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EXPANSION OF INTERCOLONIAL

Minister Of Railways Gives Important
Notice Motion.

Ottawa, May 16.—The expansion of the Intercolonial Railway through the acquisition of thirteen branch lines, totalling almost six hundred and fifty miles in length, is indicated by a resolution of which the Minister of Railways has given notice. This addition, coupled with the two Nova Scotia branches which the government is taking power to build, will turn the Intercolonial from a trunk line to a system of trunk line and branches. The resolution indicates the intention to depart from the legislation of last session, which provided that before a branch had been taken over, it had to be up to the standard of the Intercolonial. The conditions in the notice now given are that the amount of rental shall be determined by the Judge of the Exchequer Court upon the report of the Chief Engineer of the Government Railways, and the report of the Departmental Engineer who inspected the road during construction. In arriving at a valuation any subsidy paid for construction is to be deducted. The roads for which power is taken to lease for ninety-nine years are: The Vale railroad of the Acadia Coal Co., extending from New Glasgow to Thorburn, a distance of six miles; the Quebec Oriental Railway, extending from Matapedia to Paspégué, a distance of about one hundred miles; the Hampton and St. Martin, a distance of about thirty miles; the Albert Railway extending from Salisbury to Albert a distance of about forty-five miles; the Moncton and Buctouche Railway, extending from Moncton to Buctouche, a distance of about twenty-eight miles; the Caraquet Railway and Gulf Shore Railway, together extending from Bathurst to Tracadie, a distance of about eighty-five miles; the York and Carleton Railway, extending from Cross Creek to and beyond Stanley, a distance of about ten miles; the Intercolonial Railway, extending from Campbellton to the St. John Valley at Leonard's, a distance of about one hundred and thirteen miles; the Cape Breton Railway, extending from Point Tupper to St. Peters, a distance of about thirty miles, including the company rolling stock in each case: the Temiscouata Railway, extending from River du Loup to Conners, a distance of about one hundred and thirteen miles; the New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island Railway, extending from Sackville Junction to Cape Tormentine, a distance of about thirty miles; the Elgin and Havelock Railway, extending from Elgin to Havelock, a distance of about twenty-eight miles; the Kent Northern Railway, extending from Kent Junction to Richibucto, a distance of about twenty-seven miles. These can be taken upon terms and conditions to be approved of by the Government Railways managing board, provided, however, that the rental to be paid for each such line of railway shall in no case exceed an amount to be determined in the following manner, that is to say, the value of the railway proposed to be leased shall be fixed and determined by the Judge of the Exchequer Court of Canada.

SPECIAL MEETING TOWN COUNCIL

Permit For Electric Laundry Granted--- Much
Discussion re Sale of Relief Houses---
Other Business.

