The allied armies continue to have the advantage, acording to French official repots, in what can only be the preliminaries of a great battle extending from Meaux, northeast of Paris, to the fortress of Verdun, about 200 miles further acer.

This is not surprising to military men, as the Germans have been compelled to advance through the swamps of the Petit Morin, and then over base uplands to the extremely strong French position on the right. It is their only chance, however, and it is expected that they will strike and strike again. the Russians advancing from the north. But should the Austrians be defeated, as Rome says, this second army is likely to hasten Gen. Auffenberg's retirement.

There is still a pause in the operations in east Prussia, doubtless due to a scarcity of troops on the part of Russia, which has always had difficulty in transporting troops westward. Besides, the defeat they suffered in the fighting between August 21 and August 27 may have temporarily taken the sting out of their attacks.

In England where the saying is: "Britain is only just starting," the greatest enthusiasm has been created by the King's message to his indian Dominions and colonies, in which he thanks his overseas subjects for the prompitude with which they responded to the call from the Mother Country.

India alone is sending 70,000 troops, "Kitchener's pets," as they have been called since Field Marshal Kitchener re-organized the indian army. They include the army of occupation and the native forces. The later are to be commanded by their Princes and chilefa.

The reading of this statement created a tremendous sensation in the House and the stirring record of the loyality of India, which it constituted, was greeted with cheers, as the long roll call of splendid responses to the needs of the Empire was read out.

The Viceroy's statement was as follows:

"The rulers of the native states of India, who number nearly seven hundred in all, have with one accord ralled to the defense of the Empire and offered their personal services and the resources of sheir states for the war. From among the many princes and nobles who volunteered for active service the Viceroy has selected the chiefs of Jodhpur, Bikaner, Kishangarh, Rutlam, Sachin and Patilas. Sir Pertab Singh, Regent of Jodhpur, the heir apparent of Bhopal, and a brother of the Marahaja of Coochbehar, together with other cadets of noble families.

READY RESPONSE OF DOMINIONS SHOWS WORLD FUNDAMENTAL UNITY OF THE

London, Sept. 9—The official information bureau today gave out a mediage from Kinng George to the British colonies. It is as follows: "During the past few weeks the peoples of my whole empire, at nome and overseas, have moved with one mind and purpose to con

"The calamitous conflict is not of my seeking. My voice has been cast throughout on the side of peace. My ministers earnestly strove to allay the causes of the strife, and to appease differences with which my empire was not concerned. Had I stood aside when, in defiance of pledges to which my kingdom was a party, the soil of Belgium was violated and her cities made desolate, when the very life of the French nation was threatened with extinction, I should have sacrificed my honor, and given to destruction the liberties of my empire and of mankind.

REGARD FOR PLIGHTED WORD BRITISH EMPIRE'S COMMON HERITAGE

"I rejoice that every part of the empire is with me in this decision. Paramount regard for a treaty of faith, and the pledged word of rulers and peoples, is the common heritage of Great Britain and of the empire. My peoples in the self-governing dominions have shown beyond all doubt that they whole-heartedly endorse the grave decision it was necessary to take. My personal knowledge of the loyalty and devotion of my overseas dominions had led me to expect that they would cheerfully make the great efforts and bear the great sacrifices which the present conflict entails.

"The full measure in which they have placed their services and resources at my disposal fills me with gratitude, and I am proud to be able to show to the world that my peoples overseas are as determined as the people of the United Kingdom to prosecute a just cause to a successful end."

"The Dominion of Canada and the Comonwealth of Australia and the Dominion of New Zealand have placed at my disposal their naval for s, which have already rendered good service for the empire. String expeditionary forces are being prepared in Canada, Australia and New Zealand for service at the front, and the Union of South Affice has released all British troops and undertaken the important military responsibilities, the discharge of which will be of the utmost value to the empire.

"All parts of my oversea dominions have thus demonstrated, in the most unmistakable manner, the fundamental unity of the empire, amidst all its diversity of situation and conditions."

A message similar to the foregoing has been addressed by King George to the princes and peoples of India.

In the House of Commons this afternoon, C. Roberts, one of the under secretaries of the colonial department, read a message from the Viceroy of India which said that the rulers of the indian native states, nearly seven hundred in number, had, with one accord, railled to the defense of the empire with personal offers of services, as well as the resources of their states.

One India chief, seventy years old, has demanded the right to render military service, along with his nephew, a youth of sixteen, who is now with the expeditionary force. Offers of troops, horses, money and even jewels had rolled in, the Viceroy said. The Dalla Liama of Tibet had offered a thousand soldiers to aid the empire, and thousands of Llamas were praying dally for the success of the British forces and for the repose of the souls of the dead.

The house was deeply moved by this message, and its reading was greeted with cheers upon cheers.

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

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

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

SOME TESTIMONY GIVEN BEFORE ROYAL COMMISSION

Fox Information Given to the Men from England, who are Investigating The Industries of the Empire.

The keenest commercial and financial minds in the British Empire in the form of members of the Dominion's Royal Commission subjected the fox industry of Prince Edward Island to a searching irvestigation when the commission met in Charlottetown on August 17th. The two witnesses examined were Prof. W. E. Cameron and Hon. Charles Dalton. As an example of the kind of information sought for by the commission we reproduce some of the evidence as taken from a shorthand report of the proceedings:

proceedings:

Prof. Cameron examined by Sir Rider Haggard.

How long has this industry been in existence in the Island?

A—The people who started experimenting began in 1887, the Honorable Mr. Dalton and the man who worked with him at the time, Mr. Oulton. For the first number of years they ran up against many initial difficulties. The industry took on its forporate activity about 1909-10, when the fact became known that large sums of money were coming here for shipments of pelts to London.

Q—Has it increased?

A—Yes, rapidly.

Q—And I asther that year.

Q—I suppose the market for it is it imited to a few extravagant persons?

A—There has been a demand for it among the Royalty of Europe, particularly the Austrians. Russia has furnished up to the present a great market. London is the great centre of the fur market.

Q Will the disturbance in these countries affect the market?

A—I should think it would to a certain extent. It is a matter purely of supply and demand, and anything which would lessen the purchasing powers of purchasers would naturally affect the prices of pelts. This is to my mind, however, only a temporary affair. When you try to calculate the demand of fashlom you are dealing with a fickle thing.

Q—It is a fashlom which may or may not last?

A—The silver black fox fur has

Q—None of them approach it in cost?

A—Yes; the pelt of the Russian sable, about the size of one's two palms, fetches as high as \$500, or £100. Because the animal is fast decreasing in numbers, the Russian people are carrying on experiments at the present time with a view to breeding it in captivity.

Q—Are there a great number of these black foxes existing now?

A—The last government report shows that we have on the Island about 1,602 silver foxes. or 800 pairs.



Q—Is the black fox cultivated anywhere else?

A—The industry is spreading gradually into the neighboring provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, and to a certain extent in the Northern New England States. But it is still to be ascertained whether these localities can produce the high quality of fur we have in this province.

Q—It is reasonable to assume that they will come to a breeding basis?

A—Yes.






