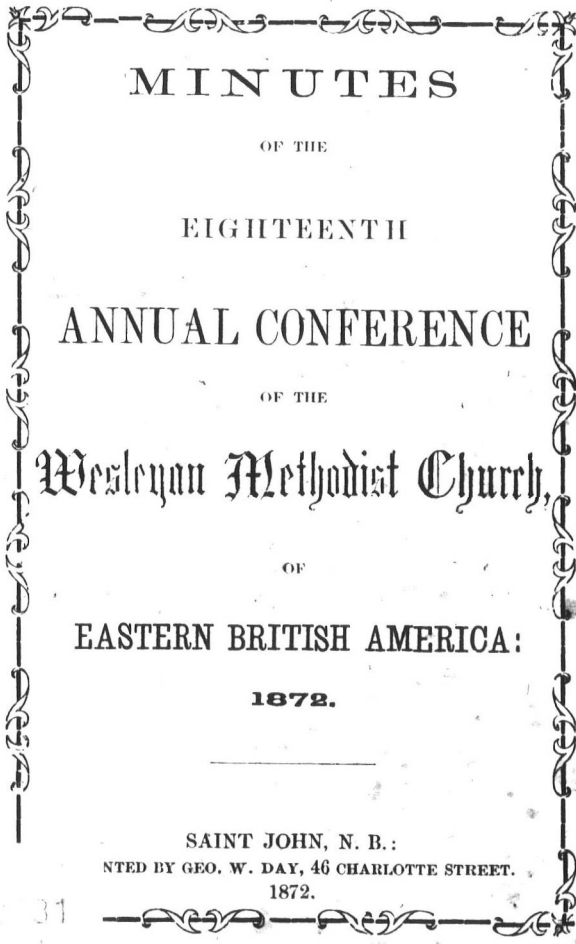

QUESTION IV.

What Ministers have died since last Conference?

ANSWER.

JOHN SNOWBALL, who was born at North Allerton, England, Sept. 27th, 1794, and died in Sackville, N. B., Sept. 13th, 1871.

His parents were Episcopalians, and though failing to instruct him in the way of Salvation, gave him a good moral training. While young, however, he became concerned about his soul, and having been led to attend the preaching of the Methodists, he was more fully awakened to his sin and danger.

Some time afterward, when fervently engaged in secret prayer, Christ was revealed to him as "mighty to save," and his heart was filled with peace, gratitude and love. Soon he felt his need of Christian communion, and finding in the class-meeting, and other similar means of grace, the assistance which he required, he resolved that the people among whom he obtained such aid should be his people, as their God was his God. After having exercised his gifts as an exhorter

for about two years, he came to this country, and in the year 1818 was accepted by the district meeting in Halifax, and sent into circuit work. Thenceforth, until 1863, he laboured with much acceptance in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland and New Brunswick. Painstaking and zealous in the performance of duty, he looked well to every department of his charge, but always felt unsatisfied unless the interests of vital Godliness were prospered in his hands.

In the reduction of Church and Parsonage debts and in the diffusion of Methodist literature he was eminently successful; and in more direct evangelistic effort he was greatly honoured by God. Extension and powerful revivals of religion frequently occurred under his Ministry.

The last eight years of his life were spent as a supernumerary at Sackville. He preached occasionally, and otherwise improved his opportunities of doing good. He took a lively interest in our Educational Institutions, and was ever ready to help and encourage both those who taught and those who received instruction in them. In him was truly exemplified the life and peace of the spiritually minded, and so when his final sickness came, no cloud of doubt shadowed his horizon. His frequent remark was: "I only wished to live so long, as I might be useful; I can now do nothing more, and only wait God's will." Suddenly came to him the summons of the Master, and unseen by mortal eye, he passed through the valley of death, and entered into the joy of his Lord, in the seventy-seventh year of his age and the fifty-fourth of his Ministry.

2. WILLIAM T. CARDY, — Born in Salisbury, Eng., Feb. 15, 1814. Died July 27, 1871. He was converted when in the nineteenth year of his age, and was soon appointed a local preacher. He entered the ministry in 1834, and travelled in the itinerant work, in Wales, two years. He subsequently attended the Theological Institution in England. He was then sent to St. Domingo, and labored in the West Indies, in the Mission work, fifteen years.

After being reduced to great prostration of health by the debilitating character of the climate, he obtained the permission of the Missionary Committee to try the climate of New Brunswick. He laboured with unceasing fidelity on the Saint John South Circuit; and his undaunted and unwearied labors during the awful visitation of cholera, in 1854, will long be remembered there. He was, indeed, a faithful Minister of our Lord Jesus Christ, and during the years of his residence within the bounds of our Conference gave most pleasing evidence of his entire devotion to God.

For the last eight years he was the subject of distressing illness, — the result, undoubtedly, of the enervating climate, the wasting labours, and the various persecutions and afflictions of his West Indian Mission. He was a saintly man; and though, owing to the fact of his removal, for his family's sake, to Chicago, three years ago, he was not privileged to see any of his ministerial brethren, he gave abundant evidence of his perfect preparation for his heavenly inheritance.

3. SAMUEL B. MARTIN, — who was born in

Sussex, England, March 26th, 1834, and died at Port Mouton, Queen's County, Nova Scotia, Oct. 28th, 1871.

At the age of six years he came from England to Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island, where, in his sixteenth year, he was converted to God under the ministry of the Rev. F. Smallwood. In 1861 he offered himself as a candidate for our Ministry and was accepted. He preached the Gospel with earnestness and fervency, and God gave him many souls as seals to his Ministry. His career was short, but useful. Robust in health, abundant in labors, and with bright prospects before him of serving his Master in the cause ever dear to his heart, death overtook him and his sun went down while it was yet day. Jesus, whose name he loved to speak in the sinner's ear and dwelt upon his tongue when battling with the tide of death, sustained him in his dying moments. When asked, "Are you sure of a mansion prepared for you?" he answered, "Yes, for me!"

By those who knew and loved him he was laid down by the side of two of his brethren in the Cemetery of Liverpool, Nova Scotia, in the belief that when the trumpet sounds, he will have a resurrection into eternal life.

4. ROBERT E. CRANE, — who was born in Horton, Nova Scotia, in the year 1818. Though nurtured and trained amid the evangelical influences of Methodism, he did not give his heart to God until the period of manhood. He was led to the Saviour under the preaching of that faithful man of God, the Rev. Wm. Croscombe, during

one of the most powerful revivals of religion ever experienced on the Horton circuit.

Impelled by holy zeal, he soon began to work for God, and in the usual way entered our ministry in the year 1846.

He labored diligently and with considerable success in the Gospel vineyard until 1867, when, on account of failing health, he became a supernumerary. He resumed the work after resting two years, but was compelled again to desist before one year had elapsed. He was greatly beloved on all the Circuits where he travelled. He was exceedingly affable and genial in disposition, full of brotherly love, and ardently attached to the doctrines and usages of Methodism.

With simplicity and fervor he proclaimed the truth of the everlasting Gospel. During the last three weeks of his sojourn on earth he was confined to his bed by severe illness; but, in the midst of all, he was graciously sustained by the felt presence of God. He calmly passed away to the home of the soul, in Halifax, during the Session of the Conference, on Friday, June 28th, 1872, in the fifty-fourth year of his age, and the twenty-sixth of his ministry.

QUESTION XIII.

What are the Resolutions respecting the Circuit Aid and Contingent Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference feels it to be its duty to make another appeal to the societies and congregations within its bounds on behalf of this Connexional Fund.

2. The existing necessity for this appeal and the object contemplated by the Fund are such as must commend its sustentation to the intelligent sympathy and liberality of the lovers of Zion's prosperity.

3. The rules for the support of this Fund are hereby reaffirmed, and their observance urged upon the attention of the superintendents and preachers.

HOME MISSION FUND.

QUESTION XIV.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Home Mission Fund?

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ANSWER.

The Conference records with great satisfaction that our Home Mission cause manifests unmistakeable signs of advancement, and that it is regarded with increasing favor by our people generally. We rejoice in the largely augmented income of this Fund, from Circuits during the year, and in the measure of success with which our operations in this department of Christian toil have been already crowned. It regards the establishment of a Home Mission Society, and the prosperity which has thus far attended this movement, with encouragement; and hopes and believes that with the continued co-operation and support of our people, and the blessing of the Great Head of the Church, this youthful organization will be abundantly instrumental in evangelizing the destitute portions of our country, and in promoting the extension of the Redeemer's kingdom.

