attendance in the House of Commons today when discussion was resumed on the
motion for the second reading of the Irish
Home Rule Bill. The first speaker was
Herbert W. Paul, Liberal, who was followed by Joseph Chamberlain.

Mr. Chamberlain said that the people of
England would probably accept the bill if
they believed it would enable them to get
rid of the Irish question, but he feared it
would do nothing of the kind. The whole
of the property classes, he continued,
whatever their religion, were opposed to
the bill. Had the Prime Missiers he of the property classes, he continued, whatever their religion, were opposed to the bill. Had the Prime Minister, he asked, ever known any State to succeed when the Government was opposed by a majority of the classes owning property? Even the Nationalists, in accepting the measure, did not admit that it was a finality. He challenged the Irish leaders to say whether they accepted the principles in the bill, affirming the veto of the crown on advice of the British Ministry, and preventing the Irish Parliament from dealing with external trade. Were these ken as final or were the financial clauses ondering Ireland liable to increased taxanon for war and other purposes connected ith Imperial policy accepted as final accre was absolutely uothing final about

the bill. As soon as an Irish Parliament should be formed they would require it to be patched up again. Did anybody consider the so-called safeguards in the bill worth anything if the Irish majority was determined to disregard them? True, the British Parliament could enforce them by civil war, but not otherwise. (Conservative cheers.) The only safeguard the Government had was the good feeling and generosity of the Irish leaders and people, and if the Government had the courage of their convictions they ought to sweep away

and it the Government had the weep away their convictions they ought to sweep away the so-called safeguards in the bill. But probably Mr. Gladstone still suspected the good intentions of the men to whom he good intentions of the men to whom he was maneuvering to give the government of Ireland. These were the imen about whom he formerly said that they preached the gospel of plunder, and were marching through rapine to the dismemberment of the empire. The present Chancellor of the Exchequer had denounced them as preaching the doctrines of treason and murder. SERIOUS LOSS TO TORONTO. Legal Decision in Re Water Rates, Involving a Loss of \$33,408 Yearly.

Toronto, April 10.—The Supreme Court of Canada has just dealt Toronto a very serious blow. The city has always refused to allow a discount on water rates on property exempted from taxation. The Dominion Government took exception to this and demanded the regular discount. This the city refused. The Government then entered suit for the amount and the courts decided in favor of the city. The matter was then taken to the Supreme Court, and judgment was given against the city on Saturday.

This decision virtually means that all exempt property in the city will now be entitled to the 60 per cent. discount. The amount of water taxes received from exempt property is \$54,014. If 60 per cent. is taken off this, it will mean an annual loss to the city of \$32,408. This last a mount, capitalized at 4 per cent., represents a sum of \$810,218 50.

World's Fair Workmen Inaugurate a General Strike.

All Differences Amicably Settled in

Better Terms.

Chicago, April 10.—To say that a general and protracted strike of men employed about the buildings in Jackson Park would be unfortunate is putting it mildly. Two or three days' delay in the work might make it impossible for the management to keep its promise to the public that everything would be complete on May 1. Work must go on without interruption. The general opinion is that it'is the plain duty of all concerned to come together to discuss the points at issue calmly and amicably and arrive at an agreement without loss of time.

THE STRIKE GROWS.

About 9 o'clock 2,000 men had quit work.

An hour later 1,500 electrical workers went out. Then orders were issued to the uniformed Columbian Guards to remove delegates found actively soliciting men to quit work. This gave rise to numerous conflicts, but officers after a half-hour's work succeeded in forcing the men who were not at work across the street, where they held them.

Last Tuesday the Carpenters' Council presented its annual scale for employing contractors to sign. Most of them in the city and at the exhibition grounds agreed, the main provisions being 40 cents and hour as the minimum wages and eight hours to constitute a day. The Exposition Company was paying these prices, but refused to sign a clause requiring the employment of union men only. J. B. Cogswell, president of the Carpenters' Council, then ordered a strike of carpenters. The strike proved a practical failure, and most of the men returned to work during the past week. The matter was carried to the Building Trades' Council and on Saturday a manifest to the exposition managers was prepared, which threatened that unless the demands of the carpenters were acceded to a general strike carried by resorted to this morning. The threatened that unless the demands of the carpenters were acceded to a general strike would be resorted to this morning. The manifesto was presented to President Higginbotham on Saturday night. He read it carefully and said he would do nothing whatever. To-day's strike was the result.

