and the minutes of the preceeding
- During the continuance of the session the most decorous order shall be observed, no one leaving the room without the permission of the Grand Patriarch, nor entering without the consent of the Grand Senior Warder.

The order of procedure, after opening adjourned sitting, shall be as follows:-

- 1. The calling of the roll of Officers and Representatives.
- The consideration of any excuses which may be offered by absentee³
- 3. The receiving and consideration of any reports from the Committee on Credentials, on claims for admission as Representatives or mem-

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- The admission and instruction (when requisite) of new members.
- 5. The reading by the Grand Scribe of the minutes of last sitting, the consideration of any objections which may be made to any part thereof, and their approval with or without amendment, as the case may require.
- 6. The reading of accounts, petitions, and other communications.
- 7. Reports of Standing Committees in the following order :-
 - On Distribution.
 - On Finance.
 - On Appeals and Grievances.
 - On Laws of Subordinates.
 - On Legislation.
 - On the state of the Order.
 - On Judiciary.

 - On Mileage and Per Diem.
 - On Petitions and Correspondence.
 - On Districts.
 - On the Patriarchs Militant.
 - 8. The receiving of any reports from Special Committees, in the order of their seniority.
 - New business.
- Unfinished business, in order of priority at previous sittings. 10.
 - Closing or adjournment (as the case may be) of the Grand Encampment.
- III. Notwithstanding the Order of Business in Rule II., the Grand Encamp ment may, by resolution, make the consideration of any matter coming before it a special order for any particular hour or day.
- IV. No question unless regularly moved and seconded, and submitted in writing, shall be put to the Grand Encampment by the Presiding Officer.
- V. No question shall be open for consideration until regularly put from the Chair; and when so put no other motion shall be received unless it be a motion-
 - I. To adjourn;
 - 2. To lay on the table ;
 - 3. To put the previous question ;
 - To postpone;
 - 5. To refer ; or
 - To amend.

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The several motions, if made, shall have precedence in the order above stated, and the first, second and third thereof shall be decided without debate.

- VI. No more than two amendments to a proposition shall be entertained at the same time, and the question shall be first taken on the last amendment submitted.
- VII. The previous question shall not be put from the Chair, until after it supports that have been ascertained that the call therefor is sustained by a majority of the representatives of the Grand Encampment present, and then shall always be put in the words following: "Shall the question be now put?" which words shall be understood to have reference to whatever question may be pending, immediately before such call, for the previous question may have been made.
- VIII. If the vote of the Grand Encampment, taken pursuant to such call for the previous question be in the affirmative the Presiding Officer shall therespon put forthwith to vote the question so pending immediately before such call, and shall not allow any further amendment or debate thereon.
- IX. Before taking the vote on any motion, the Presiding Officer shall ask:
 "Is the Grand Encampment ready for the question?" and should no member
 shall up to speak, the Presiding Officer shall rise to take the vote, after which no
 nember shall have a right to speak on the question.
- X. After any question, except that of indefinite postponement or the previous question, may have been decided, any two members, having voted in the majority, may, at the same or next sitting, move for a re-consideration, but no discussion on the main question shall be allowed upon such motion.
- XI. Any member may require the division of the question, when the sense will admit of it.
- XII. When a blank is to be filled, the question shall first be taken on the highest sum or number, or on the longest or latest time proposed.
- XIII. The yeas and nays shall be taken and recorded on the call of any three members.
- XIV. Every Representative present may be required to vote on any question, unless he is excused by the Grand Encampment or is personally interested in the result, or otherwise incapacitated.
- XV. Any member intending to speak on a question shall rise in his place and respectfully address the Presiding Officer, confining himself to the question under debate, avoiding all personality and indecorous language, as well as reflection on the Grand Encampment or its members.
- XVI. No member shall speak more than once on the same question, until every member entitled to speak shall have had an opportunity of doing so; nor more than twice, unless by permission of the Grand Encampment.
- XYII. Should more than one member rise to speak at the same time, the Presiding Officer shall decide which is entitled to the floor, and no member shall interrupt the business of the Grand Encampment, or in any manner disturb another in his speech, unless to call him to order for words spoken, or rules intringed.
- XVIII. Any member called to order while speaking shall resume his seat, and the debate shall be forthwith suspended until the point of order thus raise be determined; nor shall any member speak upon such point of order unless it to make necessary explanations, or appeal from the decision of the Chair.

The decision of the Presiding Officer on questions of order shall be whote debate, unless entertaining doubts on the point, he should invite it; and on such questions alone shall he have the privilege of speaking from the Chair.

XX. In all cases where a member may appeal from the decision of the Chair, he shall use the words following, and none other, unless it be for necessary exp nantion: "Grand Patriarch, I respectfully appeal from the decision of the Chair to the Grand Encampment," and the Grand Encampment shall, after such explanation as the Presiding Officer may deem necessary, proceed forthwith to debate and vote upon the question: "Shall the decision of the chair stand as the judgment of the Grand Encampment."

XXI. Any member who may have been ruled out of order for manifestation of temper or improper feeling, must apologize to the Grand Encampment, or to any aggrieved person if required to do so by the Presiding Officer and shall not speak again on the impending question, except to explain and apologize, unless specially permitted to do so by the Presiding Officer.

XXII. Any member has a right to protest and to have his protest spread on the journal.

XXIII. Visiting Past Chief Patriarchs, not members of this Grand Encampment, may address the Grand Encampment on receiving permission to that effect from the Presiding Officer.

XXIV. These Rules of Order, or any part thereof, shall only be altered, amended, suspended or annulled, by a vote of two-thirds of the members of Grand Encampment present and voting.

ELECTION AND INSTALLATION OF GRAND OFFICERS.

- 15. The nomination and election of Grand Officers shall take place on the first day of the annual session at three o'clock in the afternoon,
- 16. The elective officers shall be elected by ballot, unless but one candidate shall be in nomination, when he shall be declared elected by acclamation. A majority of all the votes cast shall be necessary to election, and where no candidate has such a majority the one having the lowest number of votes shall be dropped and the balloting continue until a choice is made.
- 17. At the election of Grand Officers the Presiding Officer shall appoint the scrutineers, who shall receive and count the ballots and report to him the result.
- 18. The installation of Officers shall take place at such time during the last siting of the Annual Session as may be fixed by resolution of the Grand Encampment.
- 19. Should any Officer electric fail to present himself for installation at the time duly appointed for the ceremony, his office shall be declared vacant and the Representatives present shall forthwith proceed to fill the vacancy by nomination and election; provided that if satisfactory cause for such absence be shown, the installation of such absent Officer may take place at such time and in such manner as the Grand Encampment may direct.