A special meeting of the Council was held on Tuesday evening for the special purpose of dealing with a proposal from the Relief Committee regarding the houses on Matheson's Flats. Present — His Worship the Mayor, Councillors Lunan, White, Pinault, Alexander and McKenzie. Judge McLatchey who was present introduced the matter to the notice of the Council. Speaking from his own initiative he thought it would be a good thing for the town to guarantee the rents of four or five of the Relief Houses which were to be sold on Thursday, as there was bound to be some poor people requiring help from the town, and by the town giving this guarantee, the prices for the houses would be better and the town would reap the benefit as the remainder of the money from the Relief Committee would be handed over to the town for the benefit of the poor. In the discussion which followed many of the Councillors stated that the Judge's explanation was quite different to what had been rumoured around town, and during the discussion Councillors Moors and Mowat entered the meeting. It was suggested that the town buy four or five of these houses, the only objection to that being that if these houses were kept there as poor houses, it might destroy the renting value of the remaining houses to probable purchasers. In the end His Worship appointed a special committee, consisting of Councillors Lunan, Pinault and Moors to look into the matter and report at a special meeting to be held on Wednesday evening. Judge McLatchey then withdrew. Reverting to the usual order of business the minutes of the two previous meetings were read and confirmed. Communication read from Mr. R. M. Hope declining his appointment as one of the Auditors for the School Trustees. Resignation was accepted. Communication read from T. C. Burpee regarding the case of the I. C. R. sewer. Letter placed on file. Communication read from Geo. Sanson regarding Laundry stating that he must have the laundry running by the 25th of May and asking that the matter be cleared up now. The discussion on this much talked of question brought out nothing new, and in the end Councillor Mowat moved and Councillor Pinault seconded that a permit be given for an electric laundry, subject to the condition that electric current would be supplied as could be arranged by the department, said current to be cut off at any time at the discretion of the Electric Light Committee. Carried. Councillor Miller at this time entered the meeting. A communication from Bates and Flood offering to buy the store at the disposal of the town was referred to the Public Property and streets committee with power to sell to the best advantage. Petitions were received from the following—L. T. Jondry for an auctioneer's license, N. W. Levesque, Livery Stable, Wm. Comeau and Wm. Copeland trucking. These were all referred to Police and License committee.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES
Councillor Lunan from the Police and License committee recommended that the following licenses be granted—Ed. Alexander and A. Locasse for Poolrooms, W. T. Gray, R. Ellsworth and H. P. Doyle for Livery Stables, A. C. Roy Barber on payment of \$10 and H. Harris, Restaurant on payment of \$10. Report received and adopted. A further report recommending payment of accounts totalling \$27.60 was also received and adopted. Councillor Pinault from Public Property and Streets committee submitted report recommending payment of accounts totalling \$25.50. Report received and adopted. In a further report the committee recommended that a sprinkler be bought, and on motion the Council empowered the committee to purchase a sprinkler similar to the one before the fire from the Geo. Heaman Co. London for \$235, capacity of sprinkler 250 imp. gallons. Councillor Mowat submitted report of Electric Light committee recommending payment of accounts amounting to \$32.90. Councillor White from Fire Protection Committee, accounts \$177.15. Councillor Miller from Finance Committee accounts \$176.64 all of which were received and adopted. Councillor Alexander submitted report of water and sewerage committee recommending payment of accounts amounting to \$59.05, also recommending that the water main be charged at the corner of Sugarloaf St. and Gerard St. that the water system be extended on Gerard St. to the town limits, that the Reed Co. claim for damages be not entertained and stating that the request of the Shives Lumber Co. for a hydrant had been attended to. Report received and adopted. In answer to Councillor McKenzie, Councillor Pinault promised to have the matter of clearing the old Minto site attended to.

INCREASES IN PAY
Police officers Brown and Harris were each raised \$5 per month, Wm. Jackson, water department to 25 cents per hour, George Comeau to \$2 per day.

Robert J. Cameron was appointed Hog Reeve and Pound Keeper. In answer to questions Councillor White stated there was no change in the situation regarding Brush in Ward III. The matter of outside trucking being brought before the council a list of names of men trucking in town without a license will be handed to the Police for summary proceedings. The town clerk was instructed to get the various schedules of several other towns of cab and livery tariffs with a view to arranging a tariff of our own. Council adjourned.

At the adjourned meeting held on Wednesday evening to receive the report of the special committee on Relief Houses, there were present, His Worship the Mayor, Councillors Lunan, Pinault, Moors, Alexander, McKenzie, Mowat and Miller. Councillor Pinault presented the report of the special committee recommending that the town reserve four of the Relief Houses for use as poor houses seconded by Councillor Lunan. Councillor Alexander proposed as an amendment, "That the coun-

MASONIC TEMPLE CONTRACT AWARDED

Messrs. B. Mooney and Sons are the
Successful Tenderers

The tenders for the new Masonic building were opened on Monday evening and the contract awarded to Messrs. B. Mooney & Sons, the contract price being \$8483. The building will be a two story edifice and basement, built of brick in Georgian style. On the top floor will be the lodge room, banqueting hall, and necessary offices, and on the lower floor, large office, warehouse and shipping rooms, which, with basement, will be let to Messrs. Baird & Peters, wholesale grocers. Work will be commenced immediately and the foundation stone is expected to be laid shortly with full Masonic honors. It might be mentioned that the estimated cost from the architects, Messrs. Blyth & Inray was \$8500, showing how finely they had calculated the work.

I. C. R. MADE GOOD SHOWING LAST YEAR

Ottawa, May 15.—The total surplus of the Intercolonial Railway for the past fiscal year was \$272,712 which in view of the unusually heavy expenditure is an exceptional showing. The total income for the year was \$9,863,783, from which was deducted \$9,000,000 for equipment account, \$25,000; \$76,000 to cover the cost of replacing the shops destroyed by fire at Campbellton; \$5,000 per month expenditure on new fire account, in addition to all general operating expenditures. Much gratification is felt at the splendid showing, which goes to indicate that the railway is permanently on a paying basis and is a vindication of Hon. Mr. Graham's policy in placing the railway under a special board of management.