Before 1 p.m. tully 4,000 men were out, including probably over a dozen different trades. One-third of the employes of the installation department, 200 in number, declared a strike and promptly quit work. The men engaged as teamsters have been receiving \$1.60 per day, and this morning they demanded \$2. This was refused, whereupon a strike was ordered.

The strike inaugurated at the World's Fair grounds this morning was amicably settled to night at a meeting of the Council of Administration with the executive committee of the Building Trades Council. The whole trouble is settled so far as the Exposition Company is concerned, but there are, however, several contractors on the grounds who must sign the agreement before their men will return to work. There are 2,000 men who will not return to work in the morning on this account. A committee will be at work early endeavoring to get these contractors to sign the agreement which will put these men at work and canaly completion.

LOOKS GLOOMY FOR THE HULL STRIKERS.

LONDON, April 11.—The situation in Hull to-day is quite gloomy for the strikers and to judge from present indication the Shipping Federation will win in its struggle to employ such men, union or non-union as its members please. Four hundred additional non-union men arrived in Hull to-day to take the places of union men who had quit work. There are now altogether 2,000 non-unionists at work 'at one shop and it is thought no assaults will be made upon them as they are protected by dragoons and policemen.

### THE BOOK OF BOOKS.

The Western Ontario Bible Society's Annual Meeting.

Enthusiasm and Harmony-Addresse by Rev. Dr. Antiff and Rev. W. J. Clark-Earnest Pleas for the Dissemination of God's Book -A Kindly Vote of Thanks.

The annual meeting of the Western Onstario Bible Society was held in Victoria Hall last night. On the platform were scated Rev. Dr. Sanderson (chairman), Rev. Stephen Bond (Petrolea), Rev. Dr. Antliff, Rev. Walter Rigsby, Rev. M. P. Antliff, Rev. Walter Rigsby, Rev. M. P. Talling, Rev. W. J. Clark, Rev. J. R. Gundy, Mr. John Cameron and Mr. 4x. A. Somerville. An extemporized choir was also on the platform, under the leadership of Mr. W. C. Barron.

After prayer and Scripture reading by Rev. Messrs. Bond and Talling, the chairman, Rev. Dr. Sanderson, spoke briefly. The annual meeting was of especial importance this year, he said, inasmuch as amendments were about to be submitted to the constitution. There was to be, in addition, the election of efficers. The amendments to the constitution, about to be submitted, wore called into existence by conflicting views of devout men about the society work. Their views did not harmonize and it was thought very desirable that some basis might be reached which would secure unity of action and earnestness of co-operation among those in connection with the Bible Society. He had received a communication from Dean Innes in which the latter expressed himself as heartily indorsing all that had been done during the year, and promising his hearty co-operation with the society. The dean would have been present himself but for increased duties caused by the absence of the bishop.

The amended clauses in the constitution were then read by the honorary secretary.

VARYING VIEWS

As to the Best Means of Advancing the Cause of Prohibition.

[Special to the Advertiser.]

Toronto, April 10.—At a meeting of prohibitionists held in the Legislature buildings last night, a divergence of opinion developed between the Dominion Alliance and the Women's Christian Temperance Union as opposed to the advanced prohibitionists, Royal Templars of Temperance and other temperance societies.

The first-named associations desire to take a plebiscite on the question, and the latter bodies favor Mr. Marter's bill in the Legislature for the abolition of liquorselling by retail.

The Legislature of the Northwest Terri tories recently addressed President Van Horne on the subject of the freight rates charged on wheat and coal by the C. P. R. Company. Complaint was made that the rates were too high to enable the farmers of the territories to live in reasonable comfort, and a request was made that they should be reduced. How Best Can Prohibition be Obtained?

The "Advertiser" Elicits Views Various Canadians.

A Plebiscite, Woman Suffrage and Other Aids Discussed.

