\$5,000 For Kings College

Toronto, May 14th.—The estate of the late Rev. Jacob Jehoseph Salter Mountain, of Cornwall must pay \$5,000 to Kings College, Windsor, N. S.

Mr. Justice Kelly says "The statement made in the will, and the letters indicate that \$5,000 was payable at his death. There is also evidence in his own written acknowledgment that the note was delivered over. From this I find a clear intention to make the payees creditors of his estate. It is evident that he adopted this course deliberately, so as to place the holders of the note in the position of creditors rather than of legatees."

Mr. Allison Campaign is Coming Along Well

Sackville, N. B., May 15.—The maritime canvass to raise \$200,000 endowment fund for Mount Allison University has been successful with the little community of Sackville raising practically \$35,000 to complete the endowment fund, and more amounts coming constantly from outside points.

The campaign will be continued vigorously to raise the \$50,000 needed for the Science building, and many smaller points not yet visited will be canvassed. Only a small portion of the Moncton report is in and thousands more will be forthcoming from that city.

What the Borden Government Has Done For the Dominion

Ottawa, Ont., May 12.—The Minister of Finance today brought down his budget. The financial statement showed the Dominion to have reached a pitch of prosperity never before attained, a trade over a billion, a surplus over consolidated fund of fifty-five millions, and a reduction of over twenty-three million dollars in the national debt.

The Minister's exposition of the national finances was clear and concise. He allowed his figures to speak for themselves and the statement, as he unfolded the story of unexampled prosperity, evoked frequent outbursts of applause. The total revenue for the last year had amounted to \$168,250,000 an increase of \$32,000,000 or almost the total of the country's revenue of twenty years ago.

The development of the country had called for larger outlays, but these had not exceeded \$113,250,000 on current account. The expenditure on capital account had amounted to \$33,000,000 and with an allowance of \$1,300,000 for sinking fund there was left the sum of \$23,300,000 toward the reduction of the debt. The net debt now stands approximately \$316,629,460.

For the current year, he said, in view of the financial stringency, the same rate of increase as had been shown last year in the revenue could not be expected. He believed, however, that there would be enough to meet all consolidated expenditure and all or most of the outlay on capital. The estimates for the year would probably amount to nearly \$200,000,000 but it was not usual to spend the full amount. The government's policy would be one of continued effort in behalf of the country's interests.

Suggestions for Sponge and Angel Cake

In making these cakes use pastry flour. Have the bowl and beater perfectly dry before beating the whites as any moisture will prevent their beating up light, beat quicker and lighter when cool; consequently they should be kept in some cool place until needed. Add a pinch of salt to the whites, and beat. This toughens the fibre and helps retain the air. The lightness of the sponge cake depends principally on the amount of air beaten into the eggs. Care must be taken in adding the flour. It must be folded or blended in, never beaten. Beating the batter after the flour is added breaks the air bubbles, thin the pastry and makes the cake tough and heavy. Do not grease the tins. Layer-cakes do not need to be inverted out of the baking pans. Let them cool in the tins to prevent shrinking. Bake in a moderate oven.

A Serious Fire at Inverness, N. S.

Halifax, N. S. May 19.—Fire at Inverness, C. B. Sunday morning started in the Queen Hotel Block, on Central Avenue, and the hotel together with the adjoining block, the stables and outbuildings belonging to A. J. Campbell were completely destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$20,000, insurance about \$6,000. Wener and Son occupied a store in the adjoining block and T. J. Gallant, Barrister, had his law offices on the floor. Both parties sustained loss in the removal of property. Both buildings were gutted, within an hour. For a time the whole southern portion of the town was threatened.

London, May 17.—An exploration party of eleven Germans and five Norwegians which set out in June last for the Arctic has been lost. The only survivor is Captain Ritscher.

The Farm Home

Deserves to be Made as Beautiful as Plants Can Make It.