DUTIES AND POWERS OF GRAND OFFICERS.

20. The Grand Patriarch shall preside at all meetings of the Grand Eacampment when present, and preserve order and enforce the laws thereof. He has the casting vote upon all occasions when the Grand Encampment is equally

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divided, except in cases decided by ballot. He appoints all Officers and Committees whose appointment is not otherwise provided for by the Grand Encampment. He shall sign all requisite orders on the Grand Treasurer and all regular ment. The small sign all requisite orders on the Grand Treasurer and all regular documents requiring his signature. He is ex officio a member of all Committees of the Grand Encampment. During the recess of this Encampment he has general superintendence of the Patriarchai Order in his jurisdiction. He may general superincedence of the Advanced to him by any Subordinate Encampment or by any member of a Subordinate Encampment, and he may answer such questions as are submitted to him in writing under the seal of a Subordinate Encampment. His decision upon all such appeals or questions is binding on the Encampment or member submitting the same until reversed by this Grand Encampment. He may grant dispensations to open new Encampments, and for the mergement or amalgamation of existing Encampments. He may grant the petition of a Subordinate Encampment for permission to reinstate an expelled member. He has such powers and performs such duties as are or shall be specified in the Constitution, By-Laws or Resolutions of this Grand Encampment. He shall in person or by deputy visit and inspect the books, proceedings and work of any Subordinate Encampment in the jurisdiction whenever he may deem it necessary or expedient to do so, and the necessary expense incurred in making such visits shall be defrayed by this Grand Encampment. He shall transmit or cause to be transmitted regularly previous to the commencement of each term to each Subortransmitted regularly previous to the commencement of each term to each Supor-dinate Encampment in the jurisdiction, all necessary passwords, and at the close of his term of office he shall submit to the Grand Encampment a printed report of all his official acts and decisions during the recess.

21. The Grand High Priest shall be the deputy of the Grand Patriarch, and in the event of that office becoming vacant from any cause, or in the absence of the Grand Patriarch from the Province; or in the event of the Grand Patriarch becoming from any cause unable to discharge the duties of this office he shall becoming non any same supported this office during such absence or inability, have and exercise the full powers of this office during such absence or inability, or until the next regular session, and until the vacancy may be filled. And he shall perform such other duties as are embraced in the charge of his office.

The Grand Senior Warden shall assist the Grand Patriarch at the sessions of the Grand Encampment in presiding and preserving order, and in the absence of the Grand Patriarch and Grand High Priest, he shall preside. In the event of a vacancy occurring in both the offices of Grand Patriarch and Grand High Priest he shall exercise the powers and perform the duties of Grand Patriarch until the next regular session, and until such vacancy be filled.

The duty of the Grand Scribe shall be to attend in person every session of the Grand Encampment, and when absent to transmit the books and records thereof; he shall keep a just and true record of all proceedings, and intimate to each Subordinate Encampment such portion thereof as may affect it; he shall also keep a just and true account between each Subordinate Encampment and the Grand Encampment, and also of the affairs of the Grand Encampment; he shall preserve all books and file all documents belonging to his office; attest all he shall preserve an books and me an documents belonging to his ome; attest an orders drawn on the Grand Treasurer, and pay over to him monthly all moneys coming into his hands on account of the Grand Encampment; receive all documents into his hands on account of the Grand Encampment; receive all documents. ments relative to the Grand Encampment, and submit the same to the Grand Patriarch, or the Grand Encampment if in session; conduct all correspondence on behalf of the Grand Encampment; furnish all committees with such official documents as may be necessary for their reference; transmit to the Sovereign Grand Lodge a regular report of the work of the Order in the Encampments in this jurisdiction, made up to the 31st December in each year; notify all Subordinate Encampments of each regular or special session of the Grand Encampment are E-normpments or each regular or special session of the Oranic Electronic weeks previous to its commencement; prepare all Charters at least two weeks previous to its commencement; prepare all Charters granted by the Grand Encampment; affix the Seal of the Grand Encampment to such Charters, and to all other documents requiring it; perform all the

duties of Grand Treasurer in his absence, and attend to all other business not herein enumerated, and coming properly within the duties of his office. He shall have his books properly closed and ready for examination by the auditors before the twentieth day of July in each year, and shall have a sufficient number of copies of his annual report printed for the use of the Grand Encampment. Prior to installation he shall execute in favor of the Grand Encampment a satisfactory bond of a Guarantee Company for the faithful performance of his duties, and shall receive such salary as may be fixed upon at each annual session.

- 24. The Grand Treasurer shall receive and take charge of the moneys of the Grand Encampment investing or depositing the same as directed by the Grand Encampment; he shall pay all orders drawn on him by the Grand Patriarch, and countersigned by the Grand Scribe, and none other; he shall keep his accounts in a fair, clear and legible manner, exhibiting, in as far as possible, the sources of all receipts, and the destination of all disbursements, with the amount of both; he shall have his accounts closed and ready for audit not later than the twentieth day of July in each year and submit them in printed form to the Grand Encampment at the annual session; and shall, prior to his installation, execute in favor of the Grand Encampment a satisfactory bond of a Guarantee Company for the due and faithful performance of his duties.
- 25. The Grand Junior Warden shall open and close the Grand Encampment according to his office; and he shall introduce into the Grand Encampment all new members after their credentials have been found correct.
- 26. The Grand Representatives shall attend the meetings of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and act thereat on behalf of this jurisdiction; they shall be furnished with certificates of election in the form required by the Sovereign Grand Lodge. They shall also attend the meetings of this Encampment, and submit a synopsis of the proceedings of this Sovereign Grand Lodge at the sessions thereof attended by them, to appear in the annual printed proceedings of this Grand Encampment. They shall take rank among the Elective Officers of the Grand Encampment.
- The Grand Marshal shall assist the Grand Junior Warden when called upon, and shall take charge of all processions of the Grand Encampment.
- 28 The Grand Sentinels shall perform the duties of their respective offices as prescribed by the rules and regulations of the Grand Encampment and of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the I. O. O. F.
- 29. Each District Deputy Grand Patriarch shall be the agent of the Grand Patriarch in the District over which he is appointed. It shall be his duty to see that the work of the Order is performed uniformly and correctly by "the Subordinate Encampments under his charge; to install the Officers of such Encampments or cause it to be done by a competent Officer, and to preside over meetings of the District Committee if there be one in his district. He may decide appeals, and may answer questions when submitted to him in writing under the seal of the Encampment. His decision when given is binding until reversed. He may in his own district issue dispensations to enable Encampments to confer more than one degree upon a candidate on the same night or permitting them to hold proper entertainments under the auspices of the Order. He shall report to the Grand Patriarch not later than two weeks previous to each regular session of the Grand Encampment, all dispensations issued by him or passing through his hands, and all decisions and answers rendered by him during his term of office, as well as all other matters coming within his sphere of duty, and he shall remit promptly to the Grand Scribe any moneys received by him on account of this Grand Encampment. He should not hold office in a Subordinate Encampment during his term as D. D. G. P.