A good deal of discussion has taken place in recent months with regard to the proper course to be pursued in order to secure the prohibition of the liquor traffic. During the next year, the question will be a decidedly live one, both in Provincial and in Dominion politics. The ADVERTISER has therefore undertaken to communicate with leading citizens in various parts of the country, with the object of briefly elucidating their views regarding this important question. Politicians in public life were not addressed. Our object was more for the purpose of eliciting views that would guide the temperance leaders and men in public position to a proper course in dealing with this most important question. The circular sent out from this office was in the following terms:

following terms:

"Dear Sir—There is a sufficiently strong sentiment in Canada in favor of either prohibition or restriction of the liquor traffic to effect the object desired, if that sentiment, now somewhat at loose-ends, can be properly combined. Will you give us briefly your views (either affixing your name, which we prefer, or not, as you choose) on the enclosed postal card, on the following points:

"I. Is the country ripe for prohibition? That is, if prohibition were passed, is there a sufficient public opinion in its favor to make it a workable enactment?

"2. If it be assumed, for the sake of argument, that there is a sufficiency of favorable public opinion, but a public opinion at present comparatively ineffective because uncombined; in what way can it be effectively combined?

tively combined?

"3. In the Canadian House of Commons "3. In the Canadian House of Commons there are 215 members, the great proportion of whom are, well, not exactly hostile, but indifferent to the question of prohibition. The same state of affairs exists in the legislative bodies of the United States. In what way can the adverse or indifferent majority be turned into a majority favorable to our views?

"4. Would giving the franchise to women help?

"We all admit it to be 'a hydra-headed monster,' that 'men should vote as they pray,' and all that sort of thing; but the reverberations of rhetoricians, well enough so far, need to be backed up in practical ways.

WASHINGTON, April 10.—Senator Butler
(S. C.) reported from the committee on
interstate commerce a resolution authorizing that committee to inquire whether or
not the methods prevailing in the transportation of freight and passengers on the

shippers and transportation companies,
justify or require a repeal or modification
of section 5 of the Interstate Commerce
Act, which possible pooling under any

Alleged C. P. R. Plan to Develop Passenger Trafile.

It is stated in Montreal that the Canadian Pacific Railway is about to develop its Quebec passenger traffic considerably. New steamers drawing from 27 to 30 feet will be put on the Atlantic route, and for their accommodation a wharf is to be built to which they can approach in all states of the tide. Passengers who wish to stay over will be accommodated in the C. P. R. Hotel, while those who wish to proceed west will merely have to cross the street to the C. P. R. station. Orders have been received at the M. C. R. shops, St. Thomas, to fit 500 freight cars with automatic coupler. This is in consequence of the U. S. law requiring all freight cars to be so fitted. all the tools and the laborer can produce
nothing without them. In the early part
of this century we had individualism, in
which every man worked for himself. But
through the invention of steam power the
tools of the workman had to give way to
the large manufactories. Individualism
gave way to organized industry, in which
the capitalist supplied the machinery and
took all the profit. The number of tabprers
increased. The income was put in the
hands of the few. The 7,000,000 laborers
in England received about £630,000,000 per
year, or about £80 per male adult. These
7,000,000 laborers, reckoning them as representing four persons each, mrke 28,000,000
of the entire
population. The income of the whole
country is £1,500,000,000, so that twofiths of the whole income is given to 28,
000,000 of the people, and three-fifths to
the remaining 2,000,000. There surely is
no righteousness in a system that gives this
profit of industry to the few and makes the
many live in doubt of that promise which
says, "Thy bread shall be given thee, thy



### MONTREAL MERCHANTS COMPLAIN

Of Unfair Treatment by Customs Officials

-The Government's Botch Work

Acknowledged by the

Controller.

Montreal, April 10.—A large number of wholesale merchants and importers met N. Clarke Wallace, Controller of Customs, this morning to urge upon the Government the adoption of some scheme to give a uniform appraisement of customs. The complaint of the trade was that the customs department did not charge uniform customs fees at the different ports of entry, and that Montreal merchants paid higher customs dues than did outside places. Toronto, Hamilton and London were mentioned as ports of entry where in some lines the customs appraisers passed goods at a lower valuation than Montreal merchants could obtain. The Controller of Customs admitted that the grievance of the merchants was in many respects correct. He said the Government was now endeavoring to improve the working of the Customs Act, and that it would try to secure some uniformity of appraisement.

Rev. Mr. Rigsby's Views.




