While I believe that several licenses might be cut off without materially effecting the hotel accommodation of the city, still I thought it inadvisable to suggest any reduction at the present time least any rearrangement might result in still longer depriving the Rankin House of a license, while houses with much poorer accommodation received licenses. I have no desire to enter into the controversy whether Mr. Pleasence should or should not be granted a license, that question is one solely for the Commissioners to decide. The point I wished to make was that the Rankin House should have a license if licenses are to be granted. As far as local option is concerned I am not fully persuaded that in a municipality situated as Chatham is, that any attempt to enforce such a law would be conducive to the best interests of the cause of temperance.

If these friends of temperance had secured and discussed the views of all the other candidates I would have remained silent, but as mine were the only views discussed I felt, as a matter of justice to myself, that all the electors should have the matter placed fairly before them. The temperance question is only one of many moral issues affecting the city. If in my ten years' residence my relation to all questions affecting the welfare of the city has been such as to merit commendation I shall be pleased to receive your support, but I wish frankly to state that if elected I shall fearlessly and honestly, regardless of my personal views, represent all classes of the community.

In reply to open letter from Mr. C. Austin to the electors, I would say that it is true that the W. C. T. U. and the Royal Templars held a joint meeting to discuss and consider who of the many aldermanic candidates were entitled to their influence and support. It is true that I attended that meeting and reported a conversation held with Mr. Austin as to his attitude on the question of license reduction, as he particularly intimated in the course of that conversation that he wished the W. C. T. U. to know that he did not want them to support him excepting that he was in favor of license reduction for 1906. This is my justification for reporting the conversation. We did not ask Mr. Austin or any of the candidates to pledge themselves, although they may have been approached by other individuals along this line, but we were considering the candidates entirely upon their record and reputation and to say that those who attended were surprised at Mr. Austin's stand would be putting it mild, as they all thought they had a right to expect better things of, him. Mr. Austin has acknowledged his belief that several licenses might be cut off without affecting the hotel accommodation of the city. Then we wondered why he has not the courage of his belief and not allowed himself to be sidetracked by the matter of sentiment over which the temperance people have had no control and for which they are not responsible in any way. Mr. Austin is not the only good citizen who realizes that an injustice has been done to Mr. Pleasence, and a great majority of the right thinking people of this city are in accord with the granting of a license to the Rankin House as long as licenses are being granted, as his accommodation had been second to none, but we have reason to believe that any action that the temperance people might take, would not effect the Rankin House situation either favorably or prejudically.

A GOOD EXAMPLE.

Ald. Austin is to be commended up on his frank statement as to his stand upon the temperance questions that are said to be hovering over the coming Council. Whatever a candidate's convictions on public questions especially when they are emphatic ones-the electorate should know them in order to vote the more in telligently, and a man is honest with himself and the people he seeks to represent when he frankly takes them into his conf dence. All. Austin has set a good example, which there is still time for other candidates to follow.

### A GREAT STEP FORWARD.

The report of the Joint Committee on Church Union, representing the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational Churches, is a document of unusual importance. It would not have been surprising if the com-mittee had been unable to agree on church polity, arrangements for pastoral service, and other matters of government and organization; but the setting forth of the common doctrines held by Presbyterians, Methodists and Congregationalists is a bold proceeding; and if, after being published to the world, it stands the test of criticism, and is accepted by the people of all these denominations, it will be difficult to exaggerate the extent of the progress thus made in Christian union. And this progress will be an accomplished fact, even if organic union should be long delayed. The mere fact that there is a document in existence to which the members of the three Churches can point as containing a clear and satisfactory statement of their common belief is one of immense importance.

It may be said that these and other Protestant denominations have always found this common ground in the Bible! But it was once supposed that they were divided by varying interpretations of the Bible; and this has been described as a serious difficulty, an obstacle to the progress of Christianity and even a matter of reproach. Here we not only have a general declaration that common ground is to be found in the Bible, but we have that ground marked out, a common interpretation agreed upon, and the common doctrine set forth in a document of remarkable clearness and brevity.