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30. The Grand Patriarch or Grand High Priest shall not hold office in a Subordinate Encampment while holding either of these offices.

31. It shall be the duty of the Auditors to examine the books, accounts, vouchers, etc., of the Grand Scribe and Grand Treasurer prior to each annual session of the Grand Encampment and report upon the same.

COMMITTEES OF GRAND ENCAMPMENT.

32. The Committee on Credentials shall be composed of three members, of whom the Grand Scribe shall be one, who shall report to the Grand Encampment, without delay, on the qualifications of brothers claiming admission as Representatives or Past Chief Patriarchs, and on the validity of their credentials.

33. The Committee on Distribution shall consist of three members, to whom the preferred the reports of the Grand Patriarch, Grand Scribe and Grand Representatives, in order to distribute the various matters embraced in them to appropriate Committees.

34. The Committee on Finance shall consist of five members, whose duty and Grand Treasurer, the accounts of the Grand Encampment, and all other claims and matters laid before them, and report thereon; and to suggest such measures of finance as they may deem to be expedient and necessary.

35. The Committee on Appeals shall be composed of five members, to whom shall be referred all appeals and grievances from Subordinate Encampments, or from members thereol, (unless in the case of charges against members of the Grand Encampment), on which they shall report, without delay, recommending such action as they may consider necessary; no member of this Committee shall act as such on any appeal to which he himself may be a party.

36. The Committee on Laws of Subordinate Encampments shall consist of three members, to whom shall be referred all By-Laws of Subordinate Encampments sent in for approval. No By-Laws shall be operative until so approved.

37. The Committee on Legislation shall consist of five members, to whom shall be referred all questions pertaining to the making or amending of laws.

38. The Judiciary Committee shall consist of five members, to whom shall enterted the decisions of the Grand Patriarch made during the recess, and all questions relating to the interpretation or construction of the laws and usages of the Order.

39. The Committee on the State of the Order shall consist of five members, to whom shall be referred all matters concerning the condition and prospects of the Order.

40. The Committee on Mileage and Per Diem shall consist of five members, where the presentatives and the Past Grand Patriarchs present in accordance with such resolutions as may be adopted from time to time fixing the rate of such mileage and per diem.

41. The Committee on Petitions and Correspondence shall consist of five members, to whom shall be referred all petitions and all official correspondence of the Grand Patriarch and Grand Scribe.

42. The Committee on Districts shall consist of five members, whose duty it shall be to divide the jurisdiction into districts.

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- 43. The Committee on the Patriarchs Militant shall consist of five members, whose duty it shall be to consider and report on all matters that may be referred to them relating to the Patriarchs Militant.
- 44. The first named member of the committee shall be the chairman thereof, unless otherwise ordered by a majority of the committee. At all meetings of committees the Rules of Order of the Grand Encampment shall be observed as far as practicable, except the rules respecting the writing and seconding of motions, the same of times a member may speak, recording the yeas and nays, and calling the previous question. A majority of a committee shall constitute a quorum,
- 45. The reports of all committees must be made in writing and must be read before the Grand Encampment by the member presenting the same.
- 46. In all cases where matters are referred to Special Committees to be reported on at a subsequent session of the Grand Encampment such report or reports must be sent to the Grand Scribe in time to be printed, and a copy thereof sent to each Subordinate Encampment at least one month prior to the opening of the annual session of the Grand Encampment, and to each Representative as soon as his name shall be reported to the Grand Scribe.
- 47. Any committee meeting during recess shall be paid mileage and per diem at the same rate as paid to Representatives to the Grand Encampment at us previous session; and it shall be the duty of the chairman of such committee to submit the amount of mileage and per diem to the Grand Encampment.

FINANCES.

- 48. The Grand Encampment shall be entitled to receive from each Subordinate Encampment the sum of fifty cents per annum, payable semi-annually, for each unsuspenden member on its books, as shown by its semi-annual returns.
- 49. All rituals, books, and blank forms necessary for the proper working of Encampments shall be provided by the Grand Encampment and sold to Subordinates at a uniform advance of twenty-five per cent. on cost. All orders for supplies must be over the seal of the Encampment, and must be accompanied by the amount required to pay the same.
- 50. All claims against the Grand Encampment or resolutions for the appropriation or expenditure of money shall be first submitted to the Finance Committee, who shall examine and report on the correctness or expediency of the same. No claim will be considered unless in the form of a definitely itemized account.
- 51. When such claims or resolutions have been reported correct and approved by the Grand Encampment, the Grand Patriarch shall issue an order on the Grand Treasurer, attested by the Grand Scribe, for the payment of the same, which payment shall be duly entered in the books of the Grand Encampment by the Grand Treasurer. During the recess of the Grand Encampment the Grand Patriarch has power to issue necessary orders on the Grand
- 52. The funds of the Grand Encampment shall be invested în approved Canadian securities; in the name of the Grand Encampment; but such moneys are retained in the custody of the Grand Treasurer for the immediate purposes of the Grand Encampment shall be deposited by that officer in some chartered bank, and immediately on his receipt thereof unless otherwise ordered by the Grand Encampment.

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SUBORDINATE ENCAMPMENTS.

53. On receipt of a properly signed application from the constitutional number of qualified persons, the Grand Patriarch may issue a dispensation for the opening of a Subordinate Encampment and in person, or by deputy, proceed with the institution thereof. All the necessary books and blank forms for the new Encampment shall be supplied at such rates as may be fixed by the Grand Encampment and the necessary expenses of the Officer instituting shall be naid by the Enment and the necessary expenses of the Officer instituting shall be paid by the Engampment at the time of its institution.

