STEADY GROWTH OF CAMPBELLTON

Building Permits Issued For Past Season Amount to About \$150,000.

During the past season there has been considerable activity in building. Although the cost of all kinds of building materials has been high, yet a number of fine residences have been erected and also the new Roseberry school and the Hotel Dieu Hospital. The total building permits issued amount to about \$150,000 as follows:

Water Question Up to Council Will Invest in Victory Loan Other Matters.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor presiding. There were present Councillors Bissett, Matthews, Dickie, McKay and Campbell. The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved. A number of communications in reference to various matters of minor importance were read and dealt with. The transfer of lease of the Thompson lot on Riverside Park, and the Melan lot on Roseberry street for the Fire Station, were read and ordered to be recorded. Reports of the different departments were read and accounts ordered paid. When the matter of paying insurance premiums came up Councillor Bissett said he thought it was an appropriate time for the Council to get information as to the cost of a sprinkler system for the electric light plant, and moved that the Clerk be authorized to get prices on same. Motion carried. **WATER SHORTAGE.** The matter of the present shortage of water was then taken up. Councillor Dickie, chairman of the Water & Sewerage Committee stated that he had been out of town for the past month and was not conversant with the matter, but on his request Councillor Bissett had been looking after this matter and knew just how the matter stood. Councillor Bissett stated that the water shortage was very serious. We had not had any heavy rain since early summer. The reservoir and the Smith Lake reserve had all been used up. COUNTRY NEEDS BIG RAINS

Drought Throughout Bay of Fundy Our County Severe—Farmers Obligated to Haul Water.

The present summer and fall has probably been the driest experienced on the North Shore within the memory of its citizens and consequently there has been a great shortage of water. In the country districts we hear of farmers hauling water as much as five miles. Wells, springs and brooks which have never been known to dry are this fall dried up. In Campbellton the supply of water supply from the town reservoir and Smith Lake has been practically used up and the town is suffering for water. A supply is being stored in the reservoir in case of fire, but no extra precautions against fire and the water is being used. While the rest of the province has been favored with plenty of rain of late, Restigouche seems to have been passed over and we have been experiencing the finest fall in many years. There has been little frost so far and the days have been bright and warm, a regular Indian summer. **RAIN.** Rain began to fall Wednesday evening and continued all night and Thursday. Everybody welcome. **RESTIGOUCHE MAN DIES AT TORONTO.** Mr. George Haddow Lang Identified With Restigouche's Progress Dead. Dalhousie, N. B., Nov. 12.—This community was shocked today when it became known that Rev. J. H. McLean pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church, had been notified by de-patch that Mr. George Haddow had passed away on Tuesday in Toronto. The late Mr. Haddow was born in Miramichi eighty-six years ago. He came to Restigouche early in life and engaged into mercantile business. During sixty years he conducted an up-to-date general store in Dalhousie, built several ships and for a number of years he represented Restigouche Co. in Federal politics. After his retirement from business he was for many years in the Customs. For a long period he acted as Notary Public for the Port of Dalhousie and in April 1911 he was nominated by the Norwegian government a diploma and originally was conferred upon him by King Haakon, and later by King George, giving him unprecedented length of time in the Royal Norwegian Order of St. Olaf. In connection with the St. John's Presbyterian Church Sunday School, of which Mr. George Haddow was pastor the office of superintendent for more than half a century with commendable service. He was always in his place. He was a leader in all that tended to promote the best interests of the youth of Dalhousie. In the decline of life Mr. Haddow had gone to reside in Toronto and thus he with his children. Beside his wife he is survived by three daughters and one son, Rev. Robert Haddow, B. D., Editor of the Presbyterian and Westminster Toronto. CANADA AND THE EIGHT HOUR DAY

Objections Offered by Delegates From Dominion—Assent Would be Suicidal

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—S. R. Parsons Canadian employes' delegate has frankly stated the case of Canadian employes on the eight hour day. Unless the United States first assented to any such international convention, so Mr. Parsons informed the international labor conference this afternoon, it would be suicidal for Canada to assent.

"We have in Canada," Mr. Parsons said, "eight or nine million of population. Our industries are young. They lack capital. We are struggling. We are alongside a magnificent country of one hundred and ten millions of people with great industries and great wealth. Until the United States has shown Canada must be patient."

Mr. Parsons did not object to the eight hour day per se. He objected on the ground of present world-wide conditions and the necessity of production.

