Wilson, a fireman of Dobbs Ferry, tending to show that there were victims in the catastrophe. Wilson stated that he assisted in rescuing three persons from the burning steamer and that one of them, a man named Jesse Matton, informed him that he was certain that the people in the next cabin to that of his wife and himself had perished and that there might be a number of other victims besides. Matton further stated that on buying his ticket he asked when the boat would leave New York. The ticket agent replied that the vessel might be delayed several hours as "something was the matter on board."

The coroner will endeavor to obtain a statement from Matton and his wife and the Italian who was rescued with them.

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




