Tokio, March 28. - Two of the crev of the British steamer Mars have died rescued have arrived at Hakodate. The Mars, a steamer of 2,497 tons Barry, Wales, on Nov. 26, for Vladivostock. On March 17 while attempting the passage of Soya Straits, she was caught in the ice, and finally stranded off Rural Promontory. Part of the crew effected a landing on the Island of Hakkaido, but the others were missing, including eight officers, who were later reported in a lifeboat being carried seaward by the ice.

WHITEMAN AGAIN LAUGHS AT LAW

Whiteman, former member of the Minnesota Legislature and reputed one of the most dangerous swindlers and confidence men of the century, was acquitted of the charge of grand larceny tonight. He is said to have obtained \$2,000 on an alleged fraudulent draft deposited with the Fidelity Trust Company, of this city. The jury was out

In this term he drew up the Whiteman election law, which served as a model for the states of the union until the introduction of the Australian ballot system.

In 1890 he entered on a systematic career of crime. Although indicted 33 times and convicted eleven time, Chicago has been the only city to put him. in prison. He was forced to serve one year in the Bridewell for passing a forged check for \$250 on the Grand Pacific Hotel.

Whiteman is "wanted" for various alleged swindles in more than 40 cities. He is said to have stolen more than \$1,000,000, and his total prison sentences would aggregate 51 years