Its sufficiency is not a matter for off-hand judgment. Upon that point we must have the deliberate judgment of the whole community, lay and olerical, represented by these three Churches. Although this is a Canadian movement, the matters dealt with are not bounded by political or national lines, but are universal and eternal moment. For this reason the judgment of members of these Churches and of kindred Churches in Great Britain, in the United States and all over the world,

will be awaited with deep interest Nor is the importance of the step confined to these denominations. It will be interesting to know how far this statement of doctrine agrees with that of the Anglican Church and even how far it agrees with that of the Roman Catholic Church. I may be found that the differences are not so formidable as they appear; and even if it is not possible to extend the range of organic union to other denominations, a great work may be done in preventing misunderstanding and promoting Christian fellowship and Christian charity.—

#### DRAINAGE DEDISION

Kerby vs. Township Pelee-This is proceeding to collect from defend ant \$6,500 damages claimed to have been caused to his land and crops by the drainage scheme initiated by the late Dr. Schudder on Pelec by the late Dr. Schudder on Pelee Island, which scheme was taken over and assumed by Toomship in year 1892. The plaintiff complains that in the years 1902-3 the three pumps with which the system is furnished were not properly run during the month of June, 1902, so as to keep the water in the canals or dredge cuts as low as possible according to the water in the canals or dredge cuts as low as possible according to the provisions of a by-law of the Township. He further complains that the rainstorm that began on June 28 was not properly guarded against by having the pumps started promptly, run night and day and Sundays as provided by by-law and that the pumps were not in proper repair and could not be operated to their full capacity. He further complains that the quantity of fuel was not sufficient to run the pumps during the wet scassin and after the fuel ran out the commissioner of the works was forced to purchase oil and use it as fuel without success and in consequence the pumps had to be in consequence the pumps had to be stopped. He claims that his crops were in good condition before the rainstorm and they were to a large extent if not altogether destroyed by reason of the negligent operation of the pumping scheme. The Referee found that the different causes of compaignt were apply causes of complaint were amply sustained by evidence and that in consequence of such negligence the plaintiff sustained damages to his land and crops. He further finds that the year 1902 was an unusually wet meason, but if the pumps had been properly operated according to the provisions of the defendant's by-laws the greater part, if not all, of the damages could have been avoid-He further finds that the crops of that locality was not more than fo per cent. of ordinary crop, and as to corn much less and this upon lands in no way affected by drainage works and under all the circumstances of the case he assesses damages against Township at \$1,000 and costs to be taxed, which he directs under the statute to be paid out of the general funds. # **BURNS TO HIS ELECTORS**

Labor Leader's First Public Address as Cabinet Minister.

Honor For His Constituents, But the Work Was for Him-No Sympathy for Loafer, "Cadger" or Drunkard-Appointing Committees-Denounces "Orientalized Imperialism" and Declares Chinese Labor Dangerous.

London, Dec. 27.—John Burns, the president of the Local Government Board, made his first public address since his entry into the Cabinet, when he opened the election campaign at Battersea, last night. In a characteristically courageaus

In a characteristically courageaus speech he said his accession to office was the elevation of his constituents to power—the honor was theirs, but the work was for him. He declared that he would pander to no section of the population, but would do his duty for the benefit of the whole community.

Mr. Burns said he had such strange sympathy with all the interests of the working classes that he had no sympathy to spare or the loafer, "cadger" or drunkard. His ideal was fewer workhouses, smaller charities, larger wages, more pleasure and less drink. In the smaller citles and in the larger villages he said he was already appointing committees to enable the rate-payers to have their accounts prepared in such a way that he who ran might read.

He vigorously attacked what he call ed "orientalized imperialism," of which Somaliland was the fruit, and South Africa the "rottenripe" product. He denounced Chinese labor as being politically dangerous, because it would lead to absolute chatteled slavery.

# MASSACRE OF THE REDS

Moscow Fears Reprisals by the Dreaded "Black Hundred."

The Revolutionary Outbreak Is Quell ed. But There is Possibility of Renewed Slaughter-General Strike In Peland Is Spreading-800 Railway Men at Rostoff-on-Don Killed or Wounded-Martial Law at Odessa.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 29.—Yesterday's news from Russian Poland indicated that the general strike is extending. Wholesale arrests have been made in the cities. At Sosnovice, near the Em peror's hunting lodge, an attempt has been made to blow up the barracks with dynamite. The employee of the Riga-Orel Railroad have again struck, but the majority of the railways are

but the majority of the railways are still running.

The Novoe Vremya reports that a meeting of railroad men at Rostoff-on-Don was bombarded by artillery, and that 300 of those present were killed or wounded. The paper also, says that all the Russian officials in Couriand, except those at Mittau and Libau, have been driven out of that province.

A telephone message from Moscow to The Molva savs the Town Council has denounced the indiscriminate firing on the troops and the organization of the Black Hundred under the direction of

According to advices received by the Government last night, the rebellion a Moscow is entering on its final stage.

scale.

