The newspapers of the adjoining counties are devoting considerable space these days to the consideration of the location of the proposed experimental fruit farm for Nova Scotia. Some very unlikely places have been suggested, and evidently the end is not yet. It was practically decided months ago that when such a farm was secured it would be in Kings county, and a farm situated near Wolfville was given the preference. However, the matter has again been opened up, with strong probability that the whole undertaking will be either still further deferred for some time or indefinitely. Such a narrow and sectional spirit as appears to influence the present discussion must be regretted by all who have the success of the movement at heart. So far as we can see the supreme question ought to be, Where should the farm be located in order to best serve the purposes aimed at? For our part we are quite willing to leave the decision to the gentlemen who have been named by the Fruit Growers' Association to decide the question on its merits. If the location of the farm in this neighborhood would not be in the best interests of the fruit growing industry we have no other argument to advance for the choice falling upon this vicinity.

If Canada were as thickly populated as the British Isles, it would have over a billion people. Lord Strathcona predicts that Canada will have 83 millions by the year 2000.

Geo. Thornyke Angell, the 'Friend of Dumb Animals,' as the veteran leader in the Humane Educational Movement in the United States was called, died in Boston, March 16th, aged 86 years. In 1866, after seeing two horses run to death in a race, he was inspired to humane work for the protection of the dumb animals. He started the New York society for the prevention of cruelty to animals. Mr. Angell established the publication of 'Our Dumb Animals.' Since that time he has been actively engaged in the interest of his chosen life work. He travelled many times throughout the United States and in scores of other countries in person or through work and caused to be established more than seventy thousand 'Bands of Mercy' in America and England.

A daylight saving bill has been introduced in the Canadian Parliament following the plan of the British act in putting the clocks ahead one hour on the third Sunday of April on each year and to set it back an hour on the last day of September. The object is to promote the use of daylight in factories and other working places and to induce people to use the daylight hours. At first thought it would appear that people might be induced to do this without the aid of parliament but it would be found difficult to carry out a uniform observance were the privilege left to the option of the people, especially to the option of employers of labor. The movement appears to be meeting with general favor.

The death occurred on Friday at the residence of his father, Mr. Jonathan Parsons, of Halifax, of George H. Parsons, of the law firm of O'Mullin, Parsons and Gray, barristers. Mr. Parsons fell a victim to consumption which first showed symptoms some years ago. It was not until a few weeks ago, however, that his condition became such as to cause special solicitude. At that time he was seized with a hemorrhage and since he failed rapidly. Mr. Parsons was a graduate of Acadia in the class of '66 and had many personal friends in Wolfville, to whom the news of his death came as a great shock. He is survived by his father, one brother, William G. Parsons, barrister, of Yorkton, Saskatchewan, and two sisters, Misses Mabel, of Atlanta, Ga., and Bettie, of New York.

In his message summoning Congress to deal with the revision of the tariff President Taft said that the conditions affecting prices, productions, manufacture and business generally have so changed in the last twelve years as to require a re-adjustment and revision of the import duties imposed by the Dingley tariff.

Report of Executive Committee

OF TABERNACLE SOCIETY.

Your Executive Committee herewith submit their report of the work carried on at the Tabernacle for the year ending March 1st, 1909.

SUNDAY EVENING SERVICES. Religious services have been held every Sunday evening. At most of these meetings opportunity has been given after the address for testimonies and prayer. The ministerial students of the Academy, have had charge of these services since early in September. They have taken great interest in the work and their efforts have been appreciated by the people, as manifested in the good attendance and attention.

MID WEEK SERVICES. The Thursday evening meeting was discontinued during the summer months, but resumed at the beginning of the winter. While the attendance has not been large the services have been helpful and refreshing. Rev. M. J. Freeman has had charge of these meetings.

SUNDAY SCHOOL. There are six classes in the Sunday-school, two of which are adult classes. The enrollment is 58; the average attendance has been 34.7. The attendance fell off during the summer months and so cut down the average. During the last four months the average has been 41.5. The school held their annual picnic at Starr's Point in August. Everything passed off pleasantly and the children were well pleased with their outing. A Christmas tree well laden with gifts, at the holiday time, was another joyous occasion, especially to the younger members of the school. Four of the members of the school were present every Sunday in 1908 and two others only missed one Sunday, so six were given No. 4 cross and crown pins.

FINANCIAL. The treasurer's report will show that all the current expenses of the year have been met, \$50.00 paid on principal of mortgage and a balance of \$72.41 in hand to be applied to further reduction of mortgage. It is hoped that this will be at once increased to \$100.00 so that the mortgage may be reduced to \$300.00. The income of the Sunday-school, including \$1.66 from last year, was \$29.46; the expenditure \$26.37. In June last the primary class of the Baptist Sunday-school made a donation of \$6.44 to the funds of our school. This gift was much appreciated not only for the help it gave but for the interest it manifested.

ENCOURAGEMENTS. Among the encouragements we may mention ready response that is given to appeals for financial or other help for carrying on the work; the coming forward of new workers to fill the ranks in attendance and attention at all the services and the acceptance of Christ by some of those who attend the meetings. With sincere thankfulness of our Heavenly Father for all past blessings and in hope and confidence of greater yet to come, this report is respectfully submitted.

The above report was unanimously adopted by the society.
