The earthquake today comes at the moment that the city was about to receive Francisco Madero. Cable dispatches announced his arrival at the city and indicate that despite the earthquake an ovation will be given him.

London, June 7.—The seismograph at West Bromwich recorded a huge earth shock at 11:15 this morning. At noon the needle recorded a motion of 100 millimetres, and this was followed by a secondary disturbance.

The maximum strength of the shock occurred at 12:26 p.m. It is estimated that the earthquake was not less than 6,000 miles away from West Bromwich.

EX-FRENCH PREMIER DEAD AT PARIS

"Bounced" Boulanger Taken by Death.

died here today. He was born at Aix in 1842, and became known early as an enemy of the empire. He was elected a member of the National Assembly in 1871, and in 1881 he was appointed minister of commerce in the Gambetta cabinet. In 1887 he became premier, taking also the portfolio of finance. His ministry lasted only six months, but it was notable for the retirement of General Boulanger, as minister of war. Boulanger was then at the height of his popularity, and M. Rouvier's action was regarded as a courageous one.

M. Rouvier held the finance portfolio in 1889, 1890, 1892, and from 1902 until 1905, when he was again made prime minister. He resigned from that office in March, 1906, being defeated in the Chamber of Deputtes on a minor debate over church disorders.





He has already paid in premiums \$2,000, more than the face of the policy, and has lost all his interest. Under the Homans plan, the survivors among the insured have to bear the cost of payments to beneficiaries of those who have died, Therefore the number of survivors, the greater the amount to be borne by each.

Mr. Justice Middleton finds that there was no fraud in inducing Mr. Eckersley to insure, and he says: "I can see no course open save to dismiss the action, and, doing so, I do not give costs. Not because of any unfair conduct of those now in charge of the company (they appear to be both fair and frank), but to show my disapproval of the original form of policy, which sems to me to be tricky and calculated to deceive. I think the rates should have been carried so as to show the great and prolibitive cost when the assured lives beyond 70."