The following Regulations have been agreed upon for the management of the Home Mission organization:

1. This Society shall be called the Home Missionary Society of the Conference of Eastern British America.
2. Each person subscribing not less than one dollar, annually, shall be a member of the Society, and shall be entitled to receive a copy of the Minutes of Conference, containing a Report of the proceedings of the Society, with the names of the subscribers for the year.
3. Each subscriber to the amount of Twenty dollars shall be a life-member of the Society.
4. The sources of income of the Society shall be (1) The subscriptions and collections taken up at the Home Mission Meetings, which shall be held at all the principal

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preaching places throughout the Conference, and (2) All donations made to the Society, and the interest on monies invested.

5. The funds of this Society shall be under the management of a committee, consisting of the President and Secretary of the Conference, with twenty-eight others, who shall be appointed annually by the Conference, and one half of whom shall be laymen.

6. The public anniversary of the Society shall be held during the Conference Session of each year; and shall be designated the Conference Home Missionary Meeting.

7. Each preacher occupying a Home Mission Station shall furnish, through the Chairman of his District, to the President of the Conference, a Quarterly Report of his labors, and the state of the work of God upon his mission. For Report, &c., see Appendix A.

SUPERNUMERARY FUND.

QUESTION XV.

What does the Conference resolve respecting the Supernumerary Ministers' and Ministers' Widows' Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference most gratefully observes that this important Fund continues to receive increasing attention from our people by a uniform improvement in the receipts from the Circuits year by year, though it regrets to find a falling off in the amounts contributed this year on a few of the more prominent Districts in the Conference.

2. Our Supernumerary Ministers and their families are committed to the Church as a sacred trust; and we feel assured that according as they are sustained, who have been worn out in the service of the Master, and are confidently reposing upon the benevolence of a people whose interests are to them an increasing and exhausting responsibility, God will bless and prosper our cause.

3. The Conference once more appeals to the Church for such an augmentation of pecuniary gifts and annual contributions to this Fund as shall render its resources ample to meet all the demands which the Providence of God may permit in the future to fall upon it.

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CHILDREN'S FUND.

QUESTION XVI.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference respecting the Children's Fund?

ANSWER.

1. That John Starr, Esq., and Rev. James Taylor be requested to act as General Treasurers; and the Rev. Duncan D. Currie as General Secretary.

2. In accordance with the standing rule which makes provision towards the support of the children of our Ministers, from a certain rate of contributions in proportion to the membership of the Church, it is agreed that for the ensuing year forty-nine (49) members shall provide the allowance for one child. The following statement has accordingly been prepared, determining the number of children to be allotted, at the Financial District Meetings, to the Circuits:

PARSONAGE AID FUND.

QUESTION XVII.

What are the Resolutions of Conference with regard to the Parsonage Aid Fund?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference would again call the attention of our members and congregations to the importance of securing on every Circuit a suitable Parsonage free from debt.

2. That application to this Fund for assistance, in support of local efforts, may be made by Circuits in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, and Prince Edward Island.

3. That the grant to any Circuit shall in no case exceed two hundred dollars.

4. In order to accomplish the intention of Conference in the formation of this Fund, and to insure greater uniformity in the applications thereto, and in the distribution of its grants, the following regulations are adopted, viz :

(1.) In every case where it is proposed to seek for a grant in aid of a new Parsonage, the parties about to build shall communicate with the Secretary of the Committee of this Fund, and procure from him a copy of the Model Plans; and shall also lay before the Committee full particulars in regard to size, location, tenure and value of land upon which it is proposed to build; the plans of the building, details of size, height, materials, and estimated cost, amount of reliable subscriptions in aid of purchase of land and erection of building, and also the amount of the anticipated grant.

(2.) In regard to applications for grants in aid of purchase of land and buildings.

In every case where it is proposed to purchase land and buildings for a Parsonage, it shall be necessary, in order to obtain a grant in aid of such purchase, for the Superintendent of the Circuit to communicate with the Secretary of the Committee, and furnish full particulars respecting the situation, size, value and tenure of the land, and also a plan of the house, shewing size, height, and arrangement of the rooms, a statement of the materials of which the house is built, and of the estimated present cash value of the property, and also of the extent to which the buildings are completed, together with the amount of local subscriptions.

(3.) In every case when a grant is sought to be obtained from this Fund, it must appear that, with the assistance of the grant, it shall be entirely free from the burden of any debt.

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5. In regard to applications for grants to liquidate debts on Parsonages:

(1.) Applications for grants can only be received from Circuits where there has been a distinct charge upon the Circuit accounts, and a claim upon the Contingent Fund for rent, or interest.

(2.) Satisfactory evidence must be furnished to the Committee that, with the assistance of the grant sought, and the local effort, the debt shall be liquidated, and all charges for rent or interest shall cease.

6. No grants can be made from this fund to assist in defraying the expenses incurred in repairs and alterations of Parsonages, or for the purpose of assisting in the erection of outbuildings in connection with Parsonages for which no grant is obtained.

7. No grant shall be paid from this fund until the Committee shall receive satisfactory evidence that a sum, amounting to at least three times that of the grant sought, has been secured by local effort towards the accomplishment of the object proposed.

8. Every application for aid from this Fund must receive the sanction of the District Meeting, either Financial or Annual, before it can be considered by the Committee.

9. The Treasurer of this Fund shall not pay the amounts which may be granted in aid of local efforts until he shall have received from the Secretary of the Fund satisfactory evidence upon the following points, viz.:

(1.) That the title of the property is valid, and that the deed is executed upon the Connexional plan.

(2.) That the whole of the sums subscribed on the Circuit are available and secured, so as to relieve the Circuit account from any charge for rent or interest.

(3.) A Certificate from the Registrar of Deeds must be forwarded, stating that the Connexional Deed is recorded, and that the property is free from all encumbrance, whether by way of mortgage, judgment, widow's thirds or otherwise.

The following is the Report of the operations in connection with this Fund for the past year:

1. Three Parsonages have been secured during the year. One (at Truro), a new erection to replace an old building which was sold and the proceeds expended upon the new buildings, etc. One (at Andover), new, where no parsonage had previously been, and one (at Cornwall, P. E. I.), secured by purchase; here also no Parsonage had been previously provided. These properties have been duly made over to the Connexion; and Certificates of Registry are in the hands of the Secretary of the Fund. The cost has been \$4340.00, which has been provided for as follows:

2. Six other erections, at an estimated cost of \$6880.00, have been authorized by the Committee; two to replace old buildings; and four in places hitherto unprovided with Ministers' residences.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

QUESTION XVIII.

What are the Resolutions of the Conference with reference to our Sabbath Schools?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference rejoices that while several of the Districts show a falling off in the number of the Schools, Teachers, and Scholars, in connection with our Church, within their respective bounds, we are again enabled to report a gratifying increase in the aggregate, as shown in the following summary:

2. The Conference again requests that the Ministers in their several Circuits visit the Schools as often as possible, and hold such services in the interests of the same as they may deem expedient and practicable.

EDUCATIONAL SOCIETY.

QUESTION XIX.

What are the Resolutions of Conference with regard to the Conference Educational Society?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference would call the special attention of the friends of our Church to the increasing importance of the cause of Christian Education.
2. The rapidity with which stirring events transpire among the nations of the world, and the persistent and insidious efforts of the enemies of the cross to subvert the principles of Christianity, render the subject of Education one that must commend itself to every enlightened mind and philanthropic heart.

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3. Moreover, the connection that this subject has with the Ministry of our Church, as well as with our College and Academies at Mount Allison, necessarily invest the operations of the Educational Society with an interest which calls for practical sympathy and regard.

4. The Conference regrets that in the first year of the existence of this Society, as a distinct organization, it has not generally secured that recognition, at the hands of the friends of our Church, that its promoters anticipated, and whilst it is expected that the Ministers should faithfully observe the requirements of the Constitution of the Society, it is likewise hoped that our people will more largely and generally co-operate with them.

For Reports, &c., see Appendix B.

CONSTITUTION.

Art. I. The Society shall be known as the Education Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Eastern British America.

II. The payment of an Annual Subscription of not less than three dollars shall constitute a member; and the sum of such annual subscriptions, together with the amount of the annual collections to be made throughout the Connexion, and the interest of the Permanent Fund, or Capital Stock, shall constitute the Current Income of the Society.

III. The payment of fifty dollars at any one time shall constitute a person a life member; and the sum of such payments, together with the amount of all bequests, and special donations of fifty or more dollars, shall be carefully invested from time to time, to constitute a permanent fund, to be regarded as the capital stock of the Society.

