Water Question Up to Council Will Invest in Victory Loan Other Matters.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Tuesday evening. His Worship Mayor presiding. There were present Councillors Bissett, Matthews, Dickie, McKay and Campbell.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.
A number of communications in reference to various matters of minor importance were read and dealt with.
The transfer of lease of the Thompson lot on Riverside Park, and the McLean lot on Roseberry Street for the Fire Station, were read and ordered to be recorded.
Reports of the different departments were read and accounts ordered paid.
When the matter of paying insurance premiums came up Councillor Bissett said he thought it was an appropriate time for the Council to get information as to the cost of a sprinkler system for the electric light plant, and moved that the Clerk be authorized to get prices on same. Motion carried.

WATER SHORTAGE.
The matter of the present shortage of water was then taken up.
Coun. Dickie, chairman of the Water and Sewerage Committee stated that he had been out of town for the past month and was not conversant with the matter, but on his request Coun. Bissett had been looking after this matter and knew just how the matter stood.
Coun. Bissett stated that the water shortage was very serious. We had not had any heavy rain since early summer. The reservoir and the Smith Lake reserve had all been used up.
He saw Mr. Pritchard present and he understood he had a proposition to make.

COUNTRY NEEDS BIG RAINS

Drought Throughout Bay of Fundy County Severe—Farmers Obligated to Haul Water.

The present summer and fall has probably been the driest experienced on the North Shore within the memory of the citizens and consequently there has been a great shortage of water. In the country districts we hear of farmers having to haul water as much as five miles. Wells, springs and brooks which have never before been known to dry are this fall dried up. In Campbellton the supply of water supply canal in the town, the Roseberry and Smith Lake has been practically used up and the town is suffering for water. A supply being stored in the reservoir in case of fire, but citizens are warned to take extra precautions against fire and the water shortage.

While the rest of the province has been favored with plenty of rain of late, Restigouche seems to have been passed over and we have been experiencing the finest fall in many years. There has been little frost so far and the days have been bright and warm, a regular Indian summer.

Mr. Gilbert stated that at the present time the trout were on the spawning beds and if a foot of water was drawn off they would be destroyed. His Worship asked if he would allow six inches to be drawn off and the answer was the same.
The matter of erecting an electrically driven pump at a point on Walker brook was then taken up and this was favored. However as information in reference to pumps was not at hand it was decided to adjourn until Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock.
The Council met again last evening with the Mayor and Couns. Bissett, Matheson, McKay and Campbell present.
The water outlook was reported as much improved. The superintendent stated that the reservoir was nearly full, and that water in Smith Lake was rising a little. He expected to turn on the water at 9 o'clock Thursday morning for a few hours and then the high levels would be supplied.
Coun. Bissett stated that the Shives Lumber Co. had offered the use of their steam pump from the Athol mill. This had a capacity of a little over 300 gallons per minute and could be run from the steam roller. With this installed on Walker brook, near the town a constant supply could be sustained.
On motion Coun. Bissett was authorized to procure this pump and have it installed.
Coun. McKay said he was in favor of purchasing the land of the ownership of Parker's lake and moved that the Town Solicitor be instructed to take the matter up with the Department of Lands and Mines. Motion carried.
Coun. McKay moved that \$500 to the credit of the Sinking Fund be invested in Victory Bonds—Carried.
The Town Treasurer was authorized to issue checks for the payment of purchase price as agreed of the McRae and Thompson lots.
The Clerk explained that \$20,000 for Housing Fund had been received from St. John's Presbyterian Church on Friday, Nov. 14th at 2 o'clock, P. M.
The meeting then adjourned.

RESTIGOUCHE MAN DIES AT TORONTO

Mr. George Haddow Long Identified With Restigouche's Progress Dev.