Mr. Thomas Parker, Divinity student, King's College, Windsor, N. S., has been appointed by Bishop Richardson to the charge of Dawsonville and parts adjacent. Mr. Parker preached in St. Mary's church, Dalhousie, on Sunday evening. For the last day or two he has been the guest of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Storer. Rev. E. J. Coleman may be expected to take the service in Christ church, Sunday, next.

Mr. John T. Reid was appointed Building Inspector at a salary of \$100 per annum.

SIR WILFRED LAURIER SAILS FOR ENGLAND

Greeted by Patriotic Selection as The Virginian Left
Quebec with Canada's Representatives on Board

Quebec, P. Q., May 13.—With the strains of "O Canada" ringing in his ears, Sir Wilfrid Laurier sailed yesterday afternoon for England on board the Allan liner Virginian, where he will attend the Imperial Conference and coronation ceremonies. A great crowd of people assembled on the dock to bid the Dominion Premier farewell. On his trip to England he is accompanied by Hon. L. P. Brodeur and Sir Frederick Borden.

When the premier disembarked from the special car and embarked upon the Virginian there was a large gathering of people on the dock and he was given three

cheers from his Quebec admirers. There was a large representation of the officials of the ancient capital to meet him and wish him a pleasant journey. His Worship Mayor Drouin, Hon. L. A. Taschereau and others were in attendance, while Captain Victor Pelletier, A. D. C. to the Lt. Governor presented him with a handsome bouquet of flowers. As the big steamer pulled into the stream on its journey to the other side, the crowd assembled sang "O Canada," "He's a Jolly Good Fellow" and "God Save The King" while cheers were given for the premier, Sir Frederick Borden and Mr. Brodeur.

PRESBYTERIANS CONSIDER MARRIAGE

Would Make It Purely Civil Contrast
Even In Quebec.

Perth, Ont., May 11.—That marriage should be made a purely civil contract was the most important clause in a resolution passed almost unanimously by the Presbyterian synod of Montreal and Ottawa here today. The resolution is the same as was passed by the Presbytery of Montreal. It protests strongly against the admission by Quebec of the claims of the Roman Catholic church to have the right to call on the judiciary of the province to its ecclesiastical deliverances in this connection. The resolution further points out that in view of the evil disposition in Quebec to subordinate the civil to the ecclesiastical tribunals, it must reluctantly but deliberately records its judgment that there is no other course left but to strenuously advocate that such amendment be made in the law relating to marriage as shall make that important contract a purely civil act.

IRON ORE SHIPMENTS (Union Advocate)

The Intercolonial Railway sent Sunday evening to Nipisiguit Junction an engine and a train crew to start hauling iron ore to the docks at Newcastle. The ore will be shipped to different points. There are about 52 cars of ore at Nipisiguit Junction ready for shipment.

A steamer for the Canada Iron Corporation arrived here from Baltimore on Friday and sailed on the following day with a large cargo of iron from Bathurst mine. Engineer W. F. C. Parsons was in Newcastle Saturday and he said that the development at the mines was very large and he looked for large shipments from Newcastle during the summer. Another ship came in on Monday, and trainloads of ore are arriving from the mines daily.

CORONATION BALL AT FREDERICTON.

Official announcement is made today of a Coronation Ball to be given at the Parliament buildings, Fredericton, on the evening of June 22nd by Lieutenant Governor Tweedie. The invitation list is now being prepared and prominent people all over New Brunswick will be included. Between 1,500 and 2,000 invitations will probably be issued and guests will come from different parts of the province.

A SUCCESSFUL STUDENT

Miss M. Louise Crocker of Millerton, who is attending the University of New Brunswick, had recently been elected senior lady editor of the University monthly for the year 1911-12. At a meeting of the Y. W. C. A. held a few days previous she was also elected president of that society and will attend the Muskoka Conference, as a delegate of U. N. B. in June.

QUEBEC TO ENFORCE ITS COMPULSORY VACCINATION LAW

Montreal, May 12.—Some municipalities having written to the provincial board of Health asking for delay in passing a compulsory vaccination law, a reply has been sent saying that no delay whatever would be granted. A by-law must be passed at once and it must be enforced. Reports of outbreaks from different points continue to come in.

He started out fishing this morning with the other lads, and had stopped near the culvert not far from the plant of the Canada Woodenware Co., there to enjoy a plunge in the cooling waters. It is said that he did not again arise to the surface after going down once.