IV. The current income of the Society shall be appropriated annually in manner following, viz.:

One-third part to aid in the maintenance of the Mount Allison Wesleyan College, as an agency necessary for the suitable educational training of candidates for the Christian ministry; one-third part to secure Scholarships of the annual value of not more than seventy-five dollars each, for persons authorized by the Conference to attend the Institution, at Sackville, as Theological Students, who

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may need such assistance to enable them to meet the expense of such attendance; and the remaining third part to secure Scholarships for the children of the members of the Conference of the annual value of not more than fifty dollars each for those in attendance at either Branch of the Institution at Sackville, and not exceeding half this sum for those not so in attendance; no such Scholarship to be available for any child before it shall have entered its tenth year, nor for more than six years.

If in any year it is not found by the Committee necessary to appropriate the full amount of the current income to the above named objects, the surplus for that year shall be added to the Capital Stock.

V. An anniversary Public Meeting of the Society shall be held during the Conference week in the place where the Conference may meet from year to year, at which meeting a report of its operations and condition shall be presented, and its claims shall be urged.

VI. It shall be the duty of the Superintendent of every Circuit in the Conference to arrange to have a sermon preached annually in every principal congregation upon the importance of education upon right or Christian principles, at the time appointed for making the annual collection for the Society, and also for holding public meetings in which to urge its claims wherever it may be deemed expedient, and to make all possible proper exertions to enlist the sympathies of our friends, and to promote the interests of the Society.

VII. The President of the Conference shall be ex-officio President of the Society, and its other officers shall be two Vice-Presidents, two Secretaries and two Treasurers, and a Committee of twelve. One half the number of such other officers and Committee to be laymen.

VIII. At the suggestion of the Committee any one of the rules or articles of the Constitution may be altered by vote of the Conference.

5. The "Educational Fund for Ministers' Children," as heretofore existing shall be closed, and the interest accruing from the present invested Capital shall be added, year by year, to the third part of the Current Income of the Education Society which is appropriated to Scholarships

for Ministers' Children, and all who were required to pay annual subscriptions to the said Educational Fund for Ministers' Children, shall hereafter be required to constitute themselves members of the new Education Society, by the payment of the required annual subscription; and the annual collection hitherto required for said Fund, shall be allowed to merge into that required by the new Society.

6. The interest which was ordered to be appropriated from the Jubilee Fund for the promoting of the objects for which the new Education Society is to be established, shall be paid from year to year to the Treasurer of said Society, and be counted a part of the Current Income.

PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN & BOOK ROOM.

QUESTION XX.

What are the Resolutions of Conference respecting the Provincial Wesleyan and Book Room?

ANSWER.

1. The Conference would give expression to its sense of the high importance to all the interests of our Church, that our Connexional Organ, the Provincial Wesleyan, be well sustained in its career of usefulness, and earnestly resolves to employ the utmost effort to render this indispensable instrumentality increasingly efficient, by enlarging its sphere as widely as possible in every Circuit, thereby making it more extensively auxiliary in the diffusion of Christian intelligence, and the cultivation of the religious home-life of our people.

2. The Conference still regarding with great interest the success of our Book Room, very cordially commends it to our Connexion as a highly necessary department of our Church operations, in the diffusion of sound religious literature, and trusts that this important agency may receive a greatly extended patronage and be rendered much more widely useful.

3. That the Conference regards with peculiar satisfaction the results of those measures adopted by the Rev.

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Dr. Pickard during the past three years, for relieving the Conference Office of its great burden of pecuniary liabilities, and tenders to him its cordial thanks for the able and judicious manner in which he has discharged the duties of his office as Editor and Book Steward, and trusts that the labors of the ensuing year may be still more gratifying to himself and be productive of advantage to all the important interests entrusted to his charge.

MOUNT ALLISON INSTITUTIONS.

QUESTION XXI.

What are the Resolutions of Conference with respect to the Mount Allison Educational Institutions?

ANSWER:

1. This Conference has heard with real gratification the Reports of the Collegiate and Academic Institutions, relative to the manner in which the important interests entrusted to them have been sustained during the past year.

2. That we recognize, in no ordinary degree, the hand of Divine Providence as present in the favor which these Institutions have received from our people and the general public, in the adaptation of the President, Principal and Professors to their several responsible situations, and the preservation from disease and death of those who have been associated in any way with our Halls of learning.

3. That we would hereby unanimously and earnestly pledge ourselves, as a Conference, to sustain these Institutions and the officers controlling them, by sympathy, co-operation, and prayer, feeling perfectly assured that their work being under the supervision of the Conference of E. B. America, is, in the highest sense, the work of our Divine Master.

4. The Conference has received with much satisfaction the reports of the Professor of Theology and Examining Committee, respecting the Theological Institutions, for the

past year, and has much pleasure in recording its high appreciation of the valuable services of the Rev. Charles Stewart, D. D., in his arduous and responsible work of training those young men who have been duly approved as candidates for our Ministry.

5. That we have received the reports which have been submitted to us respecting the successful operations of the past year in all departments of our Educational work at Mount Allison, with a very high degree of grateful satisfaction, as affording indubitable evidence that Divine Providence still smiles upon the work there, for the right conduct of which we have been by Him made responsible.

6. That we fully concur in the opinion of the "Board of Trustees and Governors," that while an Endowment Fund of from seventy-five to one hundred thousand dollars is now exceedingly desirable, one at least of sixty thousand dollars is immediately indispensable for the proper maintenance and advancement of the enterprise.

7. That although it is our deliberate opinion that it is to be reasonably hoped that a few comparatively wealthy individuals among our people will, when the importance of the subject is presented before them, be induced to contribute so liberally of their abundance that the largest sum named may be secured, we do now, as an indication of our strong conviction of the pressing necessity for an Endowment to the extent of at least sixty thousand dollars, pledge ourselves to contribute, from our generally so scanty personal resources, sums to amount in the aggregate to one-fifth of such required minimum sum, or one-eighth of such maximum sum.

8. The Conference has also to record its gratification at the result of the Educational Society during the year, which has been so far successful as to provide the maximum sum for four scholarships for students in attendance, and would earnestly recommend the Educational Society to the more abundant liberality of our people in view of the very great desirableness of a much larger proportion of the candidates for our ministry being allowed to avail themselves of the advantages of a systematic course of study so soon as the exigencies of our Circuit work will at all admit of their attendance at Sackville.

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9. The following shall be the course of study appointed for probationers for our Ministry, and they are required to be examined particularly upon it at the Annual Districts, viz.:

What Miscellaneous Resolutions are adopted by the Conference?

ANSWER.

I.—THANKS TO OFFICERS OF CONFERENCE OF LAST YEAR.

1. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. H. Pope (B), Ex-President, for the very judicious and faithful discharge of his presidential duties during the year.

2. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. S. W. Sprague, Co-Delegate, for the faithful discharge of his duties during the term of his office.

3. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. D. D. Currie, Secretary of the Conference; also to the Rev. S. F. Huestis, Journal Secretary, for the valuable services rendered by them during the year.

II.—CANADA CONFERENCE.

4. It was moved by Rev. H. Pickard, D. D., and seconded by Rev. D. D. Currie, and

Resolved, 1—That this Conference, having listened with intense gratification to the admirable fraternal address received from the "Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada," and to the very able and eloquent speeches just delivered by the Rev. William Morley Fushon, LL.D., and the Rev. Ephraim Evans, D. D., as Representatives of the said Conference, gratefully acknowledges the obligation under which we feel ourselves placed to our elder sister affiliated Conference, for the favor and honor conferred upon the "Wesleyan Methodist Church in Eastern British America," by such an Address, and such a deputation.

2. That as we still concur in the opinion that the formation of one Wesleyan Methodist Church for the whole of British North America is exceedingly desirable, we now proceed to appoint a committee, to act with the committee already appointed by the Canada Conference, to devise a

plan of Federal Union, and to draft a constitution for such proposed United Church, to be submitted to the Conference at its next annual session, and that such committee shall consist of eight members of the Conference, to be chosen by ballot.

Whereupon H. Pickard, D.D., Duncan D. Currie, Chas. Stewart, D. D., Henry Pope, Jr., James Taylor, John McMurray, Stephen F. Huestis, and Alex. W. Nicolson, were chosen to compose said committee.

5. On motion of Dr. Pickard, seconded by Rev. Henry Pope, Jr, it was

Resolved, That this Conference desires to express the high gratification derived from the fraternal visit of the honored representatives of the elder Sister Conference in Canada, the Rev. W. M. Punshon, LL. D., and the Rev. E. Evans, D. D., and while gratefully acknowledging the elevated pleasure and profit afforded by the discourses and addresses of these distinguished servants of the common Master, as well to the congregations of Methodism in this city, as to each of the Ministers of the Conference, would especially record the profound sense of indebtedness it feels to the Rev. Dr. Punshon, for the cheerful promptitude with which he placed his valuable services, as a Lecturer of world-wide fame, at the command of the Conference, in the interests of our Institutions at Sackville, at the present crisis of their history.