Governor-General Doubassoff is act its; with great energy and hundreds of members of the "Drujina" are already behind the bars. The strikers have lost heart and the Workmen's Council is considering the question of calling off he strike.

The principal danger now seems to be that the "Black Hundred" will com-plete the work begun by the troops, and end the revolt with a horrible mas-sacre of the Reds. The lower classes are represented as enraged at the attempt of the revolutionaries to over-throw the Emperor, and, even with the best intentions, it may be impossible for the authorities to restrain the fury of these classes once the opportunity is offered them. The attacks made an striking railroad men at wayside sta-tions sufficiently shows the temper of

the peasant classes.

Four thousand strikers marched out of Moscow, and completely destroyed several miles of the railroad track between St. Petersburg and Moscow, thirty miles outside of Moscow, in order to prevent the arrival of troop trains bearing the Seminovsky battalian of the Horse Guards and the trains back-

the Horse Guards and the trains backed twenty miles to Clyne, whence it is
understood the troops will preceed today on foot for their destination.

caused a frightful accident to a passenger train, which fell through into

Revelt Pressially Over.

Moscow, Dec. 28.—The revolt is practically over and the strike will be called off Menday. Comparative quiet prevailed sestenday, only a few fanatios continuing the struggle.

The centre of the city for the first time to-day showed signs of life, the stores re-opening, and the inhabitants, who had been cooped up for five days, were venturing out for a breath of fresh air.

The troops began operation yesterday morning at the Triumphal Arch.

The troops began operation yester-day morning at the Triumphal Arch, bombarding and demolishing an im-mense barricade near the car stables of the Belgian company which had been built behind overturned tramcars. Thence slowly pivoting from the arch the columns awent eastward clearing the columns swept eastward, clearing all the streets of the Tverstaia and north of the boulevard which separated the battlefield from the centre of the

city.

Sometimes the artillery fired a shot

Sometimes the artillery fired a shot. The work of destroying the entanglements and burning the material from which they were constructed was slow. Occasionally when the troops were fired upon from the roofs the houses were bombarded but the occupants had ample time to escape.

It is not possible to venture an estimate of the casualties which, however, are not heavy, either in the case of the troops or of the 'Drujina," The populace have been awful sufferers. Crowds have been awful sufferers. Crowds have been awful sufferers. Crowds have been moved down by rife volleys, the fire of machine guns and the grape and shrapnel of the artillery. Innocent persons even fell dead before the bullets of the revolutionists while inspecting barricades, perhaps owing to the impression that they were spies.

Revolutionists Big Steal.

Waraaw, Russian Poland, Dec. 29.—The general strike is weakening. The shops are open and cabs are circulating in the centre of the city. The employes of the factories and street railroads are still en strike.

The revolutionists during the night of Dec. 27 dynamited the safe of the district treasury of Wysokie-Massowneckie, Gevernment of Lomsha, and carried of \$150,000.

Odessa, Dec. 29.—Martial law has has been proclaimed here. Hundreds, of arrests have been made.

Gen. Booth Coming to Canada Toronto, Dec. 29.—General Booth is to visite Canada in February. Scotch Colony For Canada. London, Dec. 29.—(C. A. P.)—The Canadian Associated Press has heard of a scheme to send a large colony of Scotch people to Canada during the coming spring. The emigrants will be in sufficient numbers for a good-sized colony in the northwest. The Canadian Associated Press believes they will be from a certain district in Scotland. My informant says one of the best-known men in Canada is behind the scheme.

# PLAN ARMED REBELLION

Moscow Tactics to Be Adopted and Put in Force in Poland

Bituation at Moscow Not Greatly Changed, Although Slove Prophecies That Revolt Will Be Put Down In Four Days-News From the Provinces Is Alarming, But Kharkoff Government Has Been Captured.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 28.-According to information received by the revolu-tionary leaders here an armed rebellion on a large scale has been planned in Poland. The Socialist revolutionaries there are encouraged by the success of the insurgents in the Baltic provinces and the situation at Moscow

and in Russia generally.

The tactics to be followed are the same as those adopted at Moscow, the rising to be preceded by a general strike which aiready has practically come into operation, bringing about half the railroads in Poland to a standatill

A brief message from Moscow of yesterday says that troops with artil-lery are pouring into the city, but the situation has not generally changed. The revolutionists hold sections of the Moscow-Kazan road. The military patrols are engaged in guerilla warfare with the revolutionists who are seeking refuge on the roofs of houses and in the narrow thoroughfares.

