Other gifts which were not mentioned in last month's issue of the Magazine are:-The handsome brass alms dish on the retable, which was given by Mr. James Saurin McMurray; a set of 10 small brass vases for the altar was given by Mrs. Jones; the original kneeling cushions at the communion rail were worked by Mrs. Gosling, and the velvet cushion and back to the Bishop's chair were made by Mrs. Phillips. The brass lectern, which holds the large Bible, was the gift of Mrs. Christopher Robinson. It was with the view of harmonizing the furnishings of the chancel that this lectern replaced the original lectern of oak, which was the kind gift of Mr. R. L. Cowan, and was, by his consent, afterwards presented to St. Stephens' Church.

For the benefit of those who have not yet seen the new Service Books we would like to say that owing to the systematic and capable way in which Mrs. Allen Baines, (who kindly undertook the responsibility of obtaining the books), arranged the collections, the sum obtained was \$51.00 instead of \$3500 which the Rector asked for. The now very complete set of Service Books consists of two for the reading deskt, two for the communion table, and a Lit-

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any book for the Litany desk. The inscriptions inside the books are as follows:—"Church of St. George the Martyr, consecrated St. Andrew's Day, 1853; presented at the Dedication Festival, Advent Sunday, November 29th, 1903. Rector, Rev. Canon John D'arcy Cayley; Wardens, Henry Leslie Moore Weller, Richard Allport Baines.

The arrangements for the Lenten Services will be published in good time on a separate leaflet. It is hoped that all our parishioners will obtain copies, and will endeavor to attend as many of the special services as possible. A well-spent Lent means a happy Easter. We anticipate visits and addresses from several of the Clergy of Toronto.

The Bishop of Toronto will hold a Confirmation in St. George's Church on Sunday evening, February 14th, at 7 o'clock. We trust that many will make a point of being present not only for their own sakes, but also to encourage the young soldiers of Christ, who then make their vows and buckle on their armor.

The Rural Dean of Toronto, Canon Welch, will preach at St. George's on Sunday evening. February 7th. Unfortunately he was prevented from coming to us last month as expected.

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The Rev. J. Silva White, the new assistant of St. Luke's Church, who has recently come from the Northwest, preached an excellent sermon on "The Creation" on Sunday evening, January 31st. Mr. Phillips gave an appropriate selection from the oratorio "The Creation" after the service.

A most delightful and helpful anthem was rendered by the Choir on that evening which was highly appreciated and suggested the question: Why have we so few anthems at St-George's when we have so excellent a choir ?

We notice that the Bishop of Toronto has added two well-known names to his long list of Canons—the Rev. Dr. Cody and the Rev. H. C. Dixon. Both clergymen well deserve the dignity conferred upon them—Dr. Cody for his wonderfully successful work at St. Paul's, and Mr. Dixon for his self-denying labors as our Diocesan Missionary Secretary. One of the, if not the oldest clergyman in Toron'o, Canon Sanson, has recently died at the advanced age of 87. An' enormous crowd attended his funeral which was conducted by the Bishop of Toronto and Archdeacon Boddy. The Rev. T. R. O'Meara who has been for thirteen years the valued assistant of Trinity has been justly appointed as his successor.

Missionary boxes will be distributed among our children for the Lenten Offerings for Foreign and Canadian Missions. We trust that not only the Sunday School children, but all the children of our families, will receive and use them. So highly favored as we are at St. George's with the means of grace, we ought to do much for those who need the Gospel no less than ourselves.

May we again urge upon the new members of the congregation of informing the clergy of their names and addresses that they may receive a hearty and a personal welcome.

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
