MOST SPECTACULAR SEEN IN YEARS.

Heroic Work of Firemen Saves Jumps from Third Story

Loss Placed at \$100,000.

Montreal, Jan. 1.—Seven families living in the two story apartments from No. 25 to No. 36 St. Louis Square, which is within the water famine district, were dispossessed this afternoon when a fire completely gutted three substantial residential structures. It was forty minutes after the firemen arrived on the scene before a line of hose nearly a mile long sent the first dribbling stream into the flames.

At one time it appeared as though the entire block bounded by St. Louis Square, Laval avenue, Sherbrooke St. fand Bouvelard St. Denis was doomed, as the water pressure, at best, was very weak. It gave out entirely when the firemen had the confagration well under control and the flames burnt forth with renewed vigor.