Revolutionists Three "Armies."

The revolutionists are divided into

Revolutionists Three "Armies."

The revolutionists are divided into three "armies," the first consisting of eight hundred men armed with rifles and spikes, is operating between Moscow and Perovo, on the railroad which it controls. Artillery and cavalry are being employed against this force. The second army, armed especially with bombs and revolvers, is composed of a thousand persons, in whose ranks are many women, who display not only many women, who display not only bravery, but extreme ferocity. This force occupies in the region between the Sadovia District and the Jewish market, has many barricades to prevent the passage of troops, and is operating in small groups and attacking patrols. When pressed these revolu-tionists disappear into alleys and houses. Artillery, cavalry and infantry are used against this body. The third and largest "army" is operating in the region between the Brest railway station and the Triumphal Gate. It also has many barricades, and is engaged

in guerilla tactics.

Over in Four Days.

An inspired statement in the Slovo yesterday says that the Government expects the revolt at Moscow to be expects the revoit at Moscow to be completely crushed within four days. The duration of the rising is explained by the small number of troops available, many of whom necessarily were employed in guarding the Government buildings. The Slove says: "The Grenadiers have wiped out the stain or

their honor with blood, fighting in the front ranks at their own request." Minor collisions between the troops and strikers, of whom there are almost 50,000 still out, are taking place constantly in St. Petersburg.

Cossacks patrols are charging and dispersing workmen whenever they col-lect. The most serious affairs occurred at the Narva gate, and on the Moika Canal, in which fifty persons were killed or wounded.

Extension Alarming.
The news from the provinces yeserday shows alarming extension of the trike. The situation is really far more serious in the Baltic provinces, Caucasia and other non-Russian provinces where the entire populace is hostile.

At Kharkoff Tuesday the flag of armed revolt was raised, but, according to reports, the troops put down

the outbreak mercilessly. The 22 members of the so-called provisional Government, which had been sitting there, were captured early in the day, and later, when the red flag was raised and barricades were erected around the Melfich engine works, cannon were brought up and they were literally battered down over the heads of the revolutionists, who held out until three-quarters of the number were killed or wounded, when the remnant, 137 mea, surrendered. bers of the so-called provisional Gov

GOVERNMENT ASKED TO AID.

Salvation Army Commissioner Coombes Interviews Premier Whitney Con-cerning and and Money Grants.

Toronto, Dec. 28.—Commissioner Combes of the Salvation Army saw Premier Whitney yesterday morning and acquainted him with the progress of the Salvation Army's immigration and colonization schemes.

The army requested on increased

The army requested an increased cash grant for immigration purposes and the setting aside of several townships in Northern Ontario, which the army will undertake to completely colonize.

It is thought that the Government will accede to the first request and materially increase the cash grant, which was \$4,000 this year, but with regard to the colonization scheme there are difficulties, chief among them the vexed question of the veterans' land grants, which make it impossible for the Government to set aside whole townships for many years to come, even though new territory is being surveyed rapidly. The suggestion is made that some other provision be made for the veterans.

Commissioner Coombes will sail for England on Jan. 13 to make a report It is thought that the Government

Commissioner Coombes will sail for England on Jan. 13 to make a report to Gen. Booth with regard to the whole subject of immigration to Canada. He has an offer of 250,000 acres of land in Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan from the Dominion Government and offers from the Government of British Columbia, Question and the of British Columbia, Quebec and the

of British Columbia, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces.

The present plan is to bring at least 10,000 settlers to Canada next year. Of these, 5,000 will be located in Ontario. These will be selected from 70,000 applicants who registered at the British offices of the company within seven weeks, all seeking to come to Canada.

Premier Whitney yesterday spoke appreciatively of the work of the army. "Its work in relation to immigration," he said, "is most valuable and the pains and industry shown to bring about the best possible results are very gratifying indeed."

SENT HOME IN "DOMINION."

New Battleship to Convey Mr. Prefon taine's Remains to Canada. Ottawa, Dec. 28.—Lord Tweedmouth First Lord of the Admiralty, cables to

Sir Wilfrid Laurier as follows:

'We have heard with deep regret of
the death of our colleague, Mr. Prefontaine, Canadian Minister of Marine and
Fisheries, with whom the Admiralty have been recently in such cordial se lationship, and I beg to offer His Majesty's ship Dominion to convey the remains to Halifax, N. S. If agreeable to your Government, the Dominion will be at Cherburg on Jan. 12th for this purpose, and reach Halifax Jan. 22nd.

