The Doings of the Week Concisely Chronicled. William Scotty, a negro who died at Baltimore Monday, is said to have been 163 years old.

A horrible story comes from the lower end of Pataqui County, Georgia. A negro woman appeared to prepare a dinner, for a colored man, but the dinner was never served. She was left in a charge, cooked half dead, and served to the people. The other half of the remains were found scattered down a barrel. The negroes were frenzied on making the discovery, and seized the woman and burned her at a stake.

An Fillmore of Albert county, about three years ago changed with the post office, and \$50 bill for a stranger. The bill proved, however, to be only worth \$5. A creditor having been innocently passed beside the grange fire. The first person suspected proved his innocence. A second party was arrested, tried and acquitted, and nothing calculated to throw light on the mystery. The stage carrying the mail left for the Queen Station on Friday, and was about closing his store for the night, but was covered that his cash box containing valuable papers, besides \$100 in cash and notes of the Bank of Montreal, was stolen. Early the next morning search was made for the box, and it was found under the fence at the Queen Station. The cash and notes had been taken out. No clue to the thief was discovered till Monday afternoon when Wellington Birmingham, a lad of 17 years, was arrested in the act of robbing the store of J. L. Saunders. He admitted having robbed Mr. Kearney's store and told where the money was hidden and the notes and papers. Mr. Kearney on going to the place recovered them—the hundred dollars in cash could not be found. Mr. Kearney is a brother-in-law of Mr. J. G. Byrne of Fredericton.