"We cannot," he went on, "bring forward in any country of the world to day any regulations which are not based on a proper economic footing and do with them what we call social justice. The thing cannot be done. The two things do not work together. Let me just state that if we attempt this it is the surest way of wrecking our civilization, and we have the best civilization to-day that the world has ever brought forth. Let us take care of it and mend it here and there, but not destroy it."

BRITISH PLEDGE TO ESTABLISH JEWISH HOMELAND STANDS.

Lord Curzon, Foreign Secretary, assures Zionists that there has been no change in the policy of His Government regarding disposition of Palestine.

Lord Curzon, who recently succeeded Sir Arthur James Balfour as British Secretary for Foreign Affairs, has issued an official declaration to the Zionists Movement, assuring them that his Government stands by the pledge made on Nov. 2, 1917, by his predecessor, to aid them in the establishment of a National Jewish Homeland in Palestine.

This declaration, which electrified a mammoth audience which had assembled on Sunday night in the London Opera House, to celebrate the second anniversary of the issuance of the historic Balfour declaration, reads as follows:

"I have great pleasure to assure you, if such an assurance is necessary—and I cannot believe that it should be necessary—that no change has taken place in the policy of the British Government in reference to the establishment of a Jewish National Homeland in Palestine."

The declaration by Lord Curzon was read to the mass meeting by Lord Walter Rothschild, who presided, and to whom the original Balfour Declaration was addressed.

Another reassuring message to the mass-meeting came from Lord Curzon, who is a member of the Mandatory Commission of the Peace Conference. Lord Cecil expressed his confidence that notwithstanding all difficulties of the present situation, the Zionist Palestine project would prevail because it contains elements essential to the peace of the world, and that the time was rapidly approaching when the Zionists would be able to begin the practical work of laying the foundations for the Jewish Homeland. Of similar tenor was a message or Sir Alfred Mond, British Minister of Public Works, who declared that the delay in the ratification of peace had temporarily delayed the realization of Zionism. The attitude of the Allied Powers toward it, however, had not undergone the least modification, and the delay had not impaired its value in the slightest.

Among the speakers at the anniversary mass-meeting were Nahum Sokolow, of the Political Committee of the Zionist World Organization, and Capt. James Rothschild, who has just returned from Palestine, where he was an officer in the Jewish Legion. Capt. Rothschild spoke in Hebrew, which language he acquired while in Palestine.

A NOISE LIKE A MONKEY WRENCH
San Francisco, Nov. 10.—When attempts were made to play the massive pipe organ in the great civic auditorium here Saturday the strangest kind of shattering shrieks and wails emerged from the instrument. It was found that Uncle, a monkey in an exhibit at the auditorium, had broken out of her cage and in climbing around on top of the organ had fallen into one of the pipes. Nucie was nearly dead when part of the organ was dismantled and she was rescued.

Vessels Not Available for Shipment of Supplies and Winter Near.

Quebec, Nov. 8.—Reports of distress have been received here from points in the Lower St. Lawrence on the north and south shore, especially on the Gaspé coast and at Esquimaux Point. Merchants here have large shipments of supplies which they cannot send out as there are no vessels available. An application has been made to the government to have the steamer M. de la Rivière to deliver supplies to the people before the close of navigation.

MISTAKEN FOR DEER, IS SHOT

Arthur Duplisea Killed by Brother While Sunday Shooting.

St. John, N. B. Nov. 10.—Arthur Duplisea, mistaken for a deer, was fatally shot by his brother, Andrew on Sunday afternoon near their home at Ennisville, N. B. The bullet struck him in the jaw and he died before he could be got to the railway line. He was formerly a C.P.R. brakeman. He leaves a young wife and child.

YOUNG WOMAN HELD AS WITNESS IN OCEAN LIMITED ROBBERY CASE

Quebec, Nov. 4.—The police have arrested a young woman named Lauretta Hamel, who is a close friend of J. T. R. Broteau, one of the men charged with the hold up of the mail coach on the Ocean Limited train in September.

This young woman's apartments were unexpectedly searched a few days after the robbery and among her possessions was found the cardboard container of an automatic revolver which the girl immediately said belonged to Proteau, but which she said had been left with her by Proteau months before the robbery. She has now been arrested as a material witness in the case.

THE FIRST DEACONESS.