WORK PROGRESSING ON NEW RAILWAY

Work on the new railway is now going steadily ahead and about one hundred men are engaged in the fills around Morrisons Brook and in laying concrete waterways. Property owners are busy removing their houses from the line and with the exception of Henry Kellys and George Watts all the houses are now moved as far as the Miramichi Foundry. This building lies directly in the way and the work of removal will begin very soon.

The new station is to lie almost in a straight line continuation of Water street beyond the Mac Naughton fountain, and a fine wide access will be provided here for pedestrians and teams. A second entrance that will be convenient for West End people will be almost opposite Lobban Ave. A wide right of way has been bought here and this will connect handsily with the freight sheds also.—Gazette.

Go about the streets of Campbellton, or past the school ground, and let your observant eyes critically inspect the children. See their robust healthy bodies, their bright intelligent faces, and watch the elasticity of their movements and their splendid childish manners. Surely you will agree with the writer that in these boys and girls the community has the right to be very proud. Yes, we will readily agree that the parents of such children have the right to be vain.

But, what about the future careers of these same children and especially of these boys? Are you rearing them for citizenship in your community and Province? Or, are you merely preparing them to swell the currents of emigration into Western Canada and the United States? Stop a moment and think. What inducements are you providing for the future, for your boys to remain in this vicinity? What avenues of usefulness have you opened or are you about to open, for the benefit of your children? Think, think, think: Only a few of these boys will be needed for the professions—medicine and surgery, law, teaching etc. Only a few, perhaps one out of fifteen of the others, but few will be wanted as merchants, bankers and brokers, perhaps three out of fifteen. Now what are the ten or eleven out of fifteen to do when the age of independent action shall arrive for them? Seriously, my friends: do you suppose those ten will be content to be day laborers with axe or canthook, with pike-pole or hand-spike? Do you? Do you not know that the majority of them, eight out of ten, will migrate to other lands where opportunities invite with alluring calls to independence of life and action, unless there shall be provided sufficient of such allurement to satisfy them here?

Go where you will in Western Canada and the United States and you will find sons of New Brunswick settled for life, and prosperous and influential citizens of these adopted communities. Why did they go away from their native Country? Nothing to do to assure them independent prosperous careers! No avenues open for that usefulness that would satisfy young man-hood's aspirations, and so they went away to become a part, a noble part, in most instances, of the vigorous strength of distant communities in which to use the word "Can't" is treason to the public weal.

Do you intend that these ruddy faced, bright eyed, strong limbed boys who throng the streets and school grounds of Campbellton shall be compelled like the others, to search for opportunities in far away regions; or, do you intend while yet you may, be prepare opportunities for their ambitious natures in the vicinity of their child-hood homes?

Your natural resources are boundless. In 1900 the Restigouche Valley on both shores, from Inch Arran to Tide Head, exported nearly eight hundred thousand dollars' worth of products to the United States and to trans-Atlantic and South Atlantic countries. Yet, with even that wonderful result, the surface only of your marvelous resources has been touched. You have a dense forest, a hundred miles square, of the world's best timbers, reaching close up to your town limits. The hills in sight from your verandahs are full of minerals, clay and stone that invite exploitations. All about you are facilities for the development of power, for the establishment of factories and a score of other industrial activities. The men who went on to the bleak plains of the West and without a semblance of your own natural advantages built the teeming cities and throbbing industries that excite the admiration of the world, would, if located here in your places, and with all these limitless natural resources at their command, convert this beautiful valley on both sides of this resourceful water into a scene of enchantment.

The most baleful word in the Anglo-Saxon tongue is "Can't". It is at once the prolific cause of non-progress and decay. It never, never, never, was a benefit, but always a curse. Why do you not club together and establish a pulp mill or mills, a furniture factory, an implement factory, a creamery, brick kilns and cement works? "Can't!" Why not unite your influence and bridge or compel the bridging of the Restigouche? "Can't!" Why not unite the power of your influence with that of the railways and, bridging the St. John at St. Leonards and the Restigouche at Campbellton, make your town a great railway and trade centre? "Can't."

Oh, stop using that measly word, "Can't." You CAN and you SHOULD do all these things and, instead of

having a community that your young men will deem it for their best interest to leave develop and have a community in which not only they will want to remain, but to which the energetic and splendid young man-hood of the ill-favored communities will want to come and settle.

You love your community and you want it to prosper and progress. Then look out for your boys and give them and, through them, your community some chance for the future.