III.—THANKS, ETC.

6. That the thanks of the Conference be presented to the Rev. C. Jost, A. M., H. Sprague, A. M., A. D. Morton, A. M., Sub-Secretaries; to Rev. Joseph S. Coffin, Assistant Journal Secretary; to Rev. J. G. Angwin, Assistant Financial Secretary; to Rev. R. Duncan, and Charles H. Paisley, A. M., Conference Letter Writers; and to Rev. W. C. Brown, Reporter for *Provincial Wesleyan*; for the valuable services rendered by them at this Conference.

7. That the cordial thanks of the Conference be presented to Rev. H. Pickard, D.D., for his faithful and very valuable services, as our Financial Agent, and that he be requested to continue in that office for the ensuing year.

8. That the thanks of the Conference are due to the

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ministers on the several Halifax Circuits, for the satisfactory arrangements made by them for the comfortable accommodation of the ministers attending this Conference.

9. That the ministers of the several Halifax Circuits be requested to express from the pulpits of their respective churches next Lord's Day, the thanks of the Conference to the members of our church, and other friends, for their kindness and Christian hospitality in entertaining the ministers who have attended the present Conference.

10. The Conference presents its thanks to the proprietors of the railroads, steamboats, and coaches, for the special advantages afforded in journeying to and from this Conference.

11. That a Committee be now appointed to prepare the Pastoral Address for 1873, and report the same to the next Conference.

Ordered, That Revs. John Cassidy, and William C. Brown do compose said Committee.

12. That a Committee be now appointed to prepare the Address to the English Conference for 1873, and report the same to the next Conference.

Ordered, That Revs. R. Duncan, and Howard Sprague do compose said Committee.

IV.—TEMPERANCE.

14.—The Conference, deeply impressed with the conviction that intemperance is a sin against God, and most destructive to the best interests of our race, and that the use of alcoholic liquors, even in moderation, tends to the increase and perpetuation of drunkenness,—

Resolves—(1.) That in view of this great evil, we would reiterate and earnestly enjoin upon all our people the most careful and conscientious observance of that rule given by the Rev. John Wesley to the societies under his care, respecting the use of intoxicating drinks, viz:— "Neither buying or selling spirituous liquors, nor drinking them, unless in cases of extreme necessity."

(2.) That we hail with delight all well directed efforts of individuals and organizations to promote the cause of Temperance, and, so far as practicable, will heartily cooperate in those laudable efforts.

(3.) That as the Church of Christ should be the most effectual promoter of moral reform, we pledge ourselves

to renewed efforts to purify and preserve her from reproach by discountenancing all complicity of her members with the great evil of intemperance, whether by drinking, manufacturing, selling, signing petitions for license, or furnishing or renting places for the sale of intoxicating liquors.

When and where shall our next Conference be held?

FINANCIAL ECONOMY.

The Report (No. 2,) of the Special Committee on our Financial Economy was adopted, and is as follows:—

The Conference recommends to the Quarterly Meetings of the several Circuits the following plan, by which it is hoped they may the more effectually raise the amount necessary to meet the allowances of the ministers and preachers, and which will make the collection of class and ticket money hereafter unnecessary.

1. Let the Quarterly Boards at the beginning of each financial year estimate the amount needed for the year.

2. Then ascertain from each member of the church, and, as far as practicable, from each attendant of the congregation, what each proposes to give as his weekly or monthly contribution.

3. Let these sums be entered by a steward appointed for that purpose in a book which he shall keep as Treasurer of the Quarterly Board.

4. If the total amount of these sums does not equal the

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amount needed, then let the stewards apportion the deficiency among all such as are willing, for Christ's sake, to assume such deficiency, setting down to each person, with his consent, the additional amount which they think he ought weekly or monthly to pay.

5. Let the stewards then adopt and carry out a plan by which every one shall have the opportunity of regularly contributing each week or month by envelope or otherwise, not grudgingly or of necessity, the sum which has been pledged by him. Let those contributions be paid over regularly to the steward appointed to receive them, and be brought up by him to the Quarterly Meeting. The said steward shall keep an individual account of all these pledges and contributions, and shall pay over the same, under the direction of the Quarterly Meeting, to the preacher or preachers authorized to receive them.

STANDING ORDERS.

L.—DISTRICT MEETINGS.

4. The Chairmen of Districts are peremptorily required to procure three complete copies of the Minutes of the several annual and other meetings of the District Committees, financial and ordinary, duly signed by the Chairman and Secretary; one of these copies shall be inserted in the District Records, the second shall be reserved for the use of the Conference, and the third shall be delivered to the Secretary for preservation in the archives of the Committee. Furthermore, it is required that the last mentioned copies be handed in on the forenoon of the day preceding that on which our first preparatory Committee meeting may be appointed to be held, that the Secretaries may prepare classified lists of all matters which are to come before the Conference, and thereby expedite business.

2. That as much trouble has been caused at different sessions of Conference in consequence of alterations made in the District Minutes, it is determined, that when the Minutes of the several Districts shall have been signed by their respective Chairmen and Secretaries, they shall not be altered, except by the special permission of the Conference.

II.—PROVINCIAL WESLEYAN.

That in consequence of the annually increasing arrearages of subscriptions for the *Provincial Wesleyan*, enquiry be instituted in the District Committees respectively, as to the fidelity of each brother responsible for the collection of such monies—the accounts being previously sent to the Chairmen, and distributed at the Financial District Meetings.

III.—CANDIDATES RECOMMENDED.

Each District Chairman is required to instruct young men recommended by the District Meeting as probationers for our work to attend the meeting of the Committees for the examination of Candidates.

IV.—MISSIONARY LISTS.

Each Superintendent is required to present, at the Annual District Meeting, prepared on foolscap paper, and made up in Canada currency, a perfect list of all Foreign and Home Missionary monies collected on his Circuit; and each Chairman is required to present such lists, to the Missionary Secretaries, in a state ready for publication, on the day previous to the meeting of either of the Missionary Committees.

V.—CHILDREN'S FUND.

The Financial Secretaries of the several Districts are required to send to the Secretary of the Children's Fund, immediately after the Financial District Meeting, the names of all the ministers, in their respective Districts, who are claimants upon the Children's Fund for the current year; and to state the number of children for whom allowance is claimed; and, as far as possible, the name and date of birth of each and said children.

VI.—CONFERENCE STATISTICS.

The Chairmen of Districts are requested to bring before the notice of their respective Financial District meetings the subjoined schedule (Appendix C.) and to see that it be carefully filled up at the next Annual District Meeting.

VII.—SPIRITUAL REPORTS.

Resolved, That at the Annual District Meetings a summary of the Spiritual Reports, and of the Sabbath School

Reports, from the respective Circuits, be prepared and entered in the District Minutes, to be laid before the ensuing Conference. The Chairmen of Districts are made responsible for the execution of this order.

VIII.—BOOK ROOM ACCOUNTS.

Resolved, That every Minister and Preacher is peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book Steward each year, at or before the meeting of Conference.

has shared according to the constitution of the Society, to the extent of one third of the available income, as a provision for the Education of our Ministerial Candidates. In the crisis through which our Educational Institutions are now passing, the Committee would remind the Methodist people of these Provinces that we would imitate the spirit and philanthropy of other lands and other denominations, and conserve one of the greatest sources of power, we must not as a Church, allow these institutions to be paralyzed in any of their operations.

The interests of Education in connection with the children of Methodist Ministers have been subserved in accordance with the regulations of this Society.

It is also pleasing to report that eight young men—candidates for the Ministry—all of whom have been approved by Conference—have derived material assistance by grants from the Society. May we not expect that these young men will more than repay in their increased ability to serve the cause of Christ, the money granted to assist in qualifying them for the important work of the Ministry.

In conclusion the Committee would call attention to the fact that by increased liberality in the cause of Christian Education we shall set in train influences that will roll down the ages in glorious and saving results. The honor that is imperishable, the fame that is undying, the recompense that is eternal will attend the Christian who is identified with any movement calculated to advance the principles of him who sought to educate the hearts and intellects of men.

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APPENDIX D. ADDRESSES AND REPLIES.

THE PASTORAL ADDRESS.

Of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Eastern British America, to the Members of the Church under its care.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,—

As the collective Pastorate, assembled in our Annual Conference, we gladly avail ourselves of the opportunity of addressing to you our very cordial and Christian salutation, "Grace be with you, and peace, from Him which is, and which was, and which is to come; and from the seven Spirits which are before His throne; and from Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, and the first-begotten of the dead, and the Prince of the kings of the earth."