54. Such Subordinate Encampment shall have authority to initiate and rective into membership persons resident within its jurisdiction, which shall extend half way to the Encampment nearest located in any direction; except in cities or towns in which more than one Encampment may be located, where all such En-

55. Every Subordinate Encampment shall have a suitable seal, a proof impression of which shall be deposited with the Grand Scribe, and all reports, cerpression of water span by the Chief Patriarch and Scribe, be authenticated by the seal being printed or pressed on the body of the document, and not merely attached thereto.

56. The terms of Subordinate Encampments shall consist of twelve regular sessions; when Encampments meet semi-monthly their terms shall commence at the first regular sessions in July and January, and if monthly then at the first regular session in January. All terms shall be completed on the day the succeeding

57. On or immediately after the first meeting in January and July of each year, each Subordinate Encampment shall make a return to the Grand Encampment of its work and condition for the six months immediately preceding, Should any Encampment fail to forward its returns promptly to the Grand Encampment, as required by its Constitution, the Grand Scribe, shall, immediately upon the receipt of such return, enter to the debit of such Encampment a fine of two dollars per month for the time which may have elapsed since such return was due. After the twentieth day of July in each year, an additional fine of fifty cents per day shall be imposed on any Encampment failing to send its returns to the Grand Scribe until said returns are received by him; and in no case shall this fine be re-

8. Upon the suspension or expulsion of an Encampment, or surrender of o. Opon the suspension of expansion of an installed officers and members having the charter, it shall be the duty of its last installed officers and members having the custody of the Charter, books, papers, properties and funds of the Encampment, to assign, transfer and delier the same on demand to the Grand Patriach or the District Deputy Grand Patriarch of the District to to such Past Chief Patriarch as may be specially deputed by the Grand Patriarch or Grand Encampment to receive the same; and the same shall be held subject to the order of the Grand Encampment. Any Officer or member having such properties in custody, refusing such demand, shall be excluded from membership or fellowship in the Order, notwistanding such Encampment should afterwards be restored to good standing, and shall be liable to prosecution in the civil courts.

59 All effects or funds received by the Grand Encampment from any Subordinate Encampment under the preceding clause shall be held in trust; first, for the benefit of any brother, widow or orphans entitled to benefits in accordance with the By-Laws of such Encampments at the time of the dissolution or susension of the same; and the balance, if any, to be returned to such Subordinate pension of the same; and the balance, if any, to be returned to such Substitution of the period of its Eacampment should it be reinstated, or upon the expiration of the period of its supension; provided, however, that should said Encampment not be restored to followship within five years the funds and properties of said Encampment may

- 60. Members of an extinct Encampment upon the payment of all arrears due by them at the time of the dissolution of the Encampment, may have a card from the Grand Scribe which shall have all the force and effect of an expired withdrawal card; and the Grand Encampment, or during the recess thereof the Grand Patriarch, may direct the issue of cards to such members without the payment of arrears, or upon the payment of such portions thereof as may be deemed sufficient, upon satisfactory reasons thereof being shown; provided, always, that the Grand Patriarch and Grand Scribe shall be satisfied that the applicant was not implicated in breaking up the Encampment, or in any illegal distribution or use of the funds of the same.
- 61. Upon the application to the Grand Encamement of five or more members of an extinc. Encampment which has not been merged into or amalgamated with any other Encampment, for the restoration of such Encampment to fellowship, such applicants as the Grand Encampment may approve, may be restored to fellowship in said Encampment, together with the Charter and effects belonging to such Encampment at the time of its extinction, unless such effects shall have been disposed of as provided in clause 24 of this Constitution.
- 62. An Encampment desiring to surrender its Charter and be merged into some other Encampment, shall present to the Grand Encampment, or during recess to the Grand Patriarch, a petition over its seal and signature of its Chief Patriarch and Recording Scribe to that effect, showing that the question of mergement had been voved on and approved, after due notice sent each member; and that there are not five qualified members able and willing to retain the Charter and work the are not five and giving a statement of the amount of its funds and effects and its abstance of the same and its and institutes. There shall also accompany the petition a critified statement from the Encampment into which the petitioners desired to be merged, setting forth its willingness to receive its members and assume the liabilities and setting forth its willingness to receive its members and assume the liabilities and the petitioning Encampment, and further certifying that the names of said members have been submitted to an investigating Committee, have been reported upon, and have been severally approved and accepted by a majority vote by ballot.
- 63. On the receipt of said petition and resolution, the Grand Encampment, or Grand Patriarch during recess, may grant the prayer of the petition, and authorize the local District D-puty Grand Patrtarch, or a Special Deputy, to superintend the proposed mergement.
- 64. The said petitioning Encampment shall, within one month after the granting of its petition transfer, convey and deliver up to the Encampment in which it proposes to merge, all its assets, funds, furniture, regalia, hooks, papers and effects, except its Charter, which shall be delivered up to the Disrict Deputy Grand Patriatch or a Special Deputy; and the names of all its members Who have been previously balloted for and accepted by the Encampment into which it proposes to merge, shall be at once entered upon the roll of membership of the last mentioned Encampment, which shall thereupon assume all the liabilities and responsibilities of the said merging Encampment; and the members so received shall have such rank, and standing as the books of said merging Encampment shall show.
- 65. From and after the entry of their names upon the roll as aforesaid, each and every member whose name shall have been so entered, shall be deemed, and taken to be a member of said Encampment, and subject to the same laws and entitled to the same rights, benefits and privileges to the like extent as if he