Dalhousie, N. B., Nov. 12.—This community was shocked today when it became known that Rev. J. H. McLean, pastor of St. John's Presbyterian Church, had been notified by dispatch that Mr. George Haddow had passed away on Tuesday in Toronto.
The late Mr. Haddow was born in Miramichi eighty-six years ago. He came to Restigouche early in life and engaged into mercantile business. During sixty years he conducted an up-to-date general store in Dalhousie, built several ships and for a number of years he represented Restigouche Co. in Federal politics. After his retirement from business he was for many years in the Customs.
For a long period he acted as Non-Resident Consul for the Port of Dalhousie and in April 1911 he was honored by the Norwegian government a diploma and insignia were conferred upon him by King Haakon, and named by King George, giving him an elected knighthood in the Royal Norwegian Order of St. Olaf.
In connection with the St. John's Presbyterian Church Sunday School, of which Mr. George Haddow held the office of superintendent for many years, he had been a most efficient service. He was always in his place. He was a leader in all that tended to promote the best interests of the youth of Dalhousie.
In the decline of life Mr. Haddow had gone to reside in Toronto and thus he with his children.
Beside his wife he is survived by three daughters and one son, Rev. Robert Haddow, D. D., Editor of the Presbyterian and Westminster, Toronto.
The funeral will take place in Dalhousie from St. John's Presbyterian Church on Friday, Nov. 14th at 2 o'clock, P. M.

FAMILY ROW AT OPP. CONVENTION

Not All Harmony in Ranks of Provincial Opposition Party.

(St. John Globe, Friday)

Street stories leave no room for doubting that the opposition convention decision to exclude the press from the evening session, deprived the public of particulars of a first class family row in which members of the legislature expressed very freely their opinions and related party affairs in a way that would have made most interesting and most instructive reading. The decision to shut out the press from any session of a public assembly is generally based on the idea that the things which are to be said had better be kept from the public, not because they will hurt the public, but because those who advocate secrecy are unwilling for the white light of publicity. The street stories of what happened in the convention after the press was excluded is particularly suggestive. The Standard report of the proceedings, represents Hon. J. B. Baxter as charging his St. John colleagues and the party representations in the legislature with disloyalty to the leader in the resolution moved and supported in opposition to the government's motion censuring Messrs. Murray, Baxter, Jones and Smith.

This opposition organ's report of the proceedings gives only a brief outline of the attorney general's speech, but street rumor says Dr. Baxter was very strong in his denunciation of the St. John members and very bitter in his charges of disloyalty characterizing them as hypocrites. The opposition organ does not indicate that there was any challenge of this criticism, but street rumor says the former attorney general was not only called to account by the three St. John members, but he was actually charged with having suggested the resolution he condemned and with having made amendments in the phraseology and with having endorsed and supported its passage in a party caucus at which the decision of the caucus contemplated was discussed and the very terms of the resolution considered.

It is this part of the proceedings which has for the general voter a new significance. According to stories told the Globe by various ones who were at the convention, Mr. Potts was the first to get the floor when Hon. Mr. Baxter finished. He is said to have answered the attorney general with a rattling speech in which he

pointed out that his own voice had been raised in the party caucus against the course suggested and declared Mr. Baxter had strongly urged adopting the resolution. Messrs. Murray, Jones and Smith agreeing with him that the resolution must be passed.

his disloyalty attack was a resolution endorsed by both Murray and Baxter and approved by the party caucus. Mr. Tilley, it is said, declared he had in his possession a copy of the draft resolution bearing Mr. Baxter's handwriting suggested verbal amendments. In course of his address, Mr. Tilley put upon the party leaders the full responsibility for party difficulties, and drawing a comparison between amateur and professional politicians, asked the party to decide which should rule: those who from patriotic motives were serving their party, or those who were using the party for personal ends.

Dr. Campbell is reported as going even further than his colleagues, and it is alleged, bluntly told the convention that Dr. Baxter was the one who first suggested drawing the amendment he now so scathingly condemns. His suggestion was made to Dr. Crockett, M. P. P. for York, and to himself (Mr. Campbell), as a consequence he (Campbell) prepared a resolution, submitted it to Baxter and later to Murray for their approval, and made, at Baxter's suggestion, certain phraseology amendments, and eventually moved in the House the very resolution the ex-premier and ex-attorney-general had agreed upon as advisable in the circumstances. Dr. Campbell felt it was only right, in view of Hon. Mr. Baxter's charge of party disloyalty, that the full explanation should be made.