The important business of our Session has been brought to a happy and satisfactory termination; and we gratefully acknowledge the spirit of unanimity and fraternal harmony which has characterized our deliberations, and the tokens of divine approval and benediction which have been evidently vouchsafed. The public services of the sanctuary, and the several Anniversary Meetings have been pervaded with rich heavenly influences. If the enlightening and hallowing presence of the Head of the Church is its true glory, and a guarantee of continued establish-

ment and prosperity, then have we cause to rejoice, for at no former period could the language of the venerated Wesley, "The best of all is, God is with us," be more appropriately adopted.

The pleasure and interest of our Conference Session has been heightened by the presence amongst us of the honored delegation from the Canadian Conference, the Reverends Drs. Punshon and Evans. These beloved servants of Christ have again assured us of the fraternal and deepening affection of the extensive Church they so ably represent; and by the public ministrations of Divine truth in our congregations, and their sagacious and valuable counsels in our Conferential deliberations, have evoked our gratitude to God for the gifts and graces so pre-eminently possessed by them, and have drawn together more closely than ever the cementing bonds of love, that will, we trust, result in the confederation, at no distant day, of the several Conferences and Bodies of the Methodist family in British North America, from the Atlantic to the Pacific shores—of one consolidated, influential and aggressive Church, whose highest ambition shall be to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the length and breadth of the land. To accelerate the consummation of this most desirable epoch in our Church history, a committee has been appointed by our Conference to meet a similar one from the Canadian Conference during the ensuing autumn, to prepare a basis of Federal Union which shall be mutually acceptable.

On reviewing the year, it is cause for unfeigned thanksgiving to be enabled to report progress in the various departments of our Chris-

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tian enterprise. Zion's borders have been enlarged; believers in Christ have been established in the faith of the Gospel, and angels have participated in our joy over repentant sinners, and precious souls rescued from spiritual darkness and death. But, whilst it becomes us gratefully to recognize and rejoice over even the least measure of success, we would with anxious solicitude enquire whether the *amount* of success should perfectly satisfy us? Is it proportionate to the year's toil? An increased number of agents has been employed to scatter abroad the seed of the kingdom, and to seek in order to save the lost. Might not more signal virtues have been achieved in the name of our exalted King, and greater inroads been made upon the territory of the usurper? Might not the clouds have poured forth richer and more copious showers to refresh God's heritage? Seek, dear brethren, by importunate and believing prayer, the bestowment, in larger measure, of the Holy Spirit's grace and power. Nothing will compensate for His withdrawal. Of what avail is the prestige of learning, of influence, of past successes, if the Lord the Spirit be absent? Without Him our wisdom is foolishness, our strength weakness, and our most zealous labours ineffectual and fruitless. As the result of our Saviour's enthronement far above all heavens, we are warranted in expecting the descent of the spirit. This great gift of the Gospel dispensation is indispensable to make our Zion a peaceable and quiet habitation, and a dwelling-place of the Divine glory, and to cause the "wilderness and solitary place to be glad, and the desert to rejoice and blossom as the rose."

The necessity of working while it is day has been impressively enforced by the removal from our midst by death, during the past year, of four ministers of the Conference. They have been summoned from the labours of earth to the endless rest of heaven. Two of those who have departed hence were venerable men, extensively known and much beloved. The names of John Snowball and Wm. T. Cardy will long be fragrant to the affectionate hearts of those among whom they laboured in the Gospel, and whose servants they lived and died. As the Elijahs of the Church ascend triumphantly to the skies, may their mantle rest upon many Elishas who shall emulate their self-denying zeal and devotion.

Four brethren who have satisfactorily and honourably completed their probationary term, have been ordained and solemnly set apart to the full work of the ministry; and twenty-two young men of promise have been received as probationers for our work. Still the necessity exists for prayer to the Lord of the harvest, whose prerogative it is to thrust laborers into his vineyard, that many more young men of piety and gifts, may be impelled by his spirit to consecrate themselves to the work of preaching "the glorious Gospel of the blessed God," so that every inviting field, still unoccupied, may soon have the ministrations of the gospel ambassador, proclaiming reconciliation through faith in the blood of the Lamb.

It is exceedingly gratifying to refer to the increasing interest manifested in the Home Missionary work of the Conference, as evidenced in the yearly augmentation of the funds of this

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most important Society. The objects contemplated are such as must be approved by every Christian philanthropist, viz.: To afford relief to newly formed Circuits in sparsely peopled, and spiritually destitute localities, and the establishment of new stations, as centres of evangelistic effort. The grand design of the Home Missionary Society will not be accomplished, until every settlement in the backwoods, and every cove and harbour around the extensive sea-coast embraced within the bounds of the Conference, shall be blessed with the angel of peace.

While solicitously caring for the spiritual exigencies of our own land, and putting forth laudable efforts to evangelize the masses around us who are still without God and without hope, may the day never come when we shall feel less concern, or display less sympathy than hitherto, for the hundreds of millions of our redeemed fellow men in heathendom, whose appalling superstition, and woeful degradation, appeal for immediate help. These must have always strong scriptural claims upon our prayers and Christian beneficence. The charity of the gospel is world embracing. Its arms are extended to help men of every clime, whether black or white, Jew or Gentile. In proportion as you possess the mind of Christ, will be your love for precious souls, and your readiness to supply adequate means to enable our Church to do its full quota of the work of saving and subjugating a revolted world. While the agents of our Foreign Missionary Society are labouring amid the densest darkness of paganism, and attacking the very stronghold of error in the ancient capitol of the world, preach-

ing the gospel in Rome also, let the influence of your fervent prayers accompany them, and your enlarged liberality help to support them, and to provide an increase of labourers in the vast field, which is the *world*.

We would affectionately exhort you, dear brethren, to cultivate with the utmost diligence, *personal godliness*. Let the holiness of Christ, as exhibited in his life, and included in the gospel, be the standard of excellence toward which you are constantly aspiring. The age in which you live is pre-eminently one of worldliness, scepticism, and practical atheism; and untiring watchfulness is indispensable, that your garments may be kept undefiled. Let it be apparent by your closely walking with God, your deadness to the world, and your increasing spirituality of mind, that you are followers of them who through faith and patience are now inheriting the promises. To this end hold frequent communion with God in the retirement of the closet. We have not, because we ask not. Let us, through the atoning blood of the one Great High Priest and Mediator, approach with boldness the throne of grace; and thus mercy, and every new covenant blessing, shall be secured. Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, that being furnished with the sword of the spirit, you may successfully resist every form of evil. Attend regularly and with growing delight the ordinances of religion. They will prove as wells of salvation. Not only frequent the courts of the Lord on the Sabbath, but if at all practicable, whenever Divine Worship is celebrated; so shall your path be that of the just, shining brighter and brighter unto the perfect

day. Need we remind you of the importance of exhibiting in the performance of the worship of Almighty God, a reverential and devout demeanour. "*Stand up* and bless the glorious name of the Lord your God when you *sing* His praises. *Bow down* and *kneel* before the Lord your Maker in solemn prayer." Whenever opportunity offers commemorate your Saviour's death in the Holy Eucharist. The command, "Do this in remembrance of me," is as obligatory upon us who name the name of Christ, as it was upon the disciples to whom it was principally addressed at the institution of the blessed Sacrament. Thus do we show the necessity of Christ's atonement, and our faith therein, until His coming again.

We exhort you brethren to labour in your several spheres and according to your ability in the cause of the Blessed Master, who loved and gave himself for you. Opportunities for usefulness are abundantly furnished in the Church with which you are identified. In the Sabbath School you can usefully employ your talents by imparting religious instruction to the lambs of Christ's fold. Let the spiritual destitution of the outcasts and neglectors of salvation, induce you to attempt their rescue and moral elevation by circulating among them religious tracts. "He that converteth a sinner—*one sinner*—from the error of his way, shall save a soul from death, and hide a multitude of sins." While we counsel you to full Christian sympathy with all the truly philanthropic movements of the day, we would especially urge upon you the devout observance of the holy Sabbath, the attendance upon the class meeting, and the avoidance of every form

of worldly conformity which would neutralize the power of vital godliness, and grieve the Holy Spirit of God. While you are discharging the active duties of life, you can in various and most efficient ways exemplify and recommend that religion which is emphatically "The one thing needful." Those who have the responsibility of a family, will scarcely need to be reminded of their obligation to care for the spiritual interests of their households. The duty of training your children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord, should be regarded as of paramount importance. In the sacrament of baptism, dedicate your offspring to the Triune Deity—that ever afterward you may look upon them, and they may regard themselves as belonging to Christ and His Church. Provide for the *mental culture* of those dependent upon you, by supplying them with suitable literature. Many of the issues from the press at the present time are highly pestiferous. Sceptical principles, and soul-destroying errors of every phase are so insidiously introduced, that the untrained and unsuspecting minds of youth are in danger of being perverted and corrupted. Other literary productions are frivolous and dissipating. They present false views of life; and when a taste for them is acquired, the Bible, and other books of real value are neglected, or listlessly read. Our Book Room in Halifax is well furnished with carefully selected works, and we recommend your patronizing as largely as possible this Institution. The "Provincial Wesleyan," has earned for itself so wide and favorable a reputation, that it is unnecessary to do more than express the hope that it

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may find its way and be welcomed into every Methodist family throughout the bounds of the Conference.