- 66. Upon the completion of the mergement, the District Deputy Grand Patniarch or Special Deputy shall immediately make report thereof certifying that he bas witnessed the transfer of assets by the one Encampment, and the enry of the names of members on the roll of the other Encampment, and the shall return the Charter of the Encampment which has been merged together with the names and standing of those members who have not entered into the mergement, if there should be any such; and said members may, upon application to the Grand Scribe, receive a card, as provided for in the case of members of extinct Encampments.
- 67. When two or more Encampments desire to be united, each Encampment shall present a petition to that effect to the Grand Encampment, or during encess, to the Grand Patriarch; such petition shall set forth that the question of union had been affirmatively voted upon after due notice sent each member, and that there were not five members able and willing to retain the Charter and work the Encampment and shall also give a statement of the funds and effects and assers and liabilities of the Encampment, and a list of members, with their rank and financial standing and P. O. address.
- 68. On receipt of said petition the Grand Encampment, or during recess, the Grand Patriarch, may grant the prayer and authorize the amalgamation of the petitioning Encampments.
- 69. When the union of the said petitioning Encampments has been approved, the Grand' Patriarch shall cause notice to be sent to each unsuspended member of the several Encampments at least one week prior to the date fixed for effecting such union, and shall summon him to be present in person at the time and place appointed for that purpose; and shall also notify the officers of the several Encampments to produce and surrender at said time and place all the funds, effects, books, papers and Charters of the said Encampments.
- 70. On the production and surrender of all the said funds, effects, books and Cnarters, the Grand Patriarch shall issue a dispensation for an Encampment to the members of the several Encampments present and desiring to be united, and shall in person, or by deputy, institute the same; and shall transfer to it, as so n as instituted all the funds, effects, books and papers of the united Encampments and Encampment shall therewith assume and pay all the liabilities and responsibilities of the several Encampments out of which it has been formed, and its members shall have such rank and standing as the books of the uniting Eccampments shall show.
- 71. Any member of any of the uniting Encampments who shall fail to be present at the institution of the united Encampment may, on application to the Grand Scribe, receive a withdrawal card as provided for members of extinct Encampments, and should he apply for admission by such card to the united Encampment within six months from the date of its institution, the vote necessary for his election to membership shall be a majority vote by ballot by those present and voting.
- 72. No Encampment shall turn out in public procession without the special permission of the Grand Patriarch, except to attend the funeral of a deceased Patriarch or to attend a church parade in celebration of the anniversary of the Order.

APPEALS.

- 73. Any Encampment or Patriarch may appeal to the Grand Encampment against any decision or order of an Encampment, or of any Officer of the Grand Encampment.
- 74. An appeal to the Grand Patriarch or to a District Deputy Grand Patriarch shall contain a full record of the facts in the case certified under the seal of the Encampment interested, together with the text of the decision, if any rendered, and a statement of the grounds upon which the appeal is based.
- 75. All appeals shall be made in writing and filed with the Grand Scribe within two months from the decision or order appealed against. A transcript of the proceedings properly certified shall be sent with the appeal, and a copy of the appeal shall be served on the opposite party within the same two months.
- 76. If the appeal is against the decision of an Encampment, the Encampment shall, on demand and on receiving the proper costs and charges thereof, furnish the appellant with a copy of all proceedings in the case, duly certified, and in the event of the appeal being sustained, all such costs and charges shall be refunded by the Encampment to the appellant.
- 77. In case an appeal is sustained the Patriarch is thereby restored to his former rights, privileges and membership, unless the Grand Encampment orders otherwise.
- 78. Where the penalty adjudged by any Encampment is suspension or expulsion, the accused Patriarch may apply to the Grand Patriarch for an arrest of judgment. This application must be made within the time allowed for appeal, and a copy thereof shall be sent to the Encampment at the same time. If the application is granted, and pending the decision of the Grand Patriarch thereon the proceedings in the case shall be stayed until the appeal is decided by the Grand Encampment, and the standing of the accused brother in his Encampment shall not be affected in the interim unless he shall fail to perfect his appeal within the proper time, or the Grand Patriarch shall refuse the application.

AMENDMENTS.

79. These By-Laws may be amended, altered or repealed at any session of the Grand Encampment by a two-thirds majority of the members present and voting, on a notice given at a previous sitting of the same session.

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REPORT

OF THE

Representatives to Sovereign Grand Lodge, I.O.O.F. SESSION 1891.

Held at St. Louis, Missouri.

To the Grand Encampment of Ontario, I. O. O. F .:

PATRIARCHS,—Your Representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge have the honor to report that they attended the sixty-seventh annual communication of that Grand Body, held in the City of St. Louis, Missouri, commencing on Monday,

To those of us who have known him for years, from his absence comes a sense of personal loss; while those who know him only by reputation, may realize to some extent what we more fully realize, that the Sovereign Grand Lodge will miss its brightest ornament and its most valued member, when the eloquent orator, the able legislator, the genial gentleman, Charles M. Busbee, is not here,

The circumstances are familiar to most of you. On the 9th of June last, your Grand Sire was suddenly attacked by a disease which incapacitated him for work, and for a time even threatened a fatal issue. Happily, the fears at first entertained have not been realized; and the latest reports show that Bro. Busbee is improving in health, and will in all probability be soon completely restored. The entire Brotherhood, sympathizing with him in his affliction, and with his family in their distress, will now unite as heartily in the expression of thankfulness over the brighter prospects before him; and will anticipate with pleasure his return to active service in the Order.

The situation is, to some extent, unprecedented; and it may be well to so interpret the law in this connection as to clearly define the term of an Acting Grand Sire in similar cases, and to provide for a re-transfer of the office to the Grand Sire whenever he may be able to resume its duties.

STATE OF THE ORDER.

I am pleased to be able to announce that the returns which will be submitted to you show a most prosperous year. During 1890, no less than 68,295 men were initiated into Oddfellowship under your jurisdiction—the greatest number. in any year of our history. And the net increase for the same period was equally in any year of our matery.

And the net increase for the same period was equally upprecedented, reaching 37,442 On December 31st, 1890, our male members ship in the United States and Canada, and related Jurisdictions, was 649-702.

The returns from Australasia give 19 746, while the German Empire has 2,891, making the total number no less than 672,339.

If our increase during this year has been at the same rate, and we have no reason to doubt it, we may safely assume that our membership on the 1st of September, 1891, was not less that 700,000. If to this number be added the 69.661 Daughters of Rebekah reported December, 1890, with the probable additions they have received this year, a moderate estimate will give at the present date a

APPROVED DECISIONS.

BY THE GRAND SIRE.

- I. A Subordinate cannot change its night of meeting without altering its By-Laws.
- 2. Where several, Subordinates meet in the same hall, in the absence of any Where several, Judordinates meet in the same man, in the absence of any agreement giving to any one of said Subordinates any superior right of control of the hall, neither one of said Subordinates has power to change its night of meeting in the same hall so as to interfere with the meeting of either of the other
- 3. A Subordinate Lodge cannot legally call a special meeting for the pure of receiving propositions for membership and appointing a Committee of Character thereon.