Said one who told these facts to the Globe, neither Mr. Murray nor Mr. Baxter entered a word of denial of these statements, which directly connect the two leaders with the amendment now for the first time publicly. In the discussion, which developed over the leadership question there were many appeals to sink differences and get together. Out of these came a motion by Allan Agar, of St. John, suggesting that the leadership decision be made unanimous. As Mr. Potts instantly protested and Mr. Campbell threatened resignation of his seat the motion was withdrawn and the leadership question stands as first made about a three to one vote, the St. John members and most of the St. John delegates forming part of the minority. It is said that at least seven members of the Legislature voted against the selection of Mr. Murray as leader.

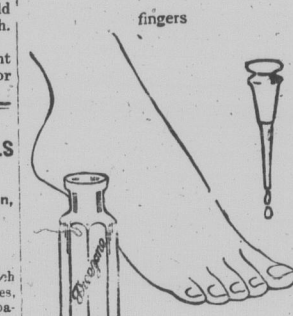

CANADA AND THE EIGHT HOUR DAY

Objections Offered by Delegates From Dominion—Assent Would be Suicidal

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—S. R. Parsons Canadian employers' delegate has frankly stated the case of Canadian employers in the eight hour day. Unless the United States first assented to any such international convention, so Mr. Parsons informed the international labor conference this afternoon, it would be suicidal for Canada to assent.

"We have in Canada," Mr. Parsons said, "eight or nine million of population. Our industries are young. They lack capital. We are struggling. We are alongside a magnificent country of one hundred and ten millions of people with great industries and great wealth. Until the United States has assented, Canada must keep silent."

Mr. Parsons did not object to the eight hour day per se. He objected on the ground of present world-wide conditions and the necessity of production.

"We cannot," he went on, "bring forward in any country of the world to day any regulations which are not based on a proper economic footing and do with them what we call social justice. The thing cannot be done. The two things do not work together."

"Let me just state that if we attempt this it is the surest way of wrecking our civilization and we have the best civilization to-day that the world has ever brought forth. Let us take care of it and mend it here and there, but not destroy it."

BRITISH PLEDGE TO ESTABLISH JEWISH HOMELAND STANDS.

Lord Curzon, Foreign Secretary, assures Zionists that there has been no change in the policy of His Government Regarding Disposition of Palestine.

Lord Curzon, who recently succeeded Sir Arthur James Balfour as British Secretary for Foreign Affairs, has issued an official declaration to the Zionists Movement, assuring them that his Government stands by the pledge made on Nov. 2, 1917, by his predecessor, to aid them in the establishment of a National Jewish Homeland in Palestine.

This declaration, which electrified a mammoth audience which had assembled on Sunday night in the London Opera House, to celebrate the second anniversary of the issuance of the historic Balfour declaration, reads as follows:

"I have great pleasure to assure you, if such an assurance is necessary—and I cannot believe that it should be necessary—that no change has taken place in the policy of the British Government in reference to the establishment of a Jewish National Homeland in Palestine."

The declaration by Lord Curzon was read to the mass meeting by Lord Walter Rothschild, who presided, and to whom the original Balfour Declaration was addressed.

Another reassuring message to the mass-meeting came from Lord Cecil, who is a member of the Mandatory Commission of the Peace Conference. Lord Cecil expressed his confidence that notwithstanding all difficulties of the present situation, the Zionist Palestine project would prevail because it contains elements essential to the peace of the world, and that the time was rapidly approaching when the Zionists would be able to begin the practical work of laying the foundations for the Jewish Homeland.

Of similar tenor was a message or Sir Alfred Mond, British Minister of Public Works, who declared that the delay in the ratification of peace had temporarily delayed the realization of Zionism. The attitude of the Allied Powers, toward it, however, had not undergone the least modification, and the delay had not impaired its value in the slightest.