Every farmer ought to take enough pride in himself to make the place he calls his home as attractive as possible. Nothing makes a place appear more attractive or increases its value so much as good buildings and a nice lawn with a showy flower bed or some shrubbery upon it.

Shrubs are not very expensive, and being of small size they mature quickly and are of great value on a place of small size. They are extremely useful for ornamenting the foreground or for covering unsightly objects.

The proper place for shrubbery is next to the buildings or on the outer limits of the lawn. When laying out the lawn bear in mind that the larger part should be open, nothing should be upon it except green grass, but if your lawn is large, an attractive flower bed may be placed upon it to good advantage.

A very showy flower bed can be made of tall red or bronzed leaved cannas, salvias and a border of some low-growing annual. The bed should be prepared as follows: The best shape is to have it round. If the soil is not very good it should be dug out to a depth of one foot and filled in with rich soil to which a liberal quantity of well-fotted manure has been added. In the centre of his bed plant about two doz. cannas placing their roots one foot apart each way; around the cannas plant two rows of salvias, having the plants stand about eighteen inches apart, and around the outside of this bed have a border of sweet alyssum, dwarf phlox or dwarf nasturtiums. The cash outlay for such a bed will not be great and if given proper attention you cannot get as much enjoyment out of your money in any other way.

Do not make the mistake of planting trees close to the house. When they grow up they will shut out the sunlight, and we all know that a dark house is not as pleasant or healthy as a well-lighted one.

To secure the finest effects from shrubbery, plant the taller growing shrubs in back for a background, and in the fore-ground use the dwarf growing species, while still in front of the dwarf shrubs a row of dwarf growing annuals may be planted for a border. By planting in this way you will have a continuous line of foliage from the grass to the tops of the tallest shrubs and the appearance will be much more pleasing than if the stems of some of the shrubs were exposed.

Do not make the mistake of planting your shrubs too close but consider the possible future size to which they will grow. Tall shrubs should stand five feet apart and dwarf ones three feet; until they reach full size, the empty space may be filled with dwarf plants or perennials.

All shrubs should be planted as soon as the frost is out of the ground and the soil is in good working condition. This will give the plants a chance to make some root growth before the hot weather arrives. Deep spading of the soil and a liberal application of well rotted manure will be well repaid by a strong vigorous growth of plants.

About all the attention shrubs require after they are planted is an occasional hoeing to keep down the weeds, and a little fertilizer applied in the Fall to keep up the fertility of the soil.

If you want your lawn to have a rich green color, it must be fertilized. This can be done by covering it with fine manure in the Fall, allowing it to remain there over Winter, and what is left in the Spring can be raked together and hauled off.

There is no reason why a farmer cannot have his home grounds just as attractive as the man in the city. On the farm there is more room and a greater opportunity.

THE TARIFF CHANGES

The following is a condensed summary of the budget delivered in the House of Commons by Hon. W. T. White on Monday, the 12th:—

Duties on cement reduced to 7 cents per 100 pounds, under British preference, and 10 cents per 100 pounds under intermediate and general schedule. Reduction amounts to 8 1/2 cents per barrel.

Raw sugar under British preference, is reduced to 40 1/2 cents per 100 pounds as against 52 1/2 cents under old tariff. Intermediate and general schedules are reduced from 83 1/2 to 57 1/2 cents.

On refined sugar British preference remains at 83 cents per 100 pounds and general and intermediate schedules are reduced from \$1.24 1/2 to \$1.07 1/2.

Refiners' privilege of importing foreign raw sugar to the amount of 20 per cent of their beet sugar production of preferential rates is abolished.

Type-setting and type-casting machines, formerly subject to 20 per cent duty, are placed on the free list.

Traction ditching machines, costing not more than \$3,000 retail, formerly subject to 27 1/2 per cent duty, are placed on the free list.

Hospitals are allowed to import glassware and sterilizing apparatus free.

Appliances to rescue miners are put on the free list.

Duties on cotton threads are reduced from 10, 12 1/2 and 15 per cent to 7 1/2 and 10 per cent.

