An Eloquent Preacher, a Good Business Man and Popular with His Congregation—St. Luke's Fine Choir and Impressive Services.

One of the most popular clergymen of Halliax is Rev. W. B. King, rector of St. Luke's. His connection with St. Luke's cathedral commenced during the incumbency of the late rector, Rev. F. R. Murray, and during the period he filled the position of curate or clerical assistant he gave great satisfaction both to the cangregation and his rector. On Mr. Murray's resignation of the rectorship the subject of this sketch was by universal con-ent of the parish horees chosen as priest in charge, their choice being ratified by the Bishop of the diocese. During the year he filled this position Mr. King became a great lavorite with the people of the parish by the untiring assiduity with which he pertormed. At Easter of 1888 he was unanimously chosen rector of the parish by the untiring assiduity with which the services of the church was punanimously chosen rector of the parish of the diocese. At this time Mr. King had not attained the age of thirty years, and was the youngerst rector St Luke's and was theyounger bad ever had. Dur-

had ever had. During the incumbency of the late rector, Mr. Murray, the services had gradually become more and more of a musical character, approaching the choral service. Mr.
Murray had secured the services of a choirmaster, a pupil of, and trained by, the celebrated Sir John Stainer—Mr. R. K. Pooley. Under his tutelage the singing of the surpliced choir had gradually improved and a strong men's choir was added. It became necessary that the elergyman officiating should be more or less artists, and the services of a should be more of less artists, and trained musicians. The rector devoted himself to further improving this very important part of the church services, and with very great

and with very great uccess. Mr. King-has a fine tenor voice, a music and a somewhat i music and a somewhat imposing presence, and it soon became apparent that the services at St. Luke's had no equal in the maritime provinces, and were at least equal to those of any church in the dominion, being barely, if at all, surpassed by the services in some of the great churches in the United States. With six fine bass voices, six excellent tenors and some thirty boys, the singing in the church, which is antiphonal, is beyond question the finest of its class in Canada. All this is largely due to the untiring energy of the rector and the warm interest he takes in the perfecting of that portion of the service of the church.

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



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

## SOUTHWARD IS THE CRY.

THE MARCH OF THE FEATHERED
TRIBE STREWN WITH DEAD.

feathered armies on their autumn march to the south. The farmer hears strange sounds and shrill calls above his head. Many a one living in cities hears a tempest of wings pass far above in the dead of

It is estimated that during the marching season, which is now at its height, many millions of birds pass southward every night. They come from every part of the north, and fly five or six hundred miles

without resting.

The birds that fly in the night rest and teed during the day along the route. The night-flyers, as a rule, live in coverts in the North, and they are afraid to expose themselves in daylight in large numbers; but those that haunt open places mount high into the air at sunrise and fly till dark.

There has been some cold weather lately in the north and this has set the birds on the southern march. They stay about their summer haunts till gray frost comes

some night, or the pools are skimmed over with ice; then their is a gathering of the aerial clans. The old ones, birds that may have made the passage for many seasons, after loud signal cries which bring the flock together, in large congregations, on the edge of the wood. Here they circle around screaming and singing as if delighted at the prospect of the march. Birds that have not been within miles of each other during the summer and which never met before, mass together under the leadership of a few veterans. I have often seen two or three thousand crows gathered in one body and waiting for the signal to start. The birds that live in the woods or browse wait till dusk then you hear a hurricane of wings. They rise often one or two miles, and sometimes three hover among the clouds, and then, having determined their course speed onward. They hardly ever set out on a night when no stars are visible, for it is by these undoubtedly that they are guided to the greatest extent.

Sometimes a storm arises when they are miles up in the air; the stars are blotted out, and they lose their way. Then they are driven before the gale for miles, but they select a piece of forest, where they perch and wait till the weather clears. If the weather is fine they tarry at each stopping place for several days, frolicking and chasing one another through the air and filling the air with their cries. But the first tinge of cold in the wind sets them off again to a warmer region where they feed again to a warmer region where they feed and scream and whistle and sing till gray frost appears or a bitter northern wind be-

Every night now the air is full of feathered armies on their autumn march

and stormy brought the largest crowd of birds. Some of them approached the light carefully, flying round and round and then steadying themselves, peered with wide, wonder-stricken eyes in through the glass. Ducks, guillemot, gulls and other large birds kill themselves as readily against the glass as robins, thrushes, warblers, sparrows or peewees.

They were driving before the storm in hundreds and thousands, but the flocks, as we could see by our glasses, kept well together. Nevertheless the leaders of each company kept on sending out signal cries so loud that they could be heard for half a mile through the storm. These were to keep the migrants together, for they could very easily get separated in the dark. Away from the rear of one of the huge flocks came a distinct answer, and then the leaders struck out more swiftly, feeling that the army was holding together. Some of these immense flocks resembled large scudding clouds, and a body of wild geese

The geese paid no heed to the light, but went on silently, save for the occasional "honking" of the leaders. Certain inhabitants on the island picked up all the dead ones that lay on the grass in the morning, and they were up so early and did their work so stealthilly that we missed seeing several specimens.



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

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