- A Subordinate may move itself into Committee of the Whole, if there is nothing prohibitory in its Constitution and By-Laws.
- 5. In raising and seating a Lodge on the occasion of a public installation, it is not permissable to use the gavel as it is used in a regular Lodge meeting.
- 6. A Subordinate has no power to donate its funds to an association known as "The King's Daughters."
- 7. Under Section 672, Digest (election of members before withdrawal), it is necessary that the Lodge to which a Brother applies for membership should notify the Lodge issuing the Visiting Card of his election; and thereupon the Brother must apply for the necessary Withdrawal Card or Dismissal Certificate; but the Secretary of the Lodge may apply for such card or certificate, at the instance and by the authority of the Brother.
- 8. Where there is no local law contrary to the general rule stated in Section 636, Digest, a Brother with a Withdrawal Card admitted to membership in a distant Lodge without the consent of the Lodge nearest his place of residence, is illegally admitted.
- 9, A "masque ball" held under the auspices of a Lodge is not necessarily an affair which may scandalize the Order. It would depend on the character and surroundings of the hall.
- 10. The Constitution of a Subordinate Lodge provides that "a member who shall violate shall obtain credit expressly by reason of being an Odd Fellow, and shall violate the terms of such credit, shall be guilty of an oftense against the laws of the Order." It is held that in such a case, to render a member of a Lodge amenable for an offense against the laws of the Order, he must have used the fact of his membership in some way for purposes of fraud or imposition.
- 11. A Grand Lodge baving declared that it "regards the practice of intemperance, gambling and profane swearing as immoral and impious," and having directed its Subordinates to treat these practices as in violation of the laws of the Order; it is held that a single instance of profane swearing does not come within the provisions above cited.
- 12. Unless there are circumstances which take the case out of the ordinary rule, an offense alleged to have been committed ten or fourteen years before the preferment of charges, would not be a proper subject for charges, owing to the lapse of time.
- 13. Under the resolution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge authorizing Grand Lodges to permit Subordinates under their jurisdiction to set aside five per cent. of their receipts from dues as a "contingent fund," it would be necessary for a Grand Lodge to take action and grant such permission before a Subordinate in its jurisdiction could thus apply its funds; and in case the Grand Lodge did not take action, its Grand Master has no power to grant such permisssion.
- 14. The Grand Sire has no power to waive or remit the payment of dues in arrears by members of a defunct Subordinate, under the jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, who desire to join another Lodge.
- 15. A. D. D. Grand Sire has no power to grant a Withdrawal Card to members of a defunct Subordinate, under the Sovereign Grand Lodge who desire to join another Lodge.
- 16. A Past Grand, otherwise qualified, can be nominated for and elected to the office of Grand Secretary and Grand Representative at the same time; and any constitutional provision in a Subordinate jurisdiction to the contrary is invalid.
- 17. It is not lawful for an association of members to be formed and incorporated under the civil law, with the name and title of "Odd Fellows' Building Association," for the purpose of erecting a building (as an investment)—said

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building to be known as an Odd Fellows' building—and for such association to solicit members to invest therein, without first obtaining the consent of the State Strand Body, and strictly complying with the laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge regarding insurance societies, and other laws prohibiting the use of the name and

- 18. A Patriarch ceasing to be a member of a Subordinate Lodge may retain 10. A ratifiaren ceasing to be a member or a Subordinate Longe may retain membership in his Encampment for one year, at the end of which period it terminates. BY THE GRAND SIRE (ACTING).

- 1. The general obligation of secrecy refers primiarily to ritualistic and such other matters as should not be spoken of to those not members of the Order. It does not prohibit a Brother from speaking of Lodge business to a member of the
- 2. A Degree Staff or Team may use such appropriate music as it may deem 2. A Degree Stan or A cam may use such appropriate music as it may be advisable; but the publication by any person of music as for use in Degree work (unless authorized by the Sovereign Grand Lodge), would be a violation of the law prohibiting the use of the name or emblems of the Qrder in private.
- 3. A Grand Master or Grand Lodge has no right to confer Past Official Defrees on a Brother from another jurisdiction, at the request of the Lodge of which said Brother is a member; it should only be done at the request of the Grand Lodge having jurisdiction over the Subordinate in which the Brother has
- 4. Irregularities arising out of the violation of law can only be healed by the authority competent to pass the law; if the law violated was "one of general application," the Sovereign Grand Lodge alone is such competent authority.
- When a construction or interpretation of local law is required by any individual member or Subordinate, the State Grand Body having jurisdiction is the proper tribunal to pronounce on the question, subject to appeal to the
- 6. Decision 99 (Journal 1890, p. 11,908), to the effect that "with the creption of the Officers and Grand Representatives constituting the Sovereign Grand Lodge, no one can obtain the Degree of Rebekah through means other than by application to and initiation in a variable constituted Degree 1 Indee has by application to, and initiation in, a regularly constituted Degree Lodge of the Daughters of Rebesh," does not alter or conflict with the law in Section 1.184, Digest, which allows the degree to be conferred on an applicant without his becoming a member of the Lodge conferring the degree.
- 7. In Section 7,194, Digest, defining who may receive the Degree of Rebetah, the words " if she be a white woman" apply to all applicants.

In order to distinguish between the Work of the Subordinate Lodge and the Rebekah Degree Lodge, the title "Past Grand" should be used as applying to the past presiding officer of a Subordinate Lodge; one holding similar rank in a Rebekah Degree Lodge should be called "Past Noble Grand."

10. A State Convention of the Degree of Rebekah, being under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge, or in its recess to the Grand Master thereof, for any interpretation of its local law that may be required.

FOREIGN AFFAIRS.

American Odd Fellowship is an institution peculiar to the United States and Canada. Our separation from the parent society in Great Britain, and the introduction of the Order into Canada, occurred in the same year. Since that time it has developed into two countries without regard to national barriers, and Representatives from both sides of the line have met in the same council chamber, and have framed and fashioned it into harmony. No national peculiarities have interfered with their work, for the reason that the national peculiarities of the people of the two countries so nearly resemble each other. Dwelling side by side, with but an invisible parallel of latitude between them; descended from the same European races; inheritors of a common law, a common literature, and a common language; closely allied in social intimacy; even their political institutions are similar, for while under diverse forms of government, both are essentially a free people, im-bued with that true spirit of civil and religious liberty which combines the greatest possible freedom for the individual citizen with loyal submission to the will of the majority uttered in due course of law. Under such circumstances, no difficulties have interfered with the harmonious development of Odd Fellowship in accordance with the dominant ideas of the North American people.