You will be gratified to know that the reports from our "Academic Institutions" at Sackville continues to be highly satisfactory, proving unmistakeably that they are nobly accomplishing the design of their establishment. It is earnestly hoped that they will still receive those proofs of your confidence and appreciation that have been accorded in the past. It is of utmost importance that the Educational interests of our Church be efficiently sustained. May every year of our Connexional life give evidence of increasing zeal to secure for our youth a thorough education based on Christian principles! Such an equipment is of more value than silver or gold, and will qualify for positions of honor and usefulness.

We again commend to your favorable notice the "Educational Society" of the Conference. One of the objects contemplated by its formation, is to aid those young men who feel called by the Spirit to the work of the ministry, but who require further educational training to enable them to discharge its sacred functions, and to become able and useful ministers of the Lord Jesus. In this age, when the fundamental and most vital doctrines of our holy Christianity are assailed by men of learning and genius, it is more imperative that those who are set for the defence of the Gospel be thoroughly furnished for their high vocation. We need say nothing more, to impress upon your minds the reasonable claims which this newly formed society has upon your Christian sympathy and beneficence.

In leaving the Conference to repair to our various spheres of holy toil, we desire to be endued with spiritual power. Brethren pray for us. Your prayers, united with ours, and added to the intercessions of the Great High Priest before the heavenly altar, must prevail. Let us learn as we have never done, the omnipotency of effectual fervent prayer, and witness its effects—in the Church by the entire consecration of its members — and in large, yea—unprecedented accessions to the Church of the saved from the world!

“God’s hands or bound or open are,
As Moses or Elijah prays.”

And now, dear brethren, we commend to the grace of Him, who is able to keep you steadfast and unmoveable, and to preserve you unto his heavenly kingdom. When the world and its fleeting shadows would encroach, when *mammon* would peremptorily assert his claims, when Satan determinedly assails; when your steps are environed with peril—may you realize the presence and help of Him who giveth power, to the faint—who said to the tempted apostle; “my grace is sufficient for thee,” and who remaineth unchangeably the same, yesterday, to-day, and for ever!

“Brethren, the grace of our Lord Jesus be with your Spirit, Amen.”

OF THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE OF 1871

TO THE

Address of the Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church

IN EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA, 1871.

REVEREND AND VERY DEAR BRETHREN:—

Your affectionate Address, presented by the Rev. G. Scott, D. D., gives us very great pleasure, and we warmly return your loving greeting in the Lord. Indeed, we have you in our hearts, and with eager welcome we always receive the letters which inform us of your state, and the honored representatives which tell us of your affairs. The confident tone of your Address strengthens our hands in God. Sons and successors of the man of one Book and of one Parish, we have not to mourn a departed glory, or to ask "Is the Lord among us, or not?" The God of our fathers, who made us a people, and gave us our mission in the world, is still with us: and this is "the best of all." Still He sheds forth the Holy Ghost, and works His "greater works," in the diffusion of the Gospel over wider fields and with vaster results. "What hath God wrought?" The rapid and vigorous growth of the Methodist Churches in the Western world is without parallel in Christian history. Everywhere the work is stamped with infallible marks of the Divine approval, and it would be a criminal blindness not to see what Israel ought to do. Clearly the word of the Lord to the children of Israel is this, "Go forward!" Nor is there any trace of flattering in your spirited Address. You stand fast in one spirit, with one mind, striving together

for the faith of the Gospel; with unanimous force lifting the Ark of God. And God doth arise, and His enemies are scattered. The harvest is ripe. The golden grain invites the reaper. We are rebuked for saying, "There are yet four months, and *then* cometh harvest;" for to faith's clear eye "the fields are white already to harvest."

Your Address distinctly indicates the Divine and human causes of your success during the past year. Your personal and Church life has been quickened "by the coming of the Holy Ghost." By renewed ministerial consecration you have honored His Divine Person and office, and He has honored you by working with you, and confirming the word by signs following. Exercising the ministry of reconciliation, you stand between God and the people, and you are successful in proportion as you catch the spirit of Him, in whose stead you stand. When the priests are clothed with salvation, the saints shout aloud for joy. A holy ministry infuses its own spirit into the churches, and they become God's leaven for spreading holiness through the land.

We, too, like yourselves, have carried to their bur'ial good soldiers of Jesus Christ; but among us, as among you, the Leader of the army with banners enlists a succession of faithful men, and carries on the wars of the Lord. While the young men who enter the ranks of your ministry come behind in no gift that human culture can bestow, we earnestly trust they may be richly endowed with those gracious qualifications that made their fathers winners of souls.

We congratulate you upon the growing completeness, symmetry, and efficiency of your Church organization. The religious and social influence of your institutions is the Divine seal which accredits you to the world as a branch of the Church of Christ. "By their fruits ye shall know them." Your Colleges for the training of your rising ministry,—your Associations for promoting Home and Foreign Missions,—your Schools for the spread of Scriptural education,—and your Book Department, for the diffusion of a sound Christian literature in the country,—are pledges for the future of Methodism in British America. The life-force of Methodism is the Missionary spirit; and we thankfully recognize in your agencies that aggressive and reproductive energy which takes possession of

the regions beyond, and plants Christian Churches in a new world.

We view with the deepest interest the proposal emanating from the Canadian Conference. It does honour to the hearts of those dear brethren, and your heart is as their hearts. A united British American Methodism will be an immense power. The economical difficulties in the way of this closer ecclesiastical union will yield before the old family feeling, and unanimous and hearty loyalty to the common cause. May the Head of the Church guide you in this matter; and may your fusion as Churches be signalized by closer personal fellowship each with the other, and all "with the Father, and with His Son Jesus Christ."

To ourselves God has vouchsafed manifold blessings and success. We regret, however, that we cannot, as last year, report an increase of members in our Societies, Our great solicitude on this subject is fully shared by the body of our dear people. The instructive tendency to gauge spiritual results by the numerical strength of our fellowship we dare not rebuke; for through all our history as a people the immediate and invariable effect of true awakening conversion, and quickening, has been the enlargement of our roll of members. We are jealous lest the absorbing claims of material interests should entail unconscious slackness in the use of our spiritual means. The erection of chapels, encouraged by unexampled munificence, and of school houses, stimulated by recent legislation, has proceeded at a rate unknown before; and we trust that this period of material expansion may be quickly followed by such an influx of converted souls that we shall again break forth on the right hand and on the left—lengthen our cords and strengthen our stakes. The happy unanimity which has characterized our deliberations during our session, and the uncommon unction which has attended the public religious services held in Manchester and the adjacent towns, are the earnest of showers of blessing.

We have much pleasure, in accordance with your request, in appointing the Rev. J. G. Hennigar as your President, and the Rev. Charles Stewart, D. D., as Co-Delegate for the next year.

And now, dear brethren, as you go forth and preach

everywhere, may the Lord work with you, and may the Gospel which you proclaim not be "in word only, but also in power, and in the Holy Ghost, and in much assurance."

THE ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE
OF THE
Wesleyan Methodist Church of Eastern British America, 1872
TO THE
BRITISH CONFERENCE, 1872.

HONORED AND BELOVED FATHERS AND BRETHREN,—

Again assembled in our Annual Conference, we rejoice in the opportunity afforded of renewing with you our filial and fraternal intercourse.

The Address received from your venerable body has been listened to by us with loving reverence and with unfeigned joy.

The general vigor and vitality of your work, the growth and success of your educational interests, the ample success of your aggressive enterprises, the princely liberality which has enabled you to multiply metropolitan churches, the flexible adaptation of agencies and methods of action to the specialities of modern civilization and to the necessities of modern life, the firm, unyielding maintenance of

great principles, and the faithful ministry of the truth as it is in Jesus, claim our grateful recognition and call for hallowed emulation.

The work we are prosecuting in the Eastern Provinces of British America ranges over a wide space, and greatly varies in its character. It comprehends pioneer effort and missions in sparsely settled localities, as well as commodious churches and established congregations in more advanced communities. Upon some circuits, "showers of blessing" have descended, nor have we had to mourn over any wide-spread declension; but success has not been commensurate with our hopes, and a deepening sense of dependence upon God has pervaded our hearts. "Paul planteth and Apollos watereth; but God giveth the increase."

