On Friday morning she was got off the bar, by the aid of the Gladstone's steam pump, and brought up to Chatham where she arrived on Saturday morning, and was laid ashore at Mill Cove for the purpose of repairs.

to a mass of glowing embers, the tall chimney alone remaining to mark where this important industrial establishment had been. In the progress of the fire, the great efforts were made by Mr. Haviland with his ferry boat to move the ships in the most danger from the mill wharf, and a number of these were blown away by the fury of the flames. The steam fire engines played on the burning ruins, till day-light, and the stream from Mr. Snowball's Engine, till 6 o'clock, a.m. Gangs of men were immediately put on to clear the ruins, and by six o'clock the following evening the debris on the site of the mill had been removed.

The mill had three gangs run by two nearly new engines, built some two years ago by Fleming & Sons of St. John, which were supplied with steam by small boilers. The value of the mill and machinery is estimated at from \$50,000 to \$60,000, and it was insured for \$14,000. The number of men employed was 120, and on this account the loss will be a severe one to the community.
