THE NEW COMET?

Toronto, Sept. 3.-According to a message received today from Barnard by the Toronto Observatory, there's a new comet in the heavens.

Professor Moorehouse, Yerkes Observatory, near Chicago, discovered this stranger comet on Sept. 1. It has a long tail, is very conspicuous, and has a rapid northeast and southwest movement, 3 hours and 20 minutes right ascension, declination 67 degrees and 15 minutes north.

"It will be visible all night in the north," said the weatherman. "It crosses the meridian line above the pole at 4:49 a.m., and below the pole at 4:49 p.m. In the early evening it is visible in the northeastern sky."



That little bill of \$566.96, which the ondon Street Railway owes to the city for removing snow last winter, will not be paid this week, as a former resolution of the committee demanded. Another month's grace was allowed the company at the meeting of the board of works last night. Manager King was present, and

mentioned the fact that the company owed the money, but he would prefer to sell some gravel to the city in part payment of the debt. He thought the city needed the gravel, and the company had plenty of it to sell. "We need the money," said Mayor Stevely.

Wants the Cash.

City Engineer Graydon opposed any ttempt to settle except on a cash pasis. He pointed out that the streets account was overdrawn \$2,000, and the bridges account was also overdrawn. The account which the street railway company owed would assist materially in keeping the overdraft within lim-

Ald. Saunders thought that some gravel could be used, as several of the streets in the city needed it badly. He said that the company should be allowed something on their account in this way.

Ald. Rose thought there was some gravel needed in the city streets. Hamilton road and Horton street were in need of gravel, and he would suggest that some be bought from the com-

City Engineer Graydon suggested that a carload of brick be purchased from the company, if the committee desired an exchange for their account. He could use some brick to good ad-

Railway Commission Has New Regulations Under Consideration.

Ottawa, Sept. 3.—The railway board spent the afternoon considering a recommendation by Mr. J. Ogilvie, inspector of rolling stock, that the recent regulations of the Interstate commerce commission of the United States for the transportation of explosives be adopted for Canada. The anadian Pacific, Grand Trunk, Canadian Northern and New York Central were all represented, and unanimously favored the recommendation on the ground that the regulations were exceedingly thorough, and it was desirable to have uniform regulations for the two countries, as cars of explosives are frequently taken across the international boundary. The regulations provide for careful packing and handling, and thorough inspection of the explosives to be shipped.