We hold the doctrine of the full and plenary inspiration of the Sacred Scriptures. We rejoice to proclaim a present, free and full salvation. We dare not adorn our ministry with the gaudy rites of a godless ceremonial, and we are solicitous for our people, that instead of the wood, hay and stubble of vain shows, they should in gold, silver and precious stones of a steadfast faith and holy continuous zeal build "upon the foundation of the Apostles and Prophets: Jesus Christ Himself being the chief corner stone."

We have not been unmindful of the pressing claims of a perishing world. The enlarged contributions of this year afford evidence of continued practical sympathy with the Foreign Missions of British Methodism. We have been led by the exigencies of our work, also into a new field of effort in the prosecution of Home Missions. Prompted by patriotic and philanthropic motives, as well as by love to Christ and loyalty to Methodism, our most influential people have cheerfully co-operated with us in this work, and by "the abounding of their liberality" have placed the Home Missionary Society amongst the most prosperous and promising of our Church enterprises.

Death has thinned our ranks. Two aged brethren have finished their course with joy; a brother always ready for pioneer work in the golden prime of manhood has fallen at his post; and during this Conference Session in the death of another esteemed minister the monition of

the Master has come to us with fresh force: "Be ye also ready."

The rapid expansion of our work has created a demand for ministerial agency which we find it difficult to supply. From various circuits of the British Conference we have welcomed laborers generally suited to this field of toil, and in these Provinces we have still room for young men who come to us well recommended, and who are prepared to endure hardness as "good soldiers of Jesus Christ."

Our Book Room, long a subject of financial difficulty, is gradually emerging from its heavy embarrassment. The Educational interests of our Church were never, perhaps, more efficient or more prosperous in carrying on the work assigned to them than at the present time; but their operations have been seriously interfered with by the introduction of a new policy in the governmental administration of New Brunswick. Professedly in the interests of Protestantism all legislative aid has been withdrawn from denominational education. To place our valuable and valued institutions upon an independent financial basis an Endowment Fund, inaugurated by generous and self-denying contributions of the brethren at this Conference, has become an imperative necessity.

The question of Union has occupied our deliberate attention. A committee has been appointed to meet an arrangement of the same kind in the Canadian Conference for the purpose of maturing a plan of federal union. We indulge in the hope that all *economical* difficulties will be overcome, and that we shall at no distant period constitute the United Methodist Church in British America.

The interest of our Conference Session and services has been heightened by the presence and ministry of the Rev. W. Morley Pimshon, LL.D., Representative of the Canada Conference, who more than ever has won our love and admiration; and we have also been indebted to the sagacious counsels of another honored member of the same deputation—the Rev. Dr. Evans.

We request the appointment of Rev. Chas. Stewart, D.D. as our next President, and Rev. Elias Brettle as Co-Delegate. We have requested Rev. Dr. Scott to act as our Representative at your Conference.

And now, beloved fathers and brethren, refreshed by the harmony which has to an unwonted degree pervaded

our assembling together, we go forth to our varied fields of toil, bearing precious seed, with the fervent prayer that the Lord of the Harvest will permit us to return rejoicing, bringing sheaves with us.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN:—

The pleasing duty of reply to your truly welcome and encouraging ADDRESS finds us the subject of emotions which indicate a ripening of the friendly relation of the past into one more intimate and interesting; and if we rightly interpret the spirit of your letter and the eloquent utterances of the honoured brethren you have been pleased to depute to us, we think ourselves correct in the impression that the warmth of regard of which we speak is sufficiently reciprocated to justify the hope of that closer BOND, which a simple friendship does not contemplate. And if this opinion be correct, we may mutually hope that the negotiations intrusted to the respective Committees, may encounter no barrier sufficient to prevent the relation our growing intimacy appears to crave.

In view, therefore, of this serious; and, as we believe,

destined relation, we especially rejoice with you in the successes to which your fraternal letter alludes; and we assure you that it affords us additional pleasure to be able to say that in our still broader field of toil we too are full of encouragement and hope.

We are humbly grateful to the *Giver of all Good* in the announcement of a membership increased during the past year,—our numbers being 2,700 in excess of the membership reported by our last Conference. And it may be said that of all our CONNEXIONAL FUNDS, they were never in a more prosperous condition than at this time.

Our Educational Institutions are at present commanding special attention and regard. Victoria College, steadily outgrowing the temporary embarrassment occasioned by the withdrawal of Government aid, was never in so prosperous a position as at the present day. The Convocation held in May was in every respect distinguished above its predecessors in the number of the degrees conferred and the profound interest taken in its proceedings by a large and appreciative public. And you will rejoice to learn that in addition to the increased efficiency of its Faculty, under the able presidency of Rev. Dr. Nelles, there has been secured to the University a THEOLOGICAL DEPARTMENT, long needed, which will provide for the additional degree of "BACHELOR OF DIVINITY," for which a suitable curriculum has been prepared.

The Wesleyan Female College at Hamilton, under the able Governorship of Rev. Dr. Rice, is sharing nobly the efficiency and prosperity of its relative at Cobourg, and is not only more largely attended than ever, but is steadily becoming the foremost institution of the kind in the Dominion.

During the year, an additional Institution of learning has been projected to meet the wants of our people in the Province of Quebec, and there is encouragement to hope that at no distant day a flourishing College will be established at Stanstead. And to this may be added that for the establishment of a Theological School in the City of Montreal, \$40,000 have been subscribed by a few of the membership of our church in that city.

In addition to the encouragements which appear in the life of our home work, it is proper to notice that in our

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Missionary efforts for the spread of the Truth abroad, there are grounds for the most inspiring hope. Our Missions to the new Province of Manitoba, and the increase of our Missionary staff in British Columbia and Vancouver's Island, have justified the most sanguine expectations, and give promise that in these distant lands, Methodism will take the prominent position which a kind PROVIDENCE has vouchsafed to it at home.

Having assured you that in all the vital parts of our growing work we have special reason for encouragement, it remains for us, in conclusion, to refer to matters which mutually affect us.

The presence and addresses of your honoured representatives, the Rev. Dr. Pickard and the Rev. D. D. Currie, have been very warmly received by us, and by their utterances, we are reassured of the magnitude and importance of your work.

We need hardly tell you that we shall be ably represented at your approaching Conference, when we inform you that our honoured President, the REV. W. M. PUNSHON, LL. D., and the REV. E. EVANS, D. D., have been appointed to bear to you our fraternal greetings.

With respect to the important question of UNION, we beg to state that a Committee has been selected, with whom any Committee you may appoint may confer on the formation of such basis of Union, as is practicable in the accomplishment of so desirable an object—which basis is to be laid before the respective Conferences for acceptance,

We have pleasure in acceding to your request for the continued permission of the appointment, by you, of the REV. JOHN BURWASH, M. A., in connection with your College at Sackville,

And now praying that great grace may rest upon you all, and that in your approaching Conference you may have additional causes for praise to HIM, whose we are, we assure you of our continued affection.

REVEREND AND BELOVED BRETHEREN,—

The reading of your very interesting address was the occasion of much gratification to us, and we are glad to reiterate our annual expression of fraternal regard for brethren beloved in the Lord.

We were greatly honored in having had your Christian salutations borne to us by your distinguished President, the Rev. W. M. Punshon, LL.D, and the Rev. Ephraim Evans, D. D. Dr. Punshon's self-sacrificing labors in behalf of our Mount Allison Institutions have procured for us very valuable and timely aid. His pulpit ministrations were occasions of hallowed delight to thousands of our Israel, graciously attended as they were by the unction of the Divine Spirit. His ripe and sagacious counsels were eminently helpful to us in our Conferential deliberations. In Dr. Evans we found the honored co-laborer with us in former eventful years, and were delighted in renewing our intercourse with him, and in being again aided by his mature judgment.

We heartily sympathize with you in your joy over what God hath wrought by and for you. That you have during the year been honored in winning so many souls to Christ, that in the effort to secure an equipment for the great and pressing work of Christian education you have achieved such considerable success, and are now enabled to devise still more liberal things, and that your broad and generous missionary policy is being honored of God is occasion

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for a common joy. We give thanks to God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, praying always for you, that what you have already accomplished may be but the promise of a grander success in promoting the various interests of the Redeemer's kingdom.

We are trying to emulate you in your faithful endeavors. Our work is carried on amidst trial. It is an occasion of real grief to us, that we cannot report a numerical increase this year; but God is opening up our way, and we seek to follow where He leads us. We are steadily gaining a wider place in all the land and a firmer hold upon the people. We cannot keep pace with the growing demand for our ministrations. We have this year received twenty young men on trial for our work, but we are still not nearly able to meet the call for laborers.