Among the speakers at the anniversary mass-meeting were Nahum Sokolow, of the Political Committee of the Zionist World Organization, and Capt. James Rothschild, who has just returned from Palestine, where he was an officer in the Jewish Legion. Capt. Rothschild spoke in Hebrew, which language he acquired while in Palestine.

A NOICE LIKE A MONKEY WRENCH

San Francisco, Nov. 10.—When attempts were made to play the massive pine organ in the great civic auditorium here Saturday the strangest kind of shattering, shrieks and roars emerged from the instrument. It was found that Uncle, a monkey in an exhibit at the auditorium, had broken out of her cage and was climbing around on top of the organ had fallen into one of the pipes. Merchants here have large shipments of supplies which they cannot send out as there are no vessels available. An application has been made to the government to have the steamer M. de la Rivière make several trips to the Lower St. Lawrence to deliver supplies to the people before the close of navigation.

MISTAKEN FOR DEER, IS SHOT

Arthur Duplisa Killed By Brother While Sunday Shooting.

St. John, N. B. Nov. 10.—Arthur Duplisa, mistaken for a deer, was fatally shot by his brother, Andrew on Sunday afternoon near their home at Ennisville, N. B. The bullet struck him in the jaw and he died before he could be got to the railway line. He was formerly a C.P.R. brakeman. He leaves a young wife and child.

YOUNG WOMAN HELD AS WITNESS IN OCEAN LIMITED ROBBERY CASE

Quebec, Nov. 4.—The police have arrested a young woman named Lauretta Hamel, who is a close friend of J. T. R. Broteau, one of the men charged with the hold up of the mail coach on the Ocean Limited train in September.

This young woman's apartments was unexpectedly searched a few days after the robbery and among her possessions was found the cardboard container of an automatic revolver which the girl immediately said belonged to Broteau, but which she said had been left with her by Broteau months before the robbery. She has now been arrested as a material witness in the case.

THE FIRST DEACONESS.

To Miss Mamie Firth, Campbellton, a sister of Rev. Alex. Firth, Douglasville, belongs the distinction of becoming the first Presbyterian deaconess in Northern New Brunswick.

Miss Firth was designated a few days ago by the Presbytery of Miramichi and the board of management of her home church has secured her services as assistant in the work of the pastorate to their minister, Rev. Hugh Miller, St. Andrew's Church, Campbellton.

The deaconess is a new order in the Presbyterian Church, but seems to be well established and looks as if it had come to stay.—Chatham World.

The Graphic understands that Miss Firth has been engaged by a Presbyterian church in Ontario for work there.

**LIGHTHOUSE KEEPER
AND NEPHEW PERISH**

Believed They Were Drowned
While Trying to Save
Boat.

Quebec, Nov. 10.—News reached
here yesterday that J. B. Desjardins,
lighthouse-keeper at Kabouraska Is-
land, and his nephew and assistant,
Joseph Desjardins, had perished dur-
ing the violent gale and snowstorm
last Thursday. The first intimation
received here that something had hap-
pened was a notification on Saturday
to B. J. Kaine, superintendent of
light-houses, that there was no light
at Kabouraska lighthouse, rowed out
to the island on Saturday and dis-
covered that both the keeper and his
assistant were missing. It is presumed
that when the storm was at its height
on Thursday the yacht tender which
was anchored between the island and
the mainland, broke away from her
moorings and the keeper and his as-
sistant with the hope of saving her
followed in a small row boat. The
boat must have been swamped as no
trace of it has been found.

The tender has since been recovered.

The G.G.S. Druid has been despatched
to the scene and further particu-
lars as to the fate of the two men
is expected today.

**HENRY FORD INVENTS A
FORD MOTOR STEEL CAR**

Detroit, Oct. 27.—An internal com-
bustion engine to be used on street
railway cars upon which Henry Ford
has been working for several months
has been completed, and with it he
expects to revolutionize transpor-
tation by the street railway and inter-
urban route.

It had its first try-out in the Ford
experimental shops at Dearborn.

