### BAPTISTS IN COUNCIL.

Annual Convention Woodstock

Missioner's Qualities

Tononto, Oct. 18.—Justice MacMahon has transmitted his private report of the Birchall case to the Secretary of State.

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The Baptist Convention resumed work this morning at 9 o'clock, President George Bentley, of Montreal, in the chair. The motion tabled last night looking to the appointment of the home mission superintendent, the secretary of foreign missions and the editor of the Canadian Baptist in open convention was lost by a large majority.

Rev. J. P. McEwan read the report of the Home Mission Board. It opened by admitting that the loss to the board of the personal influence possessed by the late superintendent, Rev. Alex. Grant, had resulted in the loss, too, of the increase of the last few years. Turning to our own field and studying the situation, the report continued:

It is palpably manifest that we are not successfully meeting our opportunities and our obligations. The causes which may have contributed to bring about these unhappy results may be multiform, but the foremost place must be assigned to our chronic dearth of ministers of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. Our supreme need at this hour is an adequate supply of men whom God has called into the work of the ministry and who are willing to pay the piece the which efficiency is possible. But not withstanding the great lack of efficient pastors, the year's work has been in many respects most gratifying. The additions to the churches have equaled those of any past year; the contributions from the mission churches, both for local and general denominational purches, both for happily on the increase, and the outlook was never more inviting.

A brief digest of the reports from some of

Mr. John Stark, treasurer of the home mission fund, reported total receipts for the year \$18,656. The sum of \$12,339 was received from subscriptions, \$2,346 from the Women's Home Mission Society and \$2,657 from legacies and the estate of the late Senator McMaster.

The following were appointed as secretaries in their respective associations of the Manitoba missions: Rev. Messrs. Murdeck, Weeks (Brockville), Hewson, Mason, McKay (London), Gilmour, Boville, Newton, Currie, Coates, Cunnings, Peer. Thomas, Sinclair, Davis, Mathews and Hastings.

The election of the Board of Home Missions was taken up, when Mr. J. S. Buchan, a barrister of Moutreal, was elected to fill the unexpired term of the late W. D. Stroud, first vice-president. The three retiring members were Hon. John Dryden, Dr. Fulton and Dr. Goodspeed were elected.

The place of evangelism in home mission work was discussed by Rev. Dr. Hutchinson. He strongly advocated the setting apart of special men for evangelistic work in the church generally, and believed that they too were needed in the mission field. Rev. The letter was identified by the witness and put in as evidence. A number of other witnesses were called and identified the soveral halters and minor articles stolen. Detective Allan's statement as to making the arrest concluded the Crown's case. For the defenoe Robert Roberts testified that on the evening in question he saw the Clouse brothers in front of his house two miles from Ingersoll. John Johnston, a blind man, gave evidence that he heard that the Clouse boys were in town, and that he met them. The Judge in summoning up the case admitted that a fairly good alibit had been made out, but the prisoners had not explained satisfactorily how they came into possession of the horses. He found the Clouse boys guilty, but the case against Chatterson had not been proved. One charge of stealing a wagon from Mr. W. Cave, and harness from Mr. J. P. Cartwright, the Clouses refused to plead, and were accordingly found guilty in a formal way.

Judge Elliot this morning passed the sentence of the court on the Clouse brothers. He pointed out that they had acknowledged being in London at the time the theft was committed and that the evidence adduced to establish an alibi was not overly of createness.

Dr. O'Connor is the third honored head. Dr. O'Connor is the third bishop of this diocese since its inception on Fcb. 21, 1856. The history of the Roman Catholic Church within the county of Middlesex dates back to 1833-40, when the old log house of worship was erected in London on the corner of Maple and fich mond streets. John Carroll and Rev. Thaddeus Kirwan. On June 29, 1851, Bishop De Charbonnel, of Toronto, confirmed 139 persons at London and 85 at the Church of St. Lawrence. As before stated the Diocese of London was erected Feb. 21, 1856, and on the 29th of the same month, the Papal Bulls were addressed to the Rev. Peter Adolphus Pinsonnes ault, priest of the Society of St. Sulpice, Montreal, naming him first bishop of the new see. He was consecrated in Montreal, May 18 following his ordination, and formally installed as bishop of London on June 29 following, the record for this year is 104 mills—a decrease of \$1 mills from last year.



THE WORKING WORLD.

General Master Workman Powderly's Appeal to His Followers.

In the current issue of the Journal of the Knights of Labor, General Master Workman Powderly submits to the order a ballot on which are printed five questions pertaining to the future position of the order in relation to politics and political action. No other question has done so much as that of politics to create factions and discord in the ranks of the knights, and this ballot, with the attending explanations and arguments, is the plan adopted by the Executive Board as a means of discovering the sense of the order upon the matter.