Our Educational Institutions we believe to be doing a great work for God, and He is stamping these labors with His approval. In our last address we reported to you a greatly increased attendance at the Academic Halls. The attendance has been still larger during the past year, and the work has been carried on with more than usual comfort. Mount Allison College is yearly adding to the number of her Alumni men who in the various professions are making honorable testimony to the exact and thorough culture given by their Alma Mater. The Female Academy secures the steadily increasing confidence of our people and the expression of a warmer enthusiasm in its work. The Board of Trustees has taken an advanced step in deciding to admit ladies to degrees in the full college course. We gratefully acknowledge your courtesy in conceding to us for another year the services of the Rev. John Burwash, A. M., whose labors are highly and deservedly appreciated.

We are suffering embarrassment, as you have suffered, from the withdrawal of Government aid, and we have arranged for making immediate appeal to our generous people for an Endowment Fund of seventy-five thousand dollars. The scheme has already been inaugurated by the promise of upwards of ten thousand dollars by the members of the Conference.

In our Theological Institution ten young men have been receiving careful training for the work of the Christian

ministry, and nearly as large a number will this year enjoy such an advantage.

The question of the Union of the two Conferences was very carefully considered by us, and the desirability of such Union was affirmed by unanimous vote. We have met your request in the appointment of a Committee to confer with your Committee on this most important matter. We shall pray that the united Committee may have the guidance of the Divine Spirit; and we shall confidently anticipate that in this important measure intimately connected with the spiritual welfare of this Dominion in the future, and affecting the interests of millions, that the Divine Providence which has ever guided us as a Church shall still lead us forth in the right way. Meanwhile, awaiting the development of the Divine plan as to our future relations, we pray, "Now the Lord of Peace Himself give you peace always by all means."

APPENDIX **A.**—HOME MISSION FUND,

R E P O R T

OF THE

HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY

FOR 1872.

The Home Mission Committee desire to acknowledge with gratitude to God the encouraging degree of success with which the efforts put forth by this Society have been crowned, during this, the second year of its history. The awakened and increasing interest manifested by our people on behalf of this enterprise, is, in itself, a most hopeful indication; while the spiri-

tual results of the year's labors, though by no means equal to our desires, are nevertheless such as abundantly prove that the hand of the Lord is with us, and that His favor rests upon our undertaking. It is not to be expected that so youthful a Society as this should be able to furnish such glowing accounts of its achievements and triumphs as those rendered by the more venerable institutions whose work has been reviewed from time to time by the Christian public with so much admiration and gratitude. Still we have reason to rejoice that even in this comparatively new and humble sphere of Christian toil, we have already been permitted to share the "joy of harvest" with those who labor in connection with older and more renowned enterprises. Fields which had been either partially or entirely abandoned for want of laborers, have been reoccupied; congregations which had languished for the Bread of Life, have had it regularly supplied to them; Circuits which were crippled and embarrassed in their pecuniary resources, have been furnished with timely aid; and, best of all, moral waste places have been visited with the fertilizing showers of grace, and precious souls have been garnered for Christ.

Our limited resources, and the exigencies of the regular work, have rendered it necessary for us thus far to confine our attention chiefly to those sections of country in which our cause already exists, but wherein for want of adequate support and oversight it has been but feebly and inefficiently sustained. This, it must be remembered, however, is really Mission work, inasmuch as many of the localities receiving aid from our

funds, would be almost destitute of pastoral care and Gospel ordinances, but for the help thus afforded. Within the bounds of most of the Circuits embraced in the operations of this Society, there are settlements, which, until recently, were but seldom visited by the Methodist Evangelist, and where great spiritual destitution prevailed. Some of these during the past year or two, have, through our Home Mission Agency, been supplied with the means of grace and added to the number of our regular appointments. We claim, therefore, to be doing a work truly Missionary in its character, and which loudly appeals for aid to all who are interested in the Evangelization of our country.

Nevertheless the Committee feel that the object of this Society is but imperfectly accomplished, so long as its operations are restricted to those portions of country already recognized as under the Ecclesiastical supervision of our Conference. There are "regions beyond" which appeal to us for help. Whole districts might be pointed out in various parts of these Provinces where Methodism has no existence, and where the visit of a Methodist Preacher would be hailed with gladness and gratitude. There are sections only partially occupied by other Churches, and where additional laborers are imperatively required. Scattered here and there over large tracts of country, there may be found many families educated in the doctrines and usages of our Church, and perchance converted through its instrumentality, who, now that circumstances have compelled their removal from the scenes of early life, yearn vainly for those ministrations with

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which they were favored in by-gone years, and which have become linked with so many precious and holy associations. Moreover, there are territories many miles in extent and embracing many thousands of inhabitants, in which there is no Protestant Church or Minister of any description, and where the deadly blight of Popery is upon the people. With such facts before us, we must acknowledge that our work, as a Home Mission organization, has but just begun. Not until every destitute village and settlement is regularly supplied with Gospel ordinances; not until the sublime destiny of Methodism to spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land is realized; not until the whole territory embraced within our Conference limits is won for Christ, can we justly regard the obligations devolving upon us as a Church thoroughly discharged, or the purpose for which this Society has been instituted, completely fulfilled.

A collection of *one hundred dollars* was made in the Brunswick Street Church, Halifax, at the Welcome Meeting of young men from England, which same was expended in assisting these brethren to reach their Circuits.

Twenty-six Circuits appear on the Home Mis-

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sion List the past year. Twenty of these had Ministers appointed to them at the last Conference; three were supplied by young men who arrived from England last autumn, and the remainder have been without the pastoral oversight of our Church during the entire year. From reports furnished by the brethren laboring on Home Mission Circuits, the following items of information are gathered.

Middle Musquodoboit has added to its other appointments Sheet Harbor, a place forty miles distant from the head of the Circuit, and which has been hitherto unsupplied with Methodist preaching. The congregations are good, and the financial help received encouraging, and it is thought that could a young man at once be sent to labor in that section of country, a flourishing cause might soon be established. A Church is being erected. At River John a commodious Church has been built during the year, and about twenty persons have been received on trial

Albion Mines.—A Bible Class and Prayer Meeting have been established at Stellarton, on this Circuit, and a Class has been organized at Westville. The work in this field appears generally in a prosperous state.

At Gabarus, C. B., a parsonage has been commenced during the year with every prospect of its speedy completion. The spiritual aspects of the cause are most encouraging. Many conversions have taken place, and at Louisbourg and Fourcho a gracious revival has been experienced.

Upon the Alberton Circuit, P. E. I., the work is becoming more consolidated, and the cause of Methodism is obtaining a firmer hold upon the

people. A new Church has been erected at Cascumpec. Souris has long stood among our unsupplied Stations, but last year a young man was appointed to the Circuit, and entered upon his labors with encouraging prospects of success.

The work on the Kingsclear Circuit presents many indications of prosperity. A gracious influence has attended the public services, and several have been added to the Classes. Three entirely new appointments have been taken up in recently settled sections of country, where there had been but little preaching previously, and where the people were hungering for the Bread of life. A most promising field of Missionary operations is furnished in connection with these places.

At Digby Neck the work steadily advances. Special services have been held on different parts of the Circuit, with very encouraging results, and a Class has been formed at Freeport, Long Island.

Caledonia Circuit has been supplied with pastoral attention during only a part of the year. A gracious revival at one of the preaching places on this Circuit has resulted in the addition of several persons to our Church there. For several months this section of country has been without the regular services of any Minister of Christ, and it presents one of the most inviting fields for Evangelistic labor within the bounds of our Conference.

The Home Mission Circuits, which have been wholly unsupplied during the year, are Goldenville, Newcastle and Dalhousie. Besides these there are several other places demanding labor-

ers, which it is hoped our resources will enable us immediately to occupy.

In closing this Report the Committee would most earnestly appeal to the lovers of Christ and of Methodism, that their continued and increased support may be given to this most philanthropic and Christian enterprise. While our hearts readily respond to those calls which come from "distant lands and climes remote," asking for the Word of Life, let them not be closed to those appeals which proceed from the destitute portions of our own country, craving the same inestimable boon. While the degraded sons and daughters of heathendom in the regions of the East and South, claim a share of our sympathies, let not the unsaved children of Christendom in our own British America, be forgotten or neglected. There are "multitudes scattered abroad as sheep having no Shepherd." Upon us as a Church devolves the high honor and the imperative duty of sending them pastors who shall gather and guide the flock, supply them with the nourishment of Divine Truth, and keep them within the precincts of the fold of Christ. Discharging our responsibility in this important matter, we may rest assured of a rich reward from Him of whose ministry it was the crowning characteristic that the poor had the Gospel preached unto them.