To Miss Mamie Firth, Campbellton, a sister of Rev. Alex. Firth, Douglasville, belongs the distinction of becoming the first Presbyterian deaconess in Northern New Brunswick. Miss Firth was designated a few days ago by the Presbytery of Miramichi and the board of management of her home church has secured her services as assistant in the work of the pastorate to their minister, Rev. Hugh Miller, St. Andrew's Church, Campbellton. The deaconess is a new order in the Presbyterian Church, but seems to be well established and looks as if it had come to stay.—Chatham World.



**LIGHTHOUSE KEEPER
AND NEPHEW PERISH**

Believed They Were Drowned
While Trying to Save
Boat.

Quebec, Nov. 10.—News reached
here yesterday that J. B. Desjardins,
lighthouse-keeper at Kabouraska Is-
land, and his nephew and assistant,
Joseph Desjardins, had perished dur-
ing the violent gale and snowstorm
last Thursday. The first intimation
received here that something had hap-
pened was a notification on Saturday
to B. J. Kaine, superintendent of
light-houses, that there was no light
at Kabouraska lighthouse, rowed out
to the island on Saturday and dis-
covered that both the keeper and his
assistant were missing. It is presumed
that when the storm was at its height
on Thursday the yacht tender which
was anchored between the island and
the mainland, broke away from her
moorings and the keeper and his as-
sistant with the hope of saving her
followed in a small row boat. The
boat must have been swamped as no
trace of it has been found.
The tender has since been recovered.

The G.G.S. Druid has been despatched
to the scene and further particu-
lars as to the fate of the two men
is expected today.

**HENRY FORD INVENTS A
FORD MOTOR STEEL CAR**

Detroit, Oct. 27.—An internal com-
bustion engine to be used on street
railway cars upon which Henry Ford
has been working for several months
has been completed, and with it he
expects to revolutionize transpor-
tation by the street railway and inter-
urban route.

It had its first try-out in the Ford
experimental shops at Dearborn.

Both Mr. Ford and his general
manager, Charles E. Sorensen, said
they were delighted with the trial
tests and confident that their con-
servative estimates as to power and
speed will be considerably exceeded.
Henry Ford said: "I am convinced
that this motor will make it possible
for cheaper—and faster transpor-
tation." Charles Sorensen said: "Mr.
Ford and I have worked long and
hard to get a finished job which will
cut weight 50 per cent. We have
won."

Present plans call for the sending
of the first street car over the Michi-
gan Central tracks at the speed of
seventy miles an hour. It will leave
just ahead of the Wolverine flyer,
fast train between Detroit and Chi-
cago, and race it for a time record.
The test will probably be made within
forty days.

The power unit which will move
the car represents a new combination
of functions. It is a motor, an air
compressor, an electrical generator
and a heating and lighting plant all
in one.

All operations necessary for the
control of the car are centered in the
motor. And all this is accomplished
with a 75 per cent. reduction in
weight as compared with the power
and control equipment of the ordi-
nary electric car.

The motor is of the double opposed
type and generates its own electric-
ity for ignition and lighting. Oppos-
ing pistons are linked to the same
throw and entirely new designs of
linked rods are used.

The power that moves the car al-
so compresses the air for the brakes,
generates electric current for the
lighting and signal system, while a
draws air in through the housing of
the motor, where it is heated and
then exhausted through heating pipes
to warm the car. This point—the
heating of a car by motor exhaust—
is very interesting.

Another feature of the new car
will be the front and rear drive; the
power being transmitted by light
flexible shafts to both the front and
rear trucks.

The power plant of the new type of
car weighs about 1,150 pounds. The
whole car will weigh, when completed
about seven tons, as compared with
the twelve to fourteen tons of the
present type of electrically equipped
car.

The rate of speed to be produced
will depend entirely upon the rate de-
sired. The car can make seventy miles
an hour. It is a matter of gearing
to reduce that to whatever rate of
speed the regulations of a city or an
inter-urban line may call for. There
will always be excess power avail-

Preble, the noted bear hunter and
trapper, is recovering from a set-to
with a big black bear, in which he re-

his long experience. He got the
bear, which is No. 129 on his list.

He was on a line of traps on Alder
stream when he found that one of
his bear traps was gone. The trail
showed that a big bear was dragging
it with the log. He hurried along the
trail and in jumping over a log ran
plump into the bear.

Before he could back out of reach
the bear hit him a terrific wallop
with his paws in the side and hip,
tearing his heavy clothing through to
the skin and inflicting deep flesh
wounds and knocking Preble all of six
feet into the bushes.