Mr. Powderly indicates the enormous difficulties in the way of forming a new party, points out the need of energy, fortitude, and money in such an undertaking. He argues against a new party strongly, pointing out the indifference of the people, and also that the various nationalities would be stirred up by their leaders against any new party, because it would not pander to sectional taste. "Religion will work its way in," he says, "and the Protestant and Catholic will be pitted against each other." Continuing, he says; "if all who are members of this order could co-operate with members of all other reform organizations in a new party, where they could vote for the principles of the order year after year, accipting strength each year, accepting defeat for principle's sake, and appreciate the lessons of such deteats such a move would have a good effect, for a new party is a necessity, and one or the other of the old parties must be dit ven out of the way to make room for more progressive and radical ideas."

He then goes on to explain that in such a movement the individual organization would remain intact and go on with its peculiar work. Each member could preserve intact his conscience without fear of any coercion. He submits the ballot, which contains the following questions, with spaces for the answers and the signer's name and address:

1. Do you favor the idea of turning the order into a party"

3. Should we co-operate



Some Fashions for vactica.

As regards the general acytic of material into ladies' dresses, there will be no startling changes this fall from what has been worn during the past season. The skirts will still be worn quite close and plain, although some dressmakers are introducing two slight pleats in front to take away the tied-buck look, and give a slight movement to the skirt, making them hang gracefully, whilst across the bottom of the front breadths are very full ruchings or yet nafrow pleatings under vandykes. The back breadths hang straight and plain. Another skirt which promises to become popular is known as the fourreau skirt. This is wrapped about the hips in two or three folds, the lower one being carried round to the back over the rest to form the top pleat of the slightly bouffant back breadths. This style makes the waist appear slender. The folds fall gracefully infront, but are very close fitting over the hips. It is confined over the bodice by a close-fitting belt. Extreme fashion dictates that these skirts be made long, lying an inch or two on the ground, in fact, This superfluous length is held up in the street by skirt supporters. The bodices are long, with high sleeves and flaring Medici collars. The styles are eminently appropriate for tall slender ladies. Those who are short or stout, particularly those who have short necks, must modify the prevailing styles to suit their figure, if they hope to look well. A lady with much embonpoint wears the closest of fitting undergarments, all skirts and look well in them. A very, short person should have the shoulder seams short, but should not put much fullness in the top of the sleeve.

THE CARE OF A WATCH.

There is no other personal belonging to which good care is more essential than a watch, and hardly any other that is more recklessly fil-used. The baby plays with it, the housewife lays sticky fingers upon it; it is left open at night for convenience, or subjected to alternations of heat and cold by being hung against the chimney in fine. There is the highest authority for saying that the best place for a watch is its owner's pocket. The pocket should be a clean one, and the watch should be further protected by a chamois bag. It should be a the same hour every day. Morning is the best time for it, and if it is done while the watch has still an hour or two to run, there will be much less wear and tear of the mainspring. In fact, paradoxical as it sounds, a watch will wear out twice as soon by running one day in ten, as it would if kept going all the time. Let it lie flat as little as possible. When not in the pocket, keep it hanging by its ring in a case of some soft, thick stuff, preferably of wool or silk. Never leave the case open the night through. If you need to do it for even an hour, be careful to wipe all dust from the crystal before closing it. No case ever yet made is dust-proof. If such were possible, the watch-mender's occupation would be well-nigh gone—since it is the dust sifting in that not merely clogs the wheels and turns the oil on the pivots to gum, but acts as emery would, and wears away the works until they utterly fail to keep time. Avoid jarring your watch, under pain of having it stop and stop until it grows worthesepass at timepiece. Do not pin your faith too closely on its accuracy, either. With the very best of movements, variations will sometimes occur. Heat, cold, motion, vibrations, location, any or all may make your watch fast or slow. One reason that ladies' watches are usually such bad timekeepers is that they are so irregularly worn—hence have about three da

What Ails the Oats?

There is general complaint this season that oats are not threshing out well, the yield being much below last year. In 1839 the crop certainly was heavy and the sample of grain unusually good. In the United States it is said that oats have failed generally and the American Agriculturist thinks the mild winter of 1889-90 was the cause for the following reason: The warm weather encouraged the growth of the nitrifying germs in the soil to an accessive extent, and made the land too rich in nitrogen for the crop, so that it made too much straw, encouraged rust and yielded light chaffy grain or no grain at all in the chaff. The enormous hay and clover crop of this season seems to corroborate this view, as abundant nitrogen causes a luxuriant growth of both grass and clover.