CAPITAL AND LABOR

(Toronto World, May 11, 1911)

In no civilized country is the interminable struggle between organized labor and organized capital more continuously severe than in the United States. The opposing forces are once more in close combat over responsibility for the explosion that wrecked the offices of the Los Angeles Times in October last, and for other explosions which have occurred in various parts of the republic during recent years. According to that section of the press which more or less represents the capitalist class, these explosions were directed against buildings where structural iron was used; the imputations being that they were attributable to the workers' union and intended to intimidate the employers who maintain "open shops." The recent arrest of a prominent official of the International Association of Bridge and Structural Iron Workers and two other men charged with complicity in the Los Angeles explosion, and the circumstances connected with the former's removal from Indiana to California, have stirred labor circles to their depths.

Of equal gravity are the counter charges made by the spokesmen of organized labor. In brief they claim that responsibility for the explosions, in so far as they were due to external causes, rests with the capitalistic combines that have united in a supreme effort to crush trades unionism in the United States. They charge a private detective conspiracy in connection with which the law governing the extradition of accused parties from one state to the jurisdiction of another, and the rights of the accused to legal advice and to a hearing in court have been entirely disregarded. Whatever may be thought of these charges and cross charges, the mere fact that they have been made testifies to the unhealthy state of the industrial and social conditions of the United States, and it would be wrong to minimize the irregularities alleged to have occurred in the Indiana procedure. Wealthy malefactors have succeeded in fighting extradition for years, and there cannot be one law for the rich and another for the worker. Meantime, the prudent course is to suspend judgment until the real facts have been ascertained.

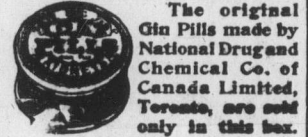

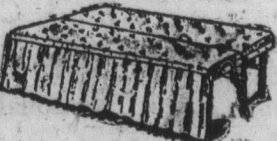

GREAT AVIATION EXHIBITION IN ENGLAND

London, May 13.—The most remarkable exhibition of aviation seen in England was given today under the auspices of the parliamentary aerial defence committee. Fourteen airmen, including Claude Grahame-White, Mons. Bleriot, the French aviator, Robert Loraine, the actor, and Captain F. S. Cody, performed various feats designed to show the utility of aeroplanes for war. Four styles of bi-planes were used.

In addition to the bi-plane two styles of mono-planes were employed. The manoeuvres were held at Hendon just outside the city. J. Armstrong Drexel, who participated, had a mishap in which he was considerably bruised and cut and his machine smashed. He was starting a flight when he dropped from a height of a few feet. He rose from the wreckage and was able to walk from the field.

The tests included scouting, dispatching carrying hand bomb throwing by Grahame-White who dropped a hundred pound missile and balls. Messages were taken to Aldershot and replies brought back. A fleet of aeroplanes armed with machine guns attacked an army dirigible balloon.

W. M. AITKEN LAUGHS AT CHARGES.

London, May 16.—On his arrival here yesterday W. Max Aitken, promoter of the Canada Cement Company, was interviewed by the Canadian Associated Press in regard to Sir Sanford Fleming's inquiry into the Canada Cement Company's \$12,000,000 alleged misappropriation. Mr. Aitken exclaimed laughingly: "It's a lot of money, I suppose you expected to find some of us knocking about here." He added, more seriously: "I have nothing to say. I have ceased treating this gentleman seriously for a long time past." Mr. Aitken added, he had not been a director of the Cement company for some time.

RE BANKS

Mr. Lewis of Huron has introduced in the Canadian Commons a bill "To amend the Criminal Code respecting banks," which would make compulsory an eight hour day for bank employees except for tellers (whose hours are shorter) and on balance days, and would severely punish any undue preference to certain creditors, the making of any consideration other than salary from bank with which one is employed, and assisting in the creation of any watered stock in the institution. "Dr. Sprule suggested that in the bill 'The bankers' embargo on marriage should be made a punishable offence.' He would place 'A very severe penalty on this interference with personal rights, which should not be allowed to exist in any civilized country.' The comments of Mr. Lewis and Dr. Sprule were, we understand, vigorously applauded by members on both sides of the house, but the leaders were, evidently, silent, and we doubt whether the gist of the bill will be adopted by the government in their new banking act now being prepared. The Banks have far too many privileges and far too much power in this country. Their autocratic powers should be greatly reduced, or, better still, the banking institutions of the country should be run directly by the government for the benefit of the whole people.
