FORGERY AT FREDERICTON.

GEORGE H. DAVIS SKIPS TO THE UNITED STATES.

FREDERICTON, February 20.—Yesterday a number of notes, discounted at the brokers of this city for George H. Davis, the well known druggist, matured. Last night Davis was not in sight. Then two discoveries were made which are confirmed to-day. The first was that Davis had taken the Sunday train at Fredericton Junction for the States. The other was that a large number of notes bore forged endorsements. Davis has been chronically in difficulties and of late friends have discontinued endorsing for him. But it now appears that thirty-five notes or orders were discounted with the endorsement of Hon. P. P. Thompson, a well known politician, who is Davis' brother-in-law. The amount of those notes so presented to Thompson is \$3,000. The name of J. D. Phinney, M. P., appears as endorsement to notes amounting to \$4,000, all declared to be forgeries.

Beside those advances by brokers, Lever Vase is said to be stuck for \$700. Another lawyer for \$600, a merchant for \$1,000 and another for \$400, all obtained from forged endorsements in the name of Thompson & Phinney. Davis walked on Sunday all the way from Fredericton to Fredericton Junction on the railway track, in a driving snow a distance of twenty-two miles.

Sixty hens, say the Plymouth Rock, well cared for, will realize in one year for eggs and chickens a sum almost incredible to those who have neglected this part of farm work which, if properly managed, will afford a means of pleasure as well as profit. Fresh eggs are always in demand, and if chickens are hatched early they will supply eggs during the winter months when prices are high. A nice sum can be realized at the end of the year by raising turkeys, say forty or fifty. They do not take much care except for the first few weeks and are always salable. Next comes m. k. e. g. This should be done in a business-like way. In preparing produce for the market cure should be taken to offer it in the most attractive form possible. If the quality of the butter, eggs and poultry offered is good and arranged in good shape there will be no difficulty in disposing of a large quantity.