Both Mr. Ford and his general
manager, Charles E. Sorensen, said
they were delighted with the trial
tests and confident that their con-
servative estimates as to power and
speed will be considerably exceeded.
Henry Ford said: "I am convinced
that this motor will make it possible
for cheaper—and faster transpor-
tation." Charles Sorensen said: "Mr.
Ford and I have worked long and
hard to get a finished job which will
cut weight 50 per cent. We have
won."

Present plans call for the sending
of the first street car over the Michi-
gan Central tracks at the speed of
seventy miles an hour. It will leave
just ahead of the Wolverine flyer,
fast train between Detroit and Chi-
cago, and race it for a time record.
The test will probably be made within
forty days.

The power unit which will move
the car represents a new combination
of functions. It is a motor, an air
compressor, an electrical generator
and a heating and lighting plant all
in one.

All operations necessary for the
control of the car are centred in the
motor. And all this is accomplished
with a 75 per cent. reduction in
weight as compared with the power
and control equipment of the ordi-
nary electric car.

The motor is of the double opposed
type and generates its own electric-
ity for ignition and lighting. Oppos-
ing pistons are linked to the same
throw and entirely new designs of
linked rods are used.

The power that moves the car al-
so compresses the air for the brakes,
generates electric current for the
lighting and signal system, while a
draws air in through the housing of
the motor, where it is heated and
then exhausted through heating pipes
to warm the car. This point—of
heating of a car by motor exhaust—
is very interesting.

Another feature of the new car
will be the front and rear drive; the
power being transmitted by light
flexible shafts to both the front and
rear trucks.

The power plant of the new type of
car weighs about 1,150 pounds. The
whole car will weigh, when completed
about seven tons, as compared with
the twelve to fourteen tons of the
present type of electrically equipped
car.

The rate of speed to be produced
will depend entirely upon the rate de-
sired. The car can make seventy miles
an hour. It is a matter of gearing
to reduce that to whatever rate of
speed the regulations of a city or an
inter-urban line may call for. There
will always be excess power avail-

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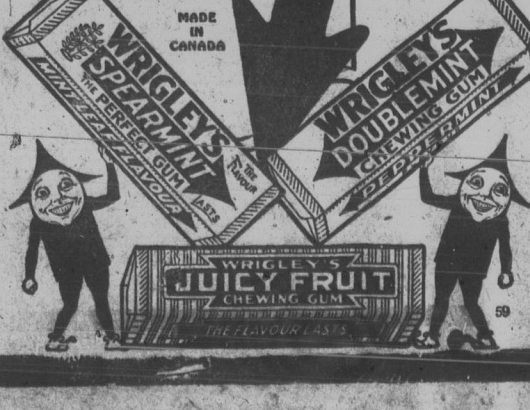

Kindly allow me space in your val-
uable paper to answer a letter of Mur-
dock Firth's in the Tribune, in answer
to the soldiers having a vote in a
Municipal election. I knew that the
soldiers had a vote in the parish they

could come from any part of the coun-
ty and I say that it is not fair to the
people.

vote where they had no interest. As
Firth says we would not know who

it was easy to tell who his supporters

00 instead of \$50.00.

about to begin. The cut will be heavy on both Crown Lands and privately owned lands.

The decision to cut more lumber is said to be the result of indications in the world-market that there will be a tremendous demand for lumber next year.

France and Belgium are expected to have heavy requirements for reconstruction and the United States and British markets also are expected to be under-supplied.

During the past season of navigation three has been a steady movement of manufactured lumber overseas from various New Brunswick ports but scarcity of shipping retarded that

movement to quite an extent. The shipping situation will gradually improve and the expectation is that the huge quantities of manufactured lumber which has been piled on the mill-yards all over the province, some of it for over the province, some of it for more than one season will be cleared in 1920, with much of the coming season's cut in addition.

The labor situation as far as the lumber-woods are concerned is said to be satisfactory. Men can be secured but high wages must be paid. For several seasons past woodsmen have been getting good pay and there is no