That the Order has been successful has been largely due to the fact that it has harmonized with the racial peculiarities, the national prejudices and the social characteristics of the people—with their forms of government and their local laws. But this very element of success in what may be termed the home of American Odd Fellowship naturally militates against its progress in foreign countries, where the surrounding circumstances vary to a greater or less degree from ours. And our record of colonization emphasizes this fact. Fourty-four years have passed since our first permanent colony was planted in the Sandwich Islands; and though to-day our Order exists under no less than thirteen different flags beyond the limits of the United States and Considerate than thirteen different flags beyond the limits of the United States and Canada, yet our membership in all those foreign countries is only about 26,000.

The most prosperous foreign jurisdictions have been those to which the Sovereign Grand Lodge, recognizing the necessity of allowing the Order to adapt itself to local conditions, has granted Charters of independent government, viz.: Autralia and the German Empire—the former having a membership of about 20,000, and the latter about 3,000. Under the Subordinate Grand Lodge of Denmark, also, the Order has made most satisfactory progress.

In unfavorable contrast is the state of the Order in such Spanish American 1139 countries as Peru and Chile. Starting under the happiest auspices, with the zeal-cus support of a distinguished Grand Sire, at that time acting as United States Minister in these countries, it sprang up with mushroom growth, speedily reaching an aggregate membership of about 600. Then, deprived of the assistance of Past Grand Sire Logan, submitted to the disturbing influences of war, and modified by the local characteristics of the people, it dwindled away; and now Peru reports only 89 members, while Chile, which reported 147 in 1889, has since that time

The growing importance of this branch of the Order is shown by the returns The growing importance of this branch of the Order is shown by the returns the Grand Secretary's Report, which give a membership on December 31st, 1890, of 132,808, making this, numerically, our greatest auxiliary department, exceeding the Encampment branch by 17,164. But numbers alone do not enable is to form a correct estimate of its value. Only those who have opportunity to observe its quiet and unobtrusive operations can gain a fair idea of the vast amount of good that has been accomplished by the Daughters of Rebekah, acting as the dispensers of the sustaining sympathy of Odd Fellowship—as the almoners of its carbonard children.

REPORT OF THE LIEUTENANT-GENERAL, COMMANDER OF

PATRIARCHS MILITANT.

ARMY HEADQUARTERS, CHICAGO, ILL., September 10, 1891.

Hon. Cl. T. Campbell, Grand Sire (Acting), I. O. O. F., Commander in Chief, etc.:

SIR AND SIRE :- I have the honor to report to you the condition of the branch of the order under my command, and offer certain suggestions and recommendations, which, if adopted, will, I believe, be of great benefit to the Patriarchs Militant and to the Order at large; and desire that you make such mention thereof in your report as you think proper, and present this document to the Sovereign Grand Lodge for its consideration.

Although the reasonable percentage of the material within the fraternity, from which to make Chevaliers, has in a great degree been consumed, still the Militant movement has advanced steadily in most of the Departments; and the ratio of aggregate increase of the Army, in general, will compare favorably with the figures reported last year. The enthusiasm previously manifested by the military element of the Order towards the Patriarchs Militant Degree and Army organization, has continued unabated in nearly every section of the continent, where Cantons have been formed and mustered into the service; and is all attested by the statistics published in the subj ined table, from which it will be seen that there are at present 628 Cantons of all arms in the service, embracing forty-seven new Cantons organized during the year; a total reported membership of 22,431 Chevaliers, of which number 370 are classified as dormant in consequence of their belonging to seventeen component Cantons in that condition (not included in the 628 reported), or which have been consolidated with others and no aggregate report made of the condensed membership. The number of Chevaliers made during the year was 2,532, an increase over the growth of last year of 791, and a net in crease over the reported membership of 1889 90 of 1,043; the known and estimated revenue of Cantons for the fiscal period is \$176,551.20, an increase of estimated, is \$1,163.703.70, an increase of \$111,998.99; and the entire sullay has been almost wholly made by individuals other branches of the Order.

- All Chevaliers, while attending a Caltonment of their own Cantons or visiting another Canton, must at least wear the regulation cap, belt and sword.
- 2 The By-laws of a Canton should provide for the amount of arrearages that bar Chevaliers from voting, and the amount is generally fixed at three months'
- 3. An officer, regularly commissioned, cannot be deprived thereof except through order of the commissioning power, based upon the finding of a court martial or as otherwise provided by law.
- 4. A Canton can not change its name at will; it must forward a petition to the Commander P. M., setting forth such desire and giving the reasons why the name of the body should be so changed.
- 5. Past officers and others out of commission, are amendable to the P. M. Law and Army Regulations as other Chevaliers, and consequently can be fined for non-attendance at regular Canton meetings.
- 6. A commissioned officer can not be removed, except by sentence of a court martial, or by a direct order from the Lieutenant-General, when circumstances prevent the holding of a court martial; but he may be detailed on special service.
- 7. A Canton is neither required nor expected to turn out as a Canton and attend the funeral of a member of the Order who was not a Chevalier; though it possesses the right to do so as a voluntary courtesy, upon obtaining the necessary dispensation to parade.
 - 8. All members of Patriarchs Militant Bands must be active members of Cantons; and the law prohibiting Chevaliers from frequenting and entering saloons where intoxicating liquors are sold, etc., when in uniform, is applicable to Patriarchs Militant Bands, as well as to Cantons and officers.
 - 9 It is inconsistent for a general officer in commission, to hold at the same time the position of Commandant of his Canton Of cowrse, a general officer can resign his position and take the position of Commandant of his Canton; and should such be the case, a majority vote of the Chevaliers is sufficient to elect him to the office of Commandant.
 - 10. A Canton can not surrender its Warrant, muster itself out of the Army and dispose of its property at will; it must first make application to the Commander of Patriarchs Militant, requesting to be mustered out of the service, setting forth the reasons therefor; and should it be determined to so muster out the body, all its property reverts to the Patriarchs Militant Headquarters, for whatsoever di-posal the General commanding may deem proper.
 - 11. A Canton possesses the right to nominate and elect as Commandant any one of its active members who is clear on the books, etc.; and the difficer on Chevalier, so elected, by refusing to qualify, does not throw the election to the candidate receiving the next greatest number of votes. If the Commandant elect refuses to qualify, his refusal necessitates the holding of another election, to fill such office, and the manner of procedure is plainly indicated by law.
 - 12 Neither the Commandant nor Clerk of a Canton possesses authority, individually, to act upon any matter proposed to either for the purpose of having it presented to the Canton. In a matter of trivial importance, of course, either of the above named officers should have the liberty to take temporary action; but, even in that case, their acts should be reported to the body for confirmation, if it was originally intended that the body should take action in the premises.