The bear made a rush at the hun-
ter but was held back by the trap and
log, and Preble who had held on to
his rifle managed to roll over and
while lying almost on his back, fired
the shot going through the bear's
brain. The animal fell almost upon
the hunter. The bear was one of the
largest seen around here for years.



To the Campbellton Graphic.
Kindly allow me space in your valuable paper to answer a letter of Murdoch Firth's in the Tribune, in answer to the soldiers having a vote in a Municipal election. I knew that the soldiers had a vote in the parish they resided in but I did not know that they could come from any part of the county and I say that it is not fair to the people.
Now as there was not contest in Grimmer, Addington or Balmoral, the soldiers could come from these parishes to the parish of Eldon or another and vote where they had no interest. As Firth says we would not know who they voted for, I agree with him but it was easy to tell who his supporters from Addington voted for as they said so in the polling booth. Mr. Firth seems to think that we could not raise the deposit but he is very much mistaken as I could have raised \$500.00 instead of \$50.00.
In regard to the Government putting everything in Mr. Copeland's and my way to elect us as Councillors, as far as I know the Government or their representatives having anything to do with a Councillor Election, if they had they could have sent us a big soldier vote.
Mr. Firth does not seem to be satisfied with the roads, well I might say that they are not the best, but as Mr. Firth was supervisor for two years and spent \$72.75 before I was appointed he could have had the roads in road shape, so the horse would not have got so bad in so short a time.
I will not say anything in regard to my work on the road, the public can judge for themselves but one thing I will say, that the money I spent was on the road and not in my pocket as I have posted a statement of the expenditure in three public places and the public can see that I did not get a large amount of money. Now I would ask Mr. Firth to let the public know what he spent in his two years and the amount of money he received. I would also ask him if he put in a bill in July 1918 for hauling the Road machine with four horses and three or four men over the road which never made the mark of the scrap. Now I think that some one besides Councillor Firth should talk of wasting money on the roads.
In regard to being bought over in Mr. Red's last election, he seems to know more about that than I do myself but I think that if the truth was told our learned Councillor has been bought and sold many times since then. Mr. Firth says that I am only out for the coming election to win a little money, out of it. Mr. Firth seems to know that there is money in elections.
As far as I am concerned in election it is not for the money, but because as my little experience in elections is that it is a loss of time and money but Mr. Firth's time don't count.
In regard to his trip to Fredericton I did not say that he got a free trip to Fredericton, but the show must have fitted him.
He seems to think that elections work on my mind and that I am liable to get a free trip to St. John. On my mind there is a place called John where Eldon could get a better Councillor.
Regarding hiring autos, I do not know what Mr. Copeland hired, he can answer that for himself but for myself I did not hire any and any who used autos for us, did it for the good of the parish.
I did not say anything against the district Clerk as with what dealings I had with him I found him to be a gentleman.
As Mr. Firth says, that if Chesser had been canvasser I would have had few votes and I think that if Chesser had not been with him he would not have got many votes in District No. 2.
As for Jas. Chesser, I have been a neighbor of his since I was a boy and the only small thing I have known him to do was when he was appointed with Murdoch Firth as a Councillor.
Now I have to ask Councillor Firth what right he had to \$19.40 for extra work assessing when he appointed three assessors and paid them \$45.00 extra besides their percentage. Now is this looking after the interest of the parish, I will stay at home the next Councillor Election as I could not vote for Murdoch Firth and face the public.
Now if any of the readers have any doubt as to his insanity they should look to the words of Solomon which says a fool is known by the multitude of his words.

HEAVY LUMBER CUT PREDICTED

Indications Point to Very Extensive Operations Throughout New Brunswick.

Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 10.—Indications at the present time point to a very heavy cut of lumber in New Brunswick during the winter which is

about to begin. The cut will be heavy on both Crown Lands and privately owned lands.

The decision to cut more lumber is said to be the result of indications in the world-market that there will be a tremendous demand for lumber next year. France and Belgium are expected to have heavy requirements for reconstruction and the United States and British markets also are expected to be under-supplied.

During the past season of navigation there has been a steady movement of manufactured lumber overseas from various New Brunswick ports but scarcity of shipping retarded that

movement to quite an extent. The shipping situation will gradually improve and the expectation is that the huge quantities of manufactured lumber which has been piled on the mill-yards all over the province, some of it for over the province, some of it for more than one season will be cleared in 1920, with much of the coming season's cut in addition.

The labor situation as far as the lumber-woods are concerned is said to be satisfactory. Men can be secured but high wages must be paid. For several seasons past woodsmen have been getting good pay and there is no
