The Prince of Wales in proposing the toast to Lord Durraven recalled the fact that they had atudied together at Oxford. Out of Work.

London, Dec. 12.—Thousands of unemplayed workingmen of London met at Tower Hill to-day and listened to addresses by James Keir Hardie, a Socialist member of Parliament, Frank Smith and others. Mr. Hardie said he intended to move the adjournment of the House of Commons to-Mr. Hardie said he intended to move the adjournment of the House of Commons to-day in order to call the attention of Parliament to the condition of the unemployed. Upon the conclusion of the speech-making the crowd marched to Hyde Park. A number of red flags were displayed. Several speeches were made in Hyde Park after which the procession was re-formed and started on the way back to Tower Hill. As the men marched through Oxford street the police captured the most offensive banner that was being carried in the lines. The men were allowed to march through Cheapside, but subsequently when they were ordered to disperse by the police they refused to do so. The police charged the crowd, and after a slight resistance succeeded in dispersing it. Traffic was stopped for a short time.

SIR RICHARD CARTWRIGHT AT TORONTO:
SIR Richard Cartwright gave an address Tuesday evening before the Young Men's Liberal Club of Toronto. President Frank Pedley occupied the chair, and there was a good attendance. Sir Richard, in his introductory remarks, expressed approval of the general principles on which the Canadian system of government was based, but declared we could never have really represent political conditions. He was very severe in his condemnation of the protective system, which he declared was a species of slavery. Interference with the rights of the individual such as protection necessitated was justifiable only in cases of absolute necessity such as never existed here. "I never had the benefits of any further educational advantages than were afforded in the common schools of my natal town," he said, "After having apprenticed myself to a hatter at the age of 17, I continued a general line of study, including extensive reading upon historical, literary, political and social subjects."

"When did you commence your lecturing career?"

"I was scarcely in my twenties when I began to speak before religious societies connected with the various churches in Winterport. This diversion from the ordinary routine of business largely claimed my attention for several years. Gradually I extended my range of subjects. I delivered several lectures on literary topics. In 1878 I left Maine and went to Iowa, where I remained until 1884. During my sojourn in the west I became actively identified with the temperance movement. On returning to my native State I placed my services at the disposal of the W. C. T. U. committees, and have since been lecturing under their auspices."

"What is the motive which actuates you mostly in the discussion of this question?"

"My idea is that while the sentimental side of temperance may be right, the scientific and practical phase should receive wider considerations than at present. The men who are opposing alcoholism are not mere sentimentalists and dreamers; they are carnest, practical, thinking men. It is necessary, then, that we should occupy more time in appeals to the reason of our hearers than to awakening their emotional faculties."

-It is now said that Mr. Richard Tooley, East Middlesex in the Conservative inprobable nominee of that party. Mr. Gilmour has been a faithful worker in the ranks for years.

-London's water supply is probably the best in point of quality in the Dominion; and our waterworks is the best asset in our possession. -The New Zealand Parliament gave the franchise to women last summer and the first general election in which women en joyed the same rights as men has just taken place. Contrary to what might have been expected from the arguments of those opposed to woman suffrage the Government which conceded the principle was defeated. This may have been an exhibition of ingratitude, or it may have arisen from a majority of the new voters throwing their influence on the side of the Opposition, whose platform they favor. The full facts regarding the voting will be of considerable interest.

Mr. Howland was not only an efficient mayor during his incumbency of the Chief Magistracy, but a man who sympathized with every good novement and work in the Dominion. He was an earnest friend of the temperance cause, and a believer in the policy of working for the total prohibition of the traffic in intoxicants. This stand he took because in the many philanthropic works in which he engaged he discovered that the consumption of intoxicating liquors is by far the most fruitful cause of poverty and crime. As a steadfast friend of young men, Mr. Howland was ever ready to promote the welfare of Young Men's Christian Associations, and again and again he took a prominent part at the inter-provincial conventions. It is a sad task to record the death in the prime of life of so estimable a man. We had thought that a man naturally possessed of so strong a physique and of so exemplary babits would be able to overcome the lung affection that in his case as in so many others, followed an attack of the prevalent malady of influenza; but it had been willed otherwise. Of the deceased philanthropist it may, however, be said that in his comparatively short life he had done more real work for his fellowfor the friendless, for the poor and needy, for the downfallen, for the downtroddenthan many men, less unselfish, would care to undertake though they lived to a patriarchal old age. For this reason his death will be lamented by thousands who have learned to love him from a knowledge of his good works alone. The deeds of such men do not die with them. Their influence and example remain as potent in-

The annual charge of interest and sinking fund amounted to \$30,042 74, making a net profit to the city of \$18,122 76. New services put in during the year 374, total 6,544. Expenses, \$19,581 36; net earnings, \$48,165 50.

Owing to the extremely low water in the river the cost of pumping was much greater than in previous years. This accounted for the added operating expenses and reduced the revenue.

A BIG CANAL That Will Cost Chicago in the Neighbor

That Will Cost Chicago in the Neighbor heod of \$30,000,000,
Chicago, Dec. 12.—The board of trustees of the sanitary district of Chicago have arranged on Thursday, Dec. 28 next, for a congressional inspection of the great channel now under construction between Chicago and Joliet, a distance of 35 miles.

This channel, popularly known as the drainage canal, is designed primarily to relieve the sanitary condition of the Chicago River and at the same time complete a great waterway which will connect the lakes and the Mississippi.

The entire work will cost Chicago about \$30,000,000,000, about \$4,000,000 being already expended. ### AMONG THE BIGWICS.

English Aristocracy.

The Queen's Yacht-Gladstone Plants a Tree-Costly

(Edmund Yates' cable to New York Tribune.)

London, Dec. 12.—The Duke of Saxe-Cobourg-Gothn, after consulting with the Queen and the Prince of Wales, has placed himself in communication with Lord Salisbury and Mr. Gladstone on the subject of his parliamentary allowance of £25,000 a year which he has resolved to surrender, and this very generous decision will probably be formally announced by the Prime Minister to the House of Commons before Parliament acjourns. The Duke's allowance was granted by an act of Parliament, and only an act of Parliament, and only an act of Parliament could take it away. This was settled in 1830, when it was proposed to deprive Prince Leopold of Sax-Cobourg-Gotha, who had been elected King of the Belgians, of an allowance of £50,000 a year, which had been voied to him for life on his marriage with Princess Charlotte. Leopold kept both Claremont and his allowance, but regularly repaid to the treasury the bulk of the income, reserving only enough to defray his English pensions and the cost of maintaining Claremont. Ernest, Duke of Cumberland, did not give up his Parliamentary allowance when he became King of Hanover in 1837, but continued to draw it until his death.