"(Signed) TWEEDMOUTH."
The Dominion is a recently launched and completed battleship, named in honor of Canada.
It is understood that the Premier is

now in communication with Solicitor-General Lemieux and the relatives of the late Mr. Prefontaine in regard to the matter.

Sir Wilfrid Accepts.

The interest taken in this case does not equal that shown by the public in the plumbers' cases, four men and a policeman composed the audience, outside of the few who were there en business.

Cumming, The Peck Penny Co., Montreal; George Boyd, Pillow, Hersey Co.; Montreal.

The charge is conspiring, combining, agreeing and arranging with certain corporations and other persons to unduly limit the production and manufacturing, supplying and dealing in tacks.

The most important facts brought out were, that the association was formed in Montreal in 1892, and was composed of the Pillow, Hersey Co., Montreal Rolling Mills Co., Peck Berry Co., and the Ontario Tack Co. Subsequently these were joined by the Jas. Pender Co., the Portland Rolling Mills Co., and W. D. Woodhail & Co. At the first meeting. W. McMaster was elected president, T. H. Whitton vice-president, and A. and T. Jenkins secretary and treasurer.

To Regulate Prices.

The association was formed for the purpose of regulating prices, and the sale of tacks. An agreement was made for one year. Members were only to sell to bons fide agents, and that no subterfuse was to be used to make sales. Menthly statements were to be rendered to the secretary showing amount of sales, by each firm. The Jenkins firm were to have access to the books of the firms at any time. Each firm was also bound by a penality of \$300, to be forfeited in case the monthly returns were not made, and also for other breaches of the agreement. A sworn declaration was also made, as to the amount of monthly purchases.

NO THOROUGH AUDIT.

Examination of York County Loan Co. Books Far From Complete-"No Graft," Says Phillips.

Graft," Says Phillips.

Toronto, Dec. 29.—Judging from the evidence given at the Government investigation into the affairs of the York Loan and Sayings Co., yesterday, the annual sudit of the books of that concern was a process to say the least perfunctory. Only a small salary was paid to the two officials who made the examination, and only a few weeks were spent on a multitude of books and documents which would have taken the time of an auditor for every day of the year.

In answer to the questions of C. A. Masten on behalf of W. H. Cross, the Government investigator, Thomas G. Hand, whose name appears appended to the certificate as to the correctness of the annual statement of 1904, said that beyond checking the totals in the ledger and stock-book he did not investigate the items. The salary paid him did not justify his spending much time on the work.

The negotiations and agreements with the Southern Light and Power Co. were explained by Joseph Barrett, the president of that concern, with regard to the sales of houses to employes that was characterized as a means of securing money without injurying the credit of the company.

Finally there came a most emphatic denial from Mr. Phillips of the existence of any kind of graft in the operation of the company and its officers.

"I will make an ad interim report to the Attorney-General as soon as possible," said Commissioner W. H. Cross when adjourning the York Loan enquiry at 6 o'clock lass night, He thanked Home Smith, acting for the liquida-

LONG ESTATE MUST GIVE UP. Judge Street Finds Directors Entitled to \$34,500.

to \$34,500.

Toronto, Dec. 29.—The executors of the estate of the late John J. Long are to pay the Northern Navigation Co. \$34,500. Such was the judgment given out yesterday by Justice Street. That amount is made up of \$30,000 with interest since 1902. The question as to whether the defendants will appeal from this judgment was stated last night to be under consideration.

The present board of directors alleged that in consequence of the inaccurate financial statement, made by J. J. Long, when president, a half-yearly dividend at 5 per cent. had been declared, and subsequent dividends, wisch amounted to \$85,519,92. For the damage sustained from the withdrawal of this capital the company claimed \$150,000.

That so far from there being a profit of the state of the

al of this capital the company claimed \$150,000.

That so far from there being a profit of \$38,519.92, as represented by Mr. Long, there was but \$87,568.85, a disparity of about \$31,000, as shown by an experimental examination after Long had left for Europe. Te bring the company up to the profit that had been alleged by the late president, the judge directs the estate te pay ever the difference between the amounts, with interest at 5 per cent., from the end of 1902, up to the present time. That made up the amount of the judgment, \$34,500. The judge believes that the directors would not have declared a dividend had not Long misstated the profits. The defendants have to disburse all the costs of the action.