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13. The "countersign" can be communicated to a Chevalier who holds membership in a Canton and resides at a great distance therefrom and near another Canton, as follows: An order for the "countersign" should be drawn on the Commandant of the Canton nearest the residence of the absent Chevalier, and be signed by the Commandant of the Canton of which he is a member. attested by the Clerk over the Seal of the Body; and on presentation thereof to aftested by the oters over the Seal of the Body; and on presentation thereof to the proper officer the holder of the order for the "countersign" shall be free examined in the work of the Patriarchs Milliant Degree, and if found proficient, the "countersign" shall be communicated and the order for it filed with the Clerk of the Canton visited. The officer making the examination must be satis-

Whereas the Stokes Prize Medal has been won upon three successive occasions by the same Canten, it is deemed that the honor conferred and received thereby is sufficient to bar that Canton, and others that may hereafter win the right to hold such prize medal for three consecutive contests in as many years, from future competitive entry therefor; it is therefore recommended that a rolled plate, alloy filled, duplicate of the Stokes Prize Medal be procured and be preplate, anoy much, supplicate of the Stokes rine meons be procured and be pre-sented to Canton Marion, No. 6, Department of Indiana, as a testimonial of its skill and honorable service; and that the said prize medal be hereafter contested for under the provisions originally conditioned by its donor, with the said Canton Marion, the previous winner, barred from the field, as shall hereafter be the case with other Cantons which attain like condition in the premises.

D. For the reason that the Clerk and Accountant of a Canton are indispensable officers, and that the success of the body is in a great manner dependent upon their efficiency, it is recommended that their military standing be raised to that of Sub. Officers, to take rank after the Ensign in the order named above; that no change be mad: in the uniform further than that grade insignia shall be embroidered in silver bullion on the collar of the coats, which shall be for the Clerk the presentation of a quill pen and for the Accountant a money pouch with a scarlet dollar mark (\$) thereon, the same to be placed over and extending vertically above and below the intersection of the crossed crook and sword; and that a single one-fourth inch gold lace band be placed on the sleeves of the coats at top

E. In consequence of the fact that elections for Field and General officers are frequently delayed because nominations have not been reported to voters, and that the interests of the service may be subserved, it is recommended that hereafter, an Assistant Adjutant-General, when sending out orders and blanks pertaining to an election, shall communicate to voters the names of known candidates; that in holding an election, no vote cast for a Chevalier who has declined to be a candidate shall be counted; and that where subsequent elections become necessary, that the name of the candidate receiving the fewest votes shall be

H. A great many Cantons seem to think that they can do as they please about ordering supplies and that all their mistakes should be ratified by the Commander P. M., therefore it is recommended that the following be adopted:

Resolved, That it is obligatory upon Cantons to procure supplies from and through Army Headquarters on the same general principle that supplies are obstined from the Great Secretary of the Secretary Great Forder. fained from the Grand Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

I. It is also recommended that it shall be unlawful for any P. M. officer to offer prizes for Militant competition, unless the same shall have been secured at the time of issuing orders promulgating information relating thereto; and that nothing shall be offered in the way of a public prize for competitive service or competition which shall have a tendency to belittle or degrade the Militant movement

J. Owing to the increased expense incurred by persons residing in Chicago, it is recommended that commutation for forage and quarters, may within the estimated appropriation, be allowed the officers on duty at Army Hear-quarters, to be estimated on the same basis as made for similar officers in the United States Army; and that the visitation expenditure be reduced to the amount estimated as necessary and hereinaker reported.

K. It is further recommended, that in case of the death of the Commander P. M., the command of the Army shall devolve upon the Senior Corps Commander, who will assume command and discharge the duties of the office until the vacancy shall have been filled through elections by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

DEMONSTRATION AT CHICAGO IN 1893.

The other prominent Secret Societies are taking initial steps toward making magnificent demonstrations in Chicago in 1893, during the period for the "Worlds Columbian Exposition;" and it is suggested that the Grand Sire be authorized to take such action as may be necessary to effect a suitable I. TRANSFER OF HEADQUARTERS TO CHICAGO.

The Headquarters of the Army were moved from Springfield to Chicago, Ill. hecause of the greater mall, railroad and effice facilities, and for the additional purpose of harmonizing and increasing the Partiarchs Militant within the bounds of the great Central Metropolis on the continent, with the gratifying results hereinbefore stated.

VISITATIONS.

The Commander has made many visitations during the year throughout all The Commander has made meny visitations during the year throughout all sections of the country east of the Mississippi River and a few Departments west thereof; attended during the second week in July the demonstration of the Division of the Niagars at Syracuses, New York, witnessed there the competitive durils of Cantons on the handsome park and encempment grounds selected by Major-General Woodward, participated in and reviewed the brilliant parade made by the Division; accepted the invitation of the Governor of Vermont to attend and take part in the parade at Bennington on the 19th of August, the occasion of the one-hundreth anniversary of the admission of Vermoth as a State into the Union and the dedication of the battle monument there. FUNDS.

This important amendment was again lost by a vote of 107 yeas to 58 nays. A proposition to leave the question of admitting young men of the sge of 18 years to the grand jurisdictions was also defeated by a vote of 106 yeas to 55 nays.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO CHANGE NAME,

Amendment to several articles of the constitution for the purposes of changing the name to Sovereign Lodge, Independent Odd Fellows, was offered by Rep. Hubbs, of New Mexico, and lays over under the rule until next session.

INDEPENDENT GRAND LODGE.

The Grand Lodge of the Republic of Switzerland and the Grand Lodge of the Kingdom of Denmark, having petitioned for Independence—it was

Revolved "That said Grand Lodges be and are hereby made each an Independent Sovereignty in Odd Fellowship, with free and complete and absolute power over the Order within their jurisdictions."