WHAT THE BUDGET SHOWS

That Canada's foreign trade has passed the billion dollar mark. Exports were \$393,000,000 and imports \$691,000,000.

That the revenue of the last fiscal year was \$168,250,000, an increase of \$32,000,000 over the previous year.

That the year's increase in revenue is equal to the entire revenue of the Dominion twenty years ago. Expenditure of the fiscal year was \$113,250,000 as compared with \$98,161,440 in the preceding year.

That of the balance between revenue and expenditure, \$55,000,000 capital and special expenditure \$33,000,000, and sinking fund of \$1,300,000 are applied.

That the National Debt is reduced by \$23,000,300, leaving the debt at present \$316,619,460.

How To Plant A Tree.

The Oklahoma Experimental Station has a bulletin on "Tree Culture," by Professor Morris, of the horticultural department. While the bulletin treats of many features, such as the best trees to plant for shade or post and pole production, perhaps the most timely and useful advice is that relating to planting which is as follows:

The trees should be set a little deeper in the soil than they stood in the nursery row, or where previously grown. The soil must be worked in underneath the large roots and tramped about them. The top of the tree should be level slightly to the south-west. This enables the tree to resist the hard south winds and before the end of the first season the tree will be standing in an erect position. It is a good idea to shake the tree several times by tramping the dirt around the roots and to pour water about the tree in order to bring the soil in contact with every bit of root surface. After the water had been poured on, another inch or two of dry soil and good surface should be thrown about the tree to prevent baking.

Baldwin Will Fly From Halifax to Ireland Proposes to Fly in Higher Air Where Speed Can be Greatly Increased

Sydney, May 11 - According to Dr. A. Graham Bell, of Baddeck, P. C. Baldwin, one of his Cape Breton assistants, will endeavor to fly across the Atlantic in an effort to win Lord Northcliff's offer of \$55,000, to the first airman who crosses the ocean in 72 hours. Dr. Bell says many alterations will have to be made in existing machines before the flight is attempted and that when a start is made one trip will have to be made in one spurt.

"Starting at Halifax in the early morning by daylight, we should reach the coast of Ireland in time for a late dinner. This is assuming that the distance is 2,000 miles," he said. Doctor Bell's calculations were based on an airship capable of forty miles an hour at normal elevations. He proposed to fly actually five miles high in one-third the atmosphere with a triple speed.

IS PREPARING FOR FLIGHT Mr. Baldwin is in Quebec at present where he is conducting experiments with a hydro-aeroplane. It is not definitely known when the flight across the ocean will take place but it will be as soon as the machine is perfected for the trip. The big offer is a great sporting chance but many alterations will have to be made in present machines before being attempted.

"There are machines existing now," said Dr. Bell, "which if they can continue going twenty hours what they have done already for shorter periods will make the flight possible in a single day. The 72 hours is a much longer time than will be needed. If the ocean is to be traversed in an airship at all it will be in a far less time than 72 hours Lord Northcliff allows. "If I was to make the flight" said the veteran inventor with boyish enthusiasm "I wouldn't make any allowance for a lighting at sea and replenishing my fuel. To make the trip at all it ought to be done in a single spurt."

"While hydro-aeroplanes can take to the water and rise again into the air the chances are against their doing anything of the sort. There is also very little likelihood of their finding the supply ship from which to replenish their tanks. Even if the wings of the airship are not injured by the descent the chances are that once on the water it would remain there until picked up, or until under the buffeting of the sea it went lower still and disappeared."

Mr. Baldwin will return to Baddeck in June and will begin preparations for his greater trip. He is very well known all over the Province as a yachtsman having lifted the Coronation Cup here last year in competition with the Sydney and Halifax Clubs. - Halifax Chronicle.

This was accomplished in the presentation of the minority report of the special committee appointed to investigate the charges brought by H. W. Corning, of Yarmouth, and C. Zwicker, of Lunenburg.
